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1.0 INTRODUCTION AND NON-TECHNICAL SUMMARY

A desk-based assessment and walkover survey of English Martyrs Primary School, Hamilton Drive, York, was commissioned by the Diocese of Middlesbrough to examine the potential for preserved archaeological remains within the grounds of the school. The work is part of pre-planning investigations being carried out in advance of an application to construct a new primary school within the grounds of the current school.

The information gathered in this report is primarily a synthesis of the available information held by York City Historic Environment Record, together with the results of a site inspection.

There are no known features within the site boundary; however a review of the Historic Environment Record showed that an aerial photograph of the area may show the presence of a feature within the site boundary, suggesting that there is limited possibility of the discovery of previously unrecorded archaeology within the site. This would probably be in the form of relict field boundaries or other landscape features, possibly of Iron Age or Roman date.

Discussions with the City Archaeologist, John Oxley, suggest that the area may contain the remains of Roman and prehistoric field systems, with an associated villa site having been located in the vicinity. A number of stone cist burials also exist within 500m of the site.

Furthermore, there is the potential for the preservation of paleoenvironmental deposits in the valley of the Holgate Beck. The site lies on the eastern bank of Holgate Beck, on low-lying ground which is prone to flooding, and with the correspondingly wet ground conditions required for good preservation of paleoenvironmental remains.

Within 500m of the site boundary, no scheduled monuments, registered parks and gardens or battlefields were noted. Two Grade II* listed buildings were found, along with a further 35 Grade II listed. 18 further HER entries were noted, relating mainly to site investigations undertaken over the last 20 years in the area. These were not considered to be of note in the context of the proposed development.

The archaeological risk to the scheme is likely to take the form of a Local Authority-required programme of work for the identification and mitigation of the development impact upon any remains directly affected by the development.

3.0 SITE LOCATION AND DESCRIPTION

The site lies on the north side of Hamilton Drive, Holgate, and is centred on NGR SJ 587510. The site is a primary school, currently in operation, within a clearly defined, hedged boundary on a flat area of ground

The current school buildings were constructed as single storey units on a 1m raised foundation, owing to the location of the school close to the Holgate Beck, which is susceptible to periodic flooding. All the buildings are concentrated in the south-western quadrant of the site, with the remaining ground being either a hard play area (to west of the buildings) or grass playing field. The grounds are predominantly flat, with slight undulations across the area. The site is still bounded to north by allotments, situated behind high hedging. Housing extends in other directions and the school lies within a suburban district, consisting of semi-detached and detached housing dating from the 1960-70s.

4.0 METHODOLOGY

A desk-based assessment of readily available online resources, together with information held in the York City Council Historic Environment Record was conducted to establish the known cultural heritage within and surrounding the site in an effort to understand more fully the likely potential for encountering archaeological remains on the site during the proposed development and the likely impact upon remains both within and surrounding the site. Sites or records within approximately 500m of the proposed site were included, to take in possibly wide-ranging sites and to help assess the potential for extended remains beyond the locations noted in the National Monument Record (NMR) and Historic Environment Record (HER).

A site walkover was undertaken on 1st July 2009, to identify any landscape features and to gain a greater understanding of the site and its environment.

The central source for the information in this assessment was the HER, with further information being provided by the NMR, including listing data available therein. Full descriptions of the sites, including location, descriptions, and cross-referenced monument numbers are included in the appendices.

5.0 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

5.1 Geological Background

The site lies on the glacial till which covers much of the Vale of York, which in turn overlies Triassic sandstone. It is likely that more locally, the site is influenced by being on the Holgate Beck floodplain, with clay and silt probably forming the majority of the soil type lying beneath the school.

5.2 Prehistoric & Roman

No known Prehistoric or Roman activity is known within the site boundary. However, the closest HER record to the site refers to a rectangular cropmark feature (EYO1148) noted on a cricket pitch during reconnaissance carried out by Cambridge University. The map regression (see Figure 5) suggests that the plotted position is possibly wrong, in that allotments have occupied that spot since before aerial reconnaissance began: it is much more likely that given they were recorded "on a cricket pitch", they are likely to be within the school grounds and therefore worthy of note. It was not possible within the scope of this document to view the aerial photograph, however it would be required to ascertain the location and extent before its importance can be wholly ascertained.

The site occupies a position south of the main Roman road to Aldborough, which ran roughly along the line of the Holgate Road, and is west of the other main Roman thoroughfare of Tadcaster road, along which the *colonia* was situated (RCHME 1962, 2)¹. The *colonia* was sited on the southern bank of the Ouse, south through the area now known as Micklegate and along the Tadcaster road. The Roman tradition of cemeteries lining major routes has led to many burials, headstones and sarcophagi being recorded alongside these roads. This is borne out further west of the site, in the area around the Mount School, where stone sarcophagi and human remains were found during the late 19th and early 20th century, and were reported in the Yorkshire Archaeological Journal (1957). This broadly corresponds to the known extents of the Roman colonia and occupies a site close to the Tadcaster Road (Johnson 1998; RCHME 1962, xxxiv).

Similarly, further burials were discovered (as evidenced on the 1st edition mapping) to west of the site at West Bank Park – formerly the Great Nursery. Latterly, a geophysical survey and accompanying archaeological evaluation was carried out in the same area (EYO17). Ten trenches were opened, although no archaeological features of note were discovered. The report concluded that significant landscaping had been carried out on the site, particularly in the northern part of the investigated area. There had been significant amounts of landscaping, presumably as part of the work to create the landscaped West Bank Park during the early 20th century, and which later became used as a council plant nursery, with associated glasshouses. The soil morphology showed that below modern overburden the site consisted of relatively undisturbed clayey sand – a naturally deposited alluvium.

It is considered that there is a moderate risk of discovery of Medieval remains within the development area. Remains would probably consist of field boundaries or other landscape features. The risk of discovery of human remains is thought to be low to negligible.

5.3 Early Medieval

No known evidence of Early Medieval activity is known within the study area.

It is considered that there is a low risk of discovery of Early Medieval remains within the development area.

5.4 Medieval

No specific evidence of Medieval activity is known within the study area, although it is likely that much of this area was under cultivation, as it lay relatively close to the Medieval town. Certainly areas such as Hob Moor would have their placename origins in the Medieval period, and are therefore likely to have been established areas for common grazing or other activities. It is therefore possible that the field boundaries thought to exist within the development area may relate to Medieval land use, rather than earlier activity.

It is considered that there is a low risk of discovery of Medieval remains within the development area.

5.5 Post-Medieval

A suite of archaeological works was carried out at Hob Moor (EYO219), to south of the site, which investigated an area of ridge and furrow and the line of a historic track crossing the moor (Pearson 2003). Several sherds of Roman pottery were discovered, although these appeared to be imported finds, probably brought in during manuring – Hob Moor was used as arable ground prior to it becoming a golf course in the 20th century. An area of ridge and furrow – also associated with its use as cultivable ground during the late 18th and early 19th centuries, was also investigated. The work concluded that there was little in the way of evidence of pre-modern human activity on the site.

A large number of listed buildings were noted within the development area. These tend to cluster around the Holgate and Tadcaster Roads, approximately 300m or more from the site. No listed buildings are within very close proximity to the site. The vast majority of these listed buildings are residential, and have been accorded the lowest level of listing, which recognises them as being of local importance.

A limited map regression exercise was undertaken, studying the Ordnance Survey mapping of the area from the 1st Edition (c. 1860) onwards.

The 1st Edition map of the area shows the site as one of a number of open fields, bounded to east by Holgate Beck. There appears to be a path between the fields affording access to the south-west corner of the site, formed by an eastwards-running branch of the lane running north from Red House to Severus' Place, along the eastern edge of the Great Nursery. Noted on the map is the site of where stone coffins and roman pottery were found, which correspond to HER record EYO17. The Holgate Beck is also shown forming the western administrative boundary of the County of York. The railway is recorded, running north-east – south-west to east of the site on the eastern side of Holgate Beck and with a footpath running along a broadly similar alignment, closer towards the site and continuing south-west towards Hob Moor. A footbridge is noted to south of the site, possibly suggesting that a crossing point may have been in use for some time.

The 2nd Edition (1897) map of the area shows that the site consisted of one of several open fields in a generally open area, although development has continued to north. Holgate Beck appears to have wooded banks, and the site is bounded to north by a nursery in the neighbouring field. The field numbers are recorded for the site and its neighbours. To north, Holgate Road is built up with a mixture of large Victorian/ Georgian villas and terraces, such as Falconer Street. The nurseries to west appear also to have expanded.

The 1937 OS map shows considerable expansion of the city, with an increase in the number of terraces running south off Holgate Road. Holgate House is clearly shown, with allotment gardens to south, in the adjoining field to the site where previously the nursery had been recorded. More allotment gardens are noted to east of the site, on the far bank of Holgate Beck. The site itself is recorded as a school sports field, although it is unclear as to the location of the school to which it refers. Given that the allotments have been in existence since then, it is likely that the cropmarks (more likely to be parchmarks) referred to in HER record EYO1148 are most likely situated within the boundary of the site.

It is considered that there is a low risk of discovery of Post Medieval remains within the development area. It is also considered that the development will not have a significant impact on any of the listed buildings in the vicinity.

6.0 SITE VISIT

The site was visited on July 1st, 2009 in fair, slightly overcast conditions.

The area of the proposed new buildings is currently in use as a hard play area, on predominantly flat ground adjacent to the Holgate Burn. No clearly defined cultural heritage features were noted. The ground was predominantly flat with gentle undulations over the grassed portion which makes up the majority of the area. No discernible features could be derived from the undulations, suggesting that they were naturally occurring and related to the field's proximity to the Holgate Beck.

A rectangular area of ground which appeared to be slightly recessed below the level of the surrounding field was noted to north east of the school buildings. This was approximately 20m square and aligned with the other buildings and appeared to be the remains of a fairly recently removed foundation, due to being about 200mm lower than the surrounding ground. It had been subject to natural regeneration and waterlogging and was not recorded as a cultural heritage feature.

It is likely that the area is susceptible to flooding, as evidenced by the current school buildings, which sit on raised foundations about 1m higher than the surrounding ground. This may have formed an important factor in the historic land use of the area, given that it would have been suitable for very few activities – namely seasonal grazing or possibly arable cultivation.

The listed buildings along the Holgate Road are a considerable distance to north, and the setting of the school, within a suburban area, reduces visibility substantially towards them, particularly since the hedge bounding the north of the site is moderately high and thick, very effectively screening the allotments beyond. Although the ground rises gradually to north, it is not considered that there are any views of note towards these receptors.

7.0 CONCLUSIONS

No visible cultural heritage features within the school grounds were discerned: no landscape features or other remains pointing to the former agricultural land use of the site were noted, although its proximity to Holgate Beck and its liability to flood may well suggest that the possibility for paleoenvironmental deposits exists. It is probable that the site was originally conceived as a water meadow, which would explain the lack of development – owing to a propensity to flood.

The aerial photograph mentioned earlier (EYO1148) is considered to refer to a parchmark within the site boundary, and as such requires some research to identify the accurate location of the feature and to establish a possible function.

It appears that prior to the 20th century, the site and its surroundings were predominantly farmland which extended south to Hob Moor, incorporating the nurseries to north and west. No evidence of human activity in the area points to anything but funerary purposes, suggesting that if evidence is to be found, it is likely to be related to less intensive activity, such as would be associated with farming or isolated occupation.

The reference to the site being a "school sports field" on the 1935 OS map may refer to its function as such for the original English Martyrs school, which was founded in the late 19th century and was situated on the Holgate Road close to the Roman Catholic church of the same name. If this is the case, there has been a relatively undisturbed continuity of use for the majority of the site, and any remains which may survive may well be early post-medieval or earlier, given the lack of recorded development around the site prior to the 20th century.

Early occupation in this area of York has also tended to concentrate around areas above the flood risk zone. For example, the Roman cemetery finds on Love Lane, at the Mount School, occupy an area of higher ground to west of the site and considerably further away from Holgate Beck. It is likely that Roman urban/ suburban occupation did not extend as far east as the site, especially if avoiding flooding was a priority to the residents. The find spot of a cist and associated human remains in the area of West Park may suggest another focus of activity away from the main routes out of York during the Roman period, suggesting the possibility of a villa site or similarly isolated site.

8.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is likely that an intrusive archaeological site investigation will be required to satisfy any planning conditions connected with an application for development of the site, given its open nature and the generally high potential sensitivity of York. The scope of any further phases of work should be formulated in discussion with the City Archaeologist who will be able to advise on the specific issues that need to addressed.

The aerial photograph noted above suggests that there is some limited potential on the site for the preservation of archaeological remains, although this is very poorly provenanced. If further work is required by the City Archaeologist, a priority should be to source a copy of the aerial photograph of the parchmarks noted above, so that any site investigations can accurately target this feature.

There is also the potential for surviving paleoenvironmental deposits within the site, given its proximity to Holgate Beck and the likelihood of encountering waterlogged material. Consequently, it may be necessary to discuss any requirement for modelling and analysing remains that the City Archaeologist may have. Without data relating to the depositional morphology, it is difficult to go further in recommending a level or scope for further work. It will therefore be necessary to analyse and discuss the findings of any geotechnical work at the first opportunity with the City Archaeologist to establish possible requirements for further work.
