1 Summary

The present farmstead at Lower Hope was traditionally within the parish of Felton, but boundary changes in the 19th Century brought it within the current parish of Ullingswick. Documentary references to Lower Hope go back to the early 14th Century, and it is very likely that the farmstead or holding had been established by the 13th Century. The present historical assessment has not included an inspection of the buildings, but the present house reportedly contains some fabric surviving from the medieval house. The present farmhouse is of complex form reflecting its evolution over many centuries, but externally the building principally appears to be of the 18th Century. The farm buildings are largely modern, partially replacing a farm range extensively rebuilt in the 19th Century. In the area south east of the house there appears to be some potential for below ground survival of the foundations of buildings relating to the earlier farmstead

2 Methodology

- 2.1 Documentary research was undertaken primarily at Herefordshire Record Office, with additional on-line searches made of records held at the Public Records Office and indexed by National Archives Online. Lower Hope is listed on the Herefordshire SMR as monument number 46640 no archaeological finds or research appear to have been recorded on the present site; the building is not described other than as a link to the Listed Building Description, which is also rather sparse: (Listed 1962) ULLINGSWICK Lower Hope and adjoining hop kiln SO 55 SE 11/688 Grade II Late C18. Stone rubble with red brick window dressings. Three storeys. Two windows, sashes with glazing bars. Central door. New tile hipped roof. End stone stack with diagonal shaft. C17 timber frame and rubble wing to west with adjoining red brick round hop kiln with slate conical roof. Listing NGR: SO5822450322.
- 2.2 The building was either deliberately omitted or overlooked by the 1932 Royal Commission on Historical Monuments for Herefordshire as the published volume did not list Lower Hope, only five secular monuments plus the church being recorded in the parish.

3 Historical development

- 3.1 The present property was historically part of the parish of Felton, and only transferred to Ullingswick late in the 19th Century. The Domesday survey (1086) indicates that Felton was amongst the lands of the church of St Guthlac, Hereford *In "TORNELAUS" HUNDRED The church itself holds FELTON. There are 3 hides paying geld except half a hide. In demesne are 3 ploughs, and 5 slaves and 1 bordar. There is 1 Frenchman with 1 plough paying 6s. It was worth 60s; now 40s.* Felton appears to have always been fairly sparsely inhabited the population in 1861 was 149 persons, by 1871 the population had fallen to 127 persons with only 23 inhabited houses.
- 3.2 The earliest identified reference to "Lower Hope" as a property name in Felton is the Public Record Office document E179/117/4 dated September 19th 1334 or shortly thereafter. This document is a fragment of a communal assessment for the fifteenth and tenth taxes granted to Edward III in 1334, for Herefordshire. The name re-occurs frequently in subsequent taxation lists, suggesting that it was a principal landholding.
- 3.3 The 1984 Sales Particulars prepared by Strutt & Parker (HRO CN37/111) refers to the property having 15th Century origins, but being "principally of 1634" with later additions. The source for this attribution is not given, but may have been derived from the deeds. The 1334 reference

(above) is indicative that there was an earlier building of some substance on or near the present site, and despite the lack of surviving earlier documentary evidence it is very likely that the Lower Hope holding originated in the 13th Century or possibly earlier.

The external appearance of the house is suggestive of an early-mid 18th C date for the south wing, 3.4 whilst the timber framing to the northern gable end is more 17th C in appearance. The house is a mixture of brick and stone, with originally two 19th C brick hop-kilns at the western end of a service range. The development of the site in the 19th C can be traced through historic mapping (Fig 6) The hop kilns do not appear on the 1842 tithe map (Fig 2), but two kilns were present by 1860 (HRO ref E59/58 - III- Fig 4). The large southern kiln is possibly a little later. The development of the farm buildings may be traced from 1842 onwards through cartographic sources, but no estate maps prior to 1842 have been traced. The development of the farm buildings suggests a fairly substantial rearrangement of the foldyard between 1842 and 1860, with additional buildings constructed to the north of the original farmyard by 1884 (Fig 5), and further buildings by 1902. The only major loss of buildings seems to have been the demolition of the range forming the southern side of the foldyard prior to 1860(Fig 6). Substantial additions and alterations to the agricultural ranges occurred during the 20th Century, and the southern-most hop kiln had been converted to domestic use by 1984. By the 1980s two substantial conservatories had been added to the farmhouse range and it had been upgraded to a gentleman farmer's residence (photographs at HRO Y221/3 17-19; Fig 7).

4 Former occupiers and owners of Lower Hope

4.1 Ownership prior to the beginning of the 19th C has not been traced (no pre 19th C deeds for the property are held by HRO), though there is a high probability that the property was historically held by the Maund family who were long established in the area (this is reflected in the local place names Maund Bryan, Whitechurch Maund, Rose Maund and Preston Maund). Some of the former Maund manors were (by the 17th Century) owned by the Hampton Court Estate, but this part of Felton seems to have remained as a separate holding, and was certainly outside the Hampton Court Estate from the early 19th Century onwards.

In 1808 the Manor House of Lower Hope and lands in Felton were mortgaged to John Pitt by the then owner of Lower Hope - John Maund of Brecon for £4500 (HRO ref C21 /1).

1813 (25th March) John Pitt assigned the mortgage of Lower Hope and lands in Felton to Dorothy Eaton, widow, of Docklow as security for a loan of £1000 (HRO ref C21 /2).

1818 John Pitt made a further assignment of the mortgage (HRO ref C21 /2).

1842 John Maund listed as owner of Upper and Lower Hope on the tithe apportionment, the then occupant (tenant) of the farm at Lower Hope was Thomas Morris, who also owned three of the fields south of the house (see Figs 2 and 3). Felton Tithe Map is located at PRO reference IR 30/14/83 Scale: 1 inch to 6 chains. By W H Apperley, Hereford 1842 – Herefordshire RO hold only a poor quality microfilm copy. The apportionment is PRO reference IR 29/14/83 and dated to 31st Dec 1841, again HRO hold only microfilm.

4.2 Census Data

(nb the occupants of adjacent holdings are given for all census years, as some of these relate to properties formerly forming part of the same estate – the farmstead at Lower Hope is indicated in **bold**). The frequency at which the occupants of the farmhouse changed suggests that most if not all of the 19th C farmers were tenant farmers, bailiffs or farm managers on behalf of an owner resident elsewhere. The farm seems to have been only occupied by its owners since circa 1900, but no sale details have been traced for this period.

4.2.10 Later Census data is not yet available, but some information may be gleaned from the local Trades Directories Jakeman and Carver's Herefordshire Directory of 1914, and Kelly's of 1917 list "LEAKE, William Henry, Farmer, Lower Hope". Leake does not appear after this date, but a search of BMD indexes revealed that a William H Leake died at Hereford aged 92 in 1959. Kelly's Herefordshire Directory of 1922 and that of 1929 both list "WRIGHT, Veall, Farm Manager to Messers Earnshaw & Place, Lower Hope" In 1932 (20th Dec.) Lower Hope Farm was sold to Neston Dana Ord Capper, who was then a young man of 21 (born 13 Aug 1911 St Weonards, Ross, Herefordshire.). It is apparent that he came from either a moneyed family background, or had inherited sufficient capital to purchase the farm. Neston Capper appears as "CAPPER, Neston, Farmer, Lower Hope, Tel. Burley Gate 18" in Kellys Herefordshire Directory 1934 through to the last available Directory (Kelly's 1941). Neston D O Capper owned the property until an auction sale at the Green Dragon, Hereford 29th June 1984. Capper died in 1991 at Ross. The 1984 sale particulars also relate the dates and vendors of parcels aof land and properties added to the Lower Hope Estate between 1932 and 1984.

5 Cartographic evidence

5.1 In the absence of available estate papers the development of the farmstead may best be traced through the cartographic record. The 1842 Tithe Awards plan appears to be the earliest detailed plan of the farmstead available in the public domain. This plan shows the core of the 19th C farmstead already developed, with a farmyard located to the east of the house, with agricultural

ranges to the NE, E and SE, the fourth side being largely occupied by the farmhouse itself. The 1842 plan show these ranges as having fairly regular rectangular outlines, but later plans show these ranges to have developed, apparently by the rebuilding on wider footprints than the 1840s buildings. The general layout is typical of many 18th C –early 19th C farmyards, and the mid 19th C enlarging of sections of the buildings is representative of the major improvements in agricultural practice at this period. By the 1860s the SE building range seems to have disappeared – and the eastern building range possibly had been rebuilt, though no great reliance can be made on the fine detail of such small scale cartographic representations. The present buildings to the E and NE of the old farmyard retain the 1860s foot print. By the 1880s building ranges were developed to the north of the original farmyard, and these were expanded further with an additional E-W range by 1902. The subsequent development of the modern buildings has not been traced, and the majority of the modern farm buildings lie to the north of the original farmyard area. The farmstead as it stands is the product of around 250 years of changing agricultural practice, but the core of the farm appears to be a late 18th or early 19th C planned farmyard. Prior to this it is likely that there were fewer, and more dispersed, buildings.

6 Conclusions

There appears to be comparatively little information about the early history of Lower Hope in the public domain, but the existence of medieval references points to the farm being a significant and principal local landholding probably from the 13th C onwards. The presence of reportedly medieval fabric within the farmhouse indicates that the present farmstead occupies the same location as its medieval forerunner. It would appear likely that the farm became part of a wider farming estate fairly early in its history, and therefore suffered the benign neglect and lack of investment that was typical of tenanted farms of the period. Later phases of investment (perhaps on changes of ownership) appear to have occurred in the late 17th C, the late 18th C and again in the late 19th C. A further stage of investment seems to have resulted from the estate being sold to a resident farmer in the early 20th C, and subsequent farmers have all been owner occupiers with an interest in investing in the property. In terms of building heritage the investment in modernising and altering the farmstead has been somewhat detrimental, but this is always a factor balanced by the better standards of maintainance prompted by a building in use as compared to one less altered but disused and poorly maintained. The present farmstead and farmhouse are both a palimpsest of multiple periods of construction and this actually adds to their charm and interest.




Figure 1: Location of Lower Hope




Figure 2: Extract from Felton Tithe Awards map (1842) showing Lower Hope (poor quality microfilm version only in HRO - inset detail of buildings has been digitally cleaned for clarity). For key to field names see Figure 3.




Figure 4: Lower Hope Estate plan 1860




Figure 5: Ordnance Survey 6" - mile mapping of Lower Hope - nb extracts not to common scale
