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Summary

An archaeological desk-based assessment and walkover survey was carried out between 8 and 12 February 2012 on behalf of Scottish Woodlands at Amer, Glen Bracadale, Skye, in advance of a woodland creation scheme. The work was undertaken to assess the nature and extent of any archaeology likely to be affected within the areas outlined for planting and regeneration and in order to inform recommendations for the protection and management of any sites recovered. The survey identified 84 new archaeological sites including prehistoric hut circles and boulder walls, and later settlement remains including townships, farmsteads, pens, shielings and a complex of turf and stone dykes. Twenty-nine areas of relict rig and furrow cultivation have also been recorded, which complements the settlement remains. Mitigation measures are proposed to safeguard the sites during the establishment of the woodland scheme.

1. Introduction

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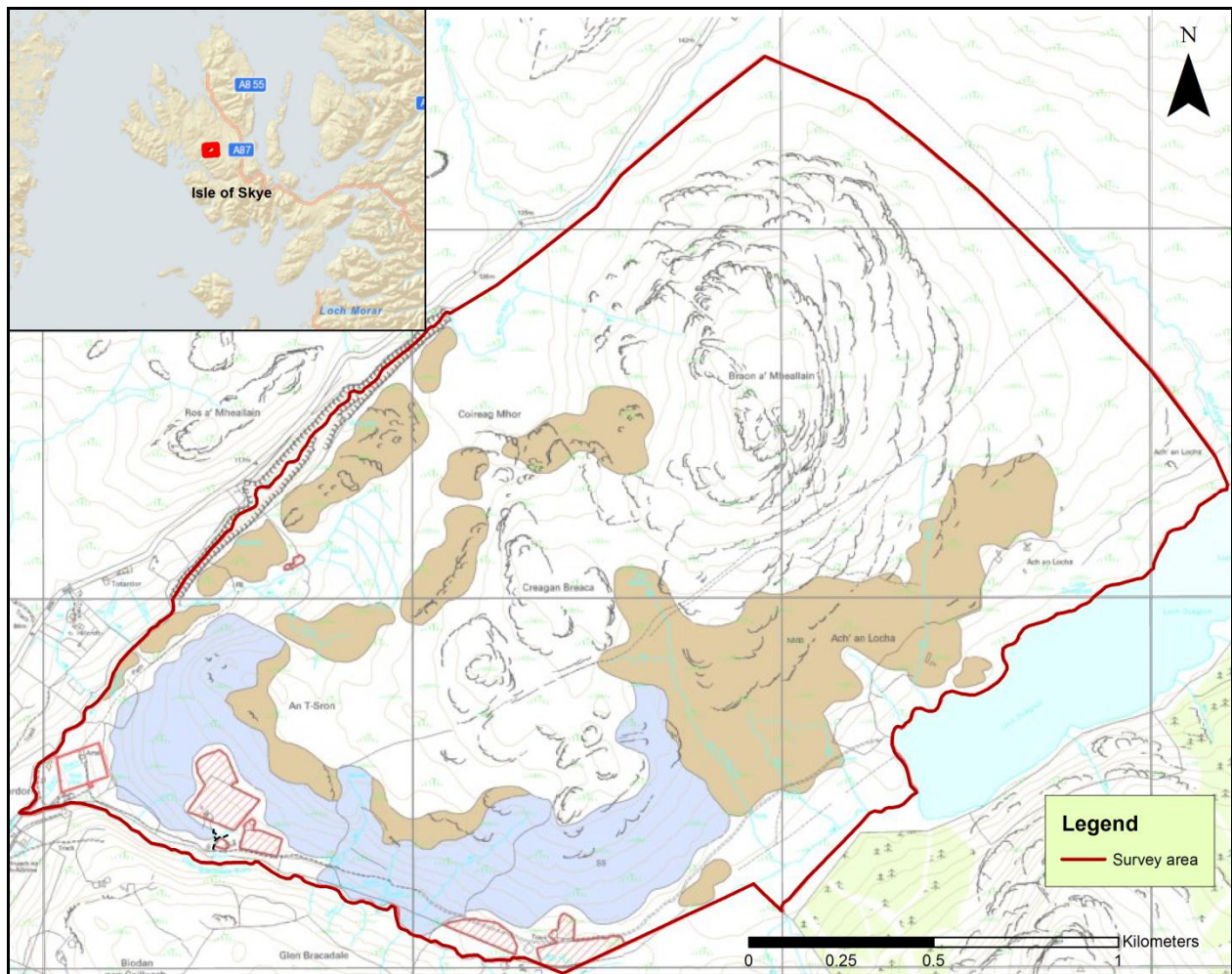


Figure 1 – Site Location map showing survey area at Amer, Skye

- 1.1 A desk-based assessment and walkover survey of the visible archaeological monuments surviving within the boundaries of a proposed woodland establishment scheme (centred at grid reference NG) was carried out at Amer, Glen Bracadale, on the island of Skye (see Fig.1) by West Coast Archaeological Services between 8 and 12 February 2012. The survey was requested by Scottish Woodlands because the area proposed for the woodland development is located in a landscape with a potential for sites of archaeological significance.
- 1.2 The purpose of the desk-based assessment and archaeological walkover survey was to identify and record the location and nature of any archaeological features of interest prior to development, whilst assessing any potential adverse impacts and proposing an appropriate strategy of mitigation. The *Scottish Planning Policy 2010* describes how archaeology should be managed when considering planning decisions and determining conditions for developments that have an impact on the historic environment.

3. Site Location

- 3.1 The area of the walkover survey at Amer totalled approximately 500 hectares, and is located in Glen Bracadale on the west coast of the island of Skye, some 4 km ENE of Struan (see Fig.1). Situated on rising ground at the NE end of the sea inlet of Loch Beag, the area for survey is bounded to the NW by the Allt Mor, to the SW by the Glen Bracadale Burn and to the NE by the Allt Garbh. The freshwater Loch Duagrich bounds most of the SE side of the survey area, along with low-lying marshy ground and a small un-named burn.
- 3.2 The survey area is dominated at the NE end by Braon a' Mheallain (267m) and by lower lying hills Creagan Breaca (199m) and An t-Sron (137m) to the SW. These hills form the spine of the survey area and are formed from basalt rocks, which form numerous rocky scarps on the slopes of the hills.
- 3.3 There are few trees within the survey area, much of which comprises open heather and grass moorland. The ground is very wet in parts, especially where peat accumulation is most pronounced. However, some of the steeper slopes are relatively

well drained, while many of the basalt outcrops have formed dry islands of good grazing.

- 3.4 Several small burns including the Allt Beithe penetrate the survey area, while artificial drainage ditches are a common feature on some of the hill slopes, attesting to relatively recent attempts to drain some of the wetter areas of ground. Peat cuts of unknown age are also numerous in some sectors of the area, mainly located on the flat, poorly drained areas of peat.
- 3.5 Views from the slopes of the hills in the survey area extend to the seascapes of Loch Bracadale and the Western Isles, and to the surrounding hills and moorlands to the NW, NE and SE. The house at Amer and several farm buildings within the SW corner of the survey area are the only buildings currently in use.

4. Archaeological and Historical Background

- 4.1 Amer, or *Amar*, translates to ‘The Channel’, which most likely refers to the narrow sea-inlet and Amar River channel that runs ENE to Amer Farm.
- 4.2 There appears to have been no previous archaeological survey of the area proposed for the planting scheme at Amer, although there have been significant settlements located along the periphery, especially to the SW and S (Bracadale) and the SE (Ach’ an Locha – *Field of the Loch*).
- 4.3 There are numerous sites of archaeological importance located in the surrounding landscape around Amer. In particular, prehistoric activity in the area is dominated by the numerous brochs and duns including Dun Beag, Dun Mor, Dun Diarmaid, Dun Garsin and Dun Taimh; souterrains at Knock Ullinish, Glen Bracadale and within the Iron Age Farmstead of Tungadale; and by several hut circles and relict field systems.
- 4.4 Prehistoric funerary monuments include the chambered cairn of Neolithic age at Ullinish and the later potential Bronze Age cairn nearby, while later religious activity is represented by the ruins of St. Assind’s Chapel, which is located on the NE shore of Loch Beag.
- 4.5 Otherwise, it is the post-medieval settlement remains that are most obvious in the surrounding area, although many of these settlements and their associated infrastructure have never been recorded archaeologically.

5. Methodology

The overall aim of this assessment was to identify and record any archaeological sites or features that might be affected by the proposed tree planting and regeneration scheme, including access tracks and fence erection within the survey area at Amer and to propose mitigation as appropriate to ensure that archaeological sites and monuments are not unnecessarily damaged or destroyed.

5.1 Desk-Based Assessment

- 5.1.1 A desk-based assessment was conducted prior to commencement of the survey in order to assess the archaeological potential of the area based on previously recorded sites and any historical documentation.
- 5.1.2 A search was made of all relevant records from the National Monuments Record of Scotland (NMRS – Canmore) and the Highland Council Historic Environment Record (HER). Aerial imagery was also checked for any relevant site information where possible.

5.2 Walkover Survey

- 5.2.1 The area of the proposed woodland planting scheme was walked over and surveyed between the 9 and 12 February 2012, during a period of cool, and showery, weather. Conditions on the ground for the walkover survey were good, although very wet underfoot in parts, with generally good visibility and light levels.
- 5.2.2 Archaeological sites were recorded individually including using high-resolution digital photography where possible, while sketch survey drawings were produced where necessary. The individual site locations were plotted using ArcPad GIS software on a handheld Windows Mobile-based computer. Details relating to the individual recovered sites and monuments can be found in the Gazetteer of Archaeological Sites in Appendix 1.
- 5.2.3 Survey and recording methods from the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland (RCAHMS) were employed and all work was conducted in strict adherence to the *Institute for Archaeologists (IfA) Code of Conduct*.

6. Results

The following sections present the results of the desk-based assessment and walkover survey.

6.1 Desk-Based Assessment

A desk-based assessment was carried out in advance of the walkover survey in order to assess the archaeological potential of the area based on previously recorded sites and any historical documentation.

6.1.1 Cartographic Sources

- 6.1.1.1 Mapping held at the National Library of Scotland in Edinburgh was checked on-line and produced the following results.

6.1.1.2 One-inch Ordnance Survey 1st, 2nd and 3rd Editions

Portree

Sheet 80: 1884, 1896, 1909

The 1st and 2nd Edition maps show *Amer* with the name of *Teangamore*, which at this time appears to have two roofed buildings, while a track leads east down Glen Bracadale towards Tungadale. The 3rd Edition map shows a total of three roofed buildings at *Teangamore*, along with the track in Glen Bracadale.

6.1.1.3 Six-inch Ordnance Survey 1st and 2nd Editions

Inverness-shire

Sheets XXVIII & XXIX

The 1st Edition map sheets published in 1881 depicts three roofed buildings and one unroofed building at *Teangamore* along with a well and two enclosures. A large sheepfold is shown to the north of the track leading through Glen Bracadale, while a single unroofed building is shown to the north of the track, to the east of the sheepfold. A single unroofed building, probably a house or farmstead, is also shown at Ach' an Locha.

The 2nd Edition sheets, published in 1903, show the same features as noted for the 1st Edition six-inch mapping. However, an additional unroofed building is shown adjacent to the house/farmstead at Ach' an Locha.

6.1.1.4 2 ½ inch (1:25 000) Ordnance Survey Explorer Map – Sheet 410, 2007

This modern map of Bracadale has utilised aerial imagery and depicts several sites of archaeological interest within the survey area. Field systems and clusters of settlement remains are shown on the lower NW, SW and S flanks of An t-Sron. This includes the remains of the buildings and enclosures depicted on the 6 inch OS mapping at *Teangamore* (shown as Amar on this map); a farmstead and associated field walls are shown to the SE of the Allt Mor, to the NW of An t-Sron; and a complex of fields and settlement remains are depicted to the N of the track in Glen Bracadale, immediately to the NW of the large sheepfold shown on the 6 inch OS mapping.

Further ESE, at a prominent turn in the track running through Glen Bracadale, a single unroofed building is shown with attached enclosure (this also appears to be the single unroofed structure shown on the 6 inch OS mapping).

Additional field walls and enclosures are shown running across the lower flanks of Braon a' Mheallain, and at least three individual farmsteads are depicted at Ach' an Locha. The farmstead shown to the SW in this group appears to correlate with the Ach' an Locha farmstead depicted on the 6 inch OS mapping.

The settlement lies around the W, SW, S and SE boundaries of the survey area and with the exception of what appears to be a degraded boundary dyke running on a NE-SW axis through the area, no other archaeological features are shown.

6.1.1.5 John Thomson's Atlas of Scotland

Skye Island, 1832

Thompson's map of 1832 shows no features of archaeological interest within the survey area at Amer, with the exception of the track leading east through Glen Bracadale towards Loch Duagrich.

6.1.2 Highland Historic Environment Record (HHER)

A full search of the Highland Historic Environment Record (HHER) produced two sites within the boundaries of the survey areas, and two other relevant sites in adjacent areas of the landscape:

6.1.2.1 MHG27684

NG 37050 39510

Farmstead, Amar

A farmstead, comprising three roofed buildings, one unroofed building and one enclosure is depicted on the 1st edition of the OS 6-inch map (Inverness-shire, Isle of Skye 1881, sheet xxviii). Three roofed buildings are shown on the current edition of the OS 1:10000 map (1992).

6.1.2.2 MHG27676

NG 38310 39050

Township, Glen Bracadale

What may be a township, comprising one roofed building, two unroofed buildings and two enclosures is depicted on the current edition of the OS 1:10000 map (1992). One unroofed building is shown on the 1st edition of the OS 6-inch map (Inverness-shire, Isle of Skye 1881, sheet xxviii).

6.1.2.3 MHG4873

NG 38260 38960

Souterrain, Glen Bracadale

NG 3826 3896 In Glen Bracadale, WSW of Loch Duagrich, at an elevation of 300ft OD is a ruined earth-house. It is situated on a mound of earth and stone apparently partly artificial, and the entrance seems to have been about 6ft from the bank of the stream.

The earth-house has the form of a narrow gallery with drystone walls and lintelled roof about 9ins under the surface, which led into the mound in a direction very slightly to the W of N and then curves round regularly to the NW. The first 6ft of the walls seem to have been quite destroyed, but for some 26ft beyond they can be traced, the space between being filled with debris. At two places, some 16ft and 21ft 6ins from where the walls begin, several lintels remain, covering a length of 3ft and 4ft 7ins respectively. The hollow can be traced farther until it dies away in a circular stony mound, the center of which lies some 15ft from the last lintel. Under one of the lintels the gallery shows a width of 2ft 6ins. There seems to have been a rise of about 3ft in the length of the earth-house.
RCAHMS 1928.

An earth-house as described by RCAHMS. About 30.0m to the NW is a ruined house with byre and yard, and about 60.0m to the NE is another.
Visited by OS (C F W) 1 June 1961.

6.1.3 Statistical Accounts

6.1.3.1 The Statistical Accounts of 1791-99, says that the main agricultural produce grown in Bracadale Parish was oats, barley and potatoes, while cattle, sheep and horses are the main livestock raised.

6.1.3.2 The population at the time of the Account numbers around 2250 people. However, between 1771 and 1774, the Account states that 128 people emigrated, while in 1788 an additional 200 people sailed for North America. The Statistical Account of 1834-45 suggests that the decline in the population of Bracadale Parish continued and that *'...the decrease in population is solely to be ascribed to the system of farming, which has for some time been adopted, viz. throwing a number of farms into one large tack for sheep-grazing, and dispossessing and setting adrift the small tenants'* (Glass, 1840).

6.1.3.3 Otherwise, there is little detail in the accounts relating to the actual individual farms and settlements on the ground.

6.1.4 Aerial Imagery

6.1.4.1 A scan of the digital imagery for the area of the survey produced a wide number of contacts for investigation that were not visible on the Ordnance Survey mapping or other desk-based sources of information. This included additional structures including potential farmsteads, especially associated with the Glen Bracadale and Ach' an Locha Townships, field walls/dykes and significant areas of relict rig and furrow cultivation. However, with the exception of peat cuttings and numerous drainage ditches cutting across the hill-slopes, the aerials also showed large tracts of quite open, featureless ground, especially to the north of the survey area.

6.2 Walkover Survey Results

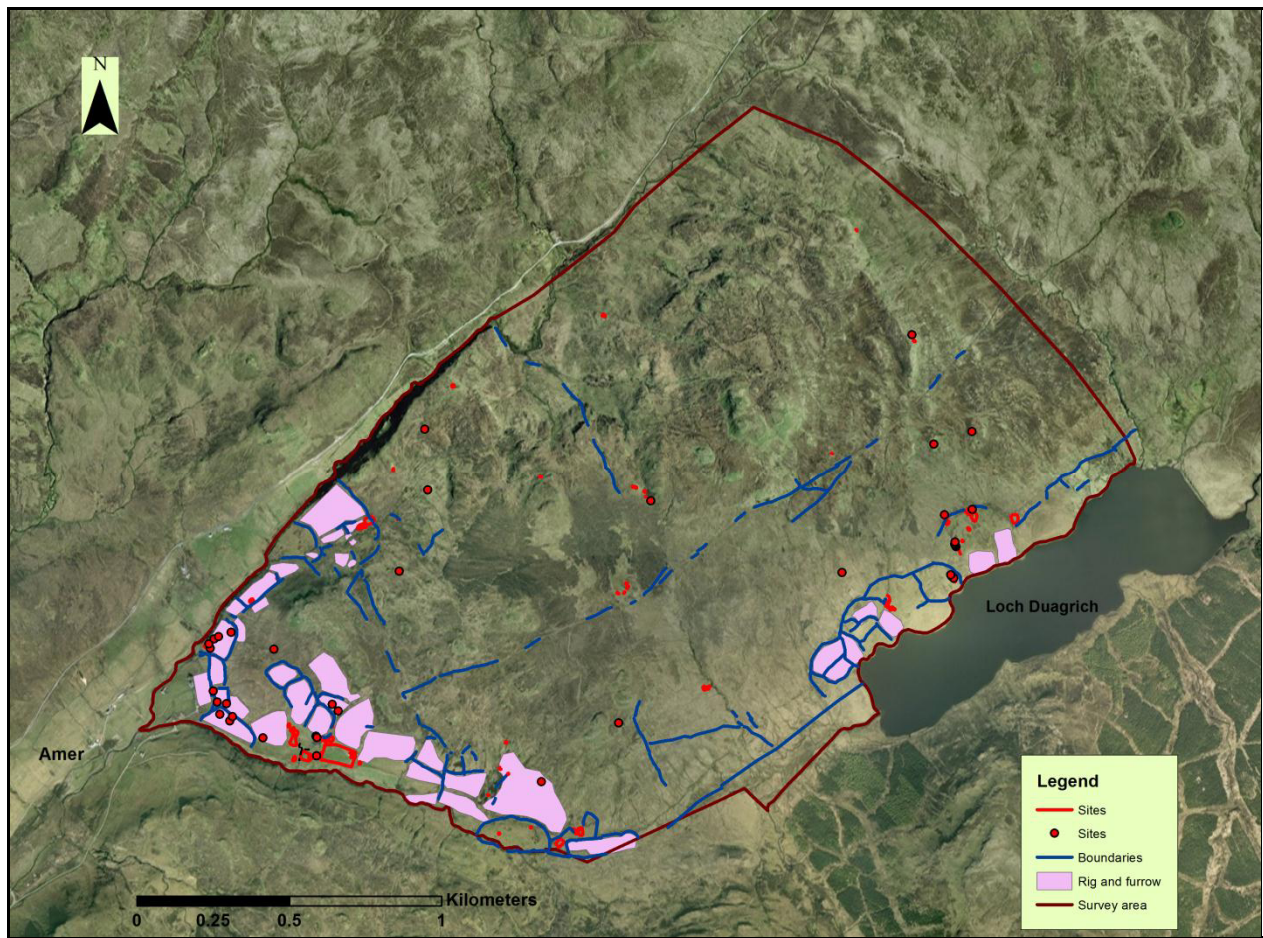


Figure 2 – Aerial image of survey area showing distribution of archaeological sites

The walkover survey revealed 84 new archaeological sites within the survey area (see Fig. 2), some of which comprise multiple and complex structures including farmsteads and shieling groups. Twenty-six areas of relict rig and furrow cultivation were also recorded, most of which were concentrated around the west, south and southeast perimeters of the survey area, in particular near the township of Amer. These sites generally relate to the Post Medieval use of the landscape, including transhumance activities, although hut circles and boulder boundaries indicate the use of the landscape during prehistory. The Gazetteer of Archaeological Sites (see Appendix 1) provides details of the individual sites identified during the survey.

6.2.1 Prehistoric Period

6.2.1.1 A total of six prehistoric hut circles were identified during the walkover survey (Sites 1, 16b, 20a, 25, 27b and 28c), most of which are in a very-degraded state of preservation. The sites have been robbed for stone and most are overlain by later shieling structures. Generally, the sites are located on terraces overlooking Glen Bracadale and Corieag Mhor at altitudes exceeding 175 metres OD, where their remains have been partially obscured and buried by peat growth.

6.2.1.2 Boulder-built walls of possible prehistoric age were also recorded on the slopes above Glen Bracadale (Sites 47, 56, 63, 66 and 70), which are most likely contemporary with the hut circles. They generally comprise rows of large boulders, some of which are set on edge, that are only visible on raised, dry areas of ground. Elsewhere, they are obscured by peat growth, especially within hollows in the landscape. The walls run in a linear manner up the hill-slopes, although one section of wall ran horizontally across the hillside where it adjoined and filled areas between low rock scarps and outcrops.

6.2.1.3 The discovery of the hut circles and boulder walls within the survey area adds to a growing number of prehistoric sites of possible contemporary age, such as the brochs and duns scattered around the shores of Loch Bracadale and the Amer inlet, the Iron Age Farmstead and souterrain at Tungadale, and the souterrain located within the later settlement of Glen Bracadale (see Section 6.1.2.3 in this report).

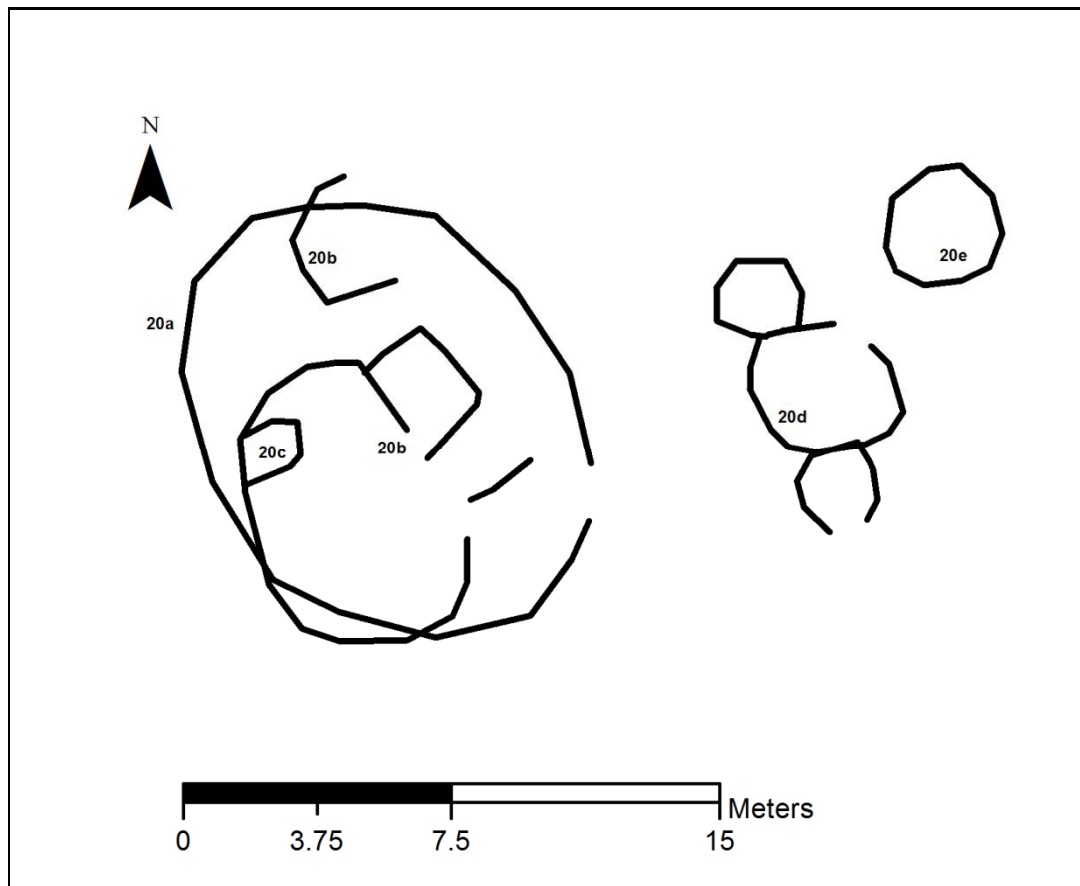


Figure 3 – Remains of prehistoric hut circle 20a and overlying shieling structures

6.2.2 Historic Period

6.2.2.1 A significant number of sites were recovered during the walkover survey at Amer that relate to settlement in the area during the Historic period, most of which are new to the archaeological record. With a poor excavation record for structures of this period in Skye, it is difficult to assign a specific age to them. It is possible that some of the farmsteads and shieling sites extend back into the later medieval period, although it is more likely that most of the structures recorded relate to post-medieval settlement. The desk-based sources do not generally provide any additional detail to assist our interpretation of these sites. Indeed, most of the settlements recorded, whether individual farmsteads or townships, are not depicted on early cartographic sources and it is also difficult to assign names to these formerly settled places in the landscape.

6.2.2.2 It is possible that the complex of houses, byres and associated structures centred on Sites 10, 11 and 13 formed a part of the *Glen Bracadale* Township, while the farmstead (Site 19) also formed a part of this settlement. The township of Ach' an Locha is represented by the farmsteads recorded at Sites 21, 23 and 24. There is no name available from the desk-based sources to attach to the farmstead complex identified in the northwest of the survey area (Site 4).

- 6.2.2.3 Some of the houses recorded within these sites include complex, multi-phase structures of stone and turf (for example see Sites 4, 21, 23 and 24), of impressive size. We can only speculate on their function and why they display such complex morphology, although it is possible that they were modified and extended to house an ever-increasing population, especially during the post-medieval period prior to the clearances that took place in this area.
- 6.2.2.4 Transhumance activity within the wider landscape is indicated by the numerous individual shielings and shieling groups that are generally located on the slopes above the townships and farmsteads, along and adjacent to stream-courses. The shielings comprise single and multi-cell structures built from stone and turf, which most likely served a variety of functions during the summer months. The distribution of the shieling groups appear to relate to the major settlement in the valleys below and it is possible to group these sites together into respective land-holdings. For example, shieling sites 7, 27, 28 and 33 most likely relate to the former township of *Amar* (*Teangamore*) and the farmstead Site 4. The shieling sites 29, 30, 31 and 32 are most likely connected with the township of *Ach' an Locha*; while shieling sites 16, 17, 20, 34 and 35 relate to the township of *Glen Bracadale*.
- 6.2.2.5 Finally, the historic landscape is enhanced by turf and stone boundary dykes, enclosures and areas of relict rig and furrow cultivation. Most of the cultivation plots are centred on the *Amer* and *Glen Bracadale* townships, many of these enclosed by dykes to form small globular-shaped fields. Elsewhere, throughout the survey area, the landscape has been divided by boundary dykes. A major linear dyke runs SW-NE through the survey area (Sites 54 and 81), while other dykes (Sites 46, 49, 54, 63, 65 and 84) run in a SE-NW direction, possibly marking the extent of the townships and their associated grazings.

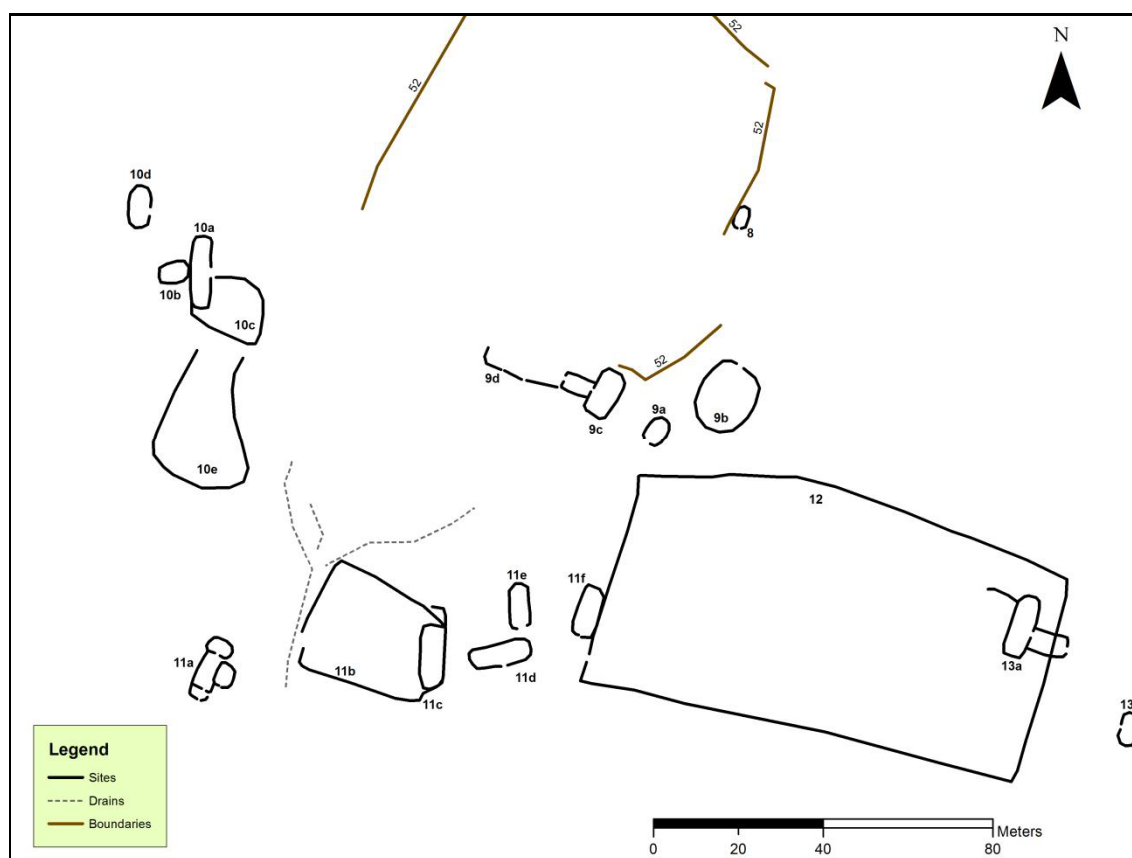


Figure 4 – Plan of the sites forming part of the township of *Glen Bracadale*

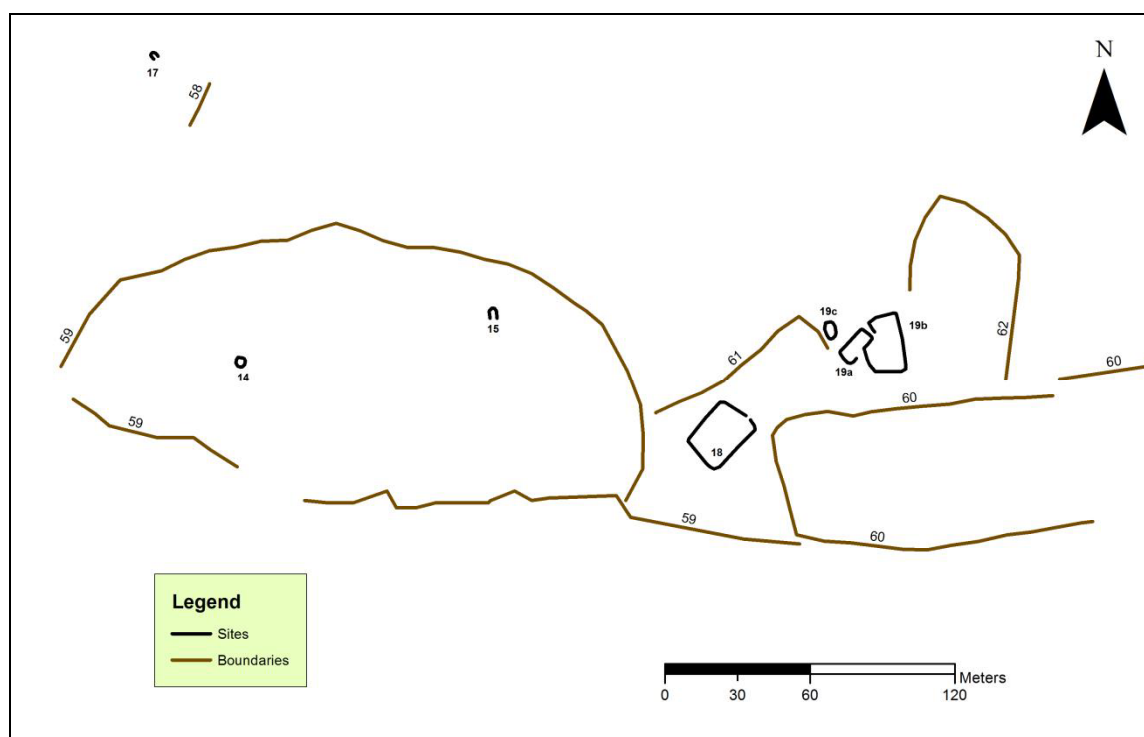


Figure 5 – Plan of farmstead Site 19 and associated enclosures in Glen Bracadale

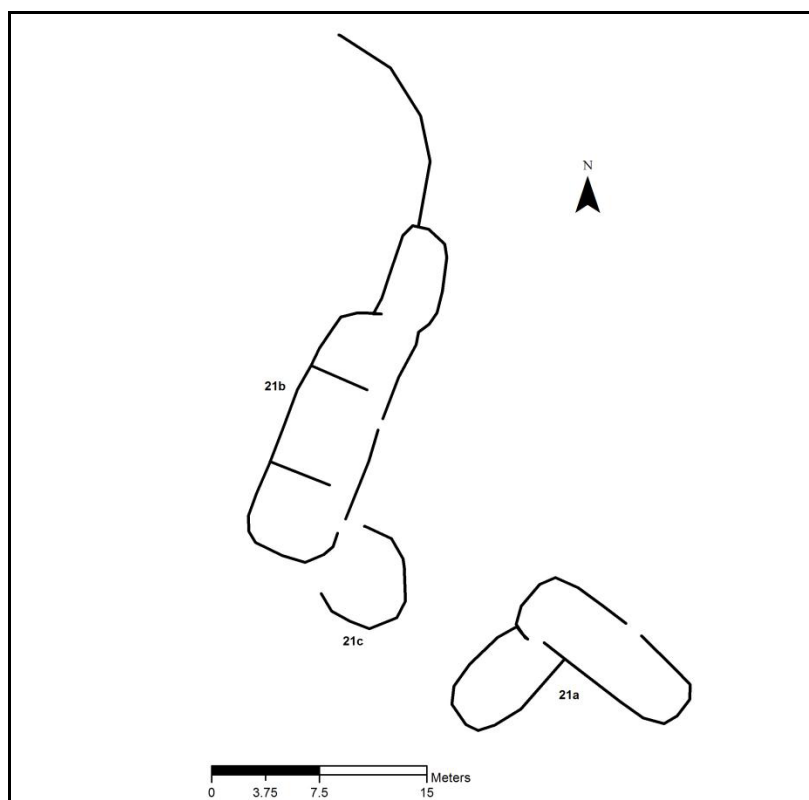


Figure 6 – Plan of farmstead Site 21, *Ach' an Locha*

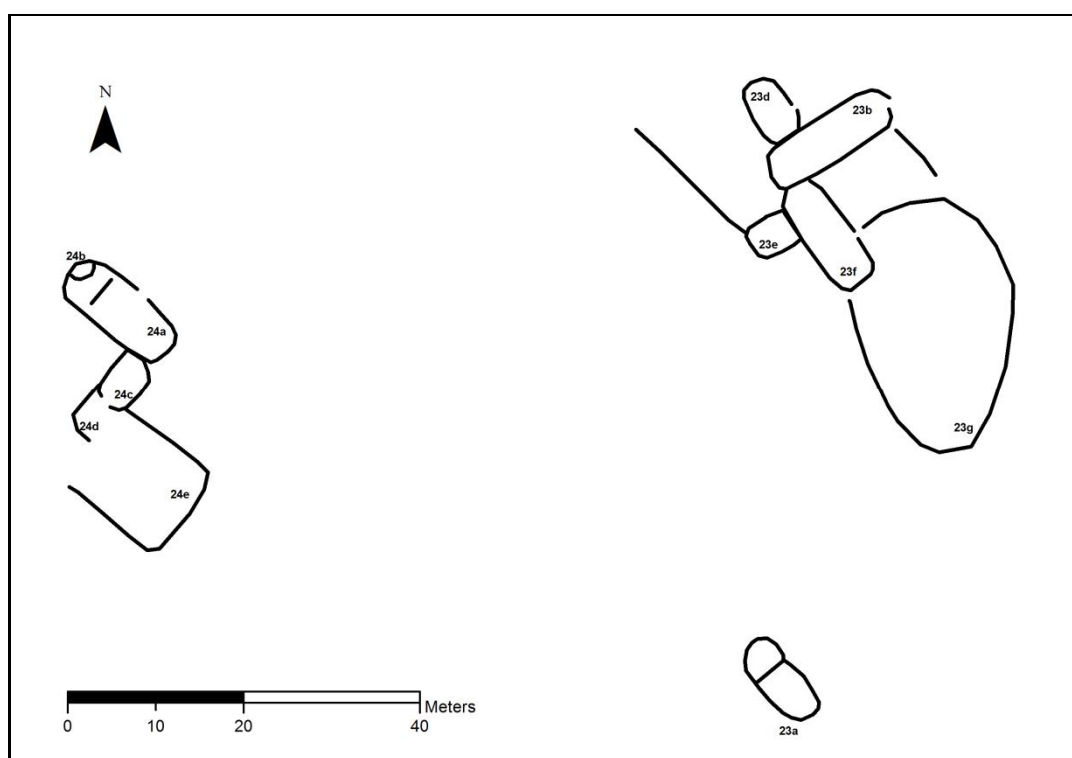


Figure 7 – Plan of farmstead Sites 23 and 24, *Ach' an Locha*

7. Discussion

- 7.1 The desk-based assessment and archaeological walkover survey of the designated area at Amer, Skye resulted in the detailed recording of a well-preserved historic landscape, with underlying remains of prehistoric hut circles and associated boulder walls. The prehistoric sites are of National importance and add to a corpus of associated, contemporary sites in the Bracadale area. It is possible that other prehistoric sites lie within the survey area and are now obscured by peat growth and the development of the later historic landscape.
- 7.2 The majority of the sites recovered during the survey comprise a well-preserved historic landscape with evidence for farmsteads and their associated infrastructure forming townships, and shielings within the wider landscape relating to these townships. Boundary dykes, enclosures and areas of rig and furrow cultivation complete this historic landscape of regional significance, the boundary dykes in particular allowing us an insight into the division and use of the land through time.
- 7.3 Recommendations for the management and preservation of the historic environment recorded at Amer are set out below.

8. Recommendations

- 8.1 At least a 10-metre buffer zone should be maintained around any individual buildings and structures including shielings, and any new tree growth within these buffer zones should be managed.
- 8.2 A 20-metre buffer zone should be maintained around the prehistoric hut circles and associated infrastructure and any new tree growth within these zones should be managed. At least a 10-metre buffer zone should be retained to each side of the boulder boundary dykes, which are most likely contemporary with the hut circles.
- 8.3 At least a 20-metre buffer zone should be maintained in the planting scheme around major areas of settlement including townships, farmsteads and shieling groups, and any new tree growth within these buffer zones should be managed. This will safeguard any additional buried remains or archaeological deposits that may extend beyond the visible features at the surface, while also allowing intra-visibility between sites and associated structures. Polygon shape-files showing recommended buffer zones are included with this report.
- 8.4 At least a 5 metres buffer zone should be retained to each side of boundary dykes, to protect and retain these important land divisions within the landscape. Any new tree growth within these buffer zones should be managed.
- 8.5 Areas of relict rig and furrow cultivation have been recorded for the Historic Environment Record, providing preservation by record. Therefore, with the exception of specific enclosed fields as identified by Scottish Woodlands on the original base mapping, areas of rig and furrow cultivation may be taken into the planting scheme.

These features potentially provide some of the better quality and well-drained soils within the survey area.

- 8.6 Access tracks for vehicles and the erection of any new fence lines should also respect the recommendations set out above.

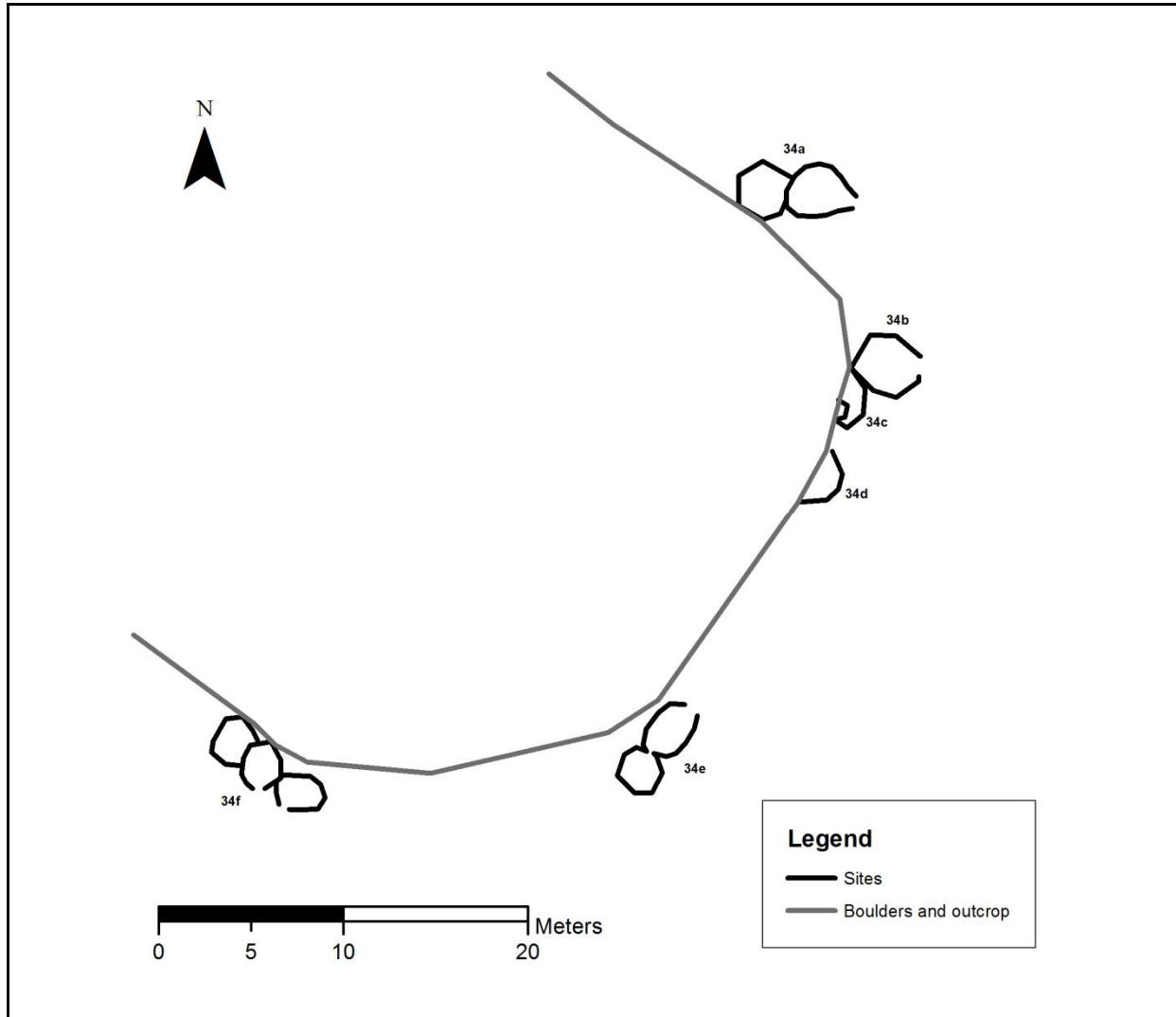


Figure 8 – Plan of shieling Site 34 on the flanks of *Creagan Breaca*

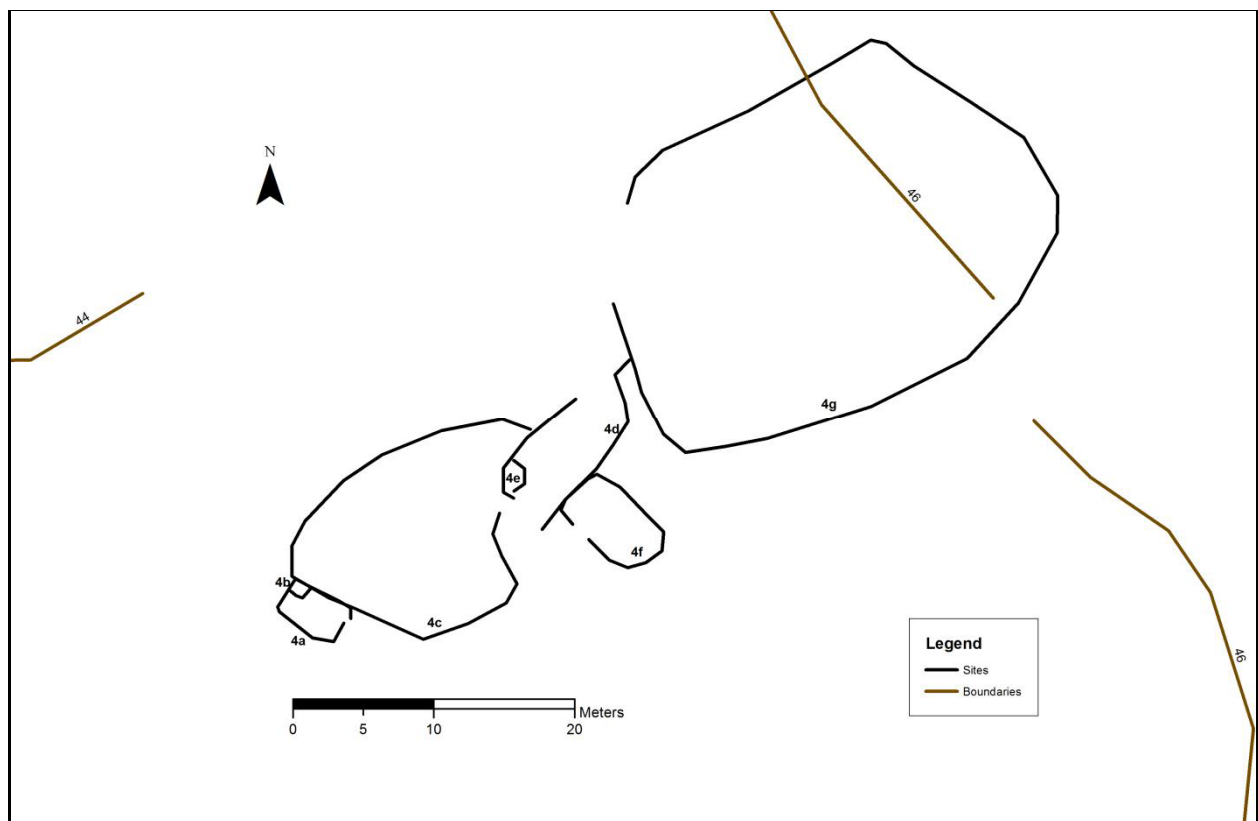


Figure 9 – Plan of farmstead Site 4 and associated structures, *Allt Mor*

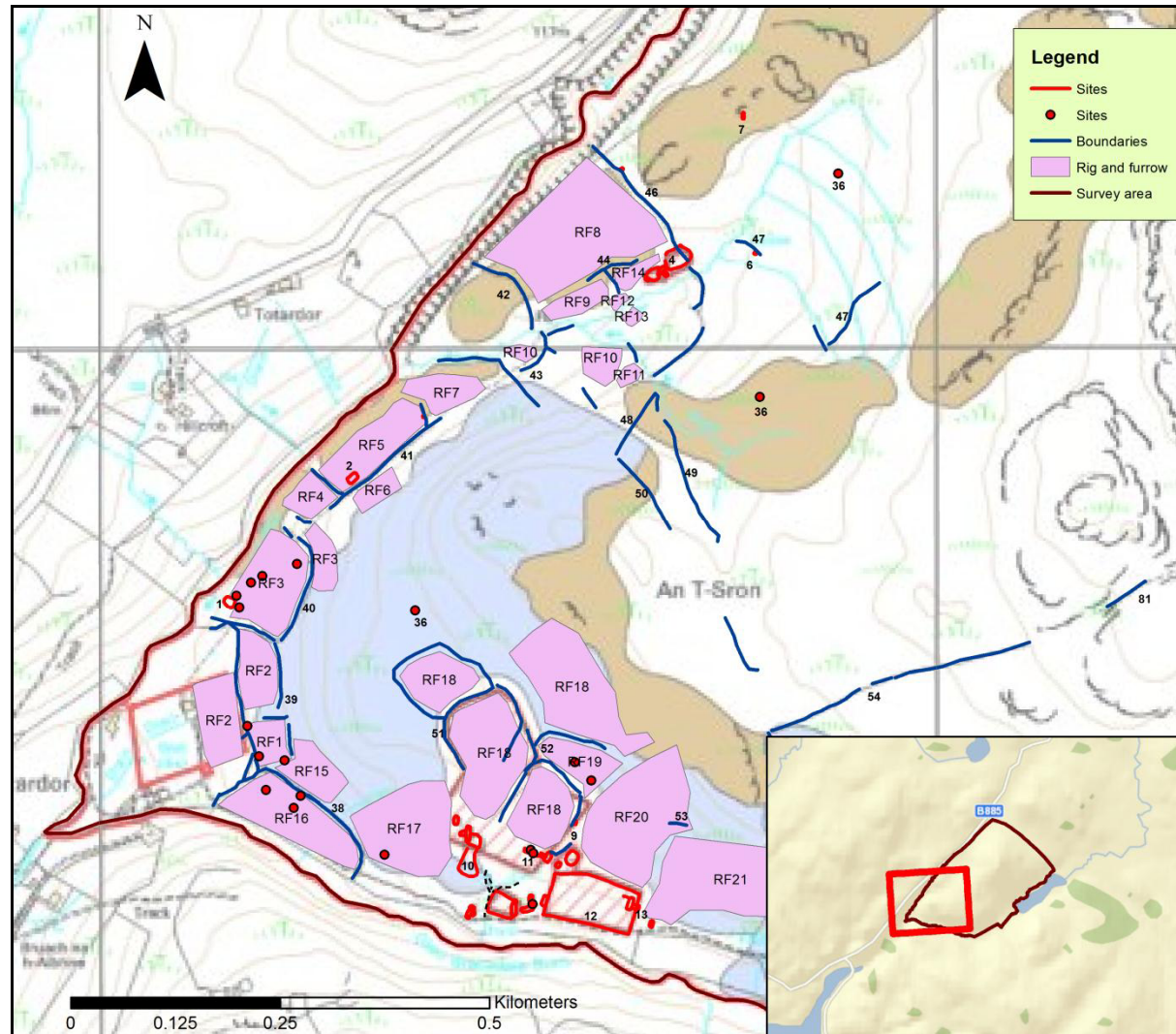


Figure 10 – Distribution of archaeological sites (Amer and An T-Sron)

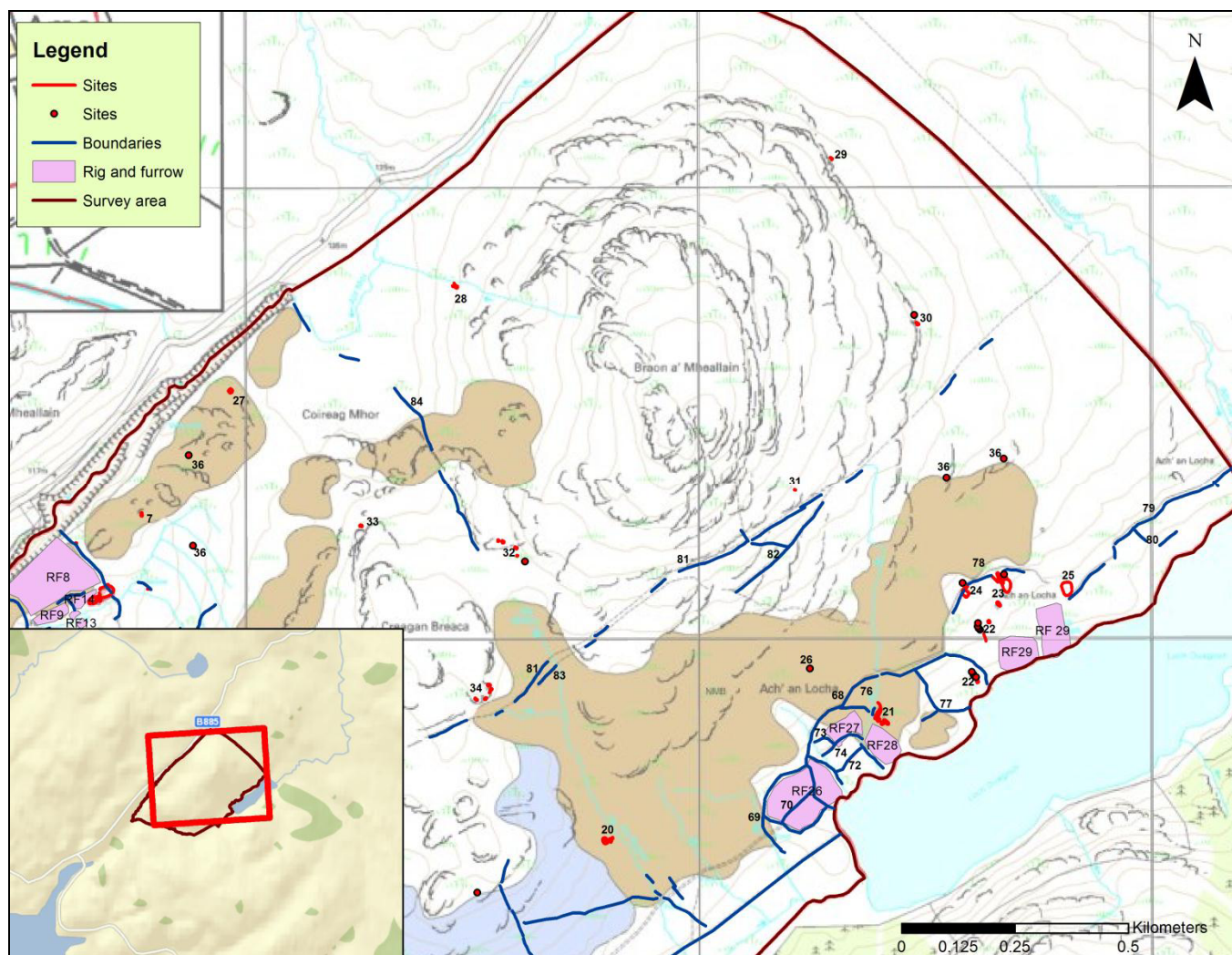


Figure 11 – Distribution of archaeological sites (Allt Mhor and Ach' an Locha)

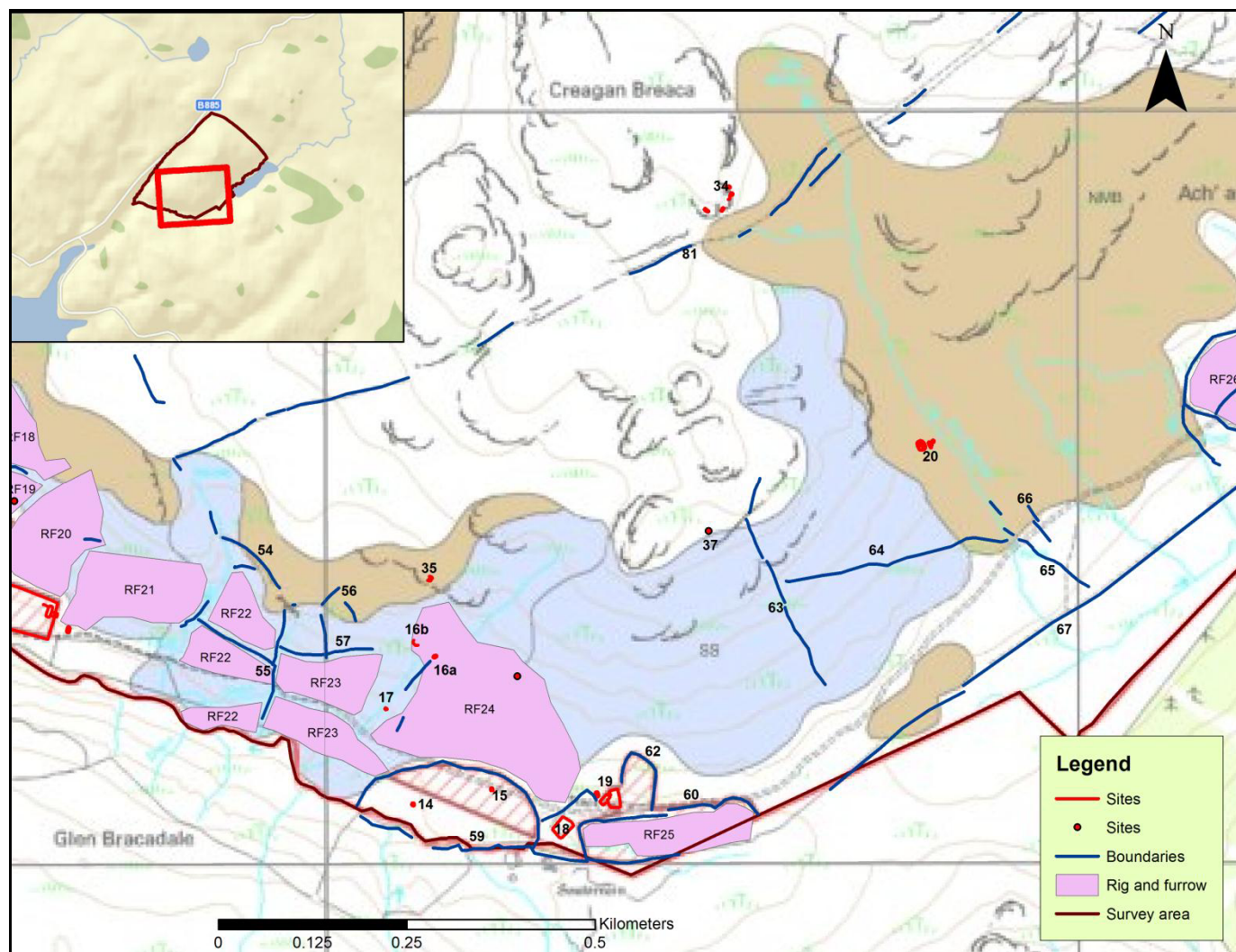


Figure 12 – Distribution of archaeological sites (Glen Bracadale)
