Non Technical Summary

An Archaeological Watching Brief was carried out at Newburgh Priory, North Yorkshire on the 29th June 2005 The work was undertaken prior to the erection of a catering marquee in a former Abbey building, now a walled garden The work involved the excavation of two small trenches where no archaeological deposits or features were observed and no finds were recovered

Introduction




Figure 2. Area of Watching Brief

- MAP Archaeological Consultancy Ltd earried out an Archaeological Watching Brief at Newburgh Priory, North Yorkshire (SE 5438 7659, Figs 1 & 2) The work involved the excavation of two small trenches within a semi-derelict building, now used as a walled garden, to investigate the presence of any archaeological features or deposits
- 1 2 The work was carried out in advance of the erection of a catering marquee in order to determine if the stakes for the marquee would damage archaeological features, specifically a tiled floor surface associated with the Priory building
- 1 3 All work was funded by Newburgh Priory

2. Historical Background

Newburgh Priory lies just to the south-east of the village of Coxwold and was founded as an Augustiman Priory m 1145 by Roger de Mowbray and remained as a priory until the dissolution The sit and lands were then granted to Anthony Belasyse, Chaplam to Henry VIII (Smith 1937, 226) The remams of the Priory buildings are mcorporated mto the present Hall that occupies the site which stands in a large estate

3. Methodology

31 The two trenches (Trenches 1 and 2) were hand excavated inder archaeological supervision in a walled garden that had formerly been one of the priory buildings now semi derelict with no floors ceiling or roof. The trenches were excavated on two separate flagged pathways, one towards the north of the garden, the other to the south A drawn written and photographic record was made of all deposits encountered.

4. **R**esults

41 Trench 1

4 1.1 Trench I measured 0 9m long, 0 8m wide and excavated to a depth of0 55m No archaeological features were observed the only deposits seen were 0 2m of topsoil (context 001) that overlay a 0 25m deep pale stoney deposit (context 002) A number of modem brick and fractured dram pipe fragments were the only finds noted from deposit 002, which were discarded Deposit 002 overlay the natural limestone bedrock

4 2 Trench 2

4 2 1 Trench 2 measured 0 8m long by 0 75m wide and excavated to a maximum depth of 0 65m The findings were the same as Trench 1, topsoil (context 001) overlying a pale stoney deposit (context 002) that sealed the natural limestone (context 003) A 3 inch diameter iron water pipe ran on an east to west alignment through the eentre of the trench and appeared to mn below the path Modem finds including brick and pipe fragments were noted in Deposit 002 but were not kept as finds

5. Conclusions

51 The archaeological work failed to located any archaeological features or deposits and only identified topsoil and a mixed stoney deposit with modem finds overlying natural stone There was no evidence of any remnant of floor surface or any other features or deposits of archaeological significance




Figure 3. Watching Brief Trench Location
