INTRODUCTION




Figure 1: Plan showing the location of Inch Kenneth Chapel, and the area of works. Inset No. 2 © Crown copyright. All rights reserved 2012. Licence number 100036933.

Under the terms of its Properties-In-Care (PIC) call-off contract with Historic Scotland, Kirkdale Archaeology was asked to undertake an archaeological watching brief on the island of Inch Kenneth (off the W coast of Mull) during the excavation of five trenches to install a new bow yett providing access to the 13th Century chapel and a burial ground (Fig.1).

The trenches were located on top of a low earth and stone embankment of indeterminate age to the N of the N gable of the chapel. The embankment was approximately 0.5m high and

appeared to be part of a large roughly-rectangular enclosure, probably a paddock, which could be traced in the field to the N.

The chapel itself is rectangular with the walls defining a single compartment internally, with the altar to the E. The E and W walls are gabled; the E wall has been strengthened at a later date by the addition of wide buttresses. There are internal burials and a large (external) burial ground to the SW and also a later burial enclosure added onto the chapel's SE corner. There is a further burial plot with evidence of structure a short distance E of the chapel.

The chapel and its associated features and structures have never been excavated. Prior to 1831, a hoard of Anglo Saxon coins and some Viking age braided silver were discovered in the vicinity, and there was thus a high potential for encountering features or artefacts of archaeological interest during the present works.

The excavations were carried out manually by Historic Scotland staff under archaeological supervision, and took place on 16th May 2012¹.

DESCRIPTION²

Trench 1

Trench 1 measured $0.25 \text{m N/S} \times 0.24 \text{m E/W} \times 0.6 \text{m}$ deep. The turf, 101, approximately 0.08 m thick, sat on 102, a layer of mid-brown silty topsoil (0.14 m thick). In turn, context 102 cleared onto a 0.18 m thick layer of moderately compact mid-brown silt and stone (103), within which were some pieces of disarticulated animal bone. The stones were sub-rounded and up to 0.15 m long x 0.06 m thick. This deposit sat over a 0.2 m thick compact layer of light brown silty clay (104) flecked with charcoal and pieces of animal bone. The presence of this material showed that the ground had been heavily made-up. At the desired depth of 0.6 m, this layer (104) cleared onto a further loose layer of crushed stone (105).

¹ Additional de-turfing, to form a path up from the beach, had been carried out previously and was recorded photographically during this visit.

 $^{^2}$ The trenches were dug as the text describes. Subsequently, Trenches 2 - 5 were extended to the E by 0.3m to provide a better fit between the upright post and the swinging gate.




Figure 2: N-facing sections in Trenches 1 - 5 (Trench 1: top-left, Trench 2: top-centre, Trench 3: Top-right, Trench 4: bottom-left, Trench 5: bottom-right)

Trench 2

Trench 2 measured $0.32 \text{m N/S} \times 0.33 \text{m E/W} \times 0.38 \text{m deep}$. The turf (201) was 0.1 m thick and sat on a layer of mid-brown silty topsoil (202), at least 0.28 m thick, within which were some pieces of disarticulated animal bone. The presence of this material showed that the ground had again been made-up.

Trench 3

Trench 3 measured 0.3 m N/S (narrowing to 0.21 m below the turf) x 0.3 m E/W x 0.42 m deep. The turf, 301, was 0.1 m thick and sat over a layer of mid-brown silty topsoil, 302, at least 0.32 m thick, within which were some pieces of disarticulated animal bone. The presence of this material again showed that the ground had been made-up.

Trench 4

Trench 4 measured $0.25 \text{m N/S} \times 0.3 \text{m E/W} \times 0.4 \text{m deep}$. The turf, 401, was 0.1m thick and sat over a layer of mid-brown silty topsoil, 402, at least 0.3m thick, within which were some pieces of disarticulated animal bone. The presence of this material showed that the ground had been made-up.

Trench 5

Trench 5 measured $0.25 \text{m N/S} \times 0.25 \text{m E/W} \times 0.4 \text{m}$ deep. The turf, 501, was 0.1m thick and sat over a layer of mid-brown silty topsoil, 502, at least 0.3m thick, within which were some sub-angular stones (<0.12m) and some pieces of disarticulated animal bone. The presence of this material showed that the ground had been made-up.

CONCLUSIONS

The isolated position of Inch Kenneth, coupled with its known use from at least the Viking period onwards, suggests that it has great archaeological potential. Although nothing of archaeological interest was uncovered during this particular period of work, any further ground-breaking works should be accompanied by an archaeological watching brief.
