# Glastonbury Abbey Catalogue of Medieval Floor Tile Designs

#### **Group 1**

This is the earliest surviving group of tiles at Glastonbury Abbey.

The tilers had previously worked at Clarendon Palace, evidenced by the mounted knight tile with embellished detail, design 1, similar to but not identical with examples from Clarendon (now in Salisbury Museum and the British Museum). There are also some other designs in common, but it is not known if they have the same stamps.

The kiln site was somewhere near Silver Street. A dump of tile wasters was found together with bronze and iron workings, implying an industrial area. The wasters were used as foundation material so they were not in situ in a dump at a tile workshop but this was obviously at no great distance away.

This group is associated with Michael of Amesbury (abbot 1235-1252), evidently a man of energy as well as financial acumen. According to Bond (*An Architectural Handbook of Glastonbury Abbey*, p.20-1) "a man of good business ability, ..... during his eighteen years of rule brought the establishment out of poverty into prosperity. He erected a hundred buildings, some within, some without the monastery. He was buried in the north transept." It was during his abbacy that "the arable lands of Glastonbury were extended, land was drained, enclosed and reclaimed from the sea and marshes, new barns, sheep houses, dairies and dovecotes were constructed and stock was increased until there were some 1300 cattle and over 7000 sheep" (Aspects of The Medieval Landscape of Somerset, edited by Michael Aston, p.64. Original source M. Williams, The Draining of the Somerset Levels, CUP 1970).

There is a tiling phase at Wells at this period but this was supplied by the Nash Hill kiln. The position of the Glastonbury kiln site close to the abbey does suggest that it was set up to supply the abbey only and possibly had only a relatively small scale production. Tiles of this group are not found in the north transept where Michael of Amesbury was buried which might suggest that tiles at that time were limited to the chancel area. An alternative argument might be that later tiles were so plentiful that earlier ones were replaced. Relations with Wells were not affable in the early 13<sup>th</sup> century so a wider market was perhaps not likely.


For convenience of analysis, the group has been divided into three sub-groups based solely on size. This is an artificial distinction and they are probably co-eval:

- 1a Rectangular step tiles, used as treads or risers;
- 1b Border tiles:
- 1c 'Normal' sized square tiles.


There are few examples of group 1, probably indicating that they were not laid in large quantities. If so, being few in numbers they were probably laid in prominent positions which could in turn mean that they were later replaced by other tile schemes.

There are also fragments of five other tile designs, D143-D147, probably belonging to group 1, which were not included in the main publication as they were too small to make out the design.



## **Group 2**

## **Group 2**

These tiles are from a circular pavement, a design using both inlaid and plain tiles.

The original inspiration for this may have been the pavements at Clarendon Palace but there are significant differences. The Clarendon ones are completely circular so they must have been set in plaster but the Glastonbury one has a square frame around it so it could easily fit in with other tile schemes. However, would this not lose the effect? There is also another difference as the Glastonbury tiles are quite small and dainty. Perhaps they were surrounded by plain tiles? Sadly, no examples of the corner tiles of the frame survive but from the fleur de lys at the end of the dragon tile, presumably set diagonally, it must have been a normal sized  $5^1/2^n$  square tile showing that this size of quarry was in use by this period.


The only other known locations for this group are at the Beckery Chapel and Muchelney Abbey. However, the Muchelney tiles do not have the same fabric and at least one of the stamps is different. The date is implied by the Beckery Chapel tiles. Although in the possession of the abbey it was leased out and not under the abbot's control until John of Taunton's appointment in 1274.

ICPS analysis indicated a distinction with other groups although there are strong similarities. This is not surprising as the timings/temperature of the firings would be critical, so there was possibly a specific kiln for these tiles. Stacking of the tiles for firing must have been a problem as they could only have been fired lying flat like baking bread rather than propped against one another as was usual.


This wastefulness of valuable kiln space coupled with the potential for a kiln disaster may be the reason why circular pavements are so rare. In addition any breakage of either the stamp or tiles would necessitate exact replacements as it would not possible to infill with any other shape or design. This may explain the difference between the dragon tiles from Glastonbury and Muchelney which are clearly using different stamps. The dragon tiles would again be very susceptible because of their varying width. Any such breakage of the tiles once laid would make patching impossible if exact replacements were not available so the entire pavement would have to have been dug up. This could possibly indicate that there were originally many more of these circular pavements than are known about today. The limited parallels may be due either to this factor or may indicate limited production. This group may have been the first products of the new Glastonbury kiln site.

There is no clear indication of where the circular pavement(s) were laid as the provenance of this group as recorded by Wedlake indicates quite a scatter (nave, Bond's heap, St. Thomas' chapel, abbot's garden).

Plain tiles from the circular pavement show that there were black bands alternating with inlaid bands. Of particular interest, fragment 801.18 has a cross incision on its base. This is deliberate, a longitudinal cut and then a shorter one across the width, and is quite probably some sort of guidance for laying. The plain bands are not particularly distinguishable one from another, if the Muchelney pavement is taken as an example, so some sort of marking would make it easier for the tile layer.




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

## **Group 3**

Like group 2 these tiles are of high quality craftsmanship both in terms of stamps and production. The appearance of this series at other sites indicates that the kilns at Glastonbury were capable of a large quantity of production with efficient avenues of distribution. These kilns were presumably on abbey land, but not as adjacent as group 1 for various possible reasons:

- i) the quality of the clay; groups 2 onwards have a finer consistency than group 1;
- ii) possibly better sited for distribution, perhaps nearer the wharf?
- iii) a site away from the abbey (and town) would be healthier and less toxic (smell, fumes etc) for the monks/inhabitants;
- iv) scope for a larger industry.

These larger tiles were probably laid together as it would be difficult to accommodate them with "normal" sized tiles. Like the refectory pavement at Cleeve Abbey which has a section of these at the dais end, you would probably see them at the "important" end of the room, which at Glastonbury may have been in the chancel area or near the high altar.

The connection of England, Clare and Cornwall was always significant but particularly was marked in 1272 by the marriage of Margaret to Edmund. Margaret, the second daughter of Earl Richard de Clare (who represented the pinnacle of the de Clare achievements in status and wealth) was married to Edmund, second and surviving son of Richard, Earl of Cornwall, brother of the king. This marriage was arranged by Margaret's mother Maud and her brothers Bogo and Earl Gilbert, both participants being aged about 22. The marriage was not a happy one and despite reconciliation attempts by the Archbishop of Canterbury and Bogo de Clare it was formally ended in 1294. (See 'A Baronial Family in Medieval England: The Clares 1217-1314', M. Altschul Baltimore, 1965 and 'Richard of Cornwall', N. Denholm-Young, 1947).

The date of this group coincides with a number of factors:

- 1272 the marriage of Margaret and Edmund and the accession of Edward I;
- the appointment of John of Taunton as abbot and Robert Burnell as Bishop of Wells; both Edward I's choices. Edward I as patron of Glastonbury;
- 1278 visit of Edward I to Glastonbury.

Tile pavements at Wells were now taking products from Glastonbury, not Nash Hill, which indicates a thriving market beyond Glastonbury as well as improved relations.


Group 3b perhaps suggests a slightly later date as they appear to be copies of group 3a, or it may show that demand was outstripping supply and that other stamps were required at the same time.

Group 3c is puzzling. These tiles are of an 'intermediate' size, which would have been particularly difficult to lay in conjunction with 'normal' sized tiles. They were therefore probably of very limited production, perhaps for just around a grave or near an altar.



## **Group 4**

Group 4 tiles come from the same kiln as the large heraldic tiles of group 3 but are all of 'normal' size. Heraldry includes smaller versions of group 3 designs, but also with some reversed so perhaps these are copies, possibly the maker not realising that he needed to cut a mirror image of the design on the stamp, not just to transfer the design as seen. Variations of heraldry include designs set both diagonally and square. The designs also include combat 'Richard and Saladin' types as seen at Cleeve Abbey. Characteristics are the same as group 3; deep burnished keys and glazing which has good colour and contrast. This group also has a widespread distribution on either side of the River Severn.


Even with the relatively small number of tiles surviving overall at Glastonbury, there appear to be more designs represented in both heraldic and non-heraldic varieties than at Cleeve Abbey, for example, and this may indicate that the tiles covered a considerable area. The number of triangular tiles surviving also imply that there were larger expanses of pavement, as at Cleeve Abbey.

Does the widespread distribution also suggest a large quantity produced, even over a relatively short period, or does it indicate more than one kiln in production?



Group 5 has the same characteristics of fabric and keying as groups 3 and 4 but with the difference that no parallels have been found at other sites. They are large and rectangular with intricate and detailed designs. The glaze particularly clear.

Could these be designs specifically made for Glastonbury and possibly for a specific area of the abbey? Possibly used as a wall border?


These are fine tiles and would have been valued as souvenirs so it is possible that this may be part of the reason why there are so few remaining at Glastonbury and none elsewhere.

There are very few fragments in this group on which to base comments but some tentative conclusions can be drawn. The fabric is reasonably well prepared but the actual production process has not been as careful. The stamped impression is not cleanly defined as if paring back has slightly dragged the fabric. There is also a little shrinkage between the body and inlay clays; as it is quite a thin inlay this may perhaps indicate that it was too dry. The thinness of the tiles is the main characteristic of this group. Could this suggest a shortage of prepared clay? Design 76 has variations on the usual type of circular design, a spade shaped corner motif and a curl on the circle.

The only known similarities are to tiles from Witham Friary, so perhaps only a limited number were produced?

766.25 – there is glaze deposit on the bottom left hand corner but there is mortar on the edge so the tile has been laid, not discarded.

#### Group 7a

The heraldic designs are very mixed. There are some repeats of royal arms/ Clare/ Cornwall which are relevant until 1300, some perhaps more decorative than significant overall? They imply a time span until the mid fourteenth century. Many designs are set square rather than on a diagonal. Diagonal designs draw the eyes ahead and to the sides so the use of these suggest larger expanses; square set suggests bands of designs so these are more likely around tombs or in limited areas. Designs D78-D92 are straightforward heraldic tiles. The provenance noted by Wedlake does not imply a widespread scatter, so this probably implies a fairly limited number of each, perhaps specific to a grave or donation? Designs D93-D95 are not heraldic as such but have the aspect of a badge or emblem.


The non heraldic designs are geometric, including roundel sets, and indicate that large areas needed to be covered, perhaps the body of the nave?

Group 7b features naturalistic designs. Similar designs are only found at Muchelney Abbey which suggests a contraction of the industry.


Continuation and variation both seem to be characteristics of this group. The impression is that many of the designs were fairly limited in numbers as few examples survive and according to Wedlake's notes find spots were few and far between. [There is always the caveat that these might have been attractive to souvenir hunters in the past.] Other designs seem to have had quite a big production run with variations in preparation and keying.

While ICPS analysis indicates that the clay came from the Glastonbury area these points, together with the time scale and diversity of this group, probably indicate several kiln sites not necessarily in close proximity but still within the general area. David Dawson (pers. comm.) confirms widespread and numerous pottery sites of all periods in the Glastonbury area and it is likely that tile production was little different. Until sites are found, which is difficult without excavation even if they have not been destroyed or built over, everything has to be speculation.



There is only one tile in this group. Visually the fabric looks closer to the Glastonbury groups rather than that from the Nether Stowey area of groups 9 and 10. 
Group 9 is a difficult group to identify in terms of detail as the designs are so indistinct. All the tiles are rectangular so the assumption is that they were laid with plain tiles. The inscription element, stamped through a slip background, makes it difficult to read and the resultant thinness makes it surprising that any survived which again indicates a late date, perhaps late fifteenth century.

The ICPS analysis of this group is interesting and precise (see also Michael Hughes' analysis in 'Cleeve Abbey: The Pottery' by John Allan in PSANHS, 1998). Even with one design (D127) in common with Cleeve Abbey the kiln site is not the same although it was in the same general area of the Quantocks. The ICPS analysis shows that the tiles may have come from a single firing which suggests a very limited quantity and hence a small area, although survival of these tiles is improbable as the designs with a slip background quickly erode.



These two designs feature ears of barley. As barley was used in beer production it might possibly be intended as a pun for abbot Richard Bere. Clayton thought there might be a third version (his drawing 192) and drew a design showing starfish-like quatrefoils in the voids between the ears. This was noted as from the abbot's hall. This is not likely as the abbot's hall was tiled well before Bere's time and the fragment cannot now be found.

ICPS analysis indicates the same source of clay as group 9 so a late fifteenth – early sixteenth century date is indicated. Abbot Bere (1493-1524) did a vast amount at Glastonbury and had huge available wealth. These tiles would have worn quickly so a period just before the Dissolution is indicated.







ICPS analysis shows that these tiles came from a kiln site at Donyatt, an established tile and pottery site. A number of tiles have multiple rod keys as well as deep scoops. Some are plain tiles, some have freehand slip decoration and some have incised decoration, only two stamped designs have been found at Glastonbury. The fabric is also variable, for example, tile 799.13 is well prepared with some lamination while tile 799.42 is not as well prepared and has more inclusions. As the majority of designs do not utilise stamps the normal constraints on size are not present with the result that both the thickness and size of the tiles in this group are variable. Generally the tiles are larger, up to 185mm square.


Some stamps are still used at this kiln site but are not particularly well cut by this date (see R. Coleman-Smith & T. Pearson, 'Excavations in the Donyatt Potteries'). These types of tiles were probably common, but, lacking stamp and inlay, were more likely to be discarded. They are also found at Muchelney Abbey but, without stamps, the designs are very individual.









#### **Plain Tiles**

The plain tiles of Glastonbury are varied and seem to correspond to most of the decorated groups. There are relatively few in the collection compared with the original numbers that must have existed and it is probable that many were discarded as lacking interest. The 1992 excavations unearthed plain tiles of different shapes (Boxes T459-T463) with slip and glaze indicating that patterns of plain tiles were also important. Later tiles, such as 737.6, had streaky slip which did not cover the entire surface so the glaze applied had variations in colour. It is not possible to say whether this was the intended effect, or whether it was caused by a lack of materials, or by haphazard production methods.

Some areas must have been paved with plain tiles. The rectangular tiles of group 9 suggest a border to plain tiles (737.6?). According to Wedlake (Gatehouse Archive ref. A39), the abbot's hall was paved with plain tiles. If it was Abbot Monington who completed the hall a date in the second half of the fourteenth century seems likely. In his notes Wedlake describes them as having a 'rich nutty brown glaze'. There are some complete brown tiles which are close enough to Wedlake's  $5^{1}/_{2}$ " square (135-138mm²). Tile 802.41 is more ochre than 777.4 which is chocolate-coloured so there may have been tonal variations.
