

Che Registers and Churchwardens' Accounts of the Parish of Dussield.

THE REGISTERS.

A S far as can now be ascertained or estimated, the area of the original parish of Duffield amounted to close upon 16,000 acres. This large parish was bounded on the north by the parishes of South Wingfield, Crich, and Wirksworth; on the west by Kirk Ireton, Mugginton, and Kedleston; on the south by Allestree, and the Derby chapelries of Quorndon and Little Eaton; and on the east by Horsley, Denby, and Pentrich. The ancient parish of Duffield not only included the area of the present parish of 3,421 acres, but also the parishes or hamlets of Belper, Heage, Turnditch, Milford, Holbrook, Hazelwood, Shottle and Postern, and even parts of the new parishes of Idridgehay and Alderswasley.

To some it may perhaps appear that this was an enormous area for one parish to cover, but the fatuity of such

a notion is at once apparent if we recollect the far vaster size of such a parish as Wirksworth and still more so of that mighty bulk of Bakewell and other parishes of the hilly districts of the county; it is well to remember that in the early days of the forming of such parishes, they largely consisted of moorland, forest, or waste, with just an occasional "field" or felled clearance in the neighbourhood of the villages or hamlets.

My old and intimate friend, the late Honble. F. Strutt, some years ago asked my assistance toward his contemplated History of Duffield, on which he was engaged at the time of his death. His voluminous papers were afterwards placed in my hands, but as they mainly consisted of long extracts from what has already appeared in the *Journals* of this society, it was not considered wise to have them published. Going over these papers again recently, to see if there was anything worth offering to our Editor, brought to my mind the transcripts that I had taken both of the Parish Registers, and of the Churchwardens Accounts, as long ago as 1866 when I was resident in the village of Duffield.

The first book of the Parish Registers begins in May, 1598 and ends in 1655; there is a blank between 1614-17, three leaves having been cut out, and a leaf has also been abstracted in 1647. The second book (paper) begins 1657 and ends 1678. The third volume extends from 1676 to 1700, and the fourth volume ends in 1791. Throughout these four volumes the practice is maintained of writing the names of the churchwardens for the current year at the foot of each page.

The interpolations in these registers are certainly not so many nor so interesting as some that we have carefully examined, but it is thought worth while to print some of these and to offer a few general reflections.

The name of most frequent occurrence in these registers of families of any distinction are the descendants of the

prolific branch of the Duffield Bradshaws, headed by Anthony Bradshaw, the lawyer who put up the celebrated monument in Duffield church in 1600 to his own memory, and that of his two wives and twenty children. The last one of these he somewhat profanely called Penultima, as though he was determined to have at least one more. The story of the Bradshaws of Bradshaw, from whom descended the Bradshaws of Marple, county Chester, and one of whom was the President of the Court which sat in judgment on Charles I, was fully told by our Editor after an exhaustive fashion in vol. xxiv of this Journal, and he also contributed a full account of Anthony Bradshaw, and of the almshouse he erected at Duffield to the volume of Old Memorials of Derbyshire (1909). The Bradshaw extracts from the Duffield registers are supposed to be given by the late Mr. Llewelyn Jewitt in vol. xxiii of the Reliquary, but there were a number of important omissions.

The following are the register references to the Vicars of Duffield:-

- 1625.—Martha the daughter of Benjamin Bentham Vicar of Duffield and Martha his wife was bur: ye 18th day of January.
- 1649.—John Taylor by vertue of an order from the Committee of Plundered Ministers took possession of the Vicariage of Duffeild and undertook the pastorall charge of that parrish March the eleventh.
- 1658.—Roger Morrice, M.A. instituted 11th Sep. and there remained till 24 Augt 1662.
- 1661.—Edwardus Buxton Bac. Artium constitutus fuit Vicar de Duffield 30 die Septembris. Induct. Octob. 6 Johan Harpur de Morley.

- 1664.—Dec 13th German son of Ed. Buxton Vicar of Duffield Bapt.
- 1665.—June 7th Edward ye sonne of Edward Buxton Vicar of Duffield Bapt.
- 1666.—Jan 1st Elizabeth ye daughter of Ed. Buxton Vicar of Duffield Bapt.
- 1670.—June 28th Rachell, ye daughter of Ed Buxton Vicar of Duffield Bapt.
- 1672.—Johannes Stafford Artium Baccalaurens Vicarius de Duffield constitutus fuit tertio die Jani Ano D'm 1672 et inductus tertio die Martii in parochialem ecclesiam Duffield 1672 per Arthurum Francis de Elvaston Vicar. ibidem,
- 1680.—Jacobus Stone Artium Baccalaurens Vicarius de Duffield constitutus fuit decimo tertio die Octobris, Inductus autem die decimo nono euisdem mensis per Venerabilem virum Thomam Browne Archidiacorum Archidiaconalis Derbie.
- 1703.—April 10th Sepult Mr. Jacobus Stone Vickar of Duffield who died in ye 52 year of his age.
- 1703.—Josephus Gorway Artium Magister Vicarius de Duffield constitutus fuit octavo die Septembris, inductus autem nono die euisdem mensis per Edwardum Revell.
- 1712.—16th Aug.

Under this date occurs the following almost incomprehensible entry, relative to the churchyard and the vicar, Thomas Carlton, who had been instituted, according to the Diocesan Registers, on June 12th, 1711:—

"Bur: Reginald Pynder Esq of Duffield. Idem Reginaldus Pynder Armiger Vicario de Duffield donavit in perpetuum ut sequitur. Item I give & bequeath the Churchyard at Duffield & ye Meadow there called Church Close late in the possession of John Malin unto my said son Mr. Thomas Pyndar, Philip Ryley of Horhan in ye county of Norfolk Esq, Matthew Smith of Derby in the said county of Derby Esq, & their Heirs & Assignes, for ever in trust, nevertheless to permit & suffer yt Present Vicar of ye Parish Church of Duffield for ye time being & his successors to receive & take ye Rents & Profits thereof for evermore. Hac sunt verba Testamenti.

Thomas Calton Vicarius."

- 1713.—March 29. Mar: Thomas Calton Vicar and Penelope Pynder widow both of Duffield.
- 1735.—May 6th: Bur: The Reverend Mr. Thomas Calton Dean of Hartington and Vicar of Duffield.

The following are the references to the Ministers of Belper in the seventeenth century:—

- 1625.—An the daughter of Richard Holt preacher of Belper bapt^d ye 9th day of November.
- 1627.—Thomas Gretton Reader of Belper Chappell was buried ye 17th day of December.
- 1646.—May 18th Matri: John Taylor minister of Belper & Jane Fellow of Belper were married.
- 1647.—John ye sonne of John Taylor of Belper minister was bapt^d ye 2nd of December.
- 1648.—Jane ye daughter of John Taylor of Belper minister was baptized ye 12th day of November.
- 1651.—Jan 4th Moses son of John Taylor minister of Belper bapt.
- 1653.—April 3rd Elijah son of John Taylor of Duffield minister bapt.

The term "preacher" was probably applied to a Nonconformist, but "reader" seems to signify one licenced to read the Common Prayer and Scriptures in the old chapel.

The ground round the Early English chapel of St. John Baptist, Belper, was not consecrated for burial purposes until the year 1793, but it had been used for burial on a wholesale scale nearly two centuries before during a terrible outbreak of the plague. In 1609 between the first day of May and the last of September, out of the then quite limited inhabitants of Belper (probably under 200), there died of that awful disease 53. The corpses, for fear of infection, were committed to the ground in the chapel-yard. Their names are thus enumerated in the Duffield registers:—

Collier cum puero, Thomas Belye et ux ejus cum puero, mater Thome Berdesley cum puero, ux Willm Ryley, Johes Browne et ux ejus, Johes Peete et ux ejus cum duobus pueris, Thomas Birkynshawe cum famulo et puero, ux Thome Banforth, ux Anthonii Fletcher cum puero, Willm Clewes cum puero, Georgius Brinckshawe, Arthurus Cleton et ux ejus, Willm Potter, Johes Hardwycke—in numero Quinquegint tres.

This 1609 attack of plague in Duffield parish was by no means confined to Belper; Holmesfield, a chapelry of Driffield, suffered at the same time, and the unconsecrated chapel-yard was used in like fashion for interment.

The second of the ancient chapels of Duffield parish was that of Heage, but there is no reference in the registers to its having a separate minister. There are, of course, various entries of the baptisms, marriages, and burials of the inhabitants of that chapelry. The first time the name of this chapelry occurs in the Duffield registers it is spelt Highedge. When the burial of "Godfrey Pole of Highedge" is entered under 27th of October, 1598. A branch of the Poles of Radbourn settled here in the reign of Henry IV. Heage did not become a separate parish until 1844.

As to the chapelry and ancient chapel of Turnditch, we have only come across the two following register entries:—

- 1648.—William Walker minister of Turndich Chapell buried ye 16th of June.
- 1700.—July 14th, Bapt: Elizabetha quedam infans (cujus pater et mater sunt ignoti) inventa infra Capellam de Turnditch.

Turnditch was made a separate parish in 1847. There was considerable repair done to the parish church

in 1673, as is explained by the subjoined interpolation in the registers:—

August 6th 1673

A Levy made by John Stafford Vicar of Duffield and William Cowper and Steven Statham Churchwardens, and wee whose names are underwritten being Assistants and Assessors of the same. The Summe is £83 ros. o5½d. for the repaare of the Church of Duffeild being much Decayed by reason of a late Violent Fleod. The particulars of the Levy for Duffeild and ye severall Hamlets of ye parish is as follows:—

There are a few references in these registers to fatal accidents:—

- 1652.—Feb. 19th, James Johnson comeinge out of Staffordshire to see his sonne at Belper died in ye field and was buryed.
- 1673.—June 23rd, Bur. John Mortone of Holbrooke killed in a Coal suffo at Horsley.
- 1673.—10 April. Buried Robt Rendall of Denbigh who going fr. a Cockfight at Denbigh & being drounk fell into water above Duffield bridge & was drowned.
- 1686.—11th Dec Buried Matthew Harrison of Belper Laund who was killed in a pitt on the Gibbett Hill.
- 1691.—7th Nov. Died Mr. Henry Couper of Duffield who fell of from his horse a little beyond Northampton & dyed imediatly.
- 1691.—8th August. Bur. Thomas Nickson of Duffield who was burned at the New Mills.
- 1694.—6th Sept. Sepult. Gulielmus Boom de Openwood Gate demersus in aqua juxta New Mill.
- 1700.—Sept. 19th Sepult Robertus de Belper qui ex pyro fuero (i.e., I died from a fall out of a pear tree).

- 1701.—25th Sept. Sep: Ricardus Dudley junr de Duffeild demersus in aqua juxta Breadsal.
- 1701.—18th Oct. Sep. Samuel Gaskin de Duffeild demersus in Derwent infra Duffeldiæ pontem.

There are a few entries which may be classified under the general term of "tramps":—

- 1624.—An Infant of one John Fox Wanderer was buried the 30th day of May.
- 1630.—A poore wandring child was buried ye 22nd day of January.
 1632.—Edw: ye sonne of a strange woman at John Seals baptd
 12th day of Aprill.
- 1703.—May. A Trafiler from some parts de Haslewich unknown

Occupations are but very rarely entered in these registers. In addition to vicars, ministers and preachers, we have only noticed, throughout the seventeenth century, "Mr. Robert Clarke, Schoolmaster of Duffield," "Mr. Adam Hillier Exciseman of Duffield," and a baker and a forester, both of Belper.

The following places are mentioned during the seventeenth century, in addition to the frequently recurring names of hamlets:—Belper Laund, Belper Lane, Burley Hill, Chevin, Court House, Cowhouse Lane, the Dalley, Duffield Bridge, Gibbet Hill, Hill Syde, Hopping Mill, Meadows House, Wyndley, New Mills, the Paper Mills, and Postern Lodge. "Arrowslee" is a curious corruption of Alderwasley.

Gibbet Hill was the name given to the highest point of the Chevin ridge.

The earliest of the extant Churchwardens Accounts supply the following additional place-names within the parish:—Flaxholme, Frakers Bridge, Goose Green House, and Oldham's Cawsies.

The following printed bill is in Pegge's Collections at the College of Arms:—

SACRILEGE. Whereas the parish church of Duffield in the county of Derby was last night broken open and the Communion Plate (consisting of a Chalice and Salver), the Gold Lace upon the pulpit cloth and the Charity money collected at the Sacrament sacrilegously stole thereat: for the more effectual bringing of the offender or offenders to justice the Church Wardens of the said parish offer a reward of 20 Guineas to anyone who shall give such information that the offender or offenders may be legally convicted of such sacrilege.

Duffield, March 4th, 1777

This explains the subjoined entry which appears among the Church Registers under date March 31st, 1777:—

Whereas there has been a reward offered by the Churchwardens for the last year for the discovery of any person or persons concerned in sacrilegiously taking the Church Plate and lace from the Pulpit Cloth we do approve of such reward and on the behalf of the parish indemnify the officers from the payment thereof if such reward should be claimed and paid.

CHURCHWARDENS ACCOUNTS.

The earliest Churchwardens Accounts begin in a substantial book which was purchased by the parish at the price of 40s., in November, 1672. It has been suggested that it may be of interest to some members of the society to give these parish accounts in full up to the end of the volume in 1786. My long researches into these parish accounts have been chiefly directed to those of much earlier date (Early Churchwardens Accounts from the fourteenth to the close of the seventeenth Century: Methuen & Co., 1913); but the interest attached to the century covered by the Duffield parish accounts is by no means to be despised. There is no kind of local record which throws so much light on the life and social habits of our forefathers as records of this nature. To be quite frank these

Duffield records from the days of Charles II to those of the opening years of George III's reign do not impress one at all favourably so far as the common life of that period is concerned. To begin with, the accounts were kept after a most slovenly and careless fashion, though often dealing with large sums for those times.

I have appended a considerable number of footnotes, though these might with ease have been very largely increased, but it seemed better to assume that the members of such a society as this knew much already about the nature of such things as Church Rates and Levies. of the curfew and of all things pertaining to bells, as to processions round parish boundaries on Rogation days, and a variety of kindred matters, or at all events could readily get information on these subjects elsewhere. have always taken considerable interest in our numerous special Forms of Prayer and I have endeavoured, with some little trouble, to identify what special forms were paid for by this parish year after year. But this amount of research, if it stood alone, gives ample evidence of the carelessness of the Duffield accounts, for a considerable number of these forms, if the book is to be relied upon, were never purchased and hence never used. The accounts often overlap and a few are obviously wrongly dated.

It must always be remembered that the English Calendar year, from 1155 to 1750-1, began on 25th March and ended on 24th March of the year following. From 1751 onwards, the year began on 1st of January and ended on 31st of December. The Duffield habit, which was by no means universal, of invariably electing the new churchwardens in accordance with the variable festival of Easter still further increased the precise dating of accounts.

Litigation as to the churchwardens' financial statements and claims was once seriously undertaken, namely, in 1769, when the result was not encouraging to the parishioners, for their legal expenses added more than £50 to the rates.

A grievous and somewhat scandalous affair was the amount spent in beer and feasting on the occasion of the election of the churchwardens, and at other parish meetings. The "bettermost people" from time to time passed elaborate rules in vestry as to limiting the amount to be spent on such occasions, and as to other payments by the parish officials at the cost of the rates; but it will be noted that the old extravagance always set in again after a year or two's lapse.

It is amusing to note how, for many years, when many other payments were adjourned or suffered to lapse, that the dog-whipper kept the churchwardens up to the mark with regard to the various articles of clothing which pertained to his annual perquisite of a suit of clothes. They never in those days, either at Duffield or elsewhere, seem to have discovered that it is quite a simple matter to train a dog never to enter a church or even a churchyard, even if it accompanies its owner to the entrance.

In 1748 a "Prayer was appended to be used daily" on occasion of the Present Mortality among the Cattle.

¹ There is no greater contrast between the comfort of church attendance in mediaeval times and indeed down to the eighteenth century and the present and recent days, than the question of artificial warmth. This year 1759 is the first time when coals were introduced into the ancient building from the Saxon period onwards. The priest at early winter mass may have had to warm his benumbed fingers on a hone, a small silver box containing heated charcoal, an altar vessel named in a few entries; a chafing dish was occasionally placed in an aisle near to some special seat as was the case at Duffield in 1723. After the vestry fireplace had been installed, there was a regular yearly charge for coal; occasional charges for coal of an earlier date were in connection with rent dues at the church.

² This was the same Act already cited.

⁸ Birth of Prince George, afterwards George IV, 1763-1830. The King, by his Queen Charlotte, had fifteen children, nine sons and six daughters. On the birth of each there was a special prayer of thanksgiving; the prayers for nine of these children are herein named.

² This umbrella, at a heavy cost, was doubtless for supplying shelter from the wet for the clergymen during a funeral. Such umbrellas at this period were huge affairs of greasy oiled canvas, stretched on ribs of whalebone or cane. There used to be one of these churchyard shelters in the church of Bromley, Kent, which is described in Hone's Table Book, published in 1827. I inspected it more than once in the seventies of last century, but I believe it has now disappeared. The wooden handle was fixed in a movable shaft with an iron front. It stood 7 feet high, and when opened was 5 feet in diameter. The only such umbrella now extant is, as far as I know, at Cantrell, Lancashire. Another umbrella was purchased in 1782. See also Chapel-en-le-Frith Churchwardens Accounts, where 10/6 was paid for an umbrella; vol. xxiii, p. 129 of this Journal.
