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#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

Under the terms of its PIC call-off contract with Historic Scotland, Kirkdale Archaeology was asked to undertake an archaeological watching brief during the digging of four trenches to house new sign boards at St. Andrews Cathedral, Fife. A record was also made of the removal of an existing sign (see Figure 1).

The work was undertaken over the course of two visits on  $5^{\rm th}$  May 2010 and  $11^{\rm th}$  June 2010.

#### 2.0 DESCRIPTION AND INTERPRETATION

### Newly installed signs

#### No. 1

This trench measured 800mm x 1000mm and was dug to a depth of 300mm. There was a single deposit (009) with two power cables (010 and 011) running *c*.NW to SE at the W end of the trench. The remains of an earlier signpost were identified at the E end of the trench. This trench was cut against post-monastic infill, possibly garden soils, which predated the formal clearance of the cathedral ruins.


## No. 2

This trench was the same size as Trench 1 (see above) and was located at the SW corner of the Cloister in the W alley. The trench contained a single deposit of dark topsoil/humic soil (007). There were no finds recovered from this trench. The trench appeared to reflect planting, perhaps flower beds or similar, in and around the cleared remains of the Cloister.

#### No. 3

This trench again measured 800mm x 1000mm and was dug to a depth of 300mm. It was located within the Chapter House. Three deposits were revealed, (004) the turf

and topsoil, sealing (005) a layer of light rubble and silt, sealing (006) a sandy silt. It was likely that contexts (004) and (005) represented similar landscaping to that picked up in the trench for sign 4, with context (006) being the truncated bedding deposit for the Chapter House floor. Disarticulated human remains were found within (005) along with fragments of oyster shell.

## No. 4

This sign was located to the W of St Rule's Tower within the area of a post-monastic cemetery. The trench measured 800mm x 1000mm and was dug to a depth of 300mm. The trench revealed three deposits. The first of these (001) was the turf and topsoil which extended to a depth of 160mm. This deposit sealed (002) – a layer of dumped sandstone and crushed stone fragments that extended to a depth of 150mm. This in turn sealed (003) a dark grey stony deposit. (001) and (002) reflected two

episodes of landscaping, with the latter containing residual/disarticulated human remains and one fragment of a medieval floor tile. (003) was not fully excavated and represents the top of a potentially undisturbed 'cemetery' horizon.

### Removed sign

This sign was removed from within a trench 700mm x 700mm square and 400mm deep. It contained one deposit, (008), a sandy stone free silt containing a few brick fragments. The trench lay close to a grave dated 1875, but at its completion there was no sign of any *in-situ* burial.

#### 3.0 CONCLUSIONS

As to be expected on a site of such historical importance with a long history of occupation, even these relatively shallow trenched threw up evidence from the distant past in the form of the fragment of medieval floor tile **SF001** recovered from Trench 4.

Little else of archaeological significance was recovered during the course of these works, however given the site's importance and the undoubted extensive archaeological deposits that survive relatively close to the ground surface, any future ground-breaking works should be carried out under close archaeological supervision.
