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


Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)



Summary

In June 2015 KDK Archaeology Ltd undertook a programme of evaluation at land at, and adjacent to, 10 High Road, Broom, Bedfordshire. The work was undertaken in advance of the planned construction of two detached dwellings with double integral garages, and the creation of a new vehicular access. The site is located within a landscape which has evidence of occupation from later prehistoric times onwards, as evidenced by extensive cropmarks in the adjacent field, as well as being within the postulated environs of the medieval settlement of Broom. As a result it was considered that there was potential for later prehistoric remains within the development area, and possibly Saxon, medieval and post-medieval deposits.

Two trenches were excavated in the footprints of the proposed buildings, but no archaeological finds or features were discovered.

1 Introduction

1.1 In June 2015 KDK Archaeology Ltd undertook a programme of evaluation at land at, and adjacent to, 10 High Road, Broom, Bedfordshire. The project was commissioned by Mrs Jean Collins, and was carried out according to a Written Scheme of Investigation prepared by KDK Archaeology Ltd (C Barclay Jones 2015), and approved by Hannah Firth, archaeological advisor (AA) to the local planning authority (LPA), Central Bedfordshire Council. The relevant planning application references are APP/P0240/A/13/2205283 and CB/13/00682/FULL.

1.2 Planning Background

This project has been required under the terms of National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) as a condition of planning permission for the development of the site.

1.3 The Site

Location & Description

The site lies at the eastern end of High Road, which is at the northern-most end of the village of Broom, in the civil parish of Southill and administrative district of Central Bedfordshire. The site is centred on National Grid Reference TL 17501 24187 (Fig. 1).

The development area is bounded to the north by High Road and to the south by open fields. The boundary to the west is formed by the adjoining property and to the east by dense vegetation (Fig. 2). The site is part of the former garden of number 10 High Road, and contains a number of mature trees on the site, some of which alongside High Road are protected by a Tree Protection Order.

Geology & Topography

The site is on a slight east-west slope, and lies at a height of approximately 35m OAD. The sedimentary deposits of the site are sand and gravel, overlying mudstone bedrock of the Stewartby Member and Weymouth Member (http://mapapps.bgs.ac.uk).

Development




Figure 3: Trench location (scale 1: 1250)

The development comprises the construction of two detached dwellings with double integral garages, and the creation of a new vehicular access (Fig. 3).

2 Results

Two trenches were located within the footprints of the proposed development, and were excavated with a mechanical tracked excavator fitted with a toothless ditching bucket.

Trench 1 (Fig. 3; Plates 1)

Trench 1 was orientated NNE-SSW and measured 14m long, 2.10m wide and 0.52m max deep. The trench stratigraphy comprised:

0.15m of Topsoil

0.2m of Sub-soil: mid brown silty sand

0.1m of Natural: orange/brown gravelly sand

There were occasional patches of gravel and shingle, particularly at the NNE end of the trench.

The trench contained no archaeological finds, features or deposits.

Trench 2 (Fig. 3: Plates 2)

Trench 2 was orientated NNW-SSE and measured 11.5m long, 2.1m wide and 0.5m deep. The trench stratigraphy comprised:

0.2m of Topsoil

0.2m of Subsoil: mid brown silty sand

0.1m of Natural: as Trench 1

The trench contained no archaeological finds, features or deposits.

3 Conclusions

Neither trench contained any archaeological features, deposits or artefacts. This may have been because the sample size was small and each trench fell between what may be widely dispersed features, or that the development area is located beyond that which has been historically occupied.
