

The Seal of All Saints', Derby.



R. S. G. FENTON, of Cranbourn Street, London, writes that it will probably be of interest to the Society to know that the original seal of the collegiate church of All Saints', Derby, is still in existence, and was sold at Sotheby's. on May 27th, 1904; the following being its catalogue description:—

252 Bronze Seal of the Royal Free Chapel of All Saints, Derby (Derby College), S. CÔMVN. LIBERÆ. CTPËLLÆ. RÆGIÆ. ÔMN. SÛÖR. DÆRBËYÆ., Christ seated under portico in centre; above, a shield bearing the three lions passant of England within a quatrefoil compartment, and below, S. EADMVND REX, the saint-king kneeling with hands clasped in prayer, *oval, 2¾ by 1¾ ins.*; Another, Seal of Doctor Fabriczy (?), S. P. FABRIECCV DOCTOR, &c., *oval, 2 by 1½ ins.* 2

** The parish church of All Saints (Derby), being a royal free chapel, was collegiate, and had besides the master or rector (who seems to have been the Dean of Lincoln), 7 prebendaries, but all their revenues amounted, 26th Hen. VIII., to £39 12s. per annum only, in the whole, and £38 14s. clear. It was granted, 1° Mariæ, to the bailiffs and burgesses of the town of Derby, *Dormer's not., p. 83.*
