REPORT ON ARCHAEOLOGICAL WORK IN SELBY FOR YORKSHIRE WATER, 1995-96

PROGRAMME OF WORK

In mid February 1995, Yorkshire Water began a major programme of work in the town of Selby, cleaning and replacing water mains throughout the centre of the town. The first phase involved the excavation of trial holes (H1 - H12) in Micklegate, Water Lane, Ousegate and Church Hill, with a view to locate and then clean and reline existing mains in these streets. This work proceeded for Water Lane and Ousegate throughout February and March. It became apparent that the existing main in Church Hill/Church Lane was in need of complete replacement, and an open cut trench was excavated for the entire length of Church Hill/Lane, and along Wren Lane (T1, T2,) in April 1995. These trenches were preceded by trial holes at intervals. Finally, several trial holes (TC1 - 7) were excavated in Church Avenue and Abbey Place in advance of further work in 1996.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL IMPLICATIONS

Selby was an important medieval town, centred around the Benedictine Abbey founded in 1069. Evidence of earlier settlement has been limited to a group of coffined burials on Church Hill which are generally regarded as pre-Conquest. The richness of the medieval archaeology was demonstrated by an excavation on Church Lane in 1973, which revealed waterlogged deposits containing cruck timbers, pottery from the eleventh to the nineteenth century, animal bone and leather.

The archaeological implications of this work were recognised from the start, and an archaeological watching brief was commissioned from Alison Clarke to oversee all ground disturbance work in the town centre.

METHODOLOGY


Most of the work was undertaken by machine though the trial cuts (C1 - C11) in Church Hill/Lane and Wren Lane were partly hand dug. H4 to H12 were machine dug at night time to minimise disruption to traffic, which made observation of archaeological deposits unusually difficult. However, the organic material in H5 in Micklegate was apparent, and basic observations on soil types and finds were possible.

At some points excavation took place in the absence of the archaeologist: where this occurred, the spoil and the excavated trench were examined and recorded as far as possible.

T1 and T2 were excavated by mini-digger, which allowed fairly good recovery of archaeological material and recording. The trial holes in Church Avenue and Abbey Place were hand excavated, which allowed good opportunities for observation and recording.

The results of the watching brief on the trial cuts in Church Hill/Lane and Wren Lane have been incorporated into the report on T1 and T2.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

The work in Selby in 1995 covered a wide range of locations in the historic core of the town. These may be grouped together as:

- a) Micklegate (H5, H6, H9, H10)
- b) Water Lane/Ousegate (H4, H7, H8, H11, H12)
- c) Church Hill/Lane and Wren Lane (H1, H2, H3, C1 C11, T1, T2)
- d) Church Avenue/Abbey Place (TC1 TC7)
- a) The holes in Micklegate revealed organic material including leather, and medieval pottery. H10, on the corner of Millgate, was less productive, and H9 was largely affected by modern disturbance from the pre-existing water mains, but H5 and H6 both indicated medieval activity in the area and a potential for the survival of environmental evidence. A soil sample from H5 produced bracken, straw, barley, figs and flax among other things (full report with Selby '96 Excavation/Watching Brief Report).

A considerable build-up of organic silt in H5 indicated that activity in the area was intense and probably spread over a period of time, though this would need further testing as only a very small area was exposed. A widespread feature in Micklegate and in Water Lane, Ousegate and Church Hill/Lane was a layer of brick paving beneath the tarmac and road fill. From the extent of disturbance of the bricks, the layers sealed by them and from their type, it is possible to suggest that they were laid as a solid surface over much of central Selby streets in the late eighteenth or early nineteenth century.


- b) The holes in this area were less productive. All were along the line of the pre-existing water main and were affected by disturbance from the main. There was no trace of organic material or medieval activity, but this is probably not conclusive negative evidence as no excavations were made in ground undisturbed in recent times, and the conditions under which the holes were observed and recorded were far from ideal.
- c) More extensive excavation was undertaken in this area, and a variety of remains and material recorded. The brick paving noted above was widespread, though broken up in many places. Brick and stone foundations of former buildings were noted along Wren Lane, at the junction of Church Hill and Wren Lane, and at the southern end of Church Lane. These all suggest that the current building lines are of relatively recent origin, and that Wren Lane in particular was probably much narrower than now, as recently as the 18th/19th century. Although some parts of the road were extensively disturbed by modern services, other areas showed stratified layers containing pottery from medieval to nineteenth century periods, and also two areas of organic remains. These produced medieval pottery, leather, wood and charcoal (full report on environmental remains with Selby '96 Report). Taken together with findings from previous excavation, these suggest widespread activity with a considerable industrial content. This is borne out for the late eighteenth century at least by Mountain's Selby Directory (1800), which lists cordwainers, joiners, a cooper and a heelmaker in Church Hill/Lane and Wren Lane, as well as various other occupations.
- d) The trial holes in Church Avenue and Abbey Place were exploratory. Those along Church Avenue indicated that a new main could be laid along the footpath without disturbing archaeological remains of any great significance, except in one area where the concentration of other


services in the narrowest part of the footpath would necessitate a deviation into the edge of the Cholera Burial Ground to the south.

TC6, at the eastern end of Abbey Place, revealed part of a human skeleton. This was outside the area of the Cholera Burial Ground and close to existing buildings, and was assumed to be medieval. It was aligned east-west, and indicated that the medieval burial ground associated with the Abbey extended further than the existing churchyard. The railings around this were erected at the same time as the construction of The Crescent to the south of the Abbey Church, and may well have curtailed the extent of the medieval burial area. The exposed skeleton was recorded and left in situ.

Overall, the work in Selby in 1995, although limited and partly undertaken in difficult conditions, produced evidence of archaeological deposits of some significance. H5 in Micklegate showed the potential for waterlogged organic deposits in undisturbed areas, although the extent of these was unknown. Church Hill also produced waterlogged deposits and some evidence of structural remains, although the nature of these could not be fully explored. TC6 in Abbey Place proved the existence of at least one burial outside the existing churchyard and beyond the limits of the Cholera Burial Ground.

Taken together, the results show a high potential for archaeological investigation in a number of streets in the historic core of the town, and provide the groundwork for targetting future archaeological work.





SUMMARY OF WATCHING BRIEF

H1 - H12 (see location plan 2)


The majority of the trial and access holes contained modern deposits associated with the original water main trenches, although these deposits were clearly backfilled with earlier material and therefore contained a mixture of nineteenth century and earlier material. H7 contained a brick lined culvert running north-west to south-east along Ousegate, which overlay the unusually deep water main. H9 reached beyond the original water main trench and layers of silts and sands were encountered. H5 was excavated in the wrong location and contained no modern services. As a result, it allowed observation of the undisturbed deposits in this part of Micklegate. These proved to be rich in organic material, including plant remains and a piece of worked leather. Associated finds included both medieval and post-medieval pottery.

T1 (see location plan 2)

This trench ran from H7 across Water Lane to H1, and then up the eastern side of Church Hill and Church Lane, crossing to the western side of Church Lane outside No 3 and finishing at the junction with Church Avenue. It joined T2 at the junction with Wren Lane. Prior to and during the machine excavation of the trench a number of cuts (C1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8 and 9) were hand excavated along the route and these are considered with the description of T1.

The average width of the trench was between 40 and 50 cm, and the depth varied between 94 and 120 cm.

Much of the fill below the tarmac road surface was disturbed, with numerous services and evidence of modern activity including areas of hardcore and clean orange sand as well as modern debris. At the northern and southern ends the road surface was underlaid by a layer of bricks set on edge, representing a former road surface which is widespread in Selby. In the area around the junction with Wren Lane was a large area of bricks and dressed stones which, although disturbed and confused, appeared to be in part at least the foundations of a building. Associated finds indicated an eighteenth or nineteenth century date, although later disruption of the area from service laying make a firm date difficult to assign.

Where modern disturbance had not taken place at deeper levels, below around 50 cm beneath the ground surface, grey and brown silts (C1053, 1054, 1055, C1056) were widespread. Some of these (C1054 and C1056) were organic. C1054 occurred as an intermittent layer outside Nos 22 to 30 Church Hill, at depths between 70 cm and 85cm from the surface, and again outside 15 to 17 Church Lane from 70 to 90 cm below the surface. It contained wood and other plant material, well-preserved animal bone and late-/post-medieval pottery. C1056 occurred at deeper levels in the same areas, between 85 and 106 cm between 30 and 26 Church Hill, and between 90 and 100 cm outside 15 to 13 Church Lane. It contained wood and plant material, well-preserved animal bone, leather and medieval pottery. The base of the layer extended below the base of the trench in parts, but cleaner non-organic grey silts and sands generally underlay the organic silts, indicating relatively undisturbed soils.

South of 13 Church Lane, much of the fill of the trench was disturbed, and it was forced to take a line dictated by the avoidance of various modern services. At the southern end of the trench brick and stone foundations were observed crossing the trench from north to south. The foundations began immediately below the brick layer (c. 25 cm below the surface), and extended to a depth of 90 cm below the surface. They were approximately 50 cm wide. Their alignment was generally in line with the frontage of the existing 18th/19th cenruty buildings on the west side of Church Lane at this point, but their position in the centre of the street suggests that the street may have been much narrower or on a slightly different line in the past. Unfortunately it was impossible to adjudge which side was the inside of any building the remains of which they represent.

T2 (see location plan 2)

This trench ran from a T junction with T1 on Church Hill, north-westwards along the northern side of Wren Lane. It was on average 100 cm deep, and widened from 23 cm between T1 and C7, to between 30 and 40 cm wide along most of its length.


A trial cut (C7) on the corner of Wren Lane and Church Hill revealed tarmac and road base to 40 cm, below which were compacted brown and grey silts with occasional cobbles. A layer of limestone fragments at 90 cm below the surface separated these silts from very organic very dark silt containing wood and plant material which continued to the base of the cut at 106 cm below the surface.

The organic silts did not extend into T2 in either direction. Towards Church Hill the trench cut across the disturbed area noted in T1, and to the west it encountered an area of brick foundation walls and cellars with associated 19th century finds. These appeared to relate to former buildings extending further north than the present building line, and would imply either a greatly reduced street width or a slightly different alignment for Wren Lane. The foundations and cellars did not extend beyond the west end of No 16 Wren Lane, but the trench continued to cut through disturbed stony silty sands with occasional 19th century finds to the west end of Wren Lane where it terminated.

A series of trial holes was hand dug around Church Avenue and Abbey Place, in advance of the excavation of a trench continuing from the end of Church Lane to the Market Place.

The location of the trench was designed to avoid, as far as possible, the known Cholera Burial Ground between Church Avenue and the boundary of the Abbey Church grounds. A gas main trench along the western side of Church Avenue was known to have disturbed several burials, though it was unclear whether these belonged to the Cholera Burial Ground or to earlier graves. The existing boundary of the Abbey Church graveyard was erected in 1792, but its former extent was unknown. The trial holes were therefore hoped to give information on the depth and extent of possible burials.

Occurs beneath 1054/1055 at depths between 85 and 106 cm from the surface, above 1057 where depth of trench reaches below the bottom of 1056, containing med. pot (mainly green glaze, including two strap handle fragments and a twisted fluted handle), wood, leather and animal bone.

On surface of footpath, above 1062

1062

Mixed brown loam with small stones '95 - TC1, TC2, TC4, TC5 Beneath 1061 and 1064, above 1063 and 1065, modern infill with mod. pottery

1063

Silty yellow sand '95 - TC1

Beneath 1062, to base of trench at 100 cm, disturbed, containing post-med. to mod. pottery, animal bone, various services

1064

Tarmac
'95 - TC2, TC3, TC4, TC5
On surface of footpath

1065

Mortary sandy loam, medium/light brown

'95 - TC2, TC3, TC5

Beneath 1062 (TC2, TC5) and 1064 (TC3), modern backfill from between 27 and 34 cm to base of trench (TC1, TC5), above 1067 (TC3) containing mod. pottery, tile, various services.

1066

Pale yellow gravel

'95 - TC2

Fill around drain at 34 - 40 cm below surface

1067

Pale yellow sand

'95 - TC3

Layer beneath 1065 between 56 cm and 79 cm below the surface, modern infill around services

1068

Dark brown silt with small angular stones

'95 - TC3

Layer beneath 1067 from 79 cm to base of hole at 104 cm below the surface, containing some charcoal flecks.

sandstone

'95 - TC6, TC7

Stone flags on surface in Abbey Place

1070

Cement

'95 - TC6, TC7

Cement layer beneath 1069 in Abbey Place

1071

Dark brown disturbed loam with stones

'95 - TC6

Layer beneath 1070, from 17 to 32 cm below the surface, containing brick and tile fragments and clay pipe fragment.

1072

Mid brown sandy loam with small stones

'95 - TC6

Layer beneath 1071, from 32 to 60 cm below the surface, containing some animal bone and human bone fragments.

1073

Gas pipe

'95 - TC6, TC7

Old gas main at 45 cm from the surface, running along Abbey Place.

1074

Mid brown clayey silt with small angular stones

'95 - TC6

Fill of grave cut of skeleton, from 60 to 95 cm below the surface, containing some disturbed human bone (including broken left tibia) and in situ right patella, and part of femur, tibia and fibula at depth of 75 cm.

Layer beneath 1074 from 95 to base of hole at 100 cm below the surface (TC6), and beneath 1077 at 80 cm below the surface (base of hole) (TC7).


