



BEDALE PRIMARY SCHOOL ARCHAEOLOGY DAYS

JB Archaeological Services was commissioned to run a three day excavation on the school field adjacent to Bedale Primary School, Bedale. The project consisted of three classes from the school being involved in both excavation and finds handling. One class took part per day and was divided into two groups. One group was based in the class room and carried out a series of finds handling tasks in order to complete the work sheet below. The other group took part in the excavation of a 6x1m trench located near the northern end of the school playing field (Figure 1). At lunchtime the two groups swapped activities. For one day the pupils had an opportunity to see a metal detector in action courtesy of one of the parents.

The location of the trench was chosen simply to be out of the way of any activities on the playing field and no archaeological assessment had been carried out beforehand.

The results of the excavation were that in at least the northern end of the field there is a layer of topsoil (c.0.07m thick) which overlies what appears to be a levelling layer (c.0.5m thick) which is a mixture of imported topsoil and 'Victorian' domestic refuse along with a small amount of building debris (brick fragments, wall plaster etc.). Below this there was a c.0.20m thick relic plough soil which contained c.10 fragments of abraded medieval pottery - probably the result of manuring from the earlier settlement of Bedale. Some of the medieval fragments appeared to be 13/14th century though I am no expert in this. Now you have done this give three reasons w

Other finds included a 19th century horse brass, 1960s toy London bus, numerous fragments of late 18th early 19th century pottery, butchered animal bone, iron nails etc.
