

a field boundary, rather than a domestic structure. It may be possible that ditch F104 is also part of this field system, although further work would be necessary to ascertain its function with any certainty.

The remains known as F206 are of a very different nature to F204, and probably represent a structure of some kind. The limestones from which this feature was constructed are much more regular, and it appears some kind of sand-based bonding agent was utilised. These remains appear to continue beyond the trench, and may indeed form the foundations of a small building in the north-west corner of the field, as postulated following the cartographic appraisal. It is likely that these remains were not detected by geophysical survey because of the overlying rubble, which would have masked the linear arrangements of stones.

In conclusion, it would appear substantial remains of the medieval field system, and possibly an associated structure, are located within the north-western corner of this plot of land.

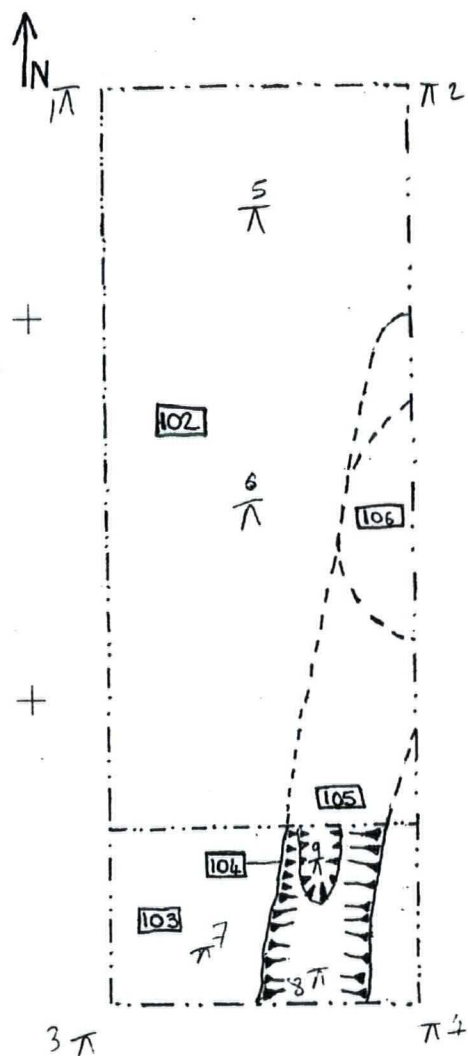


Fig. II South Facing Section of Ditch Cut F104

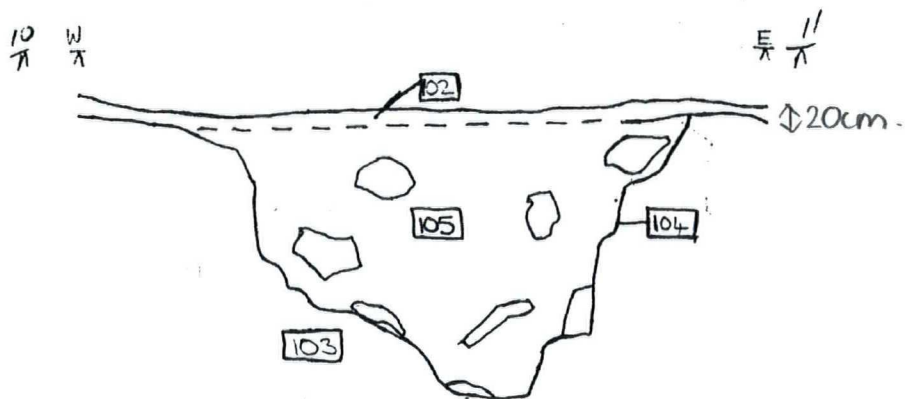


Fig. III Plan of Trench 2

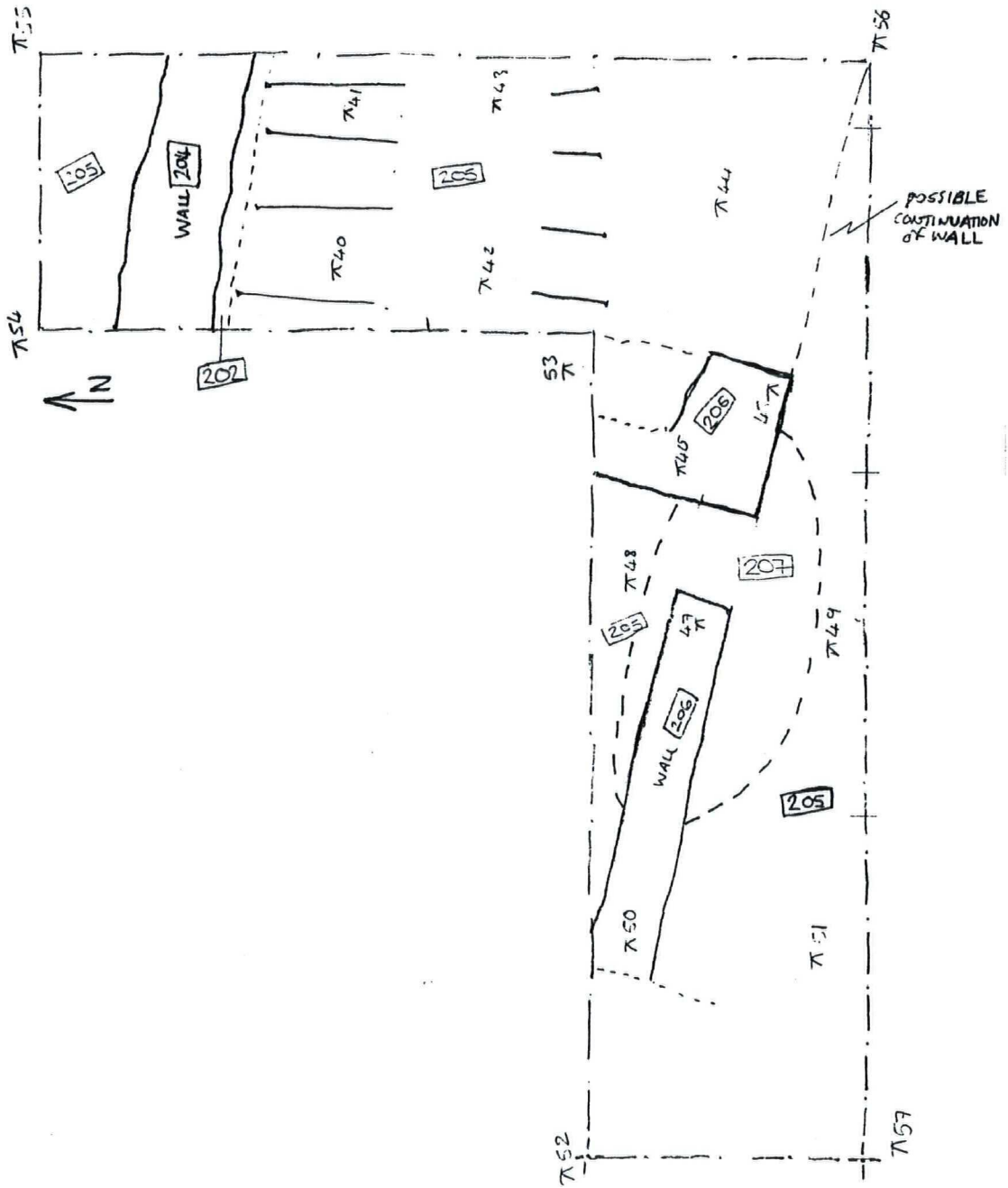


Fig. IV Plan of Trench 3

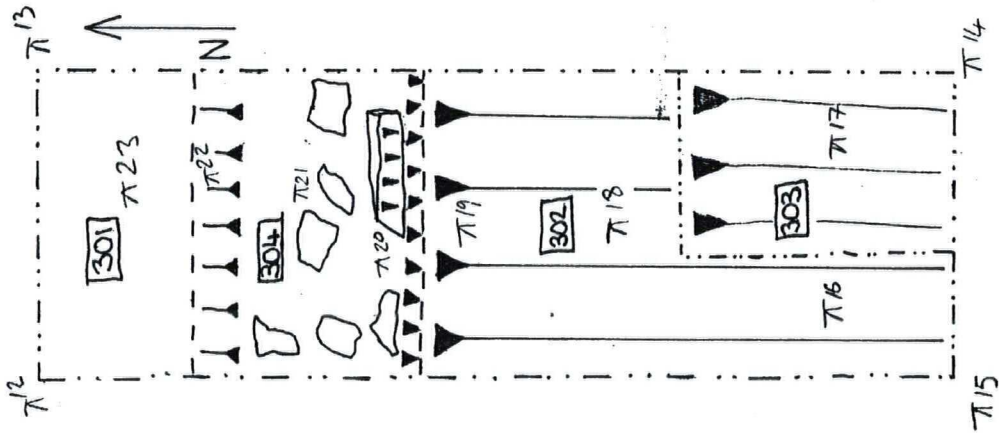


Fig. V Plan of Trench 4
