#### INTRODUCTION




Figure 1: Plan showing the location of Blackness Castle, and the site of the present works.

Under the terms of its Properties-In-Care (PIC) call-off contract with Historic Scotland, Kirkdale Archaeology was requested to undertake an archaeological watching brief on a small excavation at Blackness Castle (Fig. 1). The trench was intended to take a display board, and was located adjacent to the Barrack Block of 1870-74, to the S of the main Castle complex. The Barrack Block is assumed to be orientated E/W in this account, and the trench was at its W end, orientated NW/SE and situated 1.2 m from the Barracks at its closest point.

All excavation was carried out by hand, by Historic Scotland staff under archaeological supervision.

The work was carried out on 6<sup>th</sup> December 2011.

### DESCRIPTION

The trench measured 1.2m by 0.6m in plan, and was 0.45m deep. The uppermost deposit of gravel **001** proved to be a 100mm thickness of small rounded stone, overlying 70- 80mm of pale brown sandy silt and gravel **002**. The rest of the excavation proceeded through **003**, a dark grey sandy silt very rich in rubble (mostly dolerite chunks), but including some sandstone and brick throughout. One hand-made brick and one modern engineering brick fragment were noted within this material.

## CONCLUSIONS

This trench demonstrated that the ground to the immediate W of the Barracks Block has been disturbed in the recent past, as evidenced by the presence of the engineering brick. It remains unclear, due to the small size of the trench, whether or not this is localised disturbance caused by the laying of a nearby drain, or is more widespread - perhaps representing make-up material introduced to create the car park.
