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Non Technical Summary

This report has been prepared by MAP Archaeological Consultancy Limited under instruction from David L. Walker Limited acting on behalf of Lightwater Quarries Limited, to assess the Historical and Archaeological background and the impact of the proposed Quarry Extension at Potgate Quarry.

The Site of the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry is currently part of an arable field.

There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments, Registered Park and Gardens, Registered Battlefields, Listed Buildings or any known sites on the North Yorkshire Historic Environment Record within the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 This Desk-based Assessment was commissioned by David L. Walker Limited acting on behalf of Lightwater Quarries Limited, and was undertaken by MAP Archaeological Consultancy Ltd for a Proposed Quarry Extension to Potgate Quarry (SE 2740 7640: Fig. 1).
- 1.2 Archaeological, Historical and Architectural remains are protected by means of Statutory Instruments (including Scheduled Ancient Monument Legislation and Planning Policy Guidance Nos. 15 and 16), and by the Harrogate District Council Local Plan (Chapter 6: Policies HD1, HD4, HD5 and HD7A).
- 1.3 There are no Scheduled Ancient Monuments, Registered Park and Gardens, Listed Buildings or Registered Battlefields within the Proposed Extension

Area to Potgate Quarry. There are two Scheduled Ancient Monuments within 2km of the Proposed Extension Area to the Quarry.

- 1.4 All work was funded by Lightwater Quarries Limited.
- 1.5 The Site Code assigned to this project is MAP 05-02-10.
- 1.6 All Maps within this report have been reproduced from the Ordnance Survey with the permission of the Controller of Her Majesty's Stationery Office, Crown Copyright, Licence No. AL50453A.

2. Site Description

- 2.1 Potgate Quarry is located 1.3 km west-south-west of North Stainley with access from Musterfield Lane to the north (Pls. 1 to 8). North Stainley is located 5km north-north-west of Ripon. The Proposed Extension Area is located north of the current Working Area at Potgate Quarry and is bounded to the north and west by Musterfield Lane with Musterfield Farm to the west and farmland to the east.
- 2.2 The Proposed Extension Area is approximately 320m by 210m (6.7 hectares), which stands between heights of c. 92m and 98m AOD.
- 2.3 The Proposed Quarry Extension Area is situated on soils of the Nercwys (542) Soil Association, described as 'deep fine loamy soils with slowly permeable subsoils and light seasonal waterlogging. Associated with similar slowly permeable seasonally waterlogged soils' over underlying geology of 'Till from Palaeozoic and Mezozoic sandstone and shale (Mackney et al, 1984, p. 9).

3. Planning Background

3.1 There have been no recent planning applications lodged for the Proposed Development Sites (since January 2007: www.harrogate.gov.uk).

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4. Aims and Objectives

- 4.1 The aim of the Assessment is to:
 - Identify recorded features of archaeological significance within the study area
 - Establish the potential for hitherto unrecorded and unknown sites
 - Assess the relative importance of the sites
 - Assess the likely impact of the proposed development on the sites
 - Make recommendations to mitigate any impact of the development on the sites

5. Methodology

- 5.1 The Desk-based Assessment reviewed the following sources of information for a target area that extended for a radius of 1km from the study site: -
 - North Yorkshire Historic Environment Record (HER)
 - National Monuments Record
 - Listed Building Register
 - Aerial Photographs
 - Scheduled Monuments List
 - English Heritage Register of Historic Parks and Gardens
 - English Heritage Register of Battlefields
 - Visual inspection of the site
 - Plans and maps of the site and its environs, including historical pictorial and surveyed maps and including pre- and post war Ordnance Surveys up to the present day.
 - o Place and street name evidence
 - Trade and Business Directories
 - Historical documents and photographs
 - Appropriate archaeological and historical journals and books

6. Results

6.1 There are no archaeological sites known within the Existing Consent Area and the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry on the North Yorkshire Historic Environment Record (HER).

- 6.2 Within two kilometres of the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry, there are two Scheduled Ancient Monuments; thirty-two sites on the North Yorkshire Historic Environment Register (HER) and there are twenty-one Listed Buildings.
- 6.3 Details of the Scheduled Ancient Monuments and the Historic Environment Record are summarised in Table 1 below and illustrated on Figure 3.

6.5 Prehistoric

6.5.1 There are no Prehistoric archaeological sites or finds on the North Yorkshire Historic Environment Record within the Existing Consent Area and the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry.

6.5.2 Within two kilometres of Potgate Quarry there are eleven prehistoric sites and finds either undated or assigned to the Prehistoric Period. There are references to two finds, both axes, one undated (MNY 15939) and a broken Neolithic Stone axe (MNY29200). There was a Bronze Age Beaker Burial found in West Tanfield (MNY15522). The site of Castle Dikes has substantial earthen ramparts and is noted on the North Yorkshire HER as a possible Iron Age Hillfort, predating the Roman Villa on the site, this is a Scheduled Ancient Monument (Monument No. 29528: MNY21030). There are seven Aerial Photographic Cropmarks sites noted on the North Yorkshire HER which are interpreted as undated or Iron Age features and include Iron Age hut circles (MNY29207; MNY29208), an Iron Age Industrial Site or Quarry (MNY29205); an undated enclosure and mound (MNY24030); an undated pit alignment (MNY13755) and two enclosures, one Iron Age (MNY29204) and one undated (MNY15007).

Potential: Low

6.6 Romano-British Activity

- 6.6.1 No archaeological sites of Roman date are recorded within the Existing Consent Area and the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry.
- 6.6.2 900m south-east of Potgate Quarry is Castle Dikes, the site of a known Roman Villa and Bathhouse, which is a Scheduled Ancient Monument (Monument No. 29528: MNY21030). The villa and bathhouse were partially excavated in the nineteenth century and a further range of Roman buildings were uncovered in 1929. The villa dates from the early second century AD. The Villa was first Scheduled as a Monument in 1926 (Monument NY104).
- 6.6.3 The site of a Spring, St. Helen's Well is noted on the North Yorkshire HER as a possible Roman Spring Votive Site and later Holy well (MNY24029). This well is located 500m south of Potgate Quarry,

Potential: Low

6.7 Anglo-Saxon/Anglo-Scandinavian

- 6.7.1 There are no archaeological sites of this date recorded within the Existing Consent Area and the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry.
- 6.7.2 The villages of North Stainley (MNY15856) and Azerley (MNY13515) are both manors, which predate the Norman Conquest.

Potential: Low

6.8 Medieval Activity

- 6.8.1 The Potgate Quarry and the Proposed Extension Area lies south-west of the village of North Stainley and north-west of Ripon, in the Parish of North Stainley with Sleningford, in the District of Harrogate, North Yorkshire, which was formerly in the Lower Claro Wapentake in the West Riding of Yorkshire.
- 6.8.2 The Place-name 'North Stainley' derives from the Old English for stone "leah" meaning grove or glade (Ekwall 1974, 252, 435-8). The first mention of North Stainley in documentary sources is in the Domesday Book (1086).
- 6.8.3 There are four entries in Domesday for North Stainley. The first entry is under the Land of The Archbishop (of York) "To Ripon belongs the jurisdiction of these lands (EAST) STAINLEY; SUTTON (GRANGE); another STUDLEY (ROGER); (NORTH) STAINLEY; SLENINGFORD; SUTHEUUIC. Between them all 21 ½ carucates taxable. 15 ploughs possible there. Now there are 5 villagers and 3 smallholders who have 3 ploughs. Meadow 2 acres. In SUTHEUUIC; underwood 1 ½ leagues long and 1 league wide. Value of Ripon before 1066 £32, now £7 10s." (Faull and Stinson 986, 2W8). The second entry under the Land of the Count of Mortain states "In CUNDALL, NORTON (LE CLAY) an outklier, and LECKBY (PALACE) an outlier, Watheof had one manor of 21 carucates taxable where 12 ploughs are possible. Count Robert has (it) now. Alfread holds it for him. To the same manor belongs the jurisidiction in LECKBY (PALACE) 4 carucates, BRAMPTON (HALL) 2 carucates, CUNDALL 2 carucates, (NORTH) STAINLEY 1 carucate, (EAST) TANFIELD 1 carucate, CALDEUUELLE, 4 carucates. Together 14

carucates taxable, where 8 ploughs can plough. All waste excepte CALDEUUELLE there is one villagr with ½ plough. The whole manor 2 leagues long and 1 wide. Value before 1066, £4; now 20s." (ibid, 5W38). The next entry is in the summary of the holdings of the Archbishop, which states "In (NORTH) STAINLEY and SLENINGFORD 6 ½ carucates" (ibid SW Bu48). The final entru in Domesday is the summary of the holdings of the Count of Mortain, "in (NORTH) STAINLEY, 1 carucate" (ibid, SW H9).

- 6.8.4 There are no Medieval Finds, Sites or Monuments within the Existing Consent Area and or the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry on the North Yorkshire HER.
- 6.8.5 Within two kilometers of Potgate Quarry there are eight known Medieval sites on the North Yorkshire HER. Approximately 1.5km north of Potgate Quarry, is the Deserted Medieval Village of East Tanfield, with earthwork remains of building platforms, yards, enclosures and tracks (MNY21024), which is a Scheduled Ancient Monument (Monument No. 29522). East Tanfield DMV was scheduled in August 1958 (NY470). To the west North Stainley, and north of Potgate Quarry is the Deserted Settlement and Chapel of Sleningford (MNY15264). Mickley village has a Medieval foundation (MNY15776). Evidence of Medieval ploughing survives as ridge and furrow at Mickley (MNY23032, MNY23035; MNY23036), at Chequaer (MNY23052) and at Newfield (MNY23037). Former field boundaries and lynchets are noted at Westfield (MNY23050). The site of a Grange for Fountain's Abbey is noted at Friar's Hirst (MNY24019).

Potential: Low

6.9 Post-medieval/ Modern

6.9.1 In there were four entries under North Stainey in Baines Directory and Gazeteer of 1822

"Bell, Geo., blacksmith;

Dalton, John, Esq.;

Hudson, C.P., Esq.

Metcalf, Joseph, vict, Golden Letters"

Potgate House is also listed as a farm in North Stainley. The National Gazetteer of Great Britain and Irland of 1868 notes North Stainley under Ripon with the following description "NORTH STAINLEY, (or Stainley-with-Dleningford), a township in the parish of Ripon, West Riding county York, 4 miles N.W. of Ripon, its post town. The village, which is small, is situated on the S. bank of the river Ure, and near the Roman way to Catterick. The township contains the new palace of the bishops of Ripon, recently erected on the farm of Bramley Grange. The living is a perpetual curacy in the diocese of Ripon, value £100, in the patronage of the dean and chapter. The church is modern." (www.genuki.org.uk).

- 6.9.2 There are no Post-medieval or Modern sites noted on the North Yorkshire HER within the Existing Consent Area for Potgate Quarry or the Proposed Extension Area.
- 6.9.3 Sites within two kilometres of Potgate Quarry include Mickley Mill (MNY23031), a tree nursery or orchard at Newfields (MNY23051), Newfield Farm (MNY24041, a barn at Mickley (MNY24035). A lime kiln (MNY14700) and mills at North Stainley (MNY13990) and Azerley (MNY13822).
- 6.9.4 The 1856 First Edition Ordnance Survey Map (Fig. 5) shows the area of the Proposed Extension Area as two fields east of Musterfield with Musterfield Lane to the north and west. The present quarrying area is two fields to the south. The Area of the Company Landholding on the First Edition Ordnance Survey map includes covers Potgate Farm, a limestone quarry and Limekiln, The Cover (later called Potgate Wood) and twenty-five fields.
- 6.9.5 The 1894 Second Edition Ordnance Survey Map (Fig. 6) shows The Proposed Extension Area as two fields located south and east of Musterfield Lane and east of Musterfield. The Area of the Company Landholding in 1894, includes Potgate Wood and Potgate Farm and twenty-two fields, some field boundaries has changes.

6.9.6 The 1910 Edition Ordnance Survey Map (Fig. 7) showed the Proposed Quarry Extension Area as one field located south and East of Musterfield Lane and east of Musterfield. The Area of the Company Landholding in 1910 included the Old Quarry, Potgate Farm, Potgate Wood and seventeen fields.

6.9.7 The 1930 Edition Ordnance Survey Map (Fig. 8) showed the Proposed Extension Area as one field, as on the 1910 Edition Ordnance Survey Map. The Area of the Company Landholding includes seventeen fields, Potgate Wood and Potgate Farm.

Potential: Low

6.10 Listed Buildings

6.10.1 There are no Listed Buildings within Potgate Quarry and the Proposed Extension Area or bordering the Quarry boundaries. The nearest are in North Stainley village c. 400m east of the company landholding.

6.11 Site Walkover

6.11.1 The site was visited on the 15th February 2010. The area of the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry was an arable field to the south-west of a farm track (Pls. 1-8).

6.12 Potential for Unrecorded Sites

6.12.1 The potential for unrecorded sites is moderate. The Proposed Quarry Extension Area has been part of a Medieval and Post-medieval Fields Systems. Archaeological Deposits predating the Medieval Period are also a possibility.

6.13 Evidence of Previous Disturbance

6.13.1 There is no known evidence for previous ground disturbance on the Proposed Extension Area other than by agricultural activity.

7. Impact of the Development

7.1 The following potential impacts upon the archaeological resource are considered:

- Loss of, or damage to, archaeological sites and remains
- Settings and views of and from upstanding remains, Listed Buildings,
 Scheduled Monuments and other archaeological sites
- Changes to ground conditions as a result of changes to the drainage regime which could affect archaeological remains
- Loss of landscape features, structures and areas with historic and cultural heritage associations
- Other possible impacts such as noise, vibration, compressions and other changed ground conditions

7.2 Loss of, or damage to, archaeological sites and remains

7.2.1 The proposed Quarry extension will completely remove any archaeological remains, if present, within the Proposed Quarry Extension Area.

7.3 Settings and views of and from upstanding remains, Listed Buildings, Scheduled Monuments and other archaeological sites

7.3.1 There are no Scheduled Monuments or Listed Buildings or other archaeological sites within the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry, or within the existing consented area of working.

7.4 Changes to ground conditions as a result of changes to the drainage regime which could affect archaeological remains

7.4.1 The proposed development is not envisaged to have an effect on the prevailing local drainage conditions.

7.5 Loss of landscape features, structures and areas with historic and cultural heritage associations

7.5.1 The Quarry will have a minor impact on any features, structures and areas with historic and cultural heritage associations.

7.6 Other possible impacts such as noise, vibration, compressions and other changed ground conditions

7.6.1 As per the existing operations, the quarrying will have a minimal impact in terms of noise and vibration in the immediate environment of the application site. It is unlikely that these will have an impact on features of archaeological or historic environment importance.

8. Conclusions and Recommendations

- 8.1 The Area of the Proposed Quarry Extension is currently an agricultural field. There are no known archaeological sites from the HER, Listed Buildings or Scheduled Ancient Monuments within the Proposed Extension Area to Potgate Quarry, or within the Existing Consent Area.
- 8.2 The assessment has shown no evidence of nationally important archaeological remains on the site that would prevent its allocation or subsequent planning permission for a Proposed Quarry Extension in line with PPG.16 and PPG. 15. However it is recommended that consideration is given to further evaluation of the site before there is a physical start on the development.




