


Figure 4. Location 2.




Figure 5. Location 3.




Figure 6. Location 4.




Figure 7. Location 5.




Figure 8. Location 6.

## 2.9.1 Site Description: Single Linear feature

Slight depression filled with cinders. The feature extended for approximately 215 metres within the field through which the pipeline easement was located. (Desk Top Report ITEM 4). Discussion with the landowner revealed that this feature was the bedding for the track of a light railway which had been constructed in the early part of the twentieth century. The following brief account of this short lived enterprise is given here.

### THE SAND HUTTON LIGHT RAILWAY

The Sand Hutton Light Railway was the brainchild of Major Sir Robert James Milo Walker, the fourth baronet of Sand Hutton, . Sir Robert was born in 1890 and inherited the estate at the age of ten. During his childhood the estate income enabled him to construct an outdoor model railway and afterwards a narrow gauge railway of 15". This was his favoured gauge of line and in 1912 he acquired the now famous Basset-Lowke's Class 30 Atlantic locomotive, which he named "Synolda" after his first wife. That locomotive is now restored and displayed in the Ravensglass Railway Museum, where it was originally constructed.

Upon return from participation in the First World War, Sir Robert was able to once again pursue his activity as a railway engineer whilst at the same time managing the family estate. He was clearly successful in this enterprise, as during the years after the great war the estate increased in size by nearly 50% to 10,000 acres.

Perhaps as a result of this financial success, Sir Robert extended the railway. He employed a local man, George Batty as engineer and taking advice from the Duke of Westminster, who also ran a private line, he extended the miniature railway around the gardens of Sand Hutton Hall. At this time the railway was run and maintained for the entertainment of the baronet and guests to the estate.

In 1919 Sir Robert made plans to extend this 15-inch gauge railway across his entire estate and to connect it with the North Eastern Railway at Warthill. He was convinced that rail was the most efficient form of modern transport, if it could be used from the source of production, the farms and local industries, as opposed to carrying goods by horse drawn carts to the nearest station where they would have to be reloaded onto railway wagons.

A Light Railway Order was granted in 1920 which enabled the crossing of public roads and the carrying of passengers and by the end of that year construction had reached Claxton. It was noted at that time that the acquisition of locomotives like "Synolda"

would be difficult and costly and there were doubts as to whether these engines could cope with the steeply undulating ground to the north east of Sand Hutton.

The scale models were never tested over this terrain however, as Sir Robert totally replaced his rolling stock and the rails themselves with the purchase of engines and wagons from the Deptford Meat Depot and ten miles of track from the Robert Hudson works in Leeds.

The Sand Hutton Light Railway was now to be reconstructed as an 18-inch gauge line. Relaying of new track from Warthill to Sand Hutton and along the Claxton branch line as well as a new stretch up to Kissthorns was completed and operating a freight service by spring 1922. It was the north eastern end of this new line that was observed during top soil removal associated with the Elvington to Harton pipeline, (YORYM 1997.60).

Trans-shipment sidings were constructed at the junction with the North eastern Railway at Warthill. These consisted of a siding provided by North Eastern Railways with a narrow gauge line on each side, one of which was raised on a brick embankment to facilitate easy loading into the large, standard gauge freight wagons of the larger company.

By the end of 1922 the line was extended from Kissthorns to Barnby House to the east of Bossall. Sir George had intended to construct a further branch line, half a mile in length as far as Scrayingham but this initiative was abandoned when planning regulations made costs prohibitively high.

This then became the full extent of the Sand Hutton Light Railway. Operating through the foothills of the Wolds and lowlands to the west, this small but industrious line served the estate for a little under ten years, when following the closure of the Claxton brickworks in 1931 and a general move toward road transport it was finally closed and dismantled in 1932

Sir Robert never saw this decline as he died in 1930 aged just 39 years and 11 months. The track, engines and wagons were taken for scrap. The passenger carriage which was built in the estate workshops and is reputed to be the largest of its kind was used for some time as a cricket pavilion.

Synolda it would appear spent some time on a line in Southend before being modified and neglected at the hands of the Belle Vue Miniature Railway in Manchester.

Sand Hutton Hall, along with the remaining railway infrastructure was demolished by 1965 and an exclusive housing development now occupies most of the gardens. All that now remains of this enterprise is an alignment of breaks in the hedgerows along much of the length of its route.




Figure 9. Location 7.






Figure 11. Location 9.




Figure 12. Location 10.




Figure 13. Location 11.




Figure 14. Location 12.

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
