### Summary

Excavation of a drain and soakaway on the north side of the church revealed the foundations of the north aisle but no other archaeological features were present and there were no finds.

### Introduction

Naomi Field Archaeological Consultancy was commissioned by the Churches Conservation Trust to undertake an archaeological watching brief at Yarburgh Church in accordance with the Trust's Archaeology Policy (2004), and with the general requirements set out in the *Lincolnshire Archaeological Handbook* (Lincolnshire County Council Archaeology Section, 1998).

### Site Location and Description

The village of Yarburgh is located 5km north-east of Louth, in the Lincolnshire Middle Marsh. St John's Church is near the centre of the village.

St John the Baptist's Church is a redundant church vested in the Churches Conservation Trust since 1983, but the churchyard is still in the care of Yarburgh PCC.

### Archaeological Background

The settlement of Yarburgh is mentioned in the *Domesday Survey* of 1086. The name is thought to indicate an earlier earthwork, which has not been identified.

St John's Church was entirely rebuilt in sandstone with chalk in 1405 after a fire, and restored by James Fowler in 1853-55 (Pls 1 and 2). A south aisle was demolished in 1777.

### Scope of Work

A programme of repairs is being undertaken in the church which is vested in the care of the Churches Conservation Trust. The churchyard is still in the care of the PCC and a faculty was required for the drainage works in the churchyard.

The works comprised the provision of a new downpipe and gulley, with a 100mm diameter drain leading north from the east end of the north aisle for c. 6m to a soakaway, close to the northern boundary of the churchyard.

### **Aims and Objectives**

The purpose of the Watching Brief was to record any archaeological deposits disturbed during groundworks at the above site.

### METHOD

One experienced archaeologist was present on site during the excavation of the drain trench and soakaway by the contractors. Archaeological features were excavated, and drawn where appropriate. Context numbers were assigned for the purposes of recording and are referred to in the text (nos **100-103**). A full photographic record was made of the works on site. Work was carried out on February 2009.

### Results (Figs. 2 and 3)

A trench 0.40m wide and 0.30-0.45m deep was hand-excavated by the contractors leading from the north-east corner of the north aisle to a soakaway (1.40m x 1.30m and 0.90m deep) near the churchyard northern boundary (Pls 3 and 7). The ground at the junction of the trench with the wall was disturbed by the previous gully, which had been removed prior to the arrival of the archaeologist. The excavations exposed the north aisle foundations (Fig. 3a and Pls 4-6).

The drain trench only penetrated the top of the subsoil but the full sequence of deposits was recorded in the sides of the soakaway (Pl. 8). The soakaway area was disturbed by tree roots. The topsoil **100** was c.0.25-0.30m in depth and was a mid brown-grey clay. This overlay the subsoil **101** which was a red-brown clay with chalk flecks and 0.35m deep. Beneath the subsoil was a thin layer of chalk pebbles, **102**, 0.05m deep which overlay the natural pink brown clay, **103**. There were no finds. No graves were disturbed during the works.

### Conclusion

There was no disturbance to any archaeological remains on the site during the programme of drainage works




Fig.1 Location of Yarburgh, Lincs. Inset (b) reproduced from the 1:10,560 Ordnance Survey Explorer map 283, Crown copyright, with the permission of the Controller of the HMSO. NFAC Licence No.WL 10960)




Fig. 2 Yarburgh church Location of the monitored trench. Scale 1:500.






Fig. 3a) Profile of north aisle foundations b) typical sequence of deposits encountered in the soakaway. Scale 1:10
