# A REPORT ON AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL WATCHING BRIEF AT THE GREY HORSE PUBLIC HOUSE, KELFIELD, NORTH YORKSHIRE.

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## 10 Introduction

Beginning on the 27<sup>th</sup> January 1998, York Archaeological Trust carried out an archaeological Watching Brief on the land adjacent to the Grey Horse Public house, Kelfield, (National Grid Reference SE 5932 3840) on behalf of the contractors, J M Butler (Joinery & Building) The watching brief was carried out to fulfill a planning condition decision no 8/14/50D/PA, set by Selby District Council,

# 2 0 Methodology

The machine excavation of foundation trenches and general site reduction was momtored for any evidence of archaeological deposits which may have survived m the vicinity of the development

This watching brief was undertaken in two phases and the work was momtored by Damian Hmd and Russell Marwood on behalf of the York Archaeological Trust Records of this archaeological watching brief are currently stored with the York Archaeological Trust and the Yorkshire Museum under the accession code YORYM 1998 7

The site was reduced by a mechanical excavator using a 5' toothless bucket and trenches excavated with a 2' bucket The deposits revealed m section were recorded following the procedures laid down in the York Archaeological Trust Context Recording Manual (1996)

# 3 0 Geology and Topography

The village of Kelfield is situated c 6½ km to the NNW of Selby and c 10km west of Fulford, York It sits upon the north bank of the River Ouse some 4km down stream from the confluence of the Wharfe and Ouse Its drift geology consists of alluvium deposits with a solid base geology of Keuper Marl of the permo-triassic period

# 4 0 Historical Background

The village of Kelfield appears m the North Yorkshire Sites & Monuments Record, as number 9711 00000 Kelfield has records dating back to the time of the Norman Conquest, when it was called *Chelchefeld* or *Chelchefelt*, having two carucates and two boyates recorded

Within the village there is a circular moated site, (SMR No 9711 03000), possibly the original manor house, documented as belonging to Henry de Kelfield in 1291. This lies to the north west of the development. The manor was presumably superseded by Kelfield Hall, built in 1591. This was a substantial building, documented as having twelve hearths and stood until 1840.

To the west of the site are a pair of ditches (SMR No 9711 04100) which may be either part of a moated site or fishponds or alternatively clay workings, either for brick making or *marling*, as the place name Kelfield derives from the Old Enghsh form for chalky field (possibly)

Adjacent to the back of the pub was the alleged "village gaol", dating to the 16<sup>th</sup> century This is also within ten metres of the suggested site of the village smithy, which lies to the west of the Grey Horse Public House Most of the current houses standing m the village date to the 18<sup>th</sup> Century or later To the north of the village, Moor End, there is a cluster of mainly 19<sup>th</sup> century dwellings

## 50 The Watching Brief

The first phase of work to be observed consisted of the mechanical removal of deposits to the north and rear of the Public house in an area designated to be the car park. This was done mechanically and consisted the stripping of turf and a dark brown fine loam to a depth between 0 20m and 0 25m below the current ground level.

During these excavations two concrete structures were uncovered, just below the level of the turf, c 0 10m BGL. The more southerly of these, nearest to the Public House, seemed to be the top of a septic tank whilst the other had an unknown function

About 1m from the northern edge of the excavation a disused manhole was encountered This was half excavated to reveal a backfill of topsoil and modern glass, pot fragments and brick fragments The mam body of the structure was made up of a single brick thick (c 0 06m) 1 05m square chamber

The second phase of observations began with the excavation of the footings for the raft foundations of the new dwelling house. These were located to the west of the Public House, 10m from the street front. A series of shallow trenches were machine excavated to depths of between 0 10m and 0 25m, the deepest being for the western external load bearing wall.

Much of the excavations towards the south and east of the site were dug through the existing ash and gravel of the car park. The northern most trenches were excavated wholly within the topsoil deposit, whilst an area in the south-west corner contained demolition mbble.

#### 60 Conclusions

The full depth of the topsoil was not reached in the excavations across most of the site and this reflected in the lack of finds and non-recovery of any archaeological features. Any which may have remained along the street front would have been removed during the leveling process undertaken during the laying of the car-park. The demolition debris recovered from the south-east corner was of fairly modern date.

No trace of any archaeological deposits were found during this development. However, the close proximity of the earthworks to the NNW of the site, and the general documentary evidence of Kelfields history, would suggest that any further excavation work on or in the vacimity of the site would merit archaeological observation




