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### **ABSTRACT**

An Archaeological Desktop Study of Berkeley Castle, Gloucestershire (NGR ST 686 989) produced the following results.

The Study Area currently comprises of a 12<sup>th</sup> century castle and associated gardens that incorporates the Butterfly Farm, Watermeadow and for the purpose of this research, the immediate surrounding area including St Mary's Church and Captain Jenner's paddock.

Located on the east side of the town of Berkeley, Gloucestershire, the study area of Berkeley Castle is bounded to the North by Canonbury Street, the West by High Street and to the South by the Watermeadow and associated fields.

With a variety of remaining archaeological features that range from the 11<sup>th</sup> / 12<sup>th</sup> century (castle & church), to 18<sup>th</sup> / 19<sup>th</sup> century (walled garden & grounds), documentary sources infer that prior to the Norman Conquest and the Domesday survey of AD 1086, Berkeley, and in particular the area adjacent to the castle complex (St Mary's Church) was the location of a Saxon nunnery (abbey).

Seen to develop as a town following AD 1066 and in particular the construction of the castle, a 0.5km radius trawl of the Gloucester Sites and Monuments Record was undertaken in May 2005, producing surprisingly no results pertaining to prehistoric finds within the study area, with the first artefactual evidence for activity dating to the Roman period and a tile, altar and coffin.

Whilst there is no documentary or archaeological evidence for a Romano-British settlement at Berkeley, this absence of evidence does not indicate evidence of absence, with the artefacts suggesting the possibility of a settlement, if not at Berkeley itself, certainly within its immediate area.

When reviewing the evidence for a later Saxon settlement at Berkeley, documents suggest St Mary's Church and the land adjacent to the case study area as being the possible site of a nunnery or abbey. A statement artefacts, such as a Saxon ring, stone and cross fragments, archaeologically support adding credence to the nunnery notion.

Interestingly, despite being mentioned in Domesday, and indeed the castle's association, the Sites and Monuments Record trawl produced limited results of medieval finds from the study area and its immediate vicinity, with the majority of entries relating to Post-Medieval features / architecture, in particular the period 17<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> century.

Reviewing the documentary sources and limited archaeological finds available, it is suggested that the overall potential for the preservation of significant buried archaeological features within the study area does remain high. It is recommended, therefore that further archaeological field evaluation / excavation be undertaken within the study area, with detailed attention paid to the land surrounding St Mary's church, in particular the Butterfly Farm (former site of the Walled Garden) and the land known as Captain Jenner's Paddock, to the west of the church.

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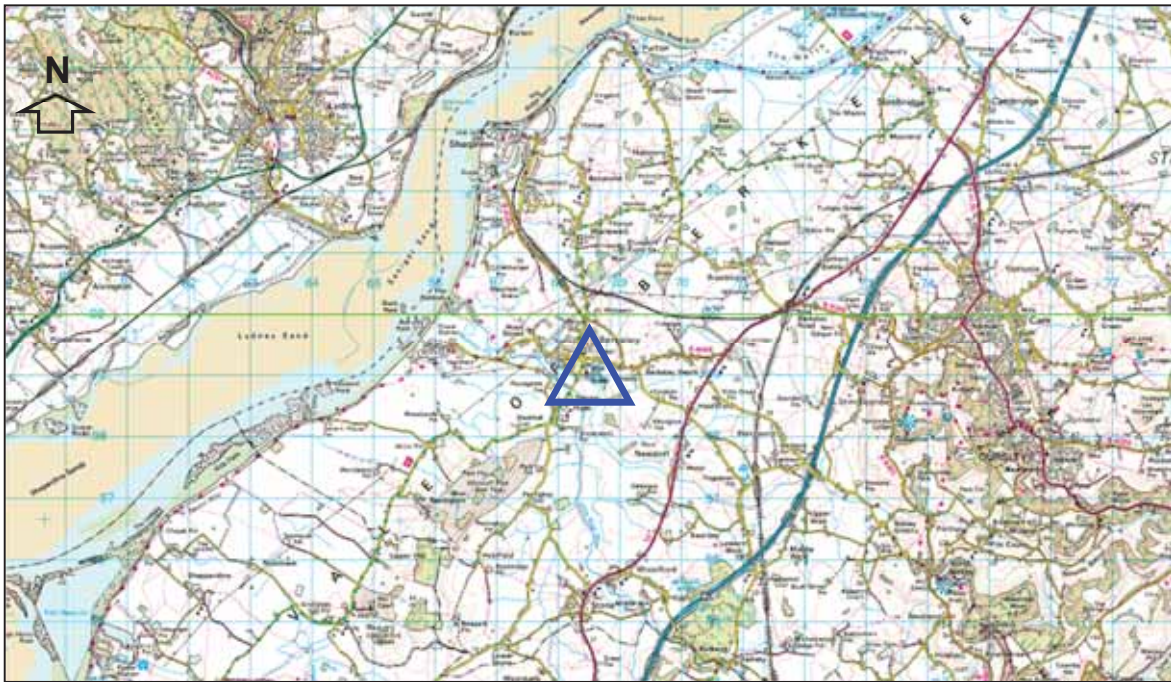


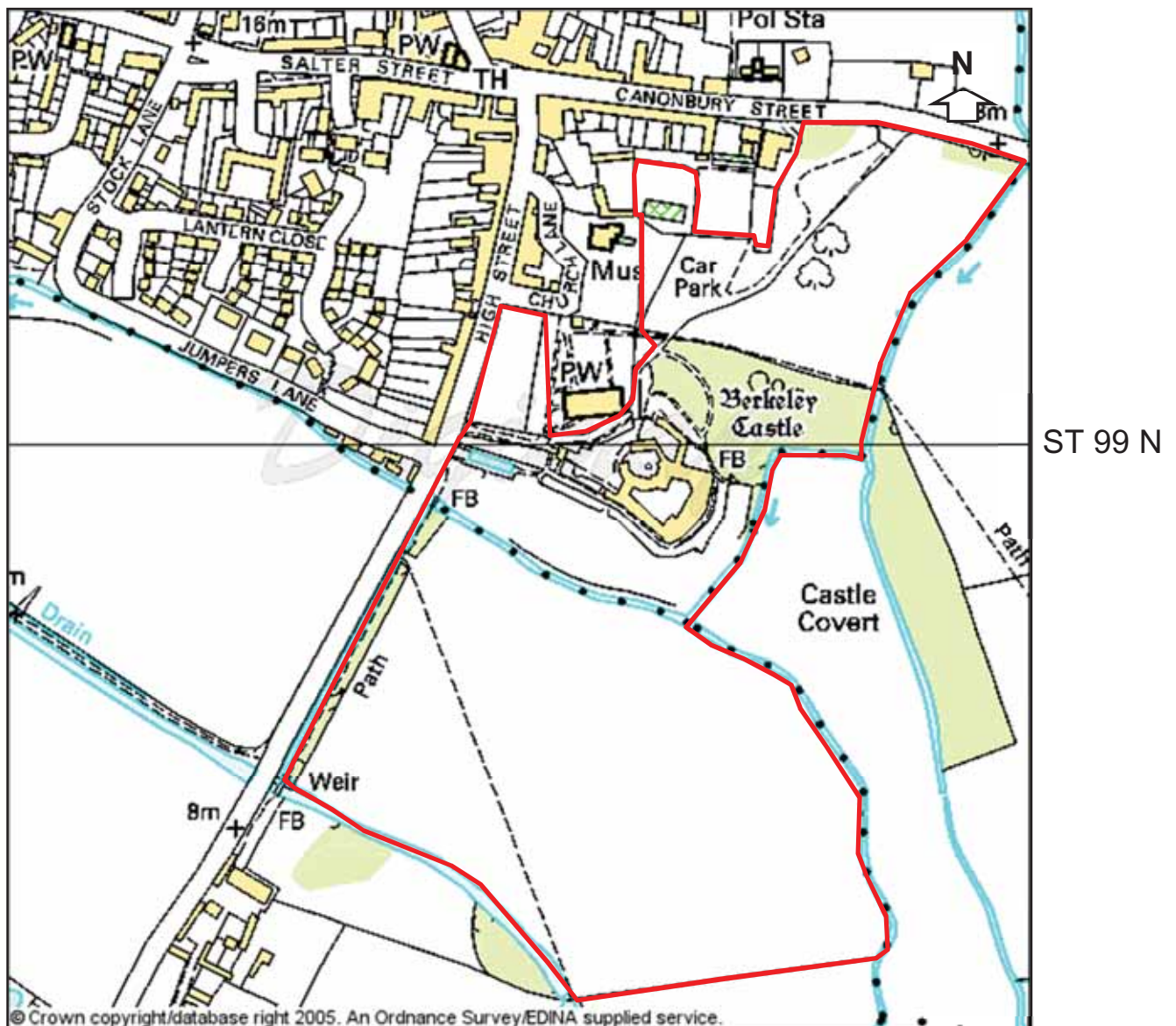

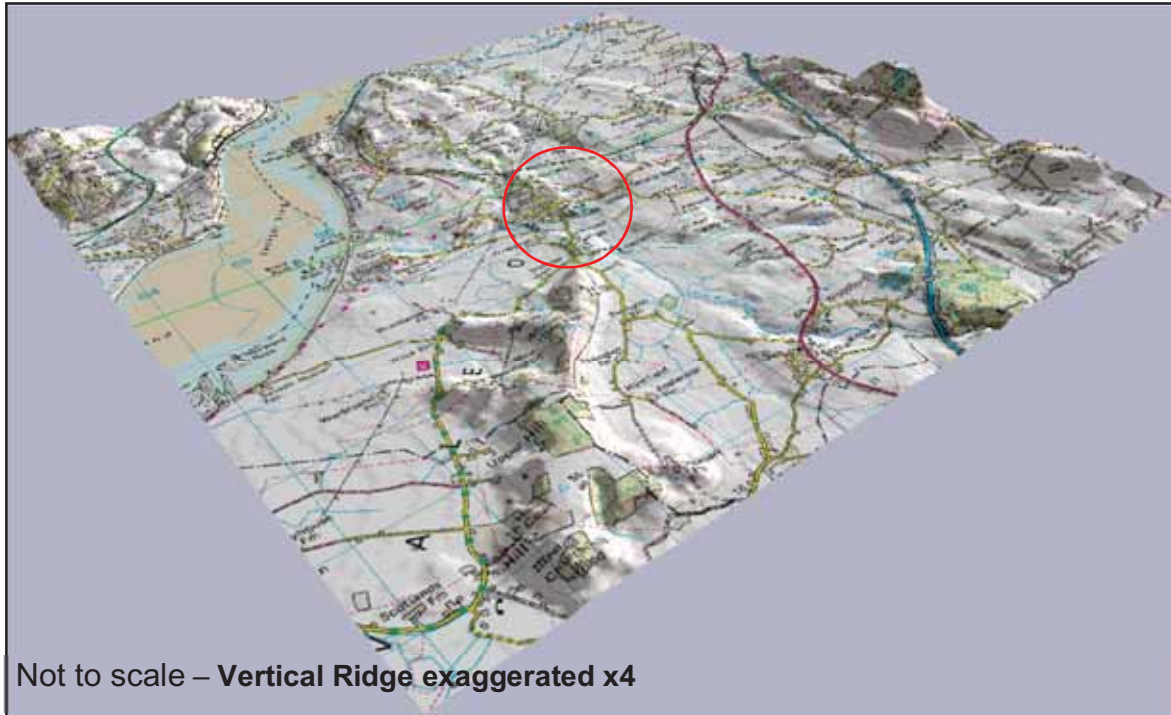

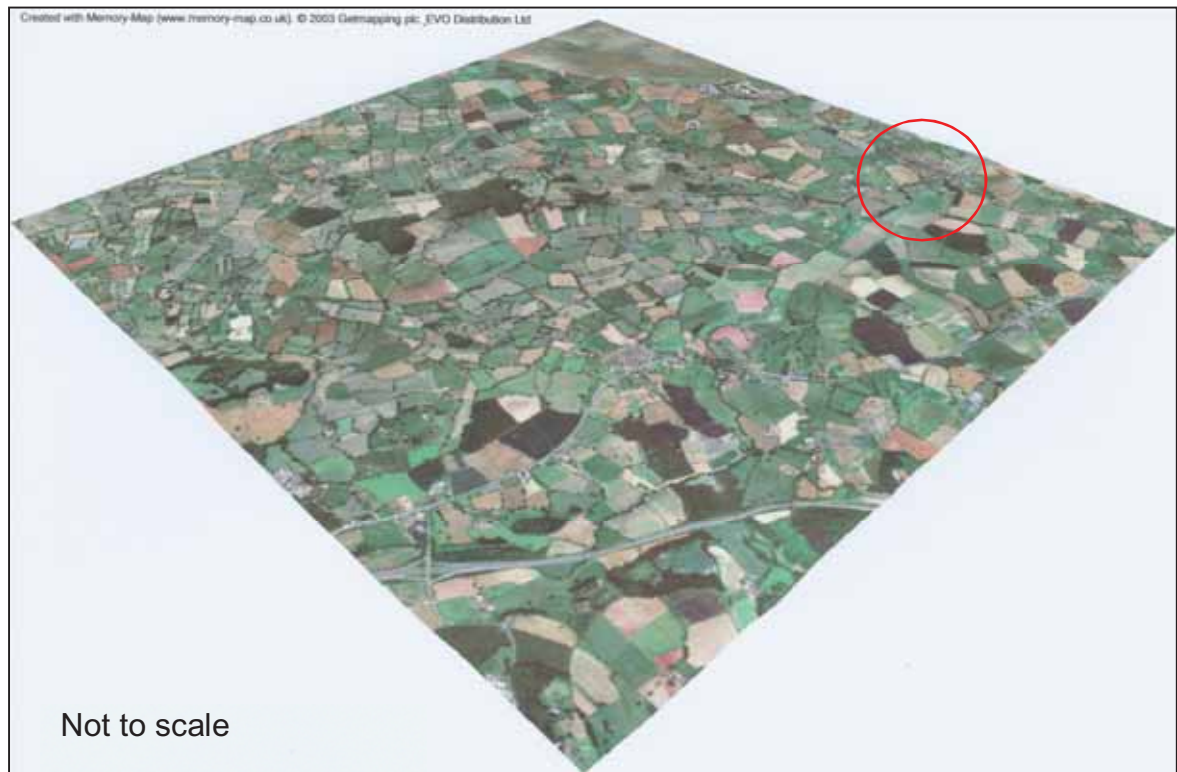
### Local Topography of the Study Area (case area outlined in red)

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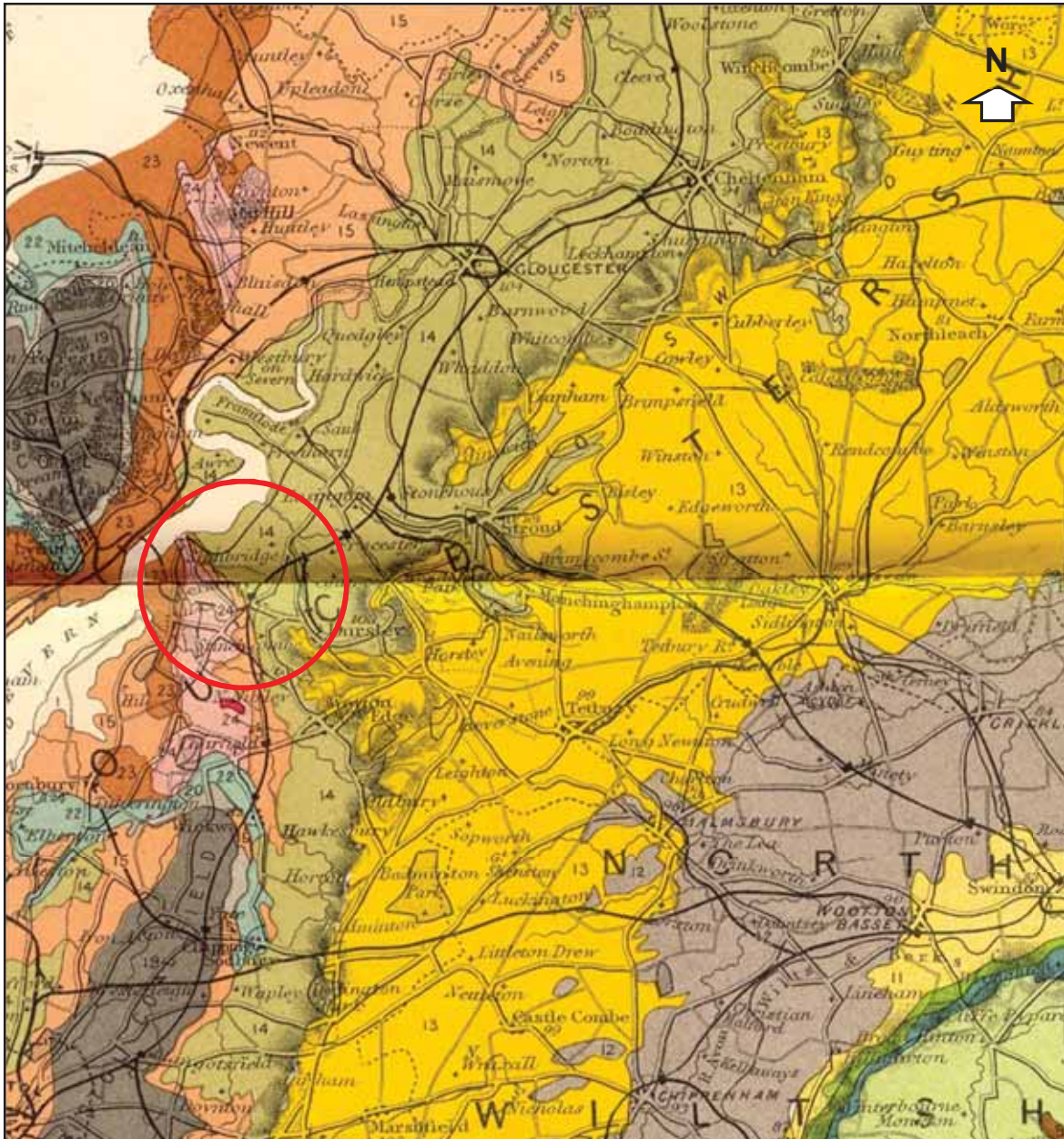

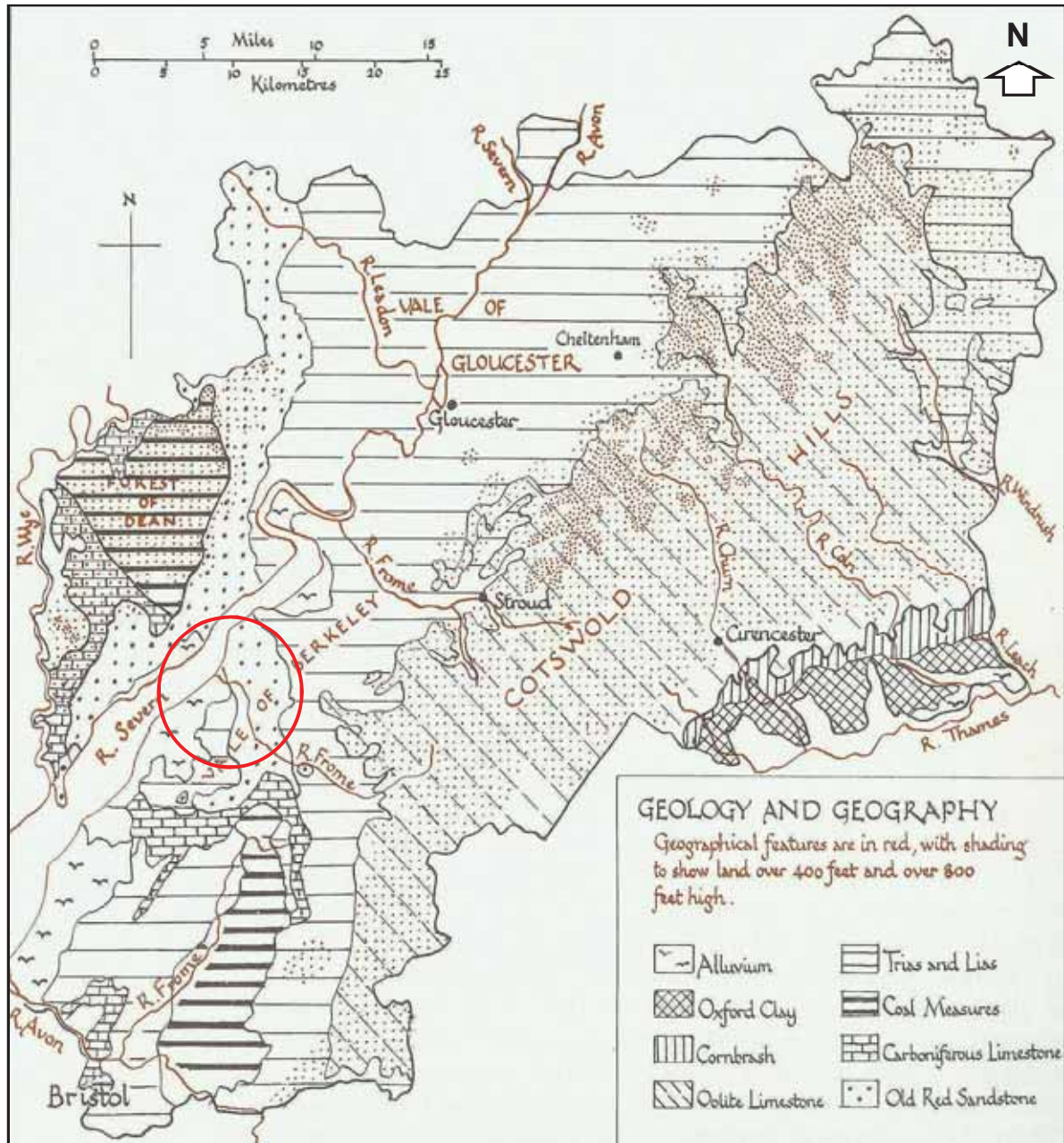

## 1. INTRODUCTION (see Figures 1 & 2)

1.1. Following an undergraduate / field school evaluation excavation of Berkeley Castle by University of Bristol students between May and July 2005, it is proposed to undertake further excavation / evaluation work at Berkeley Castle (NGR ST 686 989) during the summer 2006.

1.2. To assist this research, a limited desk based archaeological assessment of the Study Area has been commissioned by Dr Stuart Prior, Site Director, University of Bristol Department of Archaeology & Anthropology, prior to excavation.

## 2. METHODOLOGY

2.1. Searches were made of all indices of information held by Gloucester City Council Sites and Monuments Record (Appendix A). Indices and collections were also consulted in the Gloucester Central Library. All information was collated, summarized and presented in the report below. All photocopies, manuscript copies and notes, including still photographs, are preserved in the project archive to be stored at University of Bristol Department of Archaeology & Anthropology. It is no longer the policy of the Bristol Museums service to accept material that can later be reproduced by a similar exercise.

2.2. The author carried out a survey in May 2005. The Study Area was visited during May / June 2005, during which digital still photographs were taken.

## 3. TOPOGRAPHY, GEOLOGY AND CURRENT LAND USE (see Figures 3, 4, 5 & Cover)

3.1. The Study Area can be seen located on the side of a low lying spur, mid way between Bristol and Gloucester and dominating the main road route (A38) running between the two cities, as well as commanding a vantage point over the River Severn to the west. Located immediately southeast of the hamlet of Berkeley, Gloucestershire, on an east facing crest, the soil association is Fladbury 1 813b, stoneless clayey soils, intermediately calcareous and affected by surface water. Underlying is primarily solid Silurian (with Limestone's): Ludlow, Wenlock and Llandovery Bed geology, and is surrounded to the west by undulating solid Devonian (with Limestone's); and Old Red Sandstone, with alluvial deposits and solid Lias geology to the east. The Study Area lies on relatively level land, c.21m aOD<sup>1</sup>.

3.2. The Study Area is primarily a residential property with an associated working estate. Seasonally open to view by the public, the area consists of the castle and grounds, the estate including watermeadow and deer park to the southwest, Butterfly Farm to the north and associated surfaced car parking. Tenements lying both south of Canonbury Street (north of the castle) and east of High Street, Berkeley (church, graveyard etc - west of the castle) have been included for the purpose of this study.

## 4. HISTORICAL AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

### 4.1. A Historical overview of Berkeley, Gloucestershire (see Figures 6, 7 & 8)

4.1.1. Historically, the ancient town of Berkeley can be traced back to the

4.1.1. Translated as possibly '*The birch clearing*', Tandy further writes of an alternative interpretation of the towns name, that of *Beorcleah* or *Beorclingas*, leah, a word used to describe a woodland clearing and ingas meaning to belong to someone, though the latter can also refer to religious communities or monastic sites.



4.1.2. An area of higher ground that provides good visibility of the surrounding countryside to its occupants, providing protecting from enemies as well as the flood waters of the River Severn, the Domesday Survey of AD 1086 mentions the hamlet of Berkeley by name (**Figure's 6 & 7**). The full translation (Morris: 1982), is as follows:-

*(in BERKELEY Hundred) - LAND OF THE KING*

*King Edward had 5 hides in BERKELEY. In lordship 5 ploughs;  
20 villagers and 5 smallholders with 11 ploughs; 9 slaves.  
2 mills at 12s.  
10 riding men who have 7 hides and 7 ploughs.  
A market in which 17 men live and pay dues to the revenue.*

*These outliers belong to BERKELEY:*

*In HILL 4 hides; in ALKINGTON 4 hides; in HINTON 4 hides;  
In CAM 6 hides and another 11 hides; in GOSSINGTON 4 hides;  
In DURSLEY 3 hides; in COALEY 4 hides; in ULEY 2 hides; in  
NYMPFIELD 3 hides; in WOTTON (under Edge) 15 hides and  
½ virgate; in SYMONDSHALL ½ hide; in KINGSCOTE 4½ hides;  
In BEVERSTONE 10 hides; in OZLEWORTH ½ hide; in  
ALMONDSBURY 2 hides; in HORFIELD 8 hides; in KINGSWESTON  
7 hides and 1 virgate; in ELBERTON 5 hides; in CROMHALL  
(‘Abbots’) 2 hides; in ARLINGHAM 9 hides; in ASHLEWORTH  
3 hides.*

*All these said members belong to BERKELEY. In total there  
Were in them before 1066 49½ ploughs in lordship;  
242 villagers and 142 smallholders with 126 ploughs.  
127 slaves. 19 free men, riding men, who have 48 ploughs  
With their men. 22 freedmen and 15 female slaves.  
8 mills at 57s 6d.*

*In this manor two brothers held 5 hides before 1066 in  
CROMHALL (‘Lygon’); they have 2 ploughs in lordship;  
6 villagers and 5 smallholders who have 6 ploughs.  
These two brothers could turn with their land where they would.  
The value was then £4; now £3.  
Earl William assigned these men to the reeve of Berkeley, so that he might  
have their service, as Roger states.  
From this manor with all that belongs to it Roger pays to the revenue £170  
assayed and weighed.*

*Roger himself has of this manor’s land 2 hides in SLIMBRIDGE, 1 hide at  
CLINGRE, 1 hide at HURST, 7 hides at NEWINGTON (Bagpath). In lordship  
10 ploughs; 13 villagers and 21 smallholders with 22 ploughs. 16 slaves; a mill  
at 5s. The value of the whole before 1066 £9; now £11 10s.  
Roger also holds the land of Bernard the priest. 5 hides. He has 3 ploughs and  
2 villagers and 6 smallholders with 5 ploughs. The value is and was 60s.*

*In SHARPNESS 5 hides which belong to Berkeley, which Earl William placed  
outside to build a small castle. Roger claims them.*

4.1.3. As seen, Domesday makes direct mention of Berkeley and its castle, with land being set aside for the construction of a small castle within (Sharp) Ness<sup>1</sup>. This reference positively identifies Berkeley as being established by AD 1086, suggesting its foundation must lie sometime before this period.

4.1.4. Historically, there is no documentary evidence regarding the town of Berkeley's foundation, with limited Saxon references evident (see 4.1.1). Leech<sup>2</sup> writes of the town's existence by the time of Edward the Confessor (AD 1017), evidence in support being a small collection of coins minted during this period.

4.1.5. Additionally, it has been suggested that in AD 833, lands in or around Berkeley, as part of the dominion of Ethelred and Eathelflaed, was owned by some of King Alfred's family<sup>3</sup>. Several references to abbots or abbesses from an abbey located at Berkeley have been sourced, with the first recorded abbot being *Tilhere*, mentioned in a deed of AD 757. The largest estate holder in the county prior to the Norman Conquest, by AD 1086 the abbey and its estate had been dissolved (Leech).

4.1.6. Developing further following the construction of the castle, the town continued to expand, with the 13<sup>th</sup> century onwards seeing it establish itself as an important market and trading centre. Home of the Fitzharding or Berkeley family, its prosperity was often overshadowed however by the wool and cloth producing towns of the Cotswolds during the same period.

4.1.7. The town layout has changed little since medieval times, with the four main streets, that of Canonbury Street, High Street, Salter Street and Marybrook Street, first referenced in AD 1492, 1575, 1575 and 1516 respectively (Leech). Based around the probable main trading street during this period, that of High Street, the Tithe map of AD 1840 illustrates a regular series of medieval burgage plots either side of High Street suggesting a level of planning (Nash:2003) as well as the castle lawns and gardens (**Figure 8**). A notion supported by an undated deed in the Public Record Office (Ancient Deeds V) where reference is made to a tenement in "*the new town of Berkeley*", suggesting to Leech that Berkeley was one of a number of 'new towns' laid out between the 11<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> centuries.

4.1.8. During the 17<sup>th</sup> / 18<sup>th</sup> centuries, the focus of trade can be seen to shift to Salter Street and Canonbury Street, the evidence in support being the width of the streets (Salter Street probably used as a market place) and building dates (Nash: 2003).

## **4.2. A History of the Study Area (see Figure's 9 - 19)**

4.2.1. Many of the maps used in this study originated from Digimap - © Crown copyright / database right 2004 – Ordnance Survey / Edina Supplied Service to the University of Bristol. Additional cartographic evidence was supplied by Gloucester Central Library and referenced articles.

4.2.2. The Study Area lies within the ancient town of Berkeley and borders the medieval trade centre of High Street, the post-medieval trade focal point of Canonbury Street and the Saxon / medieval ecclesiastical area of St. Mary's Church.

4.2.3. Central to the study area is Berkeley castle (GSMR 5112), founded in c.AD 1067 by William FitzOsbern, Earl of Hereford and close friend of King William, as part of a royal manor with a large number of berewicks (Armitage:1912). Situated on an escarpment, mid way between Bristol and Gloucester, Berkeley castle dominates both the main road route that runs to the east between Bristol and Gloucester, as well as commanding a great vantage point over the River Severn to the west, controlling in turn the main waterway into Gloucester (Rowe: 2004).

4.2.4. Consisting of an ovoid shell keep, an inner bailey 55m across and an outer bailey of similar size, the castle covers in total a small area of c.7.1 acres (comparable with Arundel and Windsor Castles) (**Figure 9**), though when first built it possibly would have been a simple motte and bailey structure, smaller in size and made of wood. In support, Salter (2002) suggests the original castle was possibly damaged or destroyed during the Mowbray's rebellion in AD 1086, rebuilt by AD 1121, then confiscated by Henry II, due to Roger III's support to King Stephen. AD 1154 saw the castle granted to Robert FitzHardinge, a Bristol merchant and direct ancestor of the present occupants.

4.2.5. Now built in stone, the castles appearance was on the change. Fortification work resulted in the ovoid shell keep as seen today, being erected, revetting unusually the motte rather than crowning its summit thus producing a embattled, buttressed wall 14m high on the outside and only 9m inside. Flanked by four semicircular turrets 6m in diameter, further construction work undertaken during Robert's son Maurice's occupation, resulted in the forebuilding to the keep, inner bailey curtain wall erected and the Newport Brook diverted to fill the moat. Sluices and various locks built at this point enabled the flat low lying fields to be floodable, both for defence as well as to beautify the land around the castle with gardens and ponds.

4.2.6. During the 13<sup>th</sup> century, Maurice II, amongst other alterations, converted Whitcliff Wood into Whitcliff deer park, with the next main phase of development undertaken to the domestic range, including the great hall in the eastern bailey, inner / outer gatehouses and the outer ward wall during the fourteenth century (Allen Brown *et al*: 1980). Atkyns (1712: As quoted by Leech) writes of extension work at the castle taking in part of the adjacent churchyard, an inference bore out by the proximity and encroachment of the castle ditch to the churchyard on the north side.

4.2.7. With ownership constantly changing, further remodelling of the apartments can be seen to take place by George, Lord Berkeley during the 16<sup>th</sup> century. Work that was to survive the Parliamentary forces 3-day siege of the castle during the English Civil War, where a section of outer wall of the keep was destroyed and the curtain wall of the outer court breached. Taking no active part in the civil war, Lord Berkeley was allowed back to the castle only on condition it was rendered incapable of defence, hence the removal of part of the castles wall.

4.2.8. Modifications to the castle grounds were predominantly undertaken in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, with woodland to the northeast of castle and water meadows to the

east, south and southwest. Terraced at three levels that run around the walls of the castle, beyond the lowest terrace can be seen an yew archway that leads to the bowling green, below which can be found the rectangular pool, once a swimming pool and now a lily-pond. With a summerhouse at the west end, and the southern side of the pool balustraded, in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, the late Captain Berkeley, simplified the castles terraces into grass walks with narrow borders of low plants, shrubs and climbers (GSMR 13693).

4.2.9. Located c.100m southwest of the main castle complex / gardens, within the case study area, is the Watermeadow, a field incorporated into the castle gardens and one that is prone to River Severn floodwaters. Containing a slight linear depression that runs in a diagonal across it in a northwest to southeast direction, low earthworks can be seen parallel to it.

4.2.10. Lying on a flat level c.8m aOD<sup>1</sup>, the Watermeadow was surveyed using geophysical prospection methods (Rowe: 2005) during May / June 2005 whereon no significant archaeological features were discovered. Results suggest the site, due to its overlying flood deposit of alluvium (depth not known), was probably used for farming purposes, with an earthwork survey (see Davies: 2005) concluding the presence of a watercourse and associated fishponds. A statement supported by Tandy (2003) who writes of fishponds and gardens, during Maurice II's occupation, being created on the east, west and south of the castle.

4.2.11. Situated north of the main castle car park, located off Canonbury Street, can be found the Butterfly Farm set in a walled garden, c.300m due north from the main castle site in a west – east direction.

4.2.12. Listed on the AD 1840 Tithe map as the Berkeley Free school, the site later on in the 19<sup>th</sup> century became the estate gardens, with the formal walled garden and its regimental borders / south facing wall greenhouses situated behind the perimeter wall (Tandy: 2003). An unpublished report by Nash (2003) detailing excavations of the walled gardens in February 2003 discuss the existence of surviving subsurface 'formal' garden features, noting the locations of greenhouse foundations, pathways etc, and should be referred too if additional information is needed prior to excavations. **Figure 10** illustrates the trench locations.

4.2.13. Map regression from the AD 1840 Tithe Map (**Figure 8**) to the Ordnance Survey County series, scale 1:10560 & 1:2500, dated AD 1849 - 1996 – **Figures 11-19**) of the same area demonstrate the continued usage of the study area, with the burgage plots down High Street clearly illustrated, and the walled garden off Canonsbury Street, Berkeley seen to be developed and incorporated into the castles grounds.

4.2.14. In detail - Features of interest - Observed in all figures (Area (A) is an area of open ground immediately west of St.Mary's church. Mentioned on the AD 1840 Tithe map as being a garden <sup>2</sup>, the feature's usage on **Figure 11** denotes it as being

a graveyard, a notion that disappears in subsequent figures, with its usage thereafter remaining uncertain. Tandy (2003) writes of it as being known as Captain Jenner's paddock, though its exact origins are unknown to the author. Being the same alignment as the medieval burgrave plots situated along High Street, it is of interest archaeologically as its very nature suggests the possibility of it being either the site of medieval properties demolished for purposes as of yet not known, or as part of the ecclesiastical complex associated with St. Mary's church. With this in mind, we therefore cannot rule out the possibility of it being linked to the previous Saxon Abbey believed to have once stood in the paddocks vicinity.

4.2.15. Area (B) can be seen in all the figures; however a change in map detail possibly suggests a change in usage. Located at the site of the current Lily Pond within the castle's ground, information obtained from a guide book to Berkeley Castle and its gardens suggest a previous usage as a swimming pool. In the AD1840 Tithe Map, the feature appears to be of solid construction, suggesting a rectangular building of some description. This solid detail can be seen to continue until County Series 1: 2500 3<sup>rd</sup> Revision AD 1924 – 1949 (**Figure 17**), when it becomes thereon and after hollow in construction. It is therefore feasible that at this period in time, a roofed feature (swimming pool, greenhouse?) became the Lily pond.

4.2.16. Area (C), the area known as the Walled Garden south of Canonbury Street and north of the castle (see 4.2.11 -12 & Nash (2003), is recognisable in all the Figures, though its exact layout and format does appear to change from **Figure 13** onwards, suggesting a period of transition to the probable layout of the Butterfly Garden, as seen today. **Figure 19** clearly illustrates the conversion of part of the gardens to a car park AD 1969 onwards.

4.2.17. Area (D), marked on the County Series 1:10560 1<sup>st</sup> Edition AD 1849 – 1899 (**Figure 11**) as the Ice House, can be seen located immediately south of the Walled Garden, and north of the main castle complex. With cartographic evidence suggesting a continued use, by **Figure 16**, the County Series 1:2500 2<sup>nd</sup> Revision AD 1906 – 1939, its designation has changed, being referred too now as the Old Ice House. Still marked by the time of the National Grid 1<sup>st</sup> Imperial Edition AD 1948 – 1976 / 1977 (**Figure 18**) issue, **Figure 19** sees its complete removal suggesting its disappearance.

4.2.18. Marked clearly on **Figures 12 – 13**, Area (E), southwest of the main castle complex and High Street, highlights the full tidal extent of the River Severn waters, demonstrating how low lying the Watermeadow section of the study area is. This possibly suggests a low archaeological potential due to its prowess to flooding.

### **4.3 Archaeology of the Study Area (see Appendix A)**

4.3.1. A standard 500 m radius trawl of the Gloucester Sites and Monuments Record (GSMR) was undertaken in May 2005, with the results that relate directly to the study area briefly reviewed as follows. For the full description and references, please refer to the GSMR entries at Appendix A.

4.3.2. Lying immediately outside the study area, between the castle complex (southeast) (GSMR 5112 & 13693 – **Figure 20**) and an area of ground referred to as Captain Jenner's Paddock (west) (see 4.2.14 – **Figure 11**), can be found St Mary's Church. Dating back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century, various Romano-British and early medieval artefacts have been found in its association (GSMR 5117 & 6404 –

**Figure 20**), ranging from Saxon architectural / stone cross fragments, to Romano-British tiles and a coffin.

4.3.3. With no prehistoric evidence found in / around the study area, the first inference of archaeological activity near Berkeley Castle can be found dating to the Roman period and an altar found within the castle grounds. Depicting Hercules, a female, priest and a pig sacrifice (GSMR 6403 – **Figure 20**), Tandy (2003) makes reference to the presence of Roman camps and villas in the neighbouring area, though to date, no substantial archaeological evidence for a Romano-British settlement in Berkeley has been found.

4.3.4. Leech, in the document *Historic Towns in Gloucestershire – Archaeology and Planning*, makes reference to the first probable evidence for a settlement at Berkeley, that of the Saxon Abbey, quoting Smyth who in the 17<sup>th</sup> century wrote 'a great whereof (the castle adjoining St Mary's church) was built out of the ruins of the Nunnery (abbey) which stood in the same place'.

4.3.5. This notion of a nunnery or abbey on or near the church site is supported by both the Saxon artefacts found in St Mary's church, as well as a gold ring and three stones found within the castle (GSMR 5112). Reflecting a status of importance, the antiquity of the site is demonstrated by the Domesday reference (see 4.1.3); with Leech writing of St Mary's having ten chaplains recorded in AD 1338, retaining collegiate status possibly into the 14<sup>th</sup> century.

4.3.6. Indeed Leech suggests the possibility of the church tower (GSMR 9344 – **Figure 20**), separate to the church nave so to be less of a threat to the castle, being part of an earlier church, with the ecclesiastical precinct possibly located within the vicinity of St Mary's Church and the castle / grounds.

4.3.7. Post conquest, archaeological finds for the medieval period are surprisingly limited. Totalling 11, the first, GSMR 5116 (**Figure 21**), refers to the Holy Trinity Hospital of Longbridge, founded in c.AD 1170-1189 and dissolved in AD 1547.

4.3.8. GSMR 16832 (11<sup>th</sup>/12<sup>th</sup> century marketplace), 17723 (medieval roof structure), 17689 (16<sup>th</sup> century? lime pit), 17690 (16<sup>th</sup> century? cow house), 17691 (16<sup>th</sup> century? mill) and 17692 (16<sup>th</sup> century? vicarage) (**Figure's 21, 22 & 23**) all directly relate to High Street and its immediate area. GSMR 22165 and 22166 refer to medieval dwelling / associated burgage plots, recorded during excavations of the castle's walled gardens off Canonbury Street (**Figure 21**), whilst GSMR 5113 (**Figure 23**) relate to the Whitley (Whitecliffe) deer park, south of the study area, enclosed during the reign of Henry II (AD 1154 – 1189).

4.3.9. In contrast to the sparse Romano-British / Saxon archaeology, and the limited medieval finds, the majority of the records retrieved relate to Post-Medieval Berkeley and the 17<sup>th</sup> - 19<sup>th</sup> century, with 40 entries directly relating to the castle complex and the immediate area.

4.3.10. Of these, 27 relate to High Street, Berkeley<sup>2</sup>, detailing the existing 17<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> century buildings / features situated along it, west of the study area, with a further

Ten 18<sup>th</sup> century buildings / features detailed along Canonbury Street<sup>1</sup>, north of the study area.

4.3.11. GSMR 16831 relates to Chantry Cottage, Church Lane, home of Edward Jenner and is located west of the study area, next to the Butterfly Farm. With the house built in AD 1707, sold to Jenner in AD 1785 before passing to a vicarage in AD 1876, GSMR 17712, an 18<sup>th</sup> century hut can be found located within the gardens (**Figure 21**).

## 5. SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

5.1. Located on the east side of the town of Berkeley, Gloucestershire, the study area of Berkeley Castle is bounded to the north by Canonbury Street, the west by High Street and to the south by the Watermeadow.

5.2. Consisting of a variety of standing archaeological features ranging from the 11<sup>th</sup> / 12<sup>th</sup> century castle and church, to the 18<sup>th</sup> / 19<sup>th</sup> century walled garden and grounds, documentary sources indicate that prior to the Domesday survey of AD 1086, Berkeley, and in particular the area adjacent to the castle complex was the location of a Saxon nunnery (abbey).

5.3. With the town seen to develop following the Norman conquest of AD 1066 and in particular the construction of the castle, a 500m radius trawl of the Gloucester Sites and Monuments Record was undertaken in May 2005, producing surprisingly no results for prehistoric finds within the study area, with the first artefactual evidence for activity being Roman and a tile, altar and coffin.

5.4. Whilst there is no documentary or archaeological evidence for a Romano-British settlement at Berkeley, absence of evidence does not necessary indicate evidence of absence, with the finds suggesting the possibility of there being one, if not at Berkeley, certainly within the immediate area.

5.5. This statement is also true when reviewing the evidence for a Saxon settlement at Berkeley, with documents inferring St Mary's and the land adjacent to the case study area possibly being the site of a nunnery or abbey. A statement the artefacts, such as a Saxon ring, stone and cross fragments, can be seen to archaeologically support, added credence to the nunnery notion.

5.6. Interestingly, despite its mention in Domesday and the castle's association, the GSMR trawl produced limited results for medieval finds from within the study area and its immediate vicinity, with the majority of entries relating to Post-Medieval features / architecture, typically the period 17<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> century.

5.7. By reviewing the documentary sources and limited archaeological finds available, it is suggested that the overall potential for the preservation of significant buried archaeological features within the Study Area remain high. With this in mind,

it is therefore recommended that further archaeological field evaluation / excavation be undertaken within the study area, with detailed attention being paid to the land surrounding St Mary's church, in particular the Butterfly Farm (former site of the Walled Garden) as well as the land known as Captain Jenner's Paddock, west of St Mary's church.

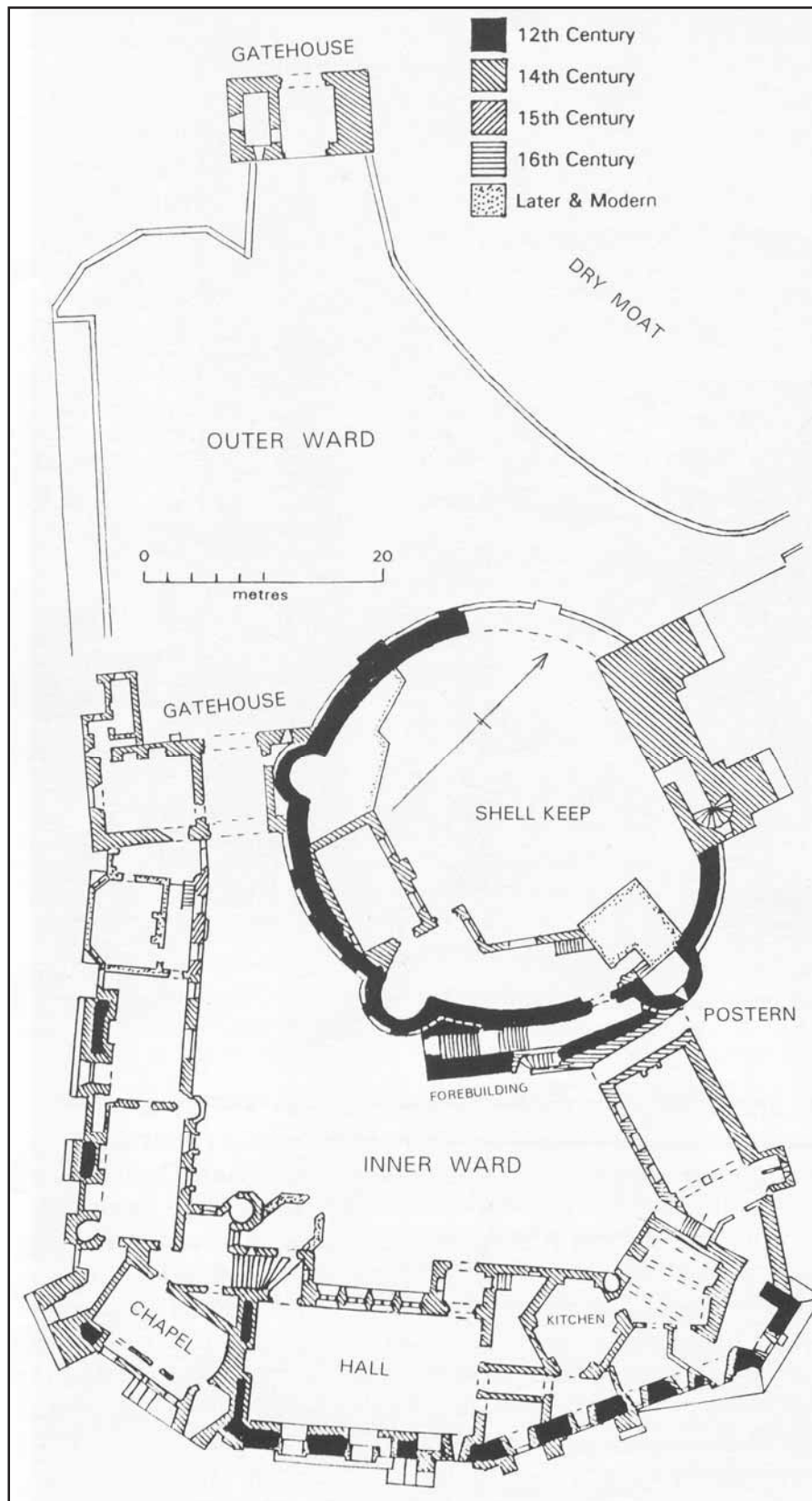

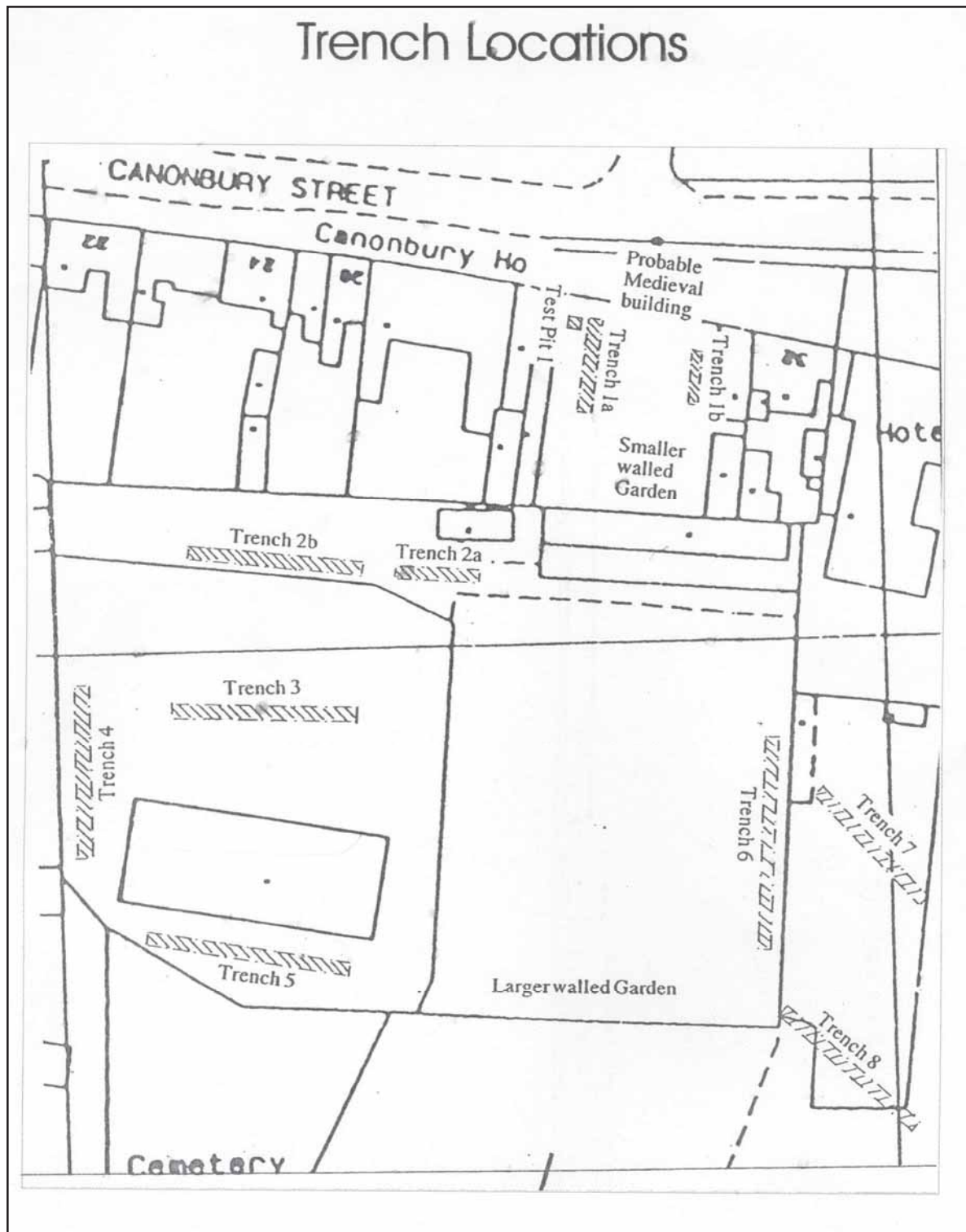
**Plan of Berkeley Castle** (© Salter 2002)

**Extract from the County Series 1:10560 1<sup>st</sup> Edition AD 1849 - 1899**

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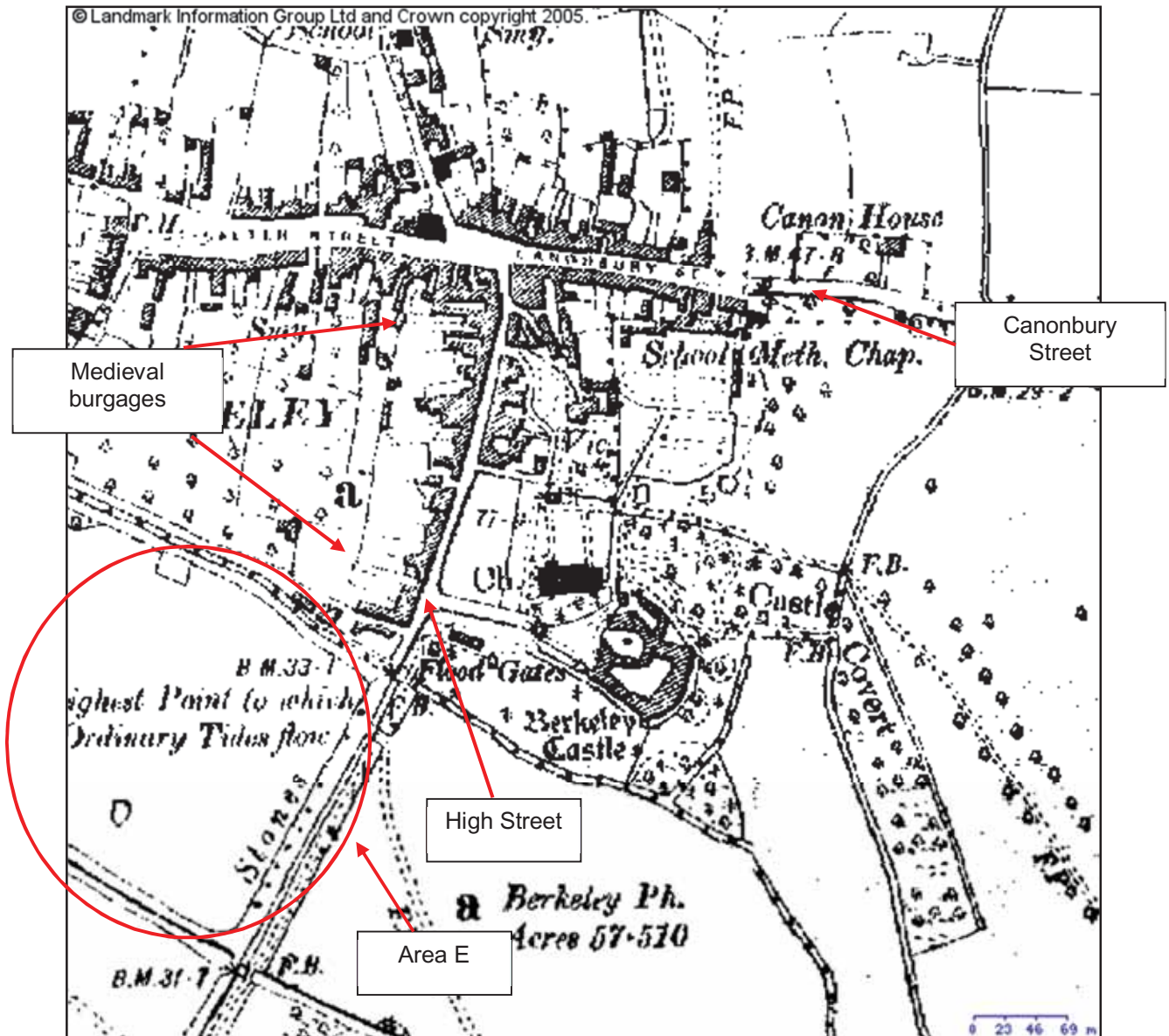

**Extract from the County Series 1:10560 1<sup>st</sup> Revision AD 1888 - 1914**

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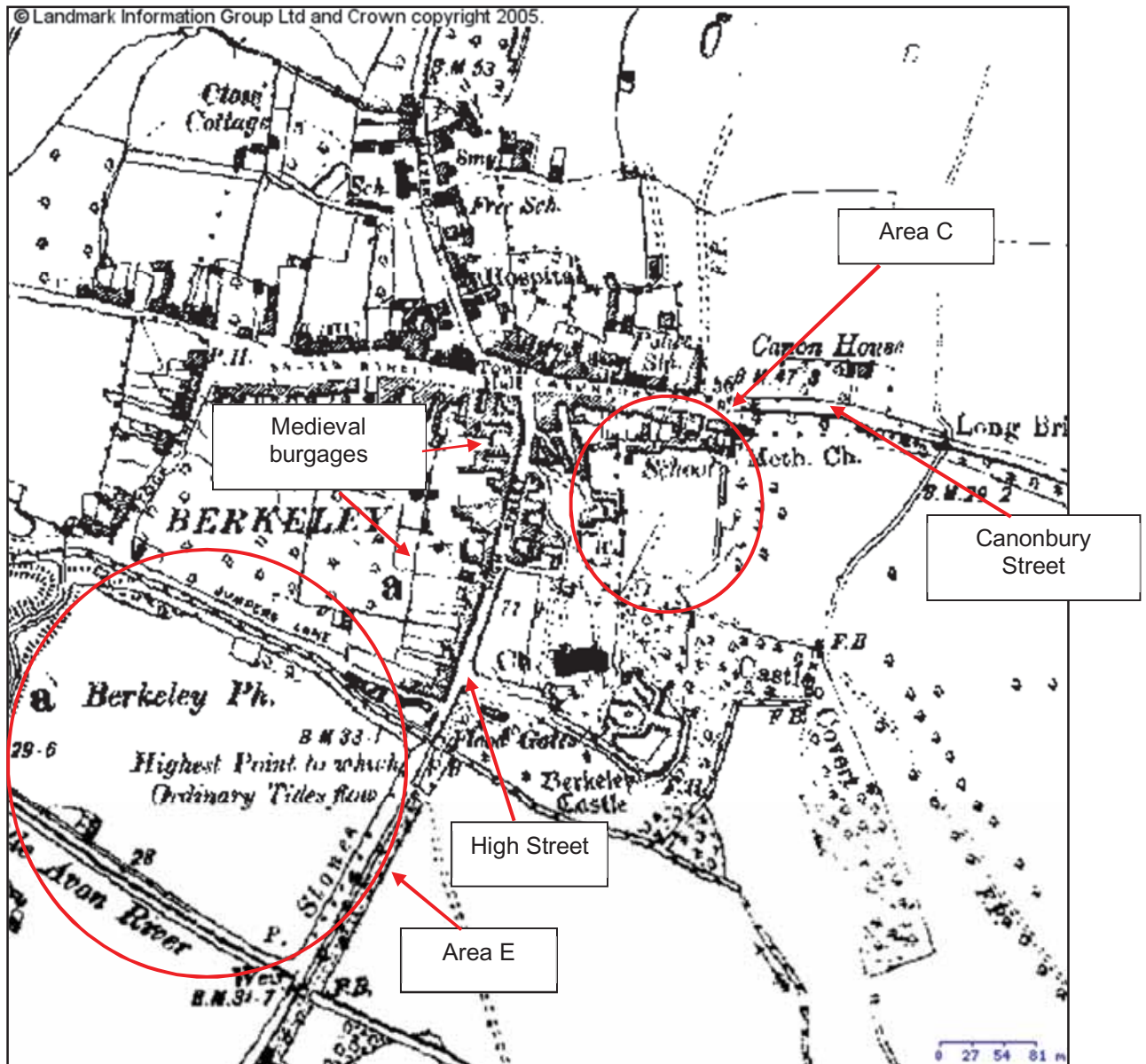

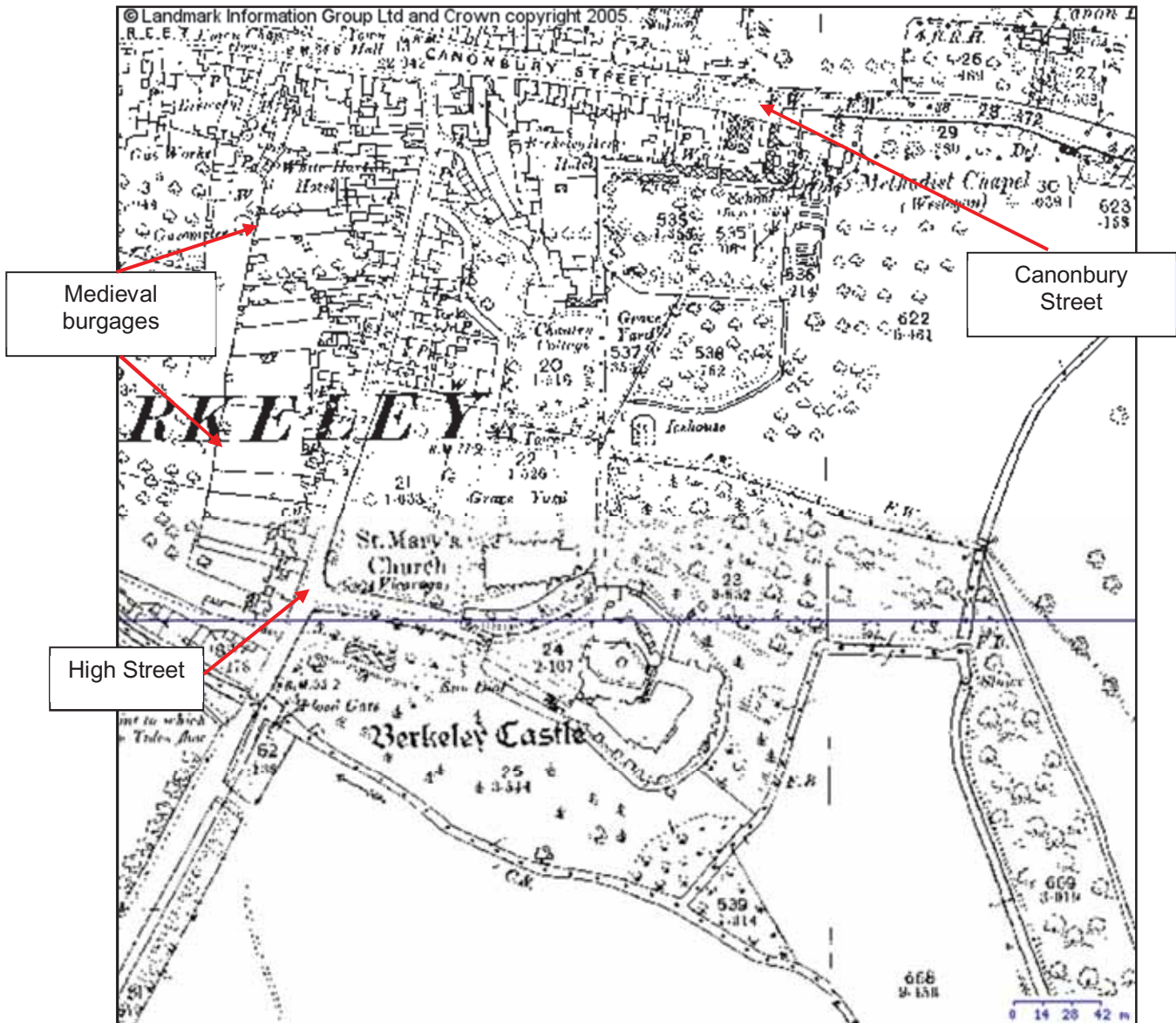

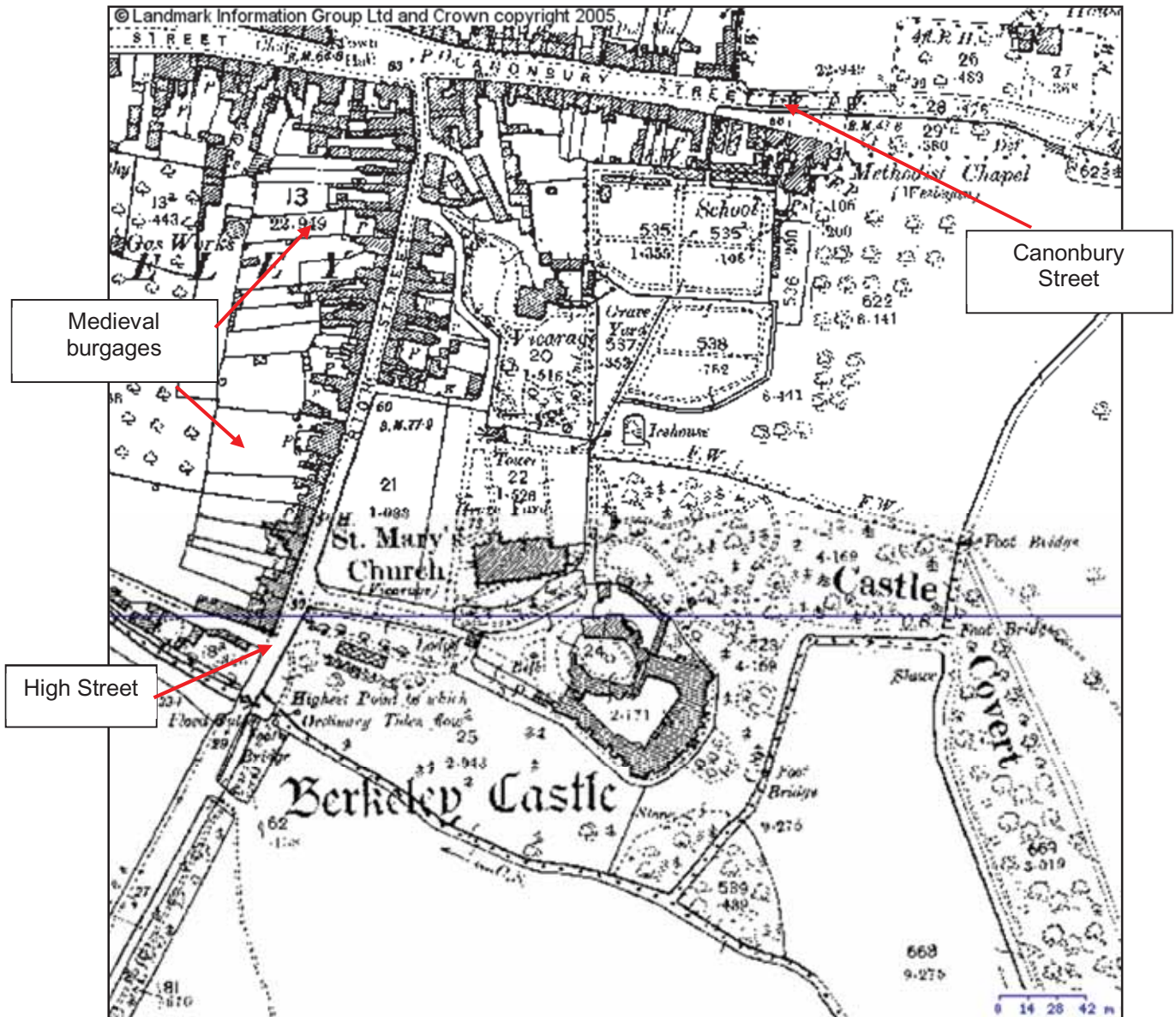




**Figure 15**

**Extract from the County Series 1:2500 1<sup>st</sup> Revision AD 1893 - 1915**

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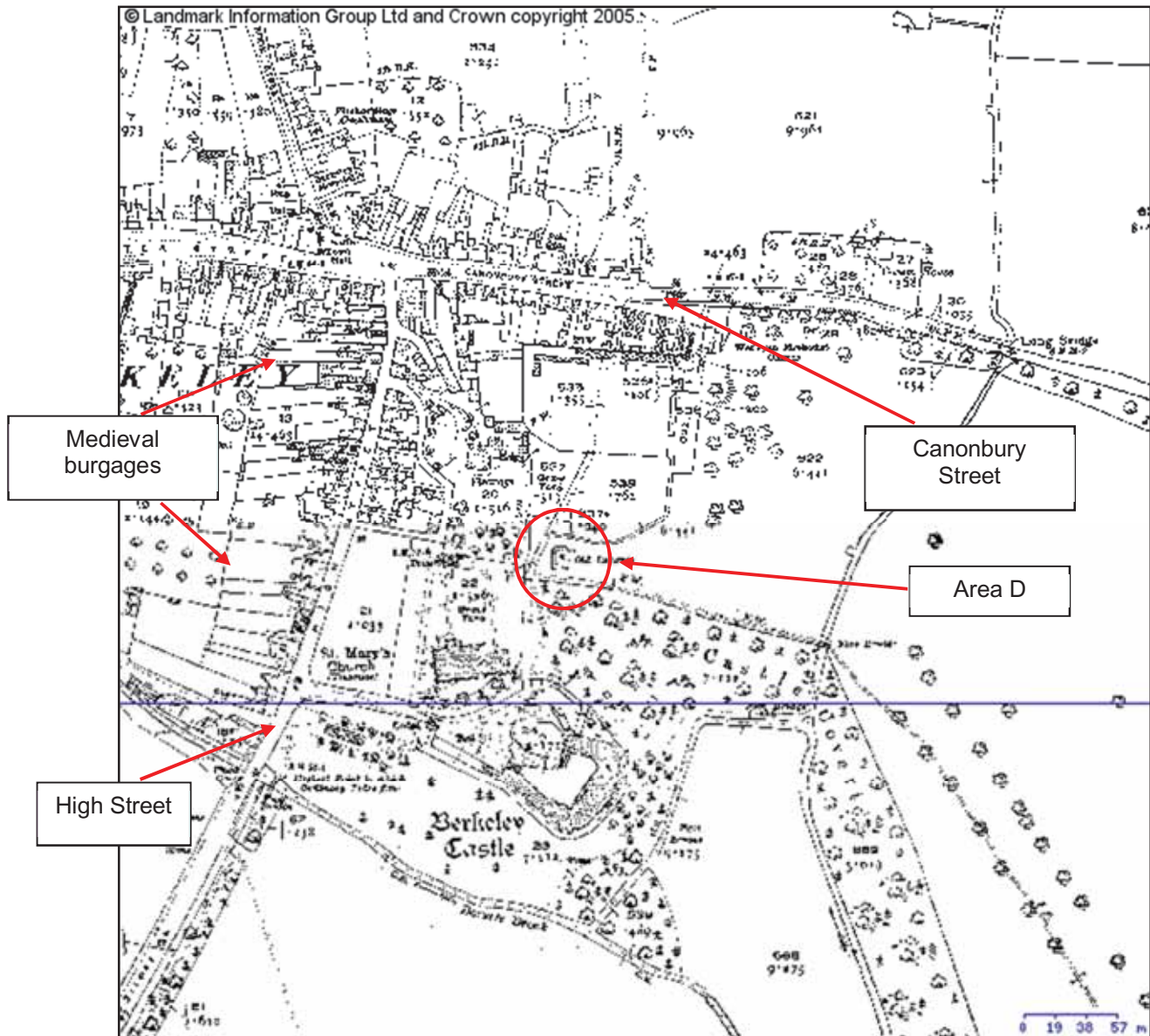

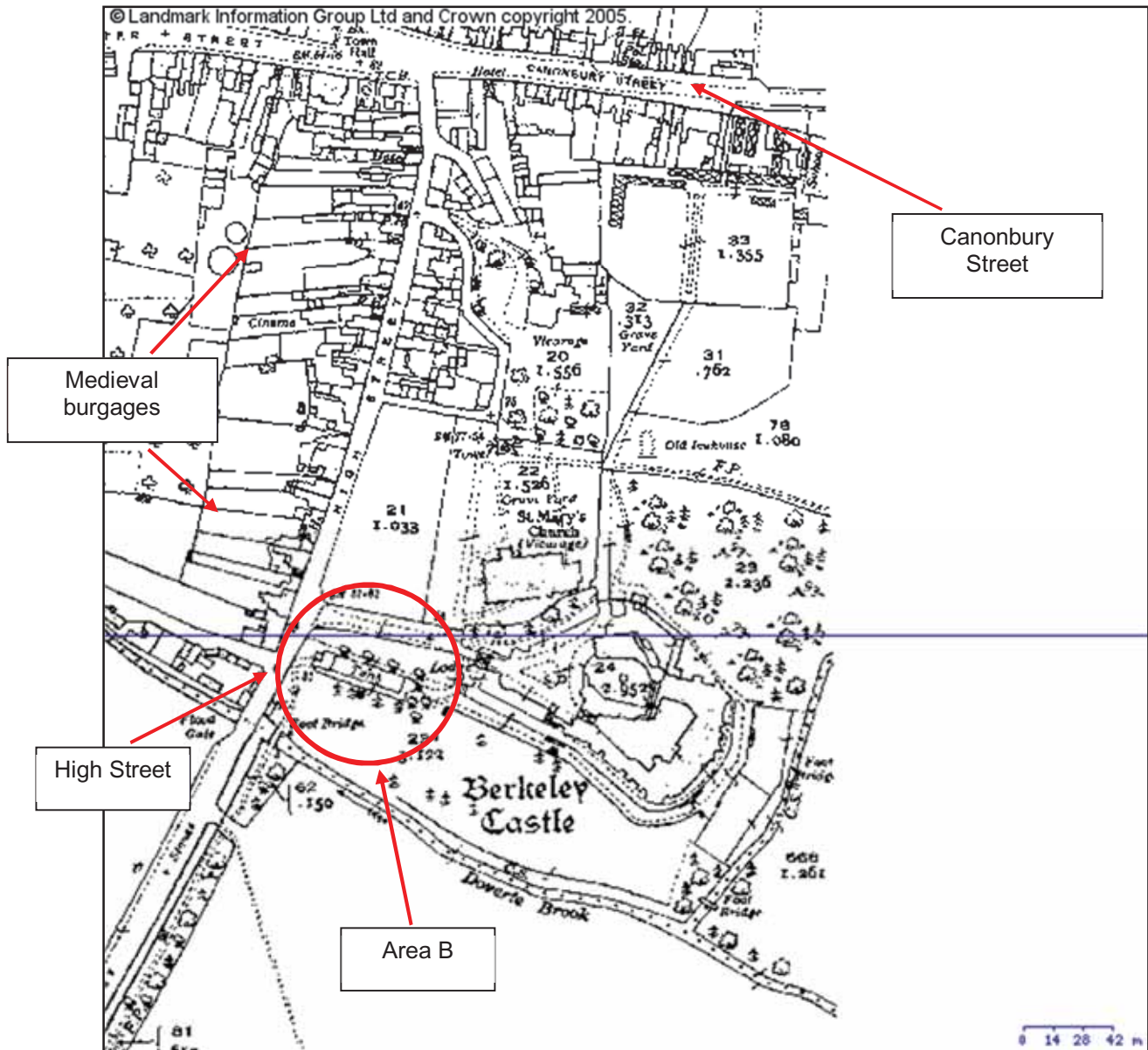

**Extract from the County Series 1:2500 3<sup>rd</sup> Revision AD 1924 - 1949**

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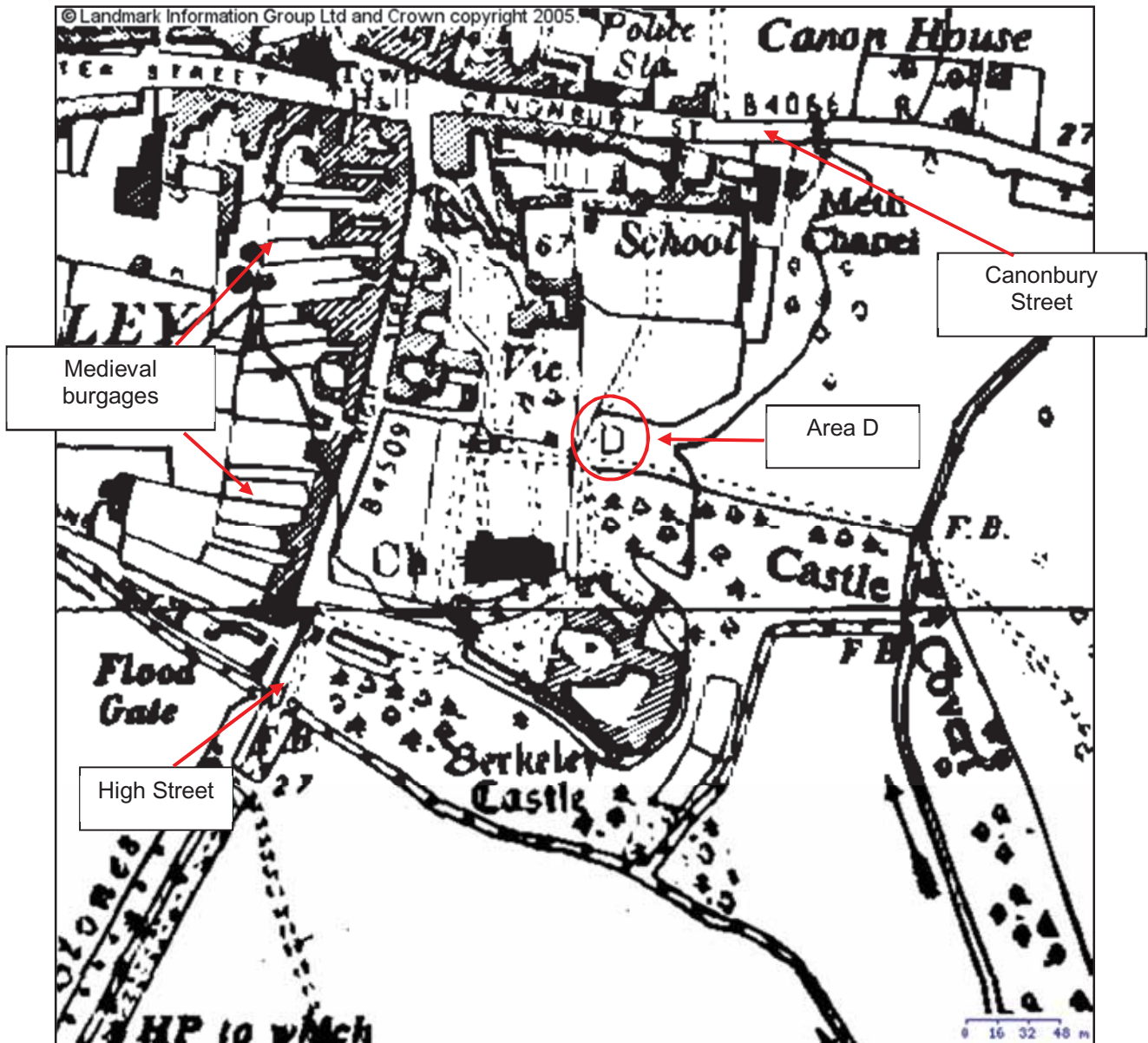

– 1976 / 1977**

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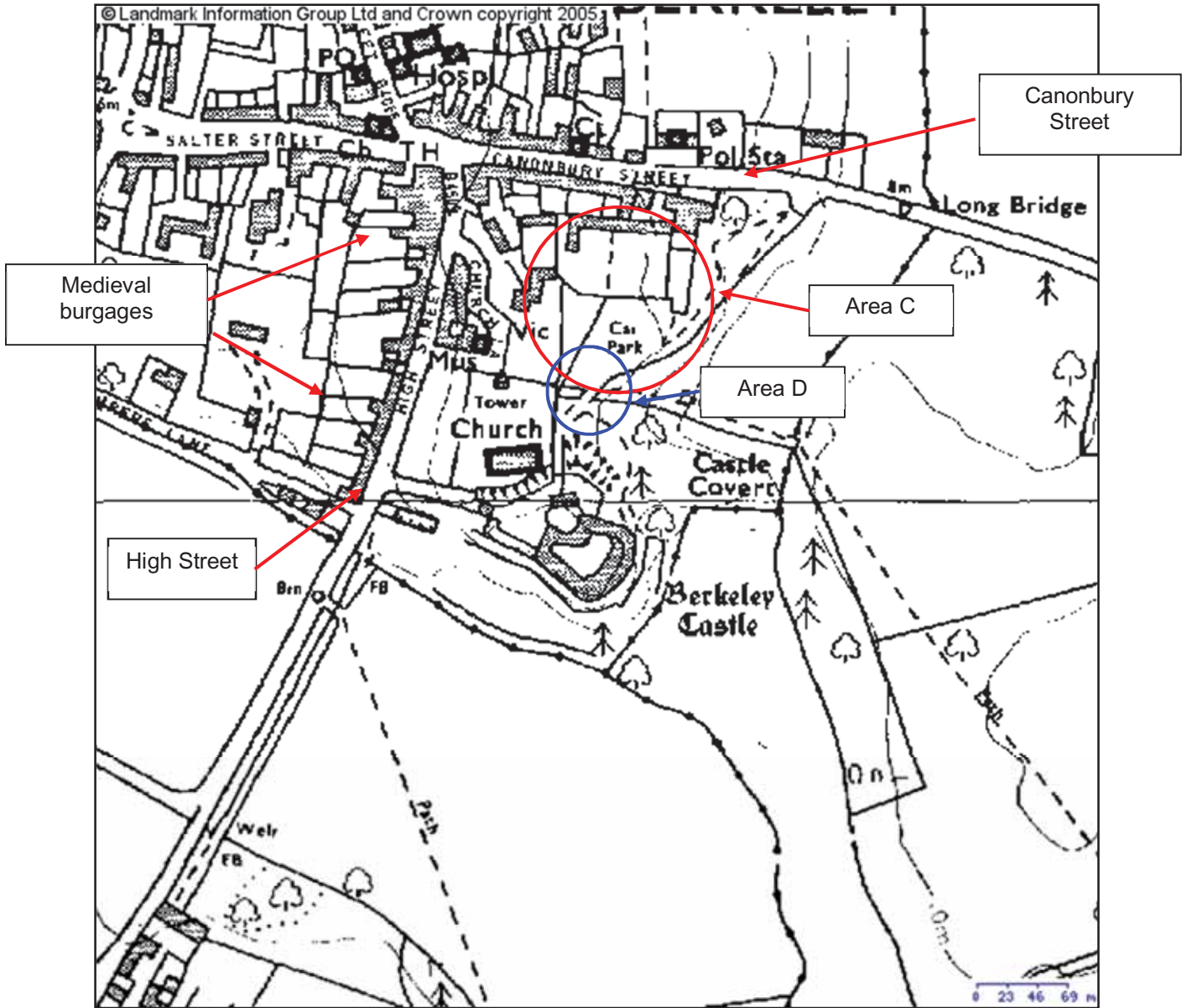

**Extract from the National Grid 1:10000 1<sup>st</sup> Metric Edition AD 1969 - 1996**

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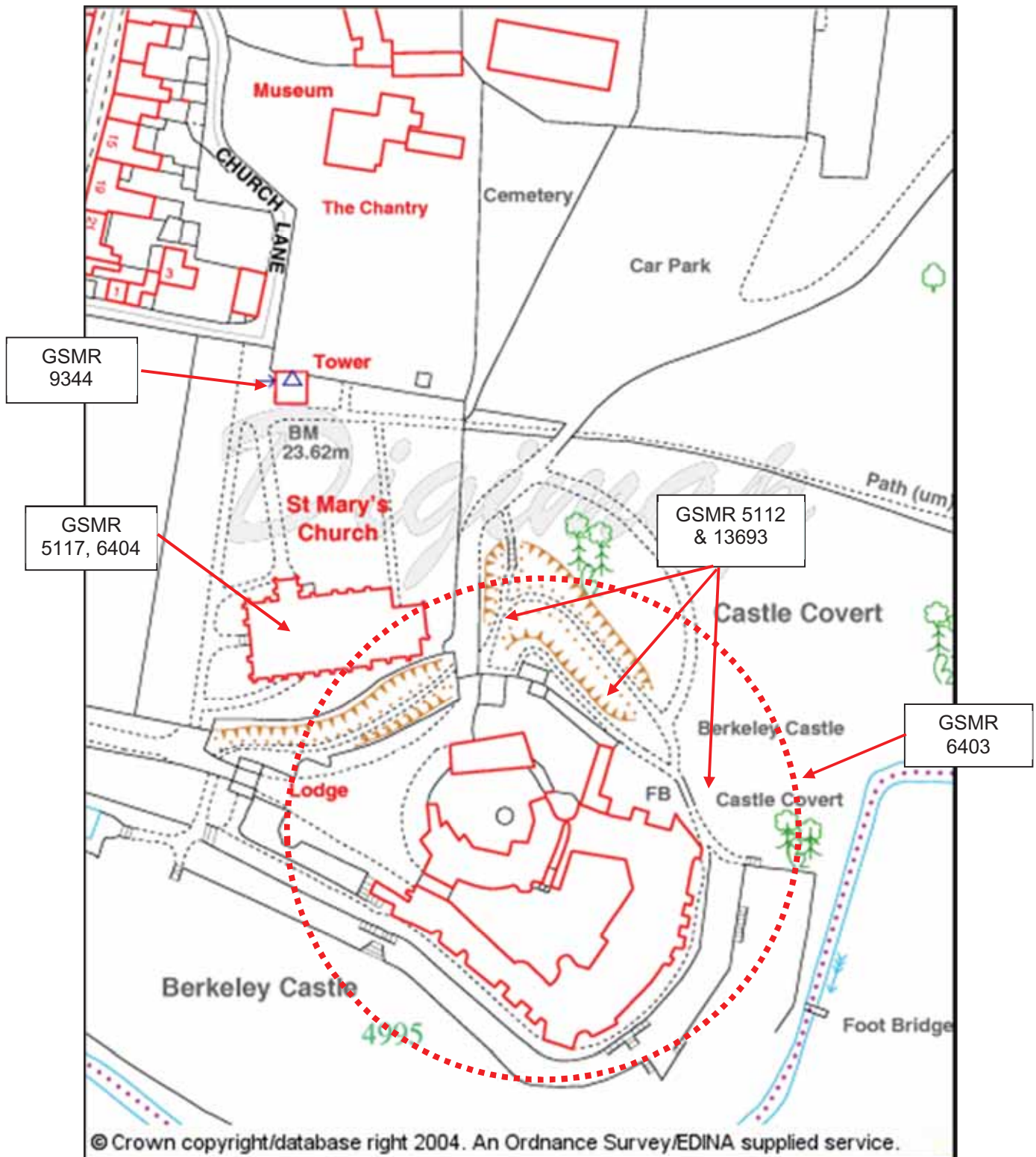

**Detailed cartographic extract of Berkeley Castle and surrounding study area detailing the relevant archaeology**

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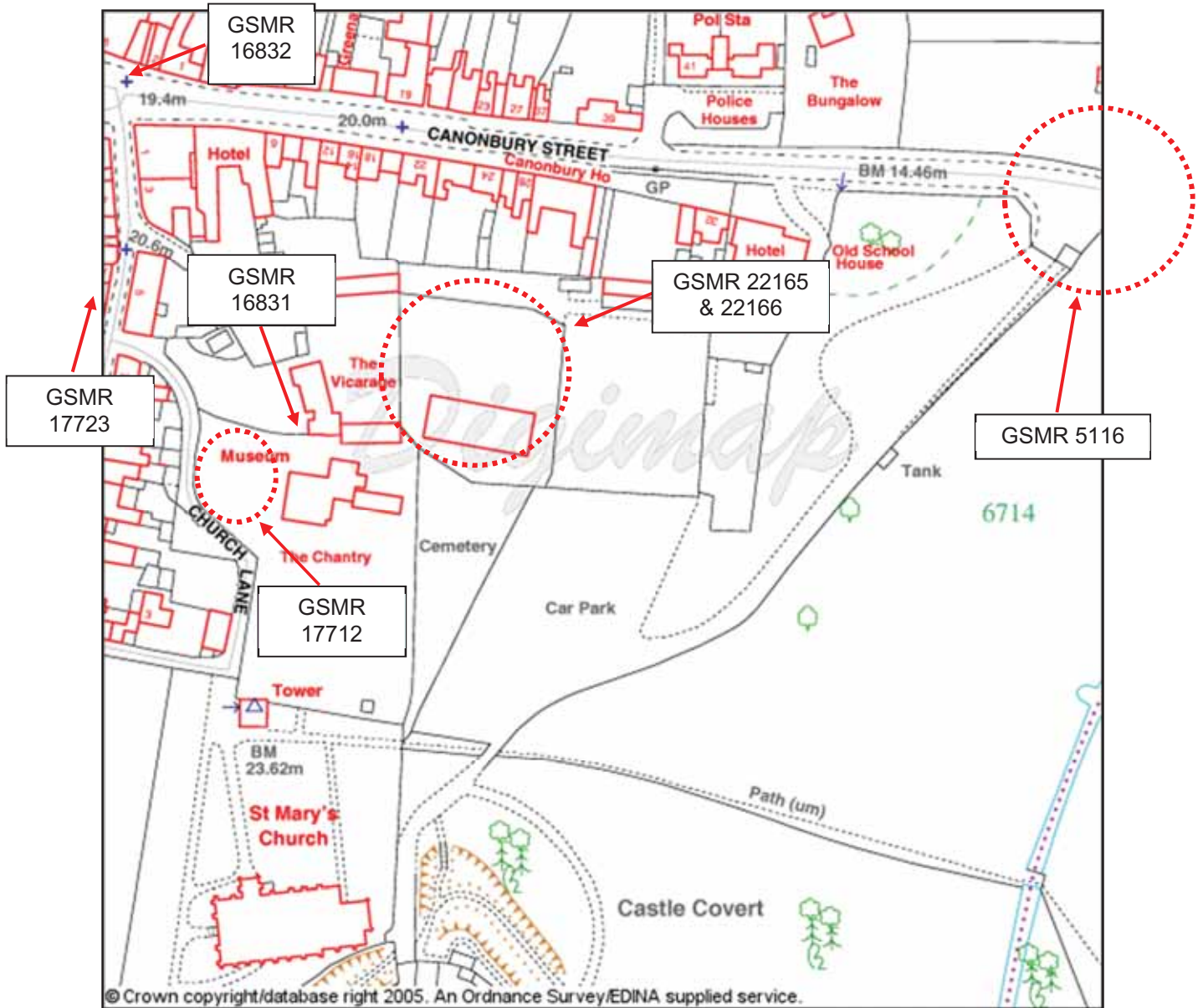

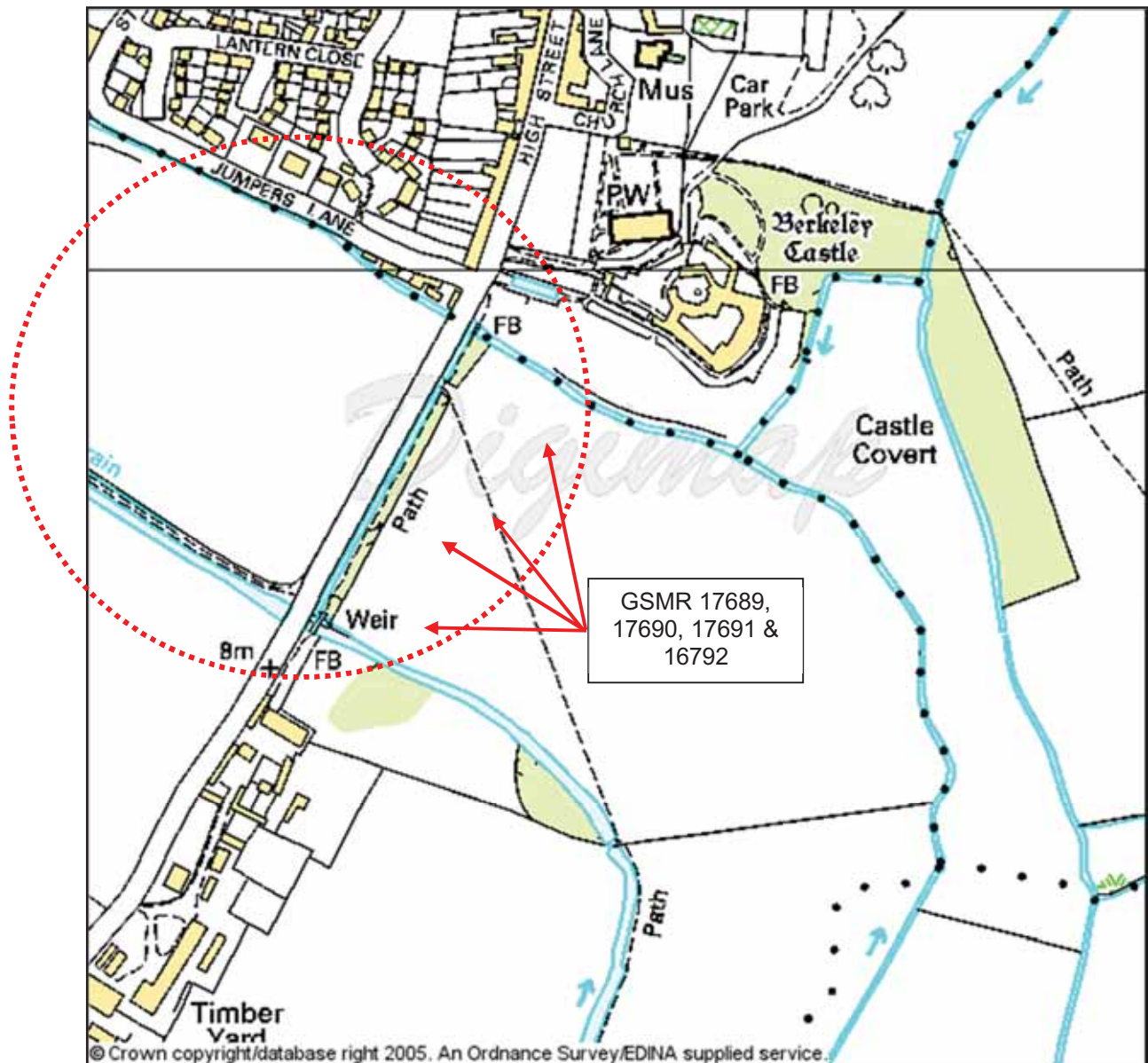

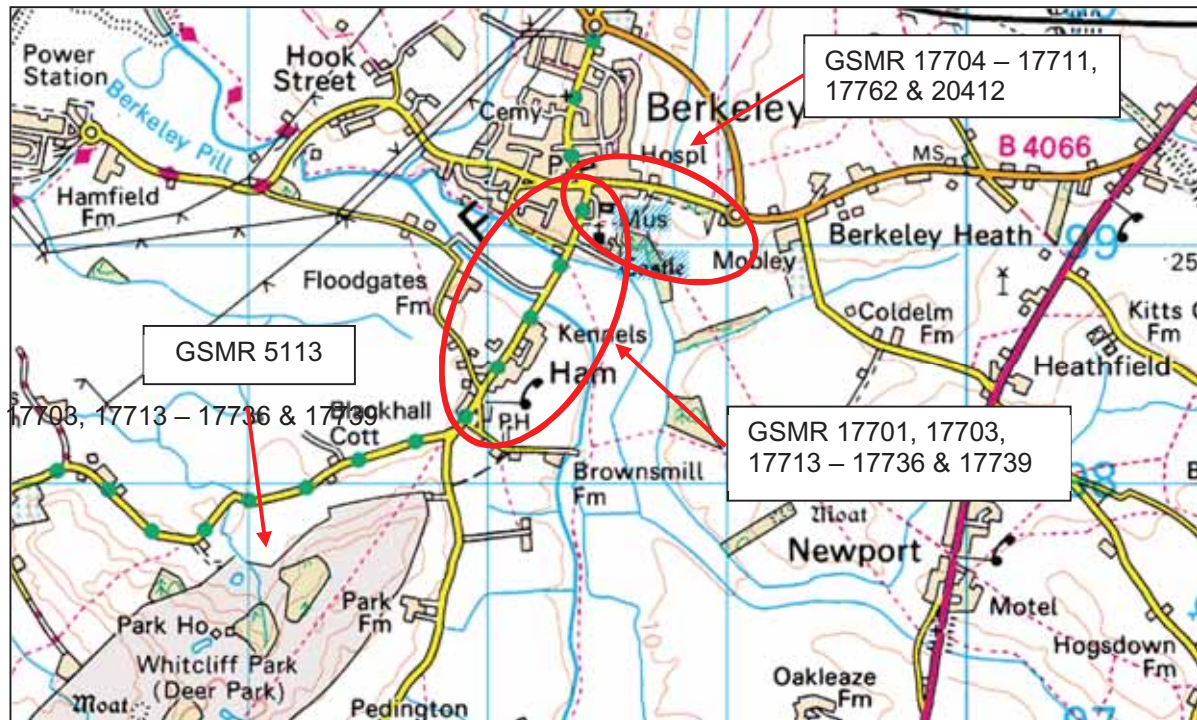

**1970** - The site was visited by the Ordnance Survey in February 1970. A dry moat was observed between ST 6843 9899 and ST 6854 9900, with an average depth of four metres. {Source Work 862.}

Whitley or Whitecliffe deer park was enclosed during the reign of Henry III & enlarged in the 16th C. (It may not be co-extensive with the present park however). {1} Of the parks belonging to Berkeley Castle, Whitley or Whitecliffe is the present park. The Worthy or Castle Park was enclosed in the reign of Henry IV & disparked in Elizabeth's time New Park was enclosed 1327-81. Two parks called Oakley & Shepnesse were disparked in the reign of Edward II & the same fate probably overtook most of the Berkeley Parks, the Cromhall was again imparked in the reign of Charles II.{2}

This area was the subject of a historic landscape survey and management plan by Nicholas Pearson Associates Ltd in May 1993. The archaeology was studied by Peter Cox. This was undertaken in three ways, fieldwalking during May 1993, a review of the available documentary sources, and analysis of the SMR.

#### AREA 5117 DESCRIPTION :-

The church of St. Mary was rebuilt in the C13 and C14 on the site of a C12 building, of which the traditional Norman south door remains.

C15 plinth of medieval tower with C18 tower above. Nave C13. Aisles and lower part of north porch C14. Chancel lengthened c.1300. C13 wall paintings. {Source Work 75.}

Irvine (1870) thought that parts of the church were of pre-Norman date, having formed portions of the church of a Saxon nunnery which existed here. {Source Work 1705.}

The C12 castle (SMR 5112) is said to have been built from the ruins of the nunnery, and it appears some religious foundation has continued until that time, as an allowance for the garments of three nuns resident at Berkeley was recorded in AD1154. {Source Work 2948.}

A 'Roman tile' is preserved in the wall of the church on the south side of the chancel arch (11 inches square and stamped DCLVI). It is said to have been found about a metre below the chancel floor in 1866. {Source Work 1271.}

On pathway to south of chancel is a fragment of a possible Roman coffin. {Source Work 1355.}

A piece of Saxon cross is preserved in the vestry. {Source Work 160.}

According to Cooke (1877), the church was the site of a pre-conquest minster. The church is C12 in origin, with many later additions. The C13 wall paintings were restored in 1862 and 1865-66. The Saxon cross consists of fragments re-used as wall stones in repairing the buttress west of the north door of the nave. On the arms of the cross appear the lower portions of two figures, one kneeling and the other standing - probably representing the Annunciation. {Source Work 2948.}

Many Roman remains were discovered during the C19 restoration of the church (see SMR 6404). {Source Work 902.}

**1987** - A stone vault found during repair of the Berkeley Mausoleum was inspected and recorded by Carolyn Heighway. It was part of the retaining structure of the C15 Berkeley memorial. {Source Work 1026.}

**2003** - An archaeological watching brief was undertaken by M Cook between 25/02/2002 and 14/03/2003 during the lifting of some cobbles and a section of stone paving. The stone paving was found to be made up of gravestones turned face downwards. Five had legible inscriptions and dated between 1791 and 1853. Finds from the site included post medieval bottle glass, pottery, clay pipe and a copper alloy token dated 1669. Redeposited medieval pottery was also recorded dating between C10 and C14. All of the human bone recorded was disturbed and not in situ. It was all retained. {Source Work 7503.}

**AREA 13693 DESCRIPTION :-**

Late C19 gardens, lawns and trees surrounding medieval castle. Though small formal gardens existed beside the Castle in the early C18, illustrated in Atkyns <8>, and Kip and Knyff (1715), nothing remains of these. The present terrace gardens were planted from the 1880s onwards by Lady Georgina Fitzhardinge, followed by Major Robert Berkeley in the early C20. The planting of the terrace borders was recorded by George Elgood, and praised Gertrude Jekyll in <5>.

Woodland to north-east of Castle, water-meadows to east, south and south-west. The terraces at 3 levels, run round the walls of the Castle for 250m from the east to south and south-west, extending westwards for a further 150m. Fine yews over the Berkeley Vale. Beyond the third and lowest terrace to the west, an archway of clipped yew and steps leads to the Bowling green above and below planting of shrubs and trees round the rectangular pool, once a swimming pool and now a lily-pond. Summerhouse at west end, and southern side of pool balustraded, with steps at centre point descending to open lawn, with groups of trees at each end. The base of the steps is flanked by 5 Irish yews to each side. The lawn extends for 300m east-west below the pool and Castle terraces, and is closed on the southern side by a hedge of Handsworth box 3m tall. <1>

The Domesday account for Berkeley records that there existed a market in which 17 men were resident (1). Later in 1159 a market grant was obtained from Henry II, by Robert, son of Hardinge (2). The market appears to have been located around the cross roads created by Longridge Street, Marybrook Street, Salter Street and High Street.

The fate of the medieval market is unclear, although a reference by Rudder in 1779 records that the market was 'so little frequented {it could be} scarcely called a one" (3). In 1839 a annual market was established by Alfred Pearce (a local wine and spirit merchant) to be held on the 2nd Monday in December (4). Later in 1859 another annual Great Market was established, together with a monthly market to be held on the first Tuesday of the month.

There exist 10 sketch maps dating from the C17 and C18 showing the town of Berkeley. These maps are reputedly re-drawn from an earlier medieval map, dating from 1543, although the source for this medieval origin is unclear, and the date of 1543 doubtful.

Upon this map is shown what appears to be a Market House, located in the market area. A market house is recorded by Smith writing in 1608, who notes '{the} old market House {is} a very ancient and curious building, forming an archway over the causeway, and extending into the Street. It was pulled down sixty years ago'(1). It is possible that the building shown on the sketch maps and Smith's reference are one of the same?

Also shown on these maps is a Market Cross, which is located adjacent to and north west of the Market House.
