## INTRODUCTION




Figure 1: Plan showing the location of Dirleton Castle, along with the sites of the present works.

Under the terms of its Properties In Care (PIC) call-off contract with Historic Scotland, Kirkdale Archaeology was asked to undertake an archaeological watching brief during the excavation of two small trenches designed to receive new interpretation boards. One trench was located within the castle compound, while the other was positioned adjacent to the present footbridge (Fig.1). The work was undertaken on 19th July 2011.

#### DESCRIPTION

#### TRENCH 1

Trench 1 was located 3.5m N of the W side of the ground floor entrance to the 'Ruthven Block' and was *c*.3.5m E of the inside face of the W curtain wall. It measured *c*.1m x 1m in plan. Excavation of this trench entailed the removal of an existing lectern-type interpretation board and the installation of a new board within the existing pit. The existing interpretation board was set in a concrete plinth **001** which in turn was laid directly within an informal shallow trench **002**, c.0.25m deep. This was cut through a mixture of imported chippings and dark soil **003** – straight onto bedrock. The bedrock was uneven and formed the core of the 13th century castle courtyard, and its head is a prominent natural rocky outcrop around which much of the 13th century work is built.

## TRENCH 2

This trench was excavated to receive a 'cairn' type sign, angled on a stone plinth. The trench measured  $c.1.25 \,\mathrm{m}$  E/W x  $0.85 \,\mathrm{m}$  N/S and was located W of the S end of the present wooden bridge leading into the castle. It was excavated to a depth of  $c.0.38 \,\mathrm{m}$  -  $0.4 \,\mathrm{m}$ . The topsoil **004** extended to a depth of  $c.0.2 \,\mathrm{m}$ , giving way to a rubble and dark soil deposit **005** which was not fully excavated. Late medieval pottery and oyster shell were found in **005**, suggesting that this deposit has not been affected by modern landscaping.




Figure 2: Pottery sherd SF001.

## CONCLUSIONS

#### TRENCH 1

The bedrock, as exposed in the existing trench, showed no sign of weathering and was too uneven to represent the courtyard surface. The implication may be that cobbling, paving or hard standing of some description would have covered the uneven bedrock head, particularly in the vicinity of the accommodation blocks towards the S side of the castle circuit. No evidence was found of any courtyard surface pre-dating the modern chippings.

#### TRENCH 2

This trench appears to be cut against an artificial terrace, which presently defines the S edge of the main defensive ditch but also provides a platform for formal planting presently defined by a line of three to four yew trees aligned generally parallel to the N face of the terrace. This terrace may form part of the elaborate gardens associated with the 16th century occupation of the site, which has been found to include a central *parterre* (presently the bowling green and a series of other compartments reflected by low earthworks to the E and S). The terrace, cut by Trench 2, also serves to provide an access point to the bridge. Whether the rocky outcrop itself was ever complemented by a ditch in the 13th century is unknown; it may be that the present terrace is the rationalisation of a route leading up to an earlier bridge point, perhaps at a lower level.
