DESCRIPTION

The site was located in the south-west comer of the Nun's Close Park Richmond, North Yorkshire close to the site of the Grey Fnars priory. The site is in an area that is lower than the surrounding car park on the northern and eastern sides tiut level with the footpath on the southern side. The first visit involved monitoring seven test pits (TP 1-7) to assess the nature of the foundations of the boundary walls on the north-east and south-west sides of the site. The thal pits were 1.5m deep and 1.6m wide and excavated by mechanical excavator with toothless ditching bucket. The one test pit excavated against the north-east boundary wall showed that there was 0.4m of binck mbble in dark grey silt abutting the wall with natural sub-soils consisting of mid orange sandy clay, exposed at 0.6m BGL onto which the wall had been constricted although there was no clear foundation cut for the wall itself.

The tnat pits adjacent to the south-west boundary wall showed that there had been a considerable dumping of soil of up to 0.8m thick against the south-west wall which had slumped and partially buned an earlier retaining wall. Below this deposit and cut through by the earlier retaining wall was a 0.1m thick layer of compact silt that may represent an old ground surface directly above the natural sub-soils. The retaining wall was made of sandstone fragments stood 1m high and was 0.4m wide. Within the section of the wall exposed in Test Pit 5 there were four fragments of string course presumably from the nearby priory incorporated into the wall with striated tooling on some of the faces and measuring 24cm x 40cm x 15cm.

A further visit to the site was made to monitor the excavation of two test pits (TP8-9) measuring 3m long 0 9m wide and excavated to a depth of 2m across the area of new housing after vegetation had been cleared from the site and a layer of hardcore laid down. In both pits there was 0 2m of hardcore overdying 0 1m of dark grey silt overtying the natural sub soils.

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The third visit involved monitoring the excavation of a further seven test pits (TP10-16) across the area of new housing. The pits were 0.9m wide and 3m king excavated to a depth of 1m. In all of the trenches the top 0.2m comprised the recently laid hardcore overlying 0.1m of dark grey silt which was directly above the natural sub soil. In Trench 2 and Trench 6 there was a concrete foundation with a wall in English bond surviving to 5 courses and were clearly machine made, i.e. post 1850 in date. The binck wall was 0.225m wide and 0.36m high and the concrete footing was 0.25m thick and 0.35m wide.

The final visit was to monitor the excavation of the foundation trenches for the southern most of the proposed bungalows. The trenches were 0.9-1m in width and 1.3m deep on the eastern side of the trench increasing to 1.5m in depth on the western side of the site. The trenches were excavated using a mechanical mini-digger with a 0.50m wide toothed bucket. The uppermost deposit across the whole observed area was the levelling for the present car park which consisted of limestone chippings and some brick mbble, this deposit was up to 0.55m thick in places.


The only features observed in the trenches beneath this levelting were all of 19th century or later date. There was a brick wall with an associated concrete foundation which ran at right angles to the street frontage probably forming part of the foundations observed in the earlier Test Pits. The brick work survived to a height of 4 courses and the bricks were laid in English Bond. Over the westermost 2.5m of the site there was a deposit of brick rubble rounded cobbles and dark brown sandy clay up to 0.50m thick which may have been either demolition dumping or the deliberate infilling of service pipe trenches. Beneath this deposit was a brown glazed sewer pipe encased in concrete 0.95m below ground level (BGL), again at right angles to the street frontage and a cast iron pipe at 0.80m BGL. The pipe was located in the westermost foundation trench section but also turned through a right angle to cross the westermost foundation trench. Beneath the features described above was a dark brown silty clay up to 0.36m thick, which was presumably a buned topsoil directly above the natural sub-soils.



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


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
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


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South-west section Test Pit 2 adjacent to south-east boundary wall



String course stone recovered from retaining wall

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


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General view of the foundation trenches looking north-east
