WATCHING BRIEF, HEMINGBROUGH BRICKWORKS


This is to confirm that I have now carried out an archaeological watching briefduring topsoil stripping in advance of clay extraction, at Hemingbrough Brick Works (centred SE 67403169) I enclose a location plan to indicate the area involved Results were archaeologically negative

Topsoil was removed by a 360 degree back-acting inachme the strip was a clean one, and conditions dry, and any archaeological feature which had been present would certainly have been visible. In the event, the only features visible were the cuts for a system of modem clay-pipe drains, and a few disturbed areas which were clearly tree holes (the area is plentifully studded with rather stunted hohne-oaks). A few flint pebbles were found, none of which showed signs of having been struck or otherwise worked the presence in the topsoil of many small lumps of chalk suggests that the field has, at some time, been inarled with this material and it is probably in such a way that the fint found its way to the site. No pottery earlier than the twentieth century, and no other object of significance, was found
