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1. Introduction

Archaeological Building Recording Services (ABRS) were commissioned by Bola's Home Ltd to undertake archaeological standing building recording (photographic survey) of the former Hartshill Institute, originally the Hartshill Working Men's Association building at 287 Harsthill Road, Harsthill, Stoke-on-Trent (SJ 86624 45788 (*Figures 1 & 2*)). Planning permission and Listed Building consent has been granted to convert the building to residential use (Planning Application No SOT/57854 & 57855LBC). The building is a traditional brick-built former institute, and is visible on the first edition Ordnance Survey map. The building is located on the southern side of Hartshill Road. The Senior Planning Officer (Archaeology/HER), Stoke-on-Trent City Council has recommended that archaeological standing building recording (photographic survey) be carried out prior to any proposed works being carried out.

The building is Grade II listed and located within the Hartshill Conservation Area. The building was listed in March 1993 for its historic and aesthetic qualities. The listed building description records it as:-

Formerly known as: Hartshill Institute HARTSHILL ROAD Hartshill. Former Institute, now in use as theatre workshop. c1840. Brick with stone dressings and plain tiled roof with scalloped tiles and ridge cresting. Gable facing street, with advanced gabled porch with paired shafts to doorway flanked by casement windows beneath 2-centred relieving arches with embossed tiles in the apex of the arch. Small rose window over the porch. Pronounced bargeboards echoing roof truss are carried on corbels.

The building was recorded during the intensive phase of the Stoke-on-Trent Historic Building Survey (HBS) in 1984 (ref. S/179). The HBS was supplied by the Senior Planning Officer, Archaeology and reviewed as part of this building recording.

A photographic survey was to be undertaken following standards as defined in Understanding Historic Buildings: A guide to good recording practice (English Heritage 2006). The photographic survey addressed the requirements detailed in the brief issued by the Senior Planning Officer.

The project was completed following the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists (CIfA) Code of Conduct, and adhered to their Standards and Guidance for Archaeological Investigation and Recording of Standing Buildings or Structures (2014), following the Written Scheme of Investigation (WSI) approved by the Senior Planning Officer, Archaeology (ABRS 2015-HIHS WSI).

2. Aims and Methodology

The aim of the survey was to provide a permanent photographic record of the building in its current state, prior to alteration or repair, to standards set down by English Heritage (2006).

The photographic survey was undertaken by Gerwyn Richards on July 15th 2015. Photographs, in 35mm monochrome negative and digital format taken as raw image files and converted to TIFFs (Tagged Image File Format) covered items 1-8 of the English Heritage guidelines (2006, 4.4.7).

Orientation: The building consists of a single linear range, fronting Hartshill Road and aligned north-north west to south-south east, for ease of description this is taken hereafter to be north to south with the principal elevation being that facing Hartshill Road, to the north. Where the terms 'left', 'right', 'front' and 'back' etc are used in the report, this is in relation to this principal elevation as viewed from Hartshill Road. For the purposes of this report a letter prefix has been allocated to each building and a letter prefix has been added for significant partitions where required.



3. Historical Background

The Hartshill Institute was opened in 1859 having been built by Colin Minton Campbell as a reading room for the Hartshill Working Men's Association. The Association soon began to experience a variety of difficulties and was closed in 1861. It re-opened in 1862, but closed again in 1865/66, it re-opened one final time in October 1866 and continued to struggle. In 1871, the Institution was advertised as a 'Public Hall' and was available to let for social

functions (from the Brief for historic building recording: 287 Harsthill Road, Hartshill, Stoke-on-Trent (SOT/57854/57855).

The plans drawn during the Stoke-on-Trent Historic Building Survey and show the original layout of the building (*Figure 3*).



A historical map regression confirms that the building plan remained largely unaltered during the 20th century. The only significant alteration is the addition of two small outshoot extensions to the south elevation. Viewing the Stoke on Trent Ordnance Survey 1:500 plan of 1878 and the later 1:500 plan of 1951 (SoTCA Ref XVIII.1.16 (*Figure 4*) & SoTCA Ref SJ8645 NE (*Figure 5*)) indicates this extension dates to the 20th century. The straight joint in the brickwork of the south easternmost extension is still apparent. Less apparent changes observed during the recording include the forward paired shafts on the porch being replaced with concrete shafts and an additional brick skin at ground level on the principal elevation.


Until recently the Institute was used by the Newcastle Players as a workshop and prop store before being sold into private ownership in 2014.








