# **Quality Check**

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## Summary

Between August 2019 and August 2020 KDK Archaeology Ltd carried out Historic Building Recording, an Historic Building Watching Brief and an Archaeological Watching Brief on Abdale House/Northside, 32-34 Warrengate Road, North Mymms, Hertfordshire during the conversion of the property to a single residence. Abdale House appears to have originally been a hall house with crosswings the earliest possibly dating from the 14<sup>th</sup> century. The eastern crosswing dates from *c*.1600 but the central section originally housing the hall is not easy to date having been completely rebuilt in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. Northside was built at much the same time as the eastern crosswing and extended in the 18<sup>th</sup> century, possibly as a larger building programme including the extension of the eastern crosswing and the addition of some smaller service rooms to the south of the building. The building was extensively rebuilt in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Historically the building is known for housing a radio station for the Polish Air Force and housing some members of the Polish government in exile during the Second World War.

## 1 Introduction

1.1 Between August 2019 and August 2020 KDK Archaeology Ltd carried out an Historic Building Recording, Historic Building Watching Brief and Archaeological Watching Brief on Abdale House/Northside, 32-34 Warrengate Road, North Mymms, Hertfordshire. The project was commissioned by Christopher Aylard, and was carried out according to a Written Scheme of Investigation prepared by KDK (Shlasko 2019), and approved by the Hertfordshire Historic Environment Team (HHET) acting on behalf of the Local Planning Authority (LPA), the Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council. The relevant planning application references are 6/2019/1371/FULL and 6/2019/1372/LB.

## 1.2 Planning Background

This project has been required under the terms of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) in order to inform development proposals.

## 1.3 *The Site*

## Location




Figure 1: General location (scale 1:25,000)

The development site is located in the village and civil parish of North Mymms and the administrative district of Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council. It is centred on National Grid Reference TL 23042 03724 (Fig. 1).

#### Description




Figure 2: Site location (scale 1:1250)

Abdale House/Northside is a single building currently divided into two residences. It is located on the west side of Warrengate Road, in the hamlet of Water End. The A1(M) runs to the west of the property. The house sits within a large garden, with agricultural fields to the south and west and a residential property to the north (Fig. 2).

### Geology & Topography

The site is located just west of Mimmshall Brook on the Lewes Nodular Chalk Formation and Seaford Chalk Formation (undifferentiated), and comprises a sedimentary bedrock formed approximately 84 to 94 million years ago. The superficial deposits are River Terrace Deposits (undifferentiated) of sand and gravel (http://mapapps.bgs.ac.uk/geologyofbritain/home.html). The elevation is approximately 80m AOD



# Proposed Development




Figure 3: Proposed development (scale as shown)

The proposed development comprises the erection of single storey rear extension with glass balcony; installation of roof mounted solar panels; re-cladding of roof and re-rendering; repairs to timber frame, render and windows; and internal and external alterations - to facilitate conversion of the building from two dwellings into one dwelling (Fig. 3).

#### 2 Aims & Methods

#### 2.1 *Aims*

As described in the Written Scheme of Investigation (Shlasko 2019), the aims of the project were:

- To compile a record of the buildings prior to development
- To examine the structural history and development of the building in relation to its historical and geographical context
- To ensure the archaeological recording of all aspects of the development programme likely to have an impact on the historic fabric of the building before and during the works
- To provide sufficient information on the historic and architectural significance of the building that will place the findings of the investigations in their local and regional context
- To provide a report that meets the requirements of the National Planning Policy Framework
- To establish the date, nature and extent of activity or occupation within the development area
- To establish the relationship of any remains found to the surrounding contemporary landscape
- To recover palaeo-environmental remains to determine local environmental conditions.

#### 2.2 **Standards**

The work conformed to the following requirements:

- CIFA 2019 Standards & Guidance for the Investigation and Recording of Standing Buildings or Structures. Reading: Chartered Institute for Archaeologists
- CIfA 2020 Standards and Guidance for an Archaeological Watching Brief Reading: Chartered Institute for Archaeologists
- The Chartered Institute for Archaeologists' Code of Conduct (CIfA 2019)
- Current English Heritage guidelines (HE 2015, HE 2016, EH 2008)
- The Association of Local Government Archaeological Officers East of England Region Standards for Field Archaeology in the East of England (ALGAO 2003)

## 2.3 **Methods**

The work was carried out according to the Written Scheme of Investigation (Section 2.1), which required:

- A programme of historic building recording to Historic England Level 3 (HE 2016).
- A watching brief on building works involving significant disturbance to the historic fabric of the building/s.

## 2.4 **Constraints**

The constraints were limited to those often found on working sites, where elements of the historic fabric were obscured or difficult to access. This did not unduly hamper the surveys or hinder the interpretation of the structure.



## Historical Background

3.1 The earliest evidence for human activity in the general area around the village of North Mymms dates from the Palaeolithic, though it is an area of limited archaeological interest. The village is first documented in the Domesday Survey 1086, where it is listed as *Mimmine*. The toponym has had numerous forms (e.g. *Northmymmes, North Mims*) and was not fixed until the early 20<sup>th</sup> century (NMHP 2021). The 'North' element of the toponym was appended to distinguishes it from South Mimms in Middlesex, whereas the latter component may have been an otherwise unknown ancient tribal name (KEPN 2021).

The following section provides a summary of the readily available historical background to the site and its environs. This section has been compiled with information from the Hertfordshire County Council Historic Environment Record (HER ref: 76/19), KDK's own library, and reliable online sources. The HER data, with a 1km search radius, is shown in Fig. 4.

## 3.2 **Prehistoric** (before 600BC), **Iron Age** (600BC – AD43) & **Roman** (AD43-c.450)

Scant remains dating to these periods have been found within the HER search area. The earliest evidence for human activity is a Palaeolithic implement (HER 1708) found at North Mymms, c. 1km northeast of the development, was exhibited to the Society of Antiquaries in 1871 by John Evans. Mesolithic flints (HER 6233, 6264), consisting of blades and flakes, were found near South Mimms Castle, c. 1200m to the south, in the 1970s. Late Iron Age pottery, was also found near south Mimms Castle (HER 6233), along with Mesolithic flints, were found during observation of the cutting of a drainage ditch alongside the western carriageway of the A1(M), during the construction of the motorway. Three of the sherds are from a large grog-tempered jar and the remaining sherd is from a plate, which is a local variant of pre-conquest copies of imported plates and was probably made at Verulamium. The two vessels date to c. AD 20-50.

## 3.3 **Saxon** (c.450-1066) & **Medieval** (1066-1500)

The present day village dates back to at least Saxon times and it is listed in the Domesday Survey of 1086 as held by the Bishop of Chester, with a recorded resources that included land for 13 ploughs and woodland for 400 pigs (Powell-Smith 2021). A manor of North Mimms was held before the Conquest by three thegns, Queen Edith's men, who were able to sell it (Page 1908). North Mymms is included in a list of possible deserted medieval villages (HER 1013) though it is doubtful. This is based on the assumption that a medieval manor house and church would have had an adjacent nucleated village, and therefore a house and church alone, as found in the post-medieval park, implied a deserted settlement. The Domesday Book records 29 households within the manor, which is a fairly high number, but Hertfordshire's pattern of settlement is almost entirely one of dispersed hamlets, and there is no evidence that a 'village' existed here. The agricultural basis of the local economy, and the medieval strip fields, is adumbrated by the ridge and furrow cropmarks (HER 18089) located by Bradmore Lane and Station Road at North Mymms.

A later Manor of Potterells (HER 10421) is documented in the 15<sup>th</sup> century as appurtenant to the manor of Brookmans. It was sold in 1632 to Thomas Coningsby of North Mymms Park, and after 1658 it became the family seat and a house (HER 10422) of importance. Whether the medieval manorial site was at the site of the post-medieval house, or at Potterells Farm (HER 18579) 500m to the north, is unknown.

The parish Church of St Mary the Virgin (Grade II\*, List Entry 1100951; HER 4847) is situated within the post-medieval park (HER 9593). It dates from the 14<sup>th</sup> century and the original grant to build the church was awarded to Simon de Swanland, Lord of the Manor, in 1328.



One of the most notable monuments is the South Mimms motte and bailey castle (Scheduled Monument 1009433; HER 95) that is located about 1.25km north-west of South Mimms village, and approximately 1.2km south of the development. It is a 12<sup>th</sup> century motte and bailey that may have been built by Geoffrey de Mandeville in 1141 with a licence from Matilda and it was probably destroyed in 1143. The motte is *c*. 9m in height and 35m in diameter at the base, and is situated in the northwest corner of a kidney-shaped bailey that measures 125m north-south by 110m east-west and is surrounded by a bank and ditch. It is possible that earlier manorial buildings (and/or a chapel, as there appeared to be an apsidal structure that was revealed during archaeological investigations in the 1960s) were demolished when the castle was built. The 'motte' is unusual, but not unique, in its construction and purpose. The timber tower was built first, and earth built up around its base to ensure stability, with access into the tower through a timber-lined tunnel. The visual result was not one of a raised mound within the bailey.

During the A1(M) road widening scheme in April 1977 the stretch of motorway near South Mimms Castle revealed a pit (HER 4835) with  $11^{th}$  - $14^{th}$  century pottery, iron slag fragments and burnt clay daub. The pit is in the vicinity of the supposed outer bailey of the Castle, but  $13^{th}$ - $14^{th}$  century sherds, including a decorated sherd and glazed jug rim. Other local finds include a  $12^{th}$  or  $13^{th}$  century grey ware body sherd from a ploughed field between South Mimms Castle and the widened course of the A1(M); and a small, undated, iron ball (HER 4837), possibly an iron cannon ball or a musket ball.

#### 3.4 **Post-Medieval** (1500-1900)

The Grade I (List entry 1100946) North Mymms Park with adjoining garden walls and Ha Ha is a country house built for Henry or Sir Ralph Coningsby about 1600, and probably before 1596. It was altered on the courtyard side in 1846-7 by E Blore, and extended on same side in 1893-4 by Sir Ernest George and Yates. It is, apparently, the original manor of North Mymms from which the smaller Manors of Brookmans, Gobions, Potterells and possibly Parsonage became separated in the late 13<sup>th</sup> or early 14<sup>th</sup> centuries (NMHP 2021). The house is a beautiful example of 'Jacobean' work, dating from the close of the sixteenth century. Its interior has, however, been re-modelled and altered at various times and it now houses a collection of exquisite tapestries that are probably unrivalled in this part of England. North Mymms park, deerpark, and garden (HER 9593), the setting for the house, is a post-medieval park shown on all maps from 1766 onwards. The parish church is also surrounded by other monuments such as Church Cottage (Grade II, List Entry 1100953), the Old Vicarage (HER 17352), and Grade II tombs in the churchyard.

North Mymms is also home to the Hawkshead Campus of the Royal Veterinary College (RVC), which is situated at Hawkshead Farm, on Hawkshead Lane. The farmhouse (Grade II, List Entry 1174039; HER 9951) is a listed farmhouse built in the 16<sup>th</sup> century or earlier, with a mid-17<sup>th</sup> century northwest wing, and brick casing and front range put up in late 18<sup>th</sup> or early 19<sup>th</sup> century. The campus is about 27 km north of central London and was officially opened by Queen Elizabeth II in 1959.

This is the period in which the development site was constructed. Abdale House/Northside (Grade II, List Entry 1174939) is thought to date from the 16<sup>th</sup> or 17<sup>th</sup> century, with substantial renovations and additions in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. The site is situated in a secluded rural location set back from Warrengate Road; it is discussed in detail below.



## 3.5 **Modern** (1900-present)

The economy of the parish has remained predominantly agricultural, though it was not just cereal-based as Home Farm (HER 9344), adjacent to North Mymms Park, was built in 1903 as planned dairy farm.

Few monuments dating to this period are listed in the HER search area, and most relate to World War II, including the anti-tank obstacles on Bradmore Lane (HER 6717); the site of an American hospital in North Mymms Park (HER 9407); and the site of an anti-aircraft gun (HER 9408) adjacent to A1(M)

The final entry in the HER search area is for undated cropmarks of ditches (HER MHT31590) located *c*. 100m north east of the development site at Abdale House. This consists of two widely spaced linear ditches running SE-NW across the southwestern part of the field to the west of Brick Kiln Wood. The faint remains of a linear running perpendicular to the northern ditch are apparent, perhaps suggesting the presence of a field system pre-dating the 1844 North Mymms Tithe Map. A faint rectilinear enclosure may also be present, a few metres to the north of the two linears.

## 3.5 Site specific

Abdale House/Northside is a Grade II listed building, originally one residence, which was divided into two residences in the 1950s. The listing description reads (NHLE Ref:1174939):

House. C16 and C17, altered and extended to form large L-plan block in mid C19. Timber frame core. Roughcast, some of the framing exposed. Plain tile roofs. 2 storeys and attics. C16/17 house comprises 2-window centre and gabled cross wings left and right with scalloped bargeboards. The left one has an attic floor and a taller rear section which may also be C17 timber frame. C19 casements and sash windows. Tudor drip moulds to all windows.

Preliminary research conducted for a Heritage Statement (Weal n.d.) suggests that the site of Abdale House may have originally been part of Water End Farm. The earliest history of the building is unknown, although the house is thought to be 16<sup>th</sup> or 17<sup>th</sup> century in origin, with substantial renovations and additions in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. By the 1830s, it was described in sales particulars as a six-bedroom house with all the appurtenances of a gentleman's country residence: stables, coach house, four servants' rooms and other necessary outbuildings (*ibid*).



After a century of occupation as a genteel residence, and multiple owners, in the late 1930s the house was requisitioned by the Ministry of Works for the war effort. Available correspondence from this period indicate that Abdale House was used by the Polish government-in-exile as both a wireless station for the Polish Air Force (apparently set up in the cellar), as a home for the families of government officials, and for training their couriers to Poland (HALS Ref S1/6a/00/29/1) Sklenarz 2011). It was also rumoured that the house was used as a summer residence by King Peter of Yugoslavia (*ibid*) or that he spent Christmas there during the war. In 1946, the property was transferred by the Ministry of Works to Welwyn Garden City Urban District Council and refitted as six flats to accommodate employees, and their families, of the De Havilland Aircraft Company (P6-8). Abdale House was then purchased in 1956 as a private residence by the Trenchards family (Conveyance 2 nd Schedule (1956)). In 2018 the property was purchased by the present owners.






Figure 4: HER data (scale 1:20,000)



# 4 Description

- 4.1 The survey sheets that detail the various rooms and provide the basis for the following description can be found in Appendix 1. Each sheet has the photographs taken during the initial site survey and those from later monitoring visits, and these are shown on the floor plans in Figures 7-10.
- 4.2 Abdale house is a predominantly 2-storey structure with a basement and attics in the crosswing to the east. The front elevation (Fig. 3; Photos 14-17), which for the purposes of this description is considered to face north, is a late Victorian alteration to a medieval timber framed structure, much of which was exposed during the course of the project. Later extensions are evident in the roofline and building material beneath the render to the south and east of the house (Figs. 4 & 5; Photos 1-13). The west elevation gives access to what later became a separate dwelling and was constructed in two phases (Figs. 5 & 6; Photos 18-21).
- 4.3 The house originated as a 2-bay medieval hall house with a crosswing to the west and east. It has undergone numerous alterations and extensions since it was first constructed, most notably in the 18<sup>th</sup> century when the east wing was extended southwards and in the later 19<sup>th</sup> century when main range was rebuilt, bringing the original frontage forward to align with the crosswings, a large room was added to the south of the entrance hall and the small adjoining rooms were rebuilt. The south end of the east wing was also heightened at this stage. Abutting the west of the original house is a range that appears to have been first constructed in the late 16<sup>th</sup>/early 17<sup>th</sup> century with later extensions dating from the 18<sup>th</sup> century. This had been converted to create a separate dwelling with its main entrance in the west elevation.
- 4.4 The earliest part of the house is the western crosswing, which possibly could date from as early as the 14<sup>th</sup> century. It has external curved braces, wattle and daub infill and a timber mullioned window in the west wall at first floor level that was blocked when the adjoining range was constructed. This wing encompasses a kitchen (Room G8; Photos 80-90) and a walk-in pantry (G7; Photos 78-79). At first floor level, the rooms that fall within the wing are the study (F11; Photos 178-191), back stair (F18) and washroom (F14; Photos 197-198). A brick-built fireplace with a 4-centred arch was installed in both the kitchen and the study above in the 16<sup>th</sup> century, both of which were blocked and replaced in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. The north wall was rebuilt in the late 19th century, when a new window was added on both floors. Breeze block infill between the posts in the north wall of the kitchen are clearly indicative of 20<sup>th</sup> century work. The original timber frame was made of robust timbers; the principal posts being up to 28cm wide. Redundant tenons could be seen at the top of the principal posts in the kitchen and the study. Timbers of lesser scantling are most apparent in the south wall of both rooms, where the narrower studs forming the 18<sup>th</sup> century partition walls are more irregularly placed and covered with lath and plaster. Wattle and daub was exposed on both the east and west walls of the study. The wattles to the east had been entwined around studs rather than staves, as is the norm. The study floor had presumably been replaced as the joists, which were 20cm wide on 45cm centres, support quite narrow floorboards that are only 9cm wide. The brick infill in the east wall of the kitchen and the west wall of the study are 19<sup>th</sup> century, and may well have been part of a wider building programme between 1886 and 1895. The roof (R2; Photos 238-9) has sawn and hand-hewn timbers (15 wide and 40cm apart), pegged at ridge, with evidence of later repairs at northern end. There is a single purlin on either side and wind braces at the southern end on both sides. The double chimney to the west has been repointed and is partially overlapped by the adjoining roof to the west.



- 4.5 The timber frame that was partially exposed in the north wall of the former east wing was seen to be set on a brick supporting dwarf wall that was approximately 40cm high. It had been faced with tiles, but where apparent the bricks were  $12 \times 6$ cm. The timbers are generally of lesser scantling than in the crosswing, with the principal posts being no more than 16cm wide, and this along with the use of internal bracing would suggest a date of c.1600. The roof has hand worked rafters, pegged at the ridge with some carpenter's assembly marks apparent. A dormer window was installed in the 19th century.
- 4.6 Close studding was revealed in the east wall with tension braces in the north, south and east walls at first floor level (Room F4; Photos 143-154). The studs in the latter are mostly later replacements and bonding timbers are prevalent throughout. Although the reworking of the south wall appears to be a single phase of 18<sup>th</sup> century date, the north and west walls have been extensively re-worked, with only a few original studs surviving to the west of the window in the north wall. The west wall was largely rebuilt in the 19<sup>th</sup> century when the fireplace was installed. The remains of a 4-centred arch survive behind a later fireplace in the room below, (G2; Photos 44-57), which also has a spinal beam with lamb's tongue chamfer stops, a feature commonly used between 1560 and 1650. The room was extended to the south in the 19th century to house a canted bay window and French doors. The roof over the east crosswing (Fig.15; R6 & R7; Photos 254-255, 257-260) is probably the original and has 8 cm wide pegged rafters on 35-45cm centres. Some carpenter's marks are still visible, as are some widely spaced saw marks, which could have been either the result of being cut in a saw pit or an early mill.
- 4.7 The central section of the original medieval house (Rooms G1; Photos 24-43, F1-3; Photos 121-142) was heavily rebuilt in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century. The original north wall was demolished and a brick wall constructed approximately 1m further northwards, the ceiling of G1 was entirely rebuilt and has two rows of scissor bracing between the newer joists. The first floor was reconfigured with new stud partition walls using machine cut timbers with primary bracing were installed to form Rooms F2 and F3 off the landing (F1). The roof was entirely replaced over this part of the house; the rafters are clearly machine cut 2 x 4" with a ridge board and a single purlin to the south (Photos 235-237) It has a square, 4 stack chimney at the eastern end of the roof, built of red brick and cement with evidence of later repairs. As part of the rebuilding, the hall was given a new staircase and fireplace, although a medieval arch was retained above the opening to the west wing.
- An early addition to the medieval house was the timber framed structure to the west housing Rooms G11 (Photos 98-106) and F15 (Photos 199-207). The scantling of the timbers as well as the framing and the lambs tongue chamfer stop on the ground floor beam suggest that this dates from the early 17<sup>th</sup> century. It has a butt purlin roof with oak rafters, each rafter couple being braced, and a wind brace in the northwest and southeast corners. There is no ridge beam or post; the rafters are all pegged, and many have carpenter's assembly marks. This building was extended in the 18<sup>th</sup> century to provide additional 2-storey accommodation to the south (Rooms G15; Photos 113-116, G16; Photos 117-120 & F16; Photos 208-212) and single storey store/service rooms to the north (Rooms G9; Photo 91) & G10; Photos 92-97). The roof over the F16 (R5; Photos 242-250) has hand sawn rafters, many of which have been supplemented by machine cut timbers as the originals have failed. The double chimney at the north end has been repointed in cement mortar, but an area of lime mortar still visible.
- 4.9 Further 18th century alterations to Abdale House include the construction of Rooms G3 (Photos 58-66)/F5-F6 (Photos 155-164) to the south of the east crosswing. The walls are entirely of brick although timber studs were applied to the ground floor walls to support the full height panelling. Of interest is the clear break in the brickwork in the west wall immediately to the north of the



fireplace in G3. This is also evident in the later room to the west, G4, where the brickwork to the north of the fireplace is earlier than that to the south. This would suggest that an earlier, albeit smaller room was replaced during subsequent building programmes. The northern section of ceiling in G3 is curved to accommodate the staircase rising from the room above (F5; Photos 156-159) to the attic rooms. The rooms on the upper floors have no particular features of interest. The roof over this section of the building has machine cut rafters and is likely to have been rebuilt in the 19<sup>th</sup> century when the attic rooms were created.

- 4.10 The extensive rebuilding works of the late 19<sup>th</sup> century included the construction of a large room (G4; Photos 67-73) to the south of the hall with a bedroom (F7; Photos 165-169) above, lit by a double height canted bay window to the south. Whereas the earlier ground floor room was incorporated into the new structure to form a large reception room, the associated first floor rooms (F8; Photos 170-172 & F9; Photos 173-175) were converted to form a passage/store (F8) and dressing room lit by a skylight (F9). At the same time, store G14a and bathroom G6 (Photos 76-77) were rebuilt and the adjoining passage and the adjacent passage (G5; Photos 74-75) was extended. It is at this time that the canted bay windows to G2 and G3 were added, and a French door under a rectangular drip mould installed in the east elevation of G3. The most significant alteration was undoubtedly the rebuilding of G1 (Photos 21-43), the central section of the medieval structure. The north wall was demolished and rebuilt in brick approximately 2m further north, and the interior gutted and rebuilt. The attic rooms also appear to have been created at this time, certainly above G3 where the rafters are machine cut, and, given the nature of the internal fittings and the dormer window, those to the north of it, too.
- 4.11 More recent work to the building was evident when the timber floor was removed in G4 to reveal brick over concrete which is 23cm deep that houses a series of service ducts at the northern end of the room. Probably of greater interest, however, is the hand cranked telephone in the stairs under the hall (Photo 33). This is a MK. XV A.P 13231 British Admiralty sound phone of the type used in World War II to communicate between different parts of the ship.




Figure 8: West elevation showing the timberwork exposed during the building works (scale 1:100)






Figure 9: Phase plan (scale 1:100)






Figure 10: Exterior photos plan (scale 1:125)






Figure 11: Basement photo plan (scale 1:100)






Figure 12: Ground floor photo plan (scale 1:100)





Figure 15: Roof photo plan (scale 1:100)





**Figure 16:** West wing timberwork (scale 1:75)








Figure 17: Rooms G8 and G11 timberwork (scale 1:75)






Figure 18: Roof over G11 (scale 1:50)






Figure 19: Room F4 timberwork (scale 1:75)




Figure 20: Room F15 timberwork (scale 1:75)



## 5 Archaeological Watching Brief






Figure 21: Archaeology plan (scale 1:125)

A series of site visits were undertaken to monitor and/or inspect groundworks to the south and the west of the building (Fig. 21).

### French Drain

A French drain was hand dug to the south of the early 20<sup>th</sup> century outbuildings (Plate 2). This was between 0.40m and 0.45m wide, and 0.30m deep, reaching the interface between the top and subsoil in places. No archaeological features were revealed but a single piece of animal bone, a shell, a few blue and white ware fragments and a small milk bottle of the size once given to schoolchildren were recovered but not retained.

Another French drain was excavated along the east and south elevations as far as the western end of Room G4 (Plates 3-5). The drain, which was hand dug around the scaffolding posts, was c.0.30m wide and 0.30m deep. The east elevation as well as the south wall of G3 had been underpinned with concrete foundations (Plate 4) but the late 19<sup>th</sup> century brick foundations for G4 had not been altered.

### Structural Test pits

Two test pits were excavated by hand to the rear of the building (TP1-2), adjacent to the exterior wall. TP1 was  $0.5 \times 0.4 \times 0.85$ m deep and TP2  $0.5 \times 0.5 \times 0.60$ m deep. The stratigraphy exposed within consisted of 1.45m of various layers of made ground (Plates 6-9):

- Made-ground (100): Compact, mid greyish brown, clayey silt, with occasional fragments of red brick (<0.05m), rounded pebbles (<0.05m), and frequent roots; this layer was c.</li>
   0.40m in depth.
- Made-ground (101): The sediment in this layer is macroscopically similar to made-ground (101), except that is slightly darker in colour, which is probably due to higher moisture content. The inclusions are also similar, but it lacks any obvious rooting. This layer was >0.45m in depth.
- Made-ground (102): Same as (100), but the pebble inclusions were more frequent. This layer was c. 0.20m in depth.
- Made-ground (103): Same as (101). This layer was >0.40m in depth. The foundation revealed within this TP was based on a layer of concrete.




Figure 22: Test pit sections (scale 1:20)

The natural geology was not revealed at the base of either test pit and the made-ground layers were evidently built-up against the brick walls of the building. The foundation revealed within TP2 was based on concrete, whereas that within TP1 was brick. These test pits were later extended by hand and another was dug entirely within the footprint of the building: Trenches 1-3 (TR1-3) were sized between  $1.8 \times 1.2$ -1.3m and  $1.2 \times 0.8$ m, with a total area of 5.35m $^2$  (Plates 10-17). Tr1 is described in detail as it exposed the stratigraphic sequence within the footprint of the building. Tr2-3 revealed the same stratigraphic sequence as TP1-2, except for Tr2 which also included the sequence described below. The stratigraphic sequence exposed within Tr1 comprised (Fig. 22):

- Wall Stub [104]: A fragment of an interior wall built from bricks measuring 26 x 7cm  $(10^{15}/_{64} \times 2^3/_4")$ .
- Concrete Foundation [105]: This feature measured (W)0.50m x (D)0.28m, and included fragments of red brick.



- Floor Foundation I (106): This layer consists of concrete with inclusions of brick fragments and flint (c. 0.04m), and is 0.15m thick. This layer was the foundation for an interior floor.
- Floor Foundation II (107): This layer comprised concrete and red brick fragments that was probably used to provide a stable foundation for layer (106); it measur4d (W)>0.44m x (D)0.23m, and continued into the eastern baulk.
- Cut [108]: Layer (107) appears to have been laid within a cut into layer (109).
- Made-ground (109): Compact, light brown, sandy silt, with frequent inclusions of rounded to angular flint (<0.03m-0.10m). This layer was 0.56m deep and was present in all Tr1 sections.
- Made-ground (110): Compact, reddish brown, sandy silt, with occasional rounded flint (<0.03m)
- Floor Foundation III (111): This layer had the same constituents as Floor Foundation I (106) and was the same thickness, and provided a foundation for an interior floor.
- Floor Foundation IV (112): This layer was present in the western half of TR1 and probably provided a stable foundation for layer (111).

No certain indication for any trench-cut for the placement of wall [104] was evident in either the north of south sections of Tr1. The natural geology was not revealed at the bases of Tr1-3.

#### **Ground Reduction**

The footprint of the new conservatory was reduced by c.0.50m (Plates 18-19), through a concrete slab, and a patchy mixture of made-ground and topsoil. The ground reduction, which was done by a mini-digger, cut into a mid brown, sandy clay subsoil by up to 0.15m in places.

### Service Trench

The excavation of a dog-legged 15m long x 0.60m wide service trench to the west of the building exposed a brick-built conduit and dumb well, a water storage tank for run off from the roofs (Plates 20-21). The dumb well was c.2m in diameter with a domed top and a 0.57m opening. The original 5cm diameter lead pipe was still in situ, and the bricks (9 ½" x 4" x 2 ½") were orange/red clay with no inclusions and bonded with a sandy lime mortar. The pipe conduit was made of the same brick. Both features were covered with thick stone paving slabs that were up to 3" thick, which probably formed a footpath. The trench was hand dug to a depth of c.0.30m.


TP1: (Excavation) East Section

Trench 1: (Excavation) West Section

### 6 Conclusions

Abdale House has previously been described as a  $16^{th}$  century timber framed building, but the external bracing to the timber framing in the western crosswing, the curved windbraces to the roof and the robust scantling of the timbers suggests that the building is somewhat older, and may in fact be as early as  $14^{th}$  century. The eastern crosswing and the oldest part of what later became Northside, are both from c.1600, at which time the fireplaces were installed in the western crosswing, and probably also in the hall. The former hall was completely rebuilt in the  $19^{th}$  century leaving little of the original intact. At the same time the house was extended southwards to provide a larger reception/dining room at ground floor level and a suite of new rooms above with further alterations, structural and decorative, taking place elsewhere in the house. This appears to have followed a major overhaul in the  $18^{th}$  century which comprised an extension to both crosswings as well as that to Northside and the construction of the additional rooms to the main range that were subject to re-working in the  $19^{th}$  century. The eastern crosswing also appears to have been heightened in the  $19^{th}$  century.

The Archaeological Watching Brief did not encounter any significant archaeological features, deposits or artefacts other than the post-medieval dumb well that would have stored the rainwater that ran off the various roofs of the house. A small number of items dating from the first half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century were encountered in the French drain excavated alongside the outbuildings, but elsewhere the ground reduction was largely sterile.

Topsoil and subsoil were encountered at the periphery of the building, and remnants were exposed along with made-ground in the area prepared for the new conservatory. However, the stratigraphic sequences exposed in all of the test pits comprised deep layers of made-ground that were deposited to level the area prior to construction of the building and its subsequent landscaping, and floor/wall foundations that were part of the structure. No certain indications of a 'trench-cut' for the emplacement of the wall foundations were observed in any of the sections of TR1-3, though the sub-circular to angular morphology of the foundation cross-sections suggests that this may have been the method employed. The lack of an evident cut may be related to the homogeneity of the sediment used to manufacture the made-ground in which the foundation was built, and the contemporaneity of its deposition. The areal extent of the made-ground and its depth demonstrates that it effectively replaced any natural soil profile, either levelling natural depressions in the geology or man-made features, or potentially disturbing/destroying archaeological remains within its footprint.

Given the paucity of archaeological remains in the general area and the predominance of agriculture and parkland it seems possible that prior to the erection of Abdale House/Northside the area was either situated outside of any settlement activity, or that it was located between widely dispersed features within the local landscape.

**Additional notes:** The 19<sup>th</sup> century ceiling joists with scissor bracing were exposed during the Watching Brief, as was the medieval and later timberwork in the west wall of G1 and the landing above. The medieval timbers were robust; the vertical post was 26cm wide and the studs 16cm wide. The northern curved external brace was fully exposed, and the late 19<sup>th</sup> century extension to the north was clear to see in the brickwork. The bricks here were light red, hand made with horizontal skintlings and measured 23 x 10 x 7cm. They were set in an irregular bond in lime mortar. The brick infill within the medieval framing was similar in colour, slightly smaller in sizer (21 x 10 x 6.5cm) and set in Flemish bond in lime mortar. These also had horizontal skintlings, which would suggest that the infill is no earlier than the late 18<sup>th</sup> century. The studwork above the medieval timber frame consists of regularly sized and spaced studs, those above the opening to the west were 5cm wide and 20cm apart, whereas those to the east of it were all 11c, wide and between 16 and 27cm apart. Wattle and daub had survived in the western panel with the wattles entwined around studs rather than staves. The rafters over this section of the building are late 19<sup>th</sup> century, machine cut 2x4inch on 35cm centres with a ridge board.



The braces in the timber frame are curved and the whole frame has brick infill between the studs. The brick work in the east wall is also partially exposed and comprises red bricks set in English bond using lime mortar with queen closers at the northern end. The exposed brickwork in the west wall suggests that it had been part of an earlier structure that extended only as far as the northern end of the fireplace before the room was created in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. The flat ceiling here also has scissor bracing and lath and plaster covering and is indicative of later 19<sup>th</sup> century rebuilding.



Additional notes: The timberwork in the west wall of F1/G1 had been fully exposed and was recorded by KK. 

The studs above the window in the north wall are likely to be original, with one later replacement to the east. This alongside the window are partially replaced. The wall here has lath and plaster as does the outside of the mullioned window. The entire south wall is lath and plaster.

Rafters are between 11 and 14cm wide, probably oak. The arched brace in the NW and NE corner is 20cm wide. The rafters are pegged and without a ridge post or beam. Each rafter couple is braced. It has butt purlins on both sides. It is abutted by a short roof to the west that joins the chimney stack. This has been partially rebuilt; the base is made of Tudor bricks that have been rendered in cement mortar.



Central brace shows evidence of reuse or that supports have been removed. Internal bracing runs along supporting the failed timbers. Double chimney at north end, red bricks (22x11x6cm) evidence of later repairs with cement repointing but with area of lime mortar still visible. Clay pipe protruding from the west stacks north side (appears to be a later addition). Double chimney stack on west side identical in construction to north stacks with more cement repointing visible and with modern clay pots. Roof 6- machine cut timbers (15 wide 40 cm apart), nailed to ridge board, evidence of later repairs to the north and south with braces at southern end and braces running along length of roof. Evidence on some reuse/previous joints visible. Floating chimney set into east side of roof, made of red brick (22x11x7cm) with lime mortar visible with later cement repairs, stack appears to have been repaired/replaced more recently, including whole brick replaced with cement. Clay pot. Large 4 stack chimney just attached to eastern side of roof appears that all four stacks have recently been replaced, red brick (23x10x7cm) and cement pointed. The base has evidence of a repair to the south of red bricks (22x10x7cm) and lime mortared while northern half is a mix of yellow (22x10x7cm) and red bricks with cement.

Roof 7- sawn timbers (15 cmwide 40cm apart) with large central purlin with timbers joined in, even fence of later repair to the north, wooden pegged at ridge. Later dormer added with machine cut timber roof, cutting through purlin and surrounding timbers.

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
