SUMMARY: A watching brief was maintained during the excavation of two holes to receive the uprights for a new sign at the entrance to Bothwell Castle. Nothing of archaeological interest was noted.

#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

Under the terms of its call-off contract with Historic Scotland, Kirkdale Archaeology was asked to undertake a short period of archaeological monitoring at Bothwell Castle during the excavation of two small pits. These were intended as the settings for the uprights for a new sign at the entrance to the castle. The work was undertaken 24 November 2009

#### 2.0 DESCRIPTION

Two trenches were excavated at the outer gateway to the castle. The outer gate lies at the end of a rough roadway leading ultimately to the castle ruins. The site of the new sign was placed to be seen by visitors before they cross the outer area into the monument. The entrance to the outer area with its track etc is a farm style gateway with stud fencing.

The trenches were placed towards the N end of a grassy verge adjacent to the site car park on the W side of the roadway leading to the outer gateway. Both trenches were identical in terms of both dimensions and contents. They measured 400 mm square and were dug to a depth of 400 mm. The trenches were aligned E-W and set 700 mm apart (centre to centre). The trenches contained turf and topsoil (**F001**) to a depth of 250 mm giving way to a compressed clay-rich subsoil (**F002**) about 150 mm in depth. In turn, this sealed a reddish brown, fairly clean, relatively stone free clay-silt rich natural level (**F003**). This natural layer was excavated to a depth of 100 mm and was not bottomed.

#### 3.0 INTERPRETATION AND OBSERVATIONS

These holes were excavated through a cultivation layer (F001) probably related to the use of this area as a field. The two lower horizons (F002 & F003) represent A and

B horizons in the subsoil profile. There were no finds or features of archaeological significance.




Fig. 1: Plan (1:1000) showing location of works
