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#### Abstract

In August 2013 Britannia Archaeology Ltd (BA) undertook an archaeological trial trench evaluation on 46 - 48 High Street, Needham Market, Suffolk (NGR TM 089 550) in advance of the residential development of the site.

Background research for the project indicated that evidence for Medieval and Postmedieval back-yard/industrial activity associated with the buildings of the Medieval Town Core would most likely be encountered.

The evaluation revealed five phases of activity, the most recent phase comprised the laying of the concrete car park. This surface was removed prior to excavation of the trial trenches.

A second phase of modern activity comprising rubbish pits 1006 and 1008 cut through Levelling Layer 1000. This layer 1000 formed the third phase of activity truncating and sealing existing modern features and preparing the site for the laying of the concrete.

The fourth phase of modern activity comprised rubbish pits and an early modern wall (1004) relating to structures associated with the buildings fronting High Street. The final phase relates to earlier agricultural activity and was a homogenous subsoil layer (1001).

Despite the high potential for medieval and post medieval back-yard/industrial activity no features predating the early modern period were present.


### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

On $19^{\text {th }}$ and $20^{\text {th }}$, August 2013 Britannia Archaeology Ltd (BA) undertook an archaeological trial trench evaluation at $46-48$ High Street, Needham Market, Suffolk (NGR TM 089 550) in response to a design brief issued by Suffolk County Council, Archaeology Service/Conservation Team (SCCAS/CT) (Antrobus. A, dated 01/08/2013). The work was commissioned to comply with a condition of planning permission reference $1694 / 13$ in advance of the residential development of the site.

The works comprised the excavation of two trial trenches measuring $8.00 \times 1.80 \mathrm{~m}$ and $5.00 \times 1.80 \mathrm{~m}$ (Figure 1).

### 2.0 SITE DESCRIPTION

The site is located within an area of garden and hard-standing behind 46 and 48 High Street in Needham Market, in an area dominated by shops and housing estates. It lies within the Medieval core (NDM 026) of the town and therefore had the potential to disturb heritage assets during its development.

The site lies at a height of approximately 22 m AOD, the bedrock geology is described as Newhaven Chalk Formation; a sedimentary deposit formed 71 to 86 million years ago in the Cretaceous Period when the local environment was dominated by warm chalk shelf seas often consisting of a calcareous ooze comprising microscopic plankton remains (BGS, 2013).

The bedrock is overlain by Glaciofluvial deposits of the Mid Pleistocene, consisting of sand and gravel formed up to 2 million years ago in the Quaternary Period. The Local environment then was dominated by ice age conditions, rocks being formed by the action of glaciers that scoured the landscape depositing moraines of till with outwash sand and gravel from seasonal and post glacial meltwaters (BGS, 2013)

### 2.1 Site Visit 14.08.13

A site visit was undertaken on the $14^{\text {th }}$ August 2013, to assess the ground conditions. Access could be gained from the private road off High Street that runs to the centre-east of the building plot. The concrete hard-standing had been removed and spoiled in two heaps that were still present within the plot. TT2 needed to be moved in order to allow excavation (DP's $1 \& 2$ and Figure 1 below); no other issues were noted during the site visit.

### 3.0 PLANNING POLICIES

The archaeological investigation was carried out on the recommendation of the local planning authority, following guidance laid down by the National Planning and Policy Framework (NPPF, DCLD 2012) which replaces Planning Policy Statement 5: Planning for the Historic Environment (PPS5, DCLG 2010). The relevant local planning policy is the Mid Suffolk District Local Plan; (1998) which is due to be replaced with the Mid Suffolk District Local Development Framework in the near future.
3.1 National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF, DCLG March 2012)

The NPPF recognises that 'heritage assets' are an irreplaceable resource and planning authorities should conserve them in a manner appropriate to their significance when considering development. It requires developers to record and advance understanding of the significance of any heritage assets to be lost (wholly or in part) in a manner proportionate to their importance and the impact, and to make this evidence (and any archive generated) publicly accessible. The key areas for consideration are:

- The significance of the heritage asset and its setting in relation to the proposed development;
- The level of detail should be proportionate to the assets' importance and no more than is sufficient to understand the potential impact of the proposal on their significance;
- Significance (of the heritage asset) can be harmed or lost through alteration or destruction, or development within its setting. As heritage assets are irreplaceable, any harm or loss should require clear and convincing justification;
- Local planning authorities should not permit loss of the whole or part of a heritage asset without taking all reasonable steps to ensure the new development will proceed after the loss has occurred;
- Non-designated heritage assets of archaeological interest that are demonstrably of equivalent significance to scheduled monuments, should be considered subject to the policies for designated heritage assets.


### 3.2 Mid Suffolk Local Plan (1998).

The local plan for Mid Suffolk deals with development on archaeological sites in policy HB14, this states the following:

- Where there is an overriding case for preservation, planning permission for development that would affect an archaeological site or setting will be refused.
- Having taking archaeological advice, the district planning authority may decide that development can take place subject to either satisfactory measures to preserve the archaeological remains in situ or for the site to be excavated and the findings recorded. In appropriate cases the district planning authority will expect a legally binding agreement to be concluded or will impose a planning agreement to be concluded or will impose a planning condition requiring the developer to make appropriate and satisfactory provision for the excavation and recording of the archaeological remains.

In section 2.2.3 of the Local Plan the Heritage and Listed Building objectives are:-

- to maintain or enhance the quality of Mid Suffolk's heritage, particularly through safeguarding its Conservation Areas and Listed Buildings
- to protect ancient monuments and their settings
- to give protection to parks and gardens of historic or landscape importance
- to control change in ways that will protect the character of towns and villages and their settings
- to give protection to archaeological sites and to ensure they are properly investigated and recorded if such sites are disturbed by development.


### 4.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

The following archaeological background utilises the Suffolk Historic Environment Record ( 500 m search centred on the site), English Heritage PastScape (www.pastscape.org.uk), and the Archaeological Data Service (www.ads.ahds.ac.uk) (ADS) (Figure 2). There are 127 entries within the 500 m search area, 22 Monument entries, 12 Events, and 93 Listed Buildings (numbers not reproduced in Figure 2 because they are too numerous). Due to the large amount of entries only those nearest the site will be discussed (See Appendix 3 for the full tables).

Prehistoric activity is fairly sparse within the search radius, however 100 m to the north of site at The Pightle (NDM 008), early and later Mesolithic struck flints were recovered during a trial trench evaluation and Neolithic pottery sherds were also located.

Anglo-Saxon activity has been recorded also during excavations at The Pightle (NDM 008) 100 m to the north, where a settlement overlooking the Gipping Valley was revealed. Recent excavations at the former Unilever site immediately to the north and east (NDM 033) recorded a prehistoric barrow and further remains of the Anglo-Saxon settlement as well as those of Roman origin. Roman pottery sherds were also recovered during excavations to the rear of 95 High Street (NDM 012).

The site itself is located within the Medieval core of Needham Market (NDM 026). At 95 High Street Medieval pottery sherds were recovered during the development of a small extension to the rear of the property (NDM 012), pits and postholes were also recorded in trial trenches at The Pightle (NDM 008).

Standing Late Medieval and Post-medieval remains are located at numbers 40, 40a, 42, and 44 High Street, where a range of structures have been listed that date from the 1600 's that have been modified over the centuries. One of the structures parallel to 42 High Street is believed to have been used in the malting industry up until the $19^{\text {th }}$ century. At 56 High Street the building has been Grade II Listed and dates to the $16^{\text {th }}$ Century, it was probably built as an extension for 52 and 54 High Street which are also Grade II Listed. Fifty High Street is another Grade II Listed building which formally had a jetty that ran along the street frontage, it is believed to be of early $16^{\text {th }}$ Century origin.

It was most likely that Medieval and post-medieval back-yard and industrial activity associated with the buildings of the Medieval Town Core would be present within the two trial trenches. However Anglo-Saxon and earlier remains have also been recorded within the vicinity.

### 5.0 PROJECT AIMS

The broad aims laid out in the SCCAS/CT brief were to undertake a linear trenched evaluation of the development area to enable the archaeological resource, both in quality and extent, to be accurately quantified.

It also stated that the evaluation would aim to identify the date, approximate form and purpose of any archaeological deposit, together with its likely extent, localised depth and quality of preservation. To evaluate the likely impact of past land uses, and the possible presence of masking colluvial/alluvial deposits.

It would also establish the potential for the survival of environmental evidence, and provide sufficient information to construct an archaeological conservation strategy, dealing with preservation, the recording of archaeological deposits, working practices, timetables and orders of cost (Antrobus, A. 2013. Sections 4.1 and 4.2).

### 6.0 PROJECT OBJECTIVES

Research objectives for the project were in line with those laid out in Research and Archaeology Revisited: a revised framework for the East of England, East Anglian Archaeology Occasional Paper 24 (Medlycott, 2011).

### 7.0 FIELDWORK METHODOLOGY

The SCCAS/CT brief required the excavation of two trial trenches over an area that comprised $5 \%$ of the total development, in advance of the construction of a single dwelling with associated garage and parking (Figure 1). One trench measuring $1.80 \times 8.00 \mathrm{~m}$ was located within the proposed building footprint, and a second measuring $1.80 \times 5.00 \mathrm{~m}$ was targeted within the garage footprint and associated parking areas but had to be moved due to the presence of a concrete rubble spoil heap (Figure 1).

A mini digger fitted with a toothless ditching bucket was employed to machine down to the first archaeological horizon; thereafter all excavation work was undertaken by hand.

The archaeology was recorded using pro-forma record sheets, drawn plans, section drawings and appropriate photographs were taken.

### 8.0 DESCRIPTION OF RESULTS (Figs. 3 \& 4)

Features and deposits are described below in trench order. Detailed information on all features and deposits can be found at Appendix 1.

Two trenches were excavated to a maximum depth of 1.20 m below ground level exposing the full stratigraphic sequence. Natural drift deposits sloped gently down to the northeast. The features were of modern origin and comprise rubbish pits and building structures.

### 8.1 Trench 1 (Figs. 3)

Trench 1 was located in the centre of the site and contained three modern pits and a modern wall. No other archaeological features were present.

Two modern pits (1006 \& 1008) were located in the north-western half of the trench. Pit 1006 was large and oval in plan and extended beyond the limit of the excavation. Its Fill 1007 comprised a compact mid-grey brown sand, silt and clay containing ceramic building material debris. Modern metalwork and blue and white china were present within the fill however none of these finds were retained. Pit 1008 was also oval in plan and contained a single fill (1009), which was very similar to Fill 1007. Pieces of plastic sheeting along with hard-core and building debris were contained within it but were once again not retained. Both pits were cut through Levelling Layer 1000 and represent the final phase of activity before the concrete was poured on the site forming the car park.

Large Pit 1010 was an irregular oval in plan and extended beyond the limits of the trial trench. Its single Fill 1011 comprised friable sand, silt and clay with a large amount of modern rubbish that included fragments from a fridge, metal work and parts from a bike. Pit 1010 was truncated by Levelling Layer 1000.

Construction Cut 1003 was linear in plan and extended beyond the limits of the trial trench. It contained Brick Wall 1004 and Backfill 1005. Brick Wall 1004, was located in the north-west end of the trench and comprised a linear course orientated north-east to south-west. Its corner was also present within the trench turning perpendicular to the north-west. Nine courses of stretched brickwork bonded with lime mortar survived in situ, the bricks dimensions were uniform measuring $220 \times 110 \times 70 \mathrm{~mm}(\mathrm{~L} \times \mathrm{W} \times \mathrm{D}$ ). This structure is most likely to be an outbuilding or outhouse associated with backyard activity relating to the houses presently fronting High Street. Single Backfill 1005 comprised midorange brown, friable sand, silt and clay interspersed with frequent ceramic building material debris. Construction Cut 1003 and Brick Wall 1004 were truncated by levelling Layer 1000.

### 8.2 Trench 2 (Figs. 4)

Trench 2 was located just to the south-west of Trench 1 and contained a single large modern pit (1012). No other finds or features other than those of modern date were present.

Large Pit 1012 extended beyond the limits of the trench and was oval in plan. It had gently sloping sides and an irregular base. Its Fill 1013 comprised mid-orange grey, compact sand, silt and clay and contained hard-core rubble and ceramic building material. Modern glass and metalwork was also present but none of these finds were retained.

### 9.0 DEPOSIT MODEL (Fig. 3 \& 4)

The deposit model was broadly consistent across both trenches and full sample sections were recorded in each (Figures $3 \& 4$ ).

Levelling Layer 1000 was at the top of the stratigraphic sequence (to a maximum depth of 0.45 m ) and related to a recent phase of modern demolition and levelling associated with the clearing of the site before its transformation into a car park. Prior to the concrete being laid, two rubbish pits in Trench 1 (1006 \& 1008) were cut through this layer and then sealed under the concrete that was poured at a later date.

Below Levelling Layer 1000 was Agricultural Subsoil Layer 1001 (present to a maximum depth of 0.92 m ). No finds were present within this layer.

At the base of the stratigraphic sequence and below Subsoil layer 1001 was Natural Drift Geology 1002. It comprised a mixture of mid yellow/orange, silty sand with moderately sized rounded and sub-angular flint inclusions.

### 10.0 DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSION

The evaluation revealed five phases of activity, the most recent phase comprising the laying of the concrete car park. The concrete surface was removed prior to excavation of the trial trenches. The second phase of activity being modern rubbish pits 1006 and 1008 which were cut through Levelling Layer 1000. Levelling Layer 1000 formed the third phase of activity truncating and sealing existing modern features and preparing the site to be concreted.

Phase four represents another period of modern activity comprising Pits 1010 and 1012 which were cut through Subsoil Layer 1001. Finds include parts of a fridge and a bike which securely dates this layer to the later part of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century. Brick Wall 1004 forms part of a structure related to backyard activity associated with the buildings that front High Street. The dimensions and makeup of the bricks suggests that this was built within the last 100 years. All of the features within this phase were truncated and sealed by Levelling Layer 1000.

The third and final phase is associated with agricultural activity that was undertaken prior to the construction of the medieval buildings, comprising homogenous Subsoil Layer 1001 which contained no features or finds. No layers predating Subsoil 1001 were present. The potential for medieval and post medieval back-yard/industrial activity was believed to be high, however no features or finds predating the early modern period were present. It is clear that the site has suffered significant damage due to the modern excavation of rubbish pits present in the backyards of the properties to the rear of High Street.

### 11.0 PROJECT ARCHIVE AND DEPOSITION

A full archive will be prepared for all work undertaken in accordance with guidance from the Selection, Retention and Dispersion of Archaeological Collections, Archaeological Society for Museum Archaeologists, 1993. Deposition will be with the relevant museum or Suffolk County Council Archaeological Store subject to agreement with the legal landowner

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where finds are concerned and in accordance with Deposition of Archaeological Archives in Suffolk, 2010.

The archive will be quantified, ordered, indexed, cross-referenced and checked for internal consistency. The material will be catalogued, labelled and packaged for transfer and storage in accordance with the guidelines set out in the United Kingdom Institute for Conservation's Conservation Guidelines No. 2 and the Archaeological Archives Forum's Archaeological Archives, A guide to best practice, compilation, transfer and curation (Brown, 2007).
