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# The Anglo-Saxon Cemetery at Spong Hill, North Elmham, Part II: 

CATALOGUE OF CREMATIONS, Nos. 22,41 and 1691-2285

## I. INTRODUCTION

This volume is the second in the series of catalogues of burials from the AngloSaxon cemetery at Spong Hill, North Elmham, Norfolk (site 1012). It covers the cremation pottery and grave-goods excavated in 1976 and 1977 from the north-eastern quarter of the cemetery. Inhumations from the same area, excavated from 1975 to 1978, will appear in a further volume. Two cremations from trenches excavated in this part of the cemetery during the 1968 trial season are also included.

All the material, as before, has been placed on loan in Norwich Castle Museum 1 which is also the final destination of the records, still at present housed by the Norfolk Archaeological Unit at Gressenhall, near East Dereham, Norfolk.

## II. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Thanks must again go primarily to the owner of the land, Simon Thompson, without whose continued co-operation the excavation could not have proceeded.

The project has continued to be financed by the Department of the Environment who increased their grant to finance full-time post-excavation work. This was carried out from 1976-7 by Catherine Hills and then by Kenneth Penn. Robert Rickett has assisted since 1978. Since 1975 the excavation has been directed by Catherine Hills for the Scole Committee under the auspices of the Norfolk Archaeological Unit. Many people have been involved as specialists, staff, excavators and post-excavation assistants. During 1976-7 site supervisors included Robert Darvill, Kenneth Penn, Robert Rickett, Inge Särlvik and Robert Wilson. Stephanie Rickett was planning supervisor and also site supervisor in 1977. Finds supervisors were Ursula Fawcett and, chiefly, Louisa Gidney. The many volunteers included professional diggers, students and amateur or part-time archaeologists. Amongst these, John Turner must be singled out for his dedicated work throughout almost the whole of the excavation.

The grave-goods were conserved at Norwich Castle Museum, chiefly by Kate Starling and Karen Wardley. The staff of the archaeology and conservation departments of the museum, particularly the Keepers of those departments, Barbara Green and Sylvia Turner, continued to offer valuable advice and assistance. Most members of the Norfolk Archaeological Unit have been directly or indirectly involved in the project, especially the County Field Archaeologist, Peter Wade-Martins. Cambridge University has provided occasional technical expertise and a number of student volunteers as well as employing Catherine Hills since 1977 in a post which allows her time for continued direction of the excavation.

This volume is the result of the combined efforts of a number of people, but ingeneral the text (including that of the catalogue) is by Catherine Hills while the illustrations both of pots and grave-goods are by Kenneth Penn. Robert and Stephanie Rickett did
much of the preliminary sorting and processing of the material and also some of the illustrations: Stephanie drew the external pot sections and plans (Figs.181-5), while Robert drew the internal sections (Figs.186-92), the stamp tables (Figs.126-36, Tables 1-6), and the plans (Figs.1-3, 193). David Morgan and Lē Adams were responsible for the reconstruction of pots from the disturbed area, which is reported on p. 3 by Robert Rickett. The photographs are the work of Jerry Lockett (now University College, London), Kenneth Penn, Graham Pooley (Norfolk Archaeological Rescue Group), Robert Rickett, Derek Edwards and David Wicks. Identification of honestones is based on petrographic examination carried out by David Moore, Mineralogy Department, British Museum (Natural History). Descriptions of glass vessels are based on descriptions by Professor Vera Evison, Birkbeck College, London. Mark Brisbane at Southampton Museum and Glenys Putnam at Cambridge are working on, respectively, pottery fabrics and cremated bones, but their final reports will not appear until the excavation has been completed and the cemetery can be considered as a whole. (An interim summary of work to date on pot fabrics appears as Brisbane 1980). Tony Gregory and Frances Healy (Norfolk Archaeological Unit) have provided information relating to the Roman and prehistoric material from the site.

Helpful comments on the first catalogue have been received from a variety of sources and have, where possible, been acted on in improving this volume. A list of corrigenda and addenda to Part I is included at the end and more general points will be dealt with either in relevant sections of the text or in the final synthetic and analytical volume of the series.

Amongst many other colleagues, Professor Vera Evison and Dr.J.N.L.Myres have continued to be a source of ideas and advice.

## III. SUMMARY OF 1976-7 EXCAVATIONS

## PREHISTORIC OCCUPATION

A scatter of microliths continues to occur over the excavated area, but only one possibly contemporary feature (1145: not in Fig. 193) has been identified. Neolithic and early Bronze Age pottery and struck flint also continue to be found unstratified over the site and in isolated or clustered irregular pits or hollows. (Frances Healy, Norfolk Archaeological Unit, is writing a full report on these phases of activity on the site).

## ROMAN OCCUPATION

Several phases of activity during the Roman period are attested by the range of pottery and artefacts found both unstratified in the ploughsoil and in a large number of ditches, pits and post holes. No certain structures of Roman date have been identified, but there are at least two ditched enclosure systems (Fig.1). The first includes a substantial north to south ditch and an attached rectangular enclosure defined by ditch 197. It appears to date to between the middle of the first century B.C. and the middle of the first century A.D. The second system, on a slightly different alignment to the first, belongs in the main to the fourth century A.D. It consists of a large rectangular enclosure defined by ditch $\underline{146}$ against which a smaller enclosure abuts on the north (ditches $569 / \underline{570}$ ). Several other ditches may also be connected. The later ditches contain a mass of pottery and some food bones in discontinuous lenses of dark soil which are at present interpreted as domestic rubbish. Associated buildings are either as yet unexcavated or have been entirely removed by erosion. The precise relationship of the fourth-century enclosures to the Anglo-Saxon cemetery is not yet clear. The northwestern corner and western side of the large enclosure (ditch 146) were noticeably avoided by cremations, giving the impression that it was still partly open and in use as a boundary in the early Anglo-Saxon period. However, some ten metres to the east, the ditch was cut by a series of cremations, some of them in pots with close fourth- to-

fifth-century parallels, notably C1716 (Fig. 55), which makes it difficult to attribute them to a relatively late phase in the cemetery's use, when an earlier boundary could have gone out of use.

## ANGLO-SAXON DOMESTIC FEATURES

Two pits to the north of the cemetery and two shallow ditches produced grasstempered Anglo-Saxon pottery, loom-weights and animal bone. A rectangular post-hole structure to the east of the cremations, south of the inhumations, may also be of AngloSaxon date.

Many pits and post-holes contained either no dateable artefacts or only material which might have been residual: small worn Roman potsherds and flint flakes are too common in features otherwise dated as Anglo-Saxon or later for isolated examples to be relied on as giving anything more than a terminus post quem for them.

## RECENT DISTURBANCES

An area in the middle of the northern half of the cemetery is occupied by several modern features containing smashed urns (Fig.2). As these features are in an area of ill-defined disturbances with a significantly high weight of fragmentary urns, they are interpreted as the work of urn diggers and rabbiters of the last two hundred and fifty years (Hills 1977, 6-8).

The total weight of sherds from this area is 265.60 kg , representing approximately 177 complete urns (calculated on 1.53 kg as the average weight of a complete urn). It has been possible to piece together parts of forty two urns (C2241-C2285, of which three were found to be parts of urns C1892B and C1937). With the exceptions of C2280, C2283 and C2285, these are all decorated urns, and there are still vast quantities of plain sherds which have not been pieced together. These urns have no associated grave-goods, and only C2283 and C2284 have any associated bone.

## THE CEMETERY

In 1976 and 1977 a total of 548 numbers were assigned to cremations. Subsequent analysis of smashed and scattered cremations showed that some of them included parts of more than one pot. Separate pots originally given one number are distinguished in the catalogue by capital letters: A, B etc. The addition of these brings the total to 595, to which should be added two excavated in 1968 and, from the disturbed area, forty-two reconstructible from a total of 177 estimated pots. A further forty-one inhumations were excavated between 1976 and 1978 which, with the seventeen already found brings the total to fifty-eight.

## Inhumations

The inhumations are now clearly seen as a distinct group, lying along the northeastern edge of the cemetery, but not outside its limits: cremations occur, if sparsely, throughout the area occupied by inhumations, and the northernmost burials so far excavated are cremations. A number of cremations were buried in inhumation pits, and are therefore either later, or in some cases possibly contemporary burials. The few cremations found amongst the eastern group of inhumations include several set in the middle of an inhumation, perhaps deliberately. There is only one clear example of an inhumation disturbing a cremation which was backfilled into its pit (C2139, Inh.46). In other cases, however, it is possible that cremations were carefully reburied or, alternatively, smashed and scattered. In either case little trace would be left of the sequence of events. On the whole, it seems that the two rites were probably in contemporary use at the time when this part of the cemetery was being used, but there is more stratigraphical evidence for cremations being relatively later than inhumations than for the reverse. This contrasts with the conclusions which can be drawn on the basis of typology and horizontal stratigraphy, which suggest that the inhumations are later.

The inhumations are orientated approximately east to west, with heads usually to the west. There is one possible line of graves and another less obvious row. Two shallow ring-ditches, each approximately 10 m in diameter, surrounded large chamber graves, one of which was accompanied by a second, smaller, grave (see Hills 1977 for discussion of one of these graves). A third, smaller, ring-ditch surrounded another grave, while a fourth grave lay within an arc of a ring-ditch which may have abutted onto the southern edges of both the large ones.

## Square Enclosure

A small square enclosure, outlined by ditch 581 , was found immediately to the west of the ring-ditches. It definitely cut one inhumation (38) and probably cut several others, but was in turn cut by cremations. This ditch must, therefore, have been in use during some part of the life of the cemetery, and could perhaps be interpreted as surrounding an area with some special significance, although it is debatable whether one should go so far as to interpret it as a shrine.

## CREMATIONS

## Cremated Bone

Analysis of the bone by Glenys Putnam is now in progress and will be published in due course. One interesting interim conclusion is that many of the pots contained parts of two or more individuals. The prevalence of multiple burials will raise considerably final population estimates as numbers can no longer be counted simply on a basis of equating one pot with one individual, even if allowance is made for possible contamination by repeated use of the same site for funeral pyres. It will also complicate attempts to discover consistent relationships between categories of grave-goods or pottery and the age or sex of associated burials. On the other hand, it might be useful in distinguishing family groupings.

## Un-urned Cremations

Not all collections of un-urned bone can be considered as deliberately un-urned, for some are redeposited from pots disturbed by later burials, animals or urn diggers. Others, however, appear to have been deliberately buried without a pot. Some, which were found beside or underneath an urned burial, may be extra bones from the pot, or more probably, separately buried individuals, and these (like the burials associated inside a pot) might repay study in terms of identifying family groups. Other un-urned burials appear to have been set in a pit in the ground by themselves, possibly in a box or bag which has since decayed and disappeared. Where possible, the catalogue entries show to which category such concentrations of bone belong ${ }^{2}$.

## IV. POTTERY

The pots are arranged according to decoration in the illustrations as in part I. The attempt to go further and arrange undecorated pots according to shape has been abandoned, since it seems more consistent to arrange all the pots according to one aspect only, and not to try to combine two disparate means of ordering. Undecorated pots are, therefore, now in numerical order. Although an Anglo-Saxon pottery specialist might have preferred all the pots to be left in numerical order for him to rearrange according to his own system, experience has shown that for student or general archaeological readers, it is helpful to provide some kind of preliminary arrangement. This is not intended as anything more than a grouping according to the absence or presence of basic decorative elements, without any deductions being drawn from that grouping. The exception to this principle is in the arrangement together of the stamp-linked pots (and, in one case, of unstamped but stylistically very similar pots). It is suggested that these may be the products of individual potters or workshops which it is useful to see together on one page. In future it may be possible to identify pots made by the same person on

other grounds, but at present stamp links seem the only justifiable basis for doing so.

## STAMP-LINKED GROU PS

Stamp-linked groups include additions to the sixteen groups identified in part $I$, and also new groups numbered 17-43. Brief descriptions of associated grave-goods are now included in the discussion of each group as well as the pottery.

## Group 1

No pots can be definitely added to this group, but C2078 and C2243 (Fig.93), which are both decorated with single rows of large swastika stamps, might be related.

Group 2 (Fig. 69, Plate IV)
Two pots can be added, C1793 and C2182. All four pots of this group share the same simple swastika stamp and three also share a second, more complex swastika. The designs of C1793 and C1047 are very close, differing only in slight variations of stamp arrangement. C2182 is similar in size and shape to the first two, but has empty chevrons instead of stamp-filled panels. The fourth pot (B.M.1946, 7-5, 1) has a different pattern which it shares with C1046 and C1224 from Groups 1 and 3.

Only two of the pots have recorded grave-goods (associations of the B.M. pot are now lost): playing pieces of C1047, and a comb in C2182. The pots in this group were found widely dispersed around the edges of the cemetery.

Group 3 (Fig. 69)
A third, fragmentary pot, C2167, shares the runic stamp found previously on C1224 and C1564 (Hills 1974). Two of the pots, C2167 and C1564, are close in shape and pattern: both have horizontal rows of stamps or dots around the neck and chevrons on the shoulder. Sloping rows of dots or stamps define the chevrons and single impressions of the runic stamp appear in the panels. The third pot, C1224, as already noted, shares a decorative scheme with pots from Groups 1 and 2 .

All three of the pots contained grave-goods, in two cases including iron tweezers. There were also two pots with glass beads and single occurrences of playing pieces, bronze fragments, ivory and an iron rivet. The pots in Group 3 were buried at some distance from each other, two as much as 37 m apart, but they could be seen as lying immediately around the edge of the central part of the cemetery.

## Groups 1-3

The impression persists that Groups $1-3$ may all in fact belong to one, larger group, but no direct stamp links have so far been established to demonstrate this.

Group 4 (Fig.69, Plate III)
One new pot, C1798, has been added to the group, bringing the total to eight. The pots have a limited range of decoration: all except C1333 have rows of stamps around the neck, all of these except C1334 being rows of rectangular stamps often put close together in imitation of rouletting. Five of the eight have chevrons around the middle, one has groups of vertical lines alternating with stamps, one has a continuous band of vertical lines, and the last is too fragmentary to determine its decoration below the neck. Most of the pots have a tendency towards a carinated rather than a rounded angle.

Five pots contained grave-goods, but there was no obvious pattern amongst these: glass occurred three times, tweezers and combs twice, shears and a knife once each. The group was distributed around the western and northern sections of the cemetery.

Group 5 (Fig.69)
In part I, four pots from Spong Hill and five from elsewhere were listed. One

further pot is included in this volume, C1933, and two more were excavated in 1979 which will not be discussed here. All pots in this group carry one of several versions of the 'foot' stamp which has given the name 'planta pedis' used in earlier discussion (Myres and Green 1973,237 ). These stamps are often very difficult to interpret. In some cases the same stamp, if slanted or dragged, could produce an elongated 'foot' or, if impressed vertically, a simple oval. The range shown on Table 3 is, therefore, representative of impressions which may have been produced by a smaller number of actual tools. Variations between the Table published in part I and that published here arise from the variation in quality of stamp impressions on pots which are, in several cases, very worn and fragmentary. The coherence of the group as a whole is unaffected since its internal consistency is otherwise so great. All have a row of stamps around the neck, usually including two alternating stamps and either stamp-defined chevrons or vertical bosses and vertical lines around the middle. C1933 is like C1043 in that it belongs to the vertical boss, vertical line category, with the addition of vertical stamp rows, but the zig-zag 'feet' alternating with circles on the neck are identical to those on C1032.

Many of the pots in this group have no recorded grave-goods, but three of the four recently excavated Spong Hill pots had associated objects: in two there were glass and ivory; bronze fragments and pieces of a comb each occurred once. This group was distributed widely around the cemetery in its peripheral zones.

Group 6
There are no additions to this group.
Group 7/12 (Figs. 70-2)
This group has been enlarged both by newlyfoundpots and by the inclusion of those previously listed as belonging to Group 12. (The stamps on C2119, one of the new pots, clearly demonstrate the link, and the two groups must now be discussed as one). The additions are: C1783F, C1797, C2100, C2101, C2119, C2252, C2258, C2277. There is also one inhumation accessory vessel, inhumation $42 / 2$, which will be published in the inhumation catalogue. This brings the total to thirty-one pots, the largest group so far identified. The range of stamp motifs remains the same, with the addition of some new variants: the cross-in-circle and grid from Group 12 and from new pots only one further grid. The range of patterns also remains the same: simple single or multiple horizontal stamp rows (all the former Group 12 fall into this category) and more complex combinations of vertical bosses and stamps in rows or panels. Variations on the more complex patterns link several pots, as elements occur in different combinations: for example C2277, C2258 and C1086 all have vertically-scored bosses, with stamp panels between, but C2258 shares the arched stamp rows found on C1246. C1088, C2119 and all the Group 12 pots have upper halves covered with horizontal stamp rows. Only C1797 differs from the group as a whole in that it is decorated with a linear plait design.

Several of the pots were reconstructed from the disturbed area and some others were fragmentary. Subtracting these and the inhumation accessory $42 / 2$ we are left with twenty-four pots whose contents should be considered. Nineteen of these contained some kind of grave-goods; there were glass beads in eleven pots, combs in five, bone beads in four and brooches in three. There was only one set of miniatures, and one instance each of bone rings, ivory, and bone pegs. If this is compared with finds from the cemetery as a whole, some significant differences can apparently be observed, although it is true that the numbers involved are not very large. Half of all the cremations contained grave-goods, whereas even if fragmentary (but not reconstructed) pots are included, two-thirds of Group 7 pots produced finds. The range of finds is representative of those found in the site as a whole, but there are differences in relative proportions. Only one set of miniatureswas found amongst Group 7 pots, whereas over the site as a whole single items or sets were found in $12 \%$ of cremations. On the other hand, glass beads, found overall in $20 \%$ of cremations, occurred in about $40 \%$ of Group 7 , and combs,
found overall in $10 \%$ of cremations, also occurred twice as often amongst Group 7 burials. The difference might be lessened if only complete pots were considered, but it would not disappear altogether. This may be a feature related specifically to Group 7 pots or it may be related to the variable distribution of finds over the site as a whole. All the Group 7 pots were found in the northern half of the cemetery.

## Group 8 (Fig. 73)

Two pots, C 1783 H and C 2271 , can be added to this group, bringing the total to nine. All share the same grid stamp. Several other pots may share the cross-in-circle found on C1366, but the stamp impressions are too obscure for this to be certain. C1783H is too fragmentary for its decoration to be reconstructed, but enough remains of C2271 to show that its pattern was similar to that of C1113: with stamps between arched slashed cordons.

Two of the pots contained tweezers, two glass and one a honestone, and one a bone bead. All were found in the northern half of the cemetery, some amongst the Group 7 cluster.

## Groups 9 and 10

There are no additions to these groups.
Group 11 (Fig. 72-3)
One addition, C2261, shares two stamps with C1085 and a second, C1852, shares two with C1085 and C1403. Otherwise, the four pots in this group are not strikingly similar. All have stamp rows around the neck, but only C1852 has bosses and, otherwise, they display a variety of linear and stamped patterns. Apart from a nail possibly associated with C1085 and a piece of bronze sheet with C1852, there are no associated gravegoods. All were buried in the northern half of the cemetery, not very close together: C1085 was nearly 30 m away from 1852, 25 m from C2261 and about 14 m from C1403.

## Group $12=$ Group 7

## Group 13 (Fig. 73)

There are two additions, C1745B and C1850. All four pots in the group share a rosette stamp, only C1596 has a second stamp, an 'S' . C1745B is very similar in decoration to C1110, while C1850 differs only in the addition of stamps to the chevron panels. The fourth pot, C1596, is unlike the others in that it has four stamp rows around the neck instead of two, has a chevron not defined by a line below, and, chiefly, by vertical bosses.

Except for a piece of glass vessel which may have been associated with C1745B, there are no associated grave-goods. The group was scattered over the northern half of the cemetery.

## Groups 14, 15 and 16

There are no additions to these groups.

## Groups 17-43

The remaining groups have been identified amongst the pots excavated in 1976-7, and in only one case include pots from the earlier volume.

## Group 17 (Figs. 73-4)

This consists of four pots, C1835, C1859, C1884 and C1906. Three share a concentric circle stamp and two share a pair of grid stamps. Three of the pots have chevrons defined by, and filled with, stamps. Three have shallow vertical bosses, so that C1859 combines details found separately on C1835 and C1884 which otherwise, at first
sight, do not look very similar. C1906 is a smaller, simpler version of C1859.
Bronze fragments were found in two of the pots, in one of them associated with a pair of tweezers, and two pots had no grave-goods. All were buried close together on the northern edge of the cemetery, one cutting inhumation 28. The greatest distance between members of the group was 8 m .

Group 18 (Fig. 75, Plate III)
Four pots, C1927, C1937A, 1937B and 2262, carry a range of six stamps, two of them shared by all the pots, two by three pots. All are decorated with three horizontal stamp rows around the neck. None has any grave-goods and all were found in or near the disturbed area, probably all originally buried within 2 m of each other.

## Group 19 (Fig. 74)

A pair of pots, C1837A and C1837B, were found confused together. They share the same three stamps and are both small with flat lids. The only difference is that where there are crossed lines on A, there are vertical lines on B. No grave-goods were found.

## Group 20 (Fig. 76)

This includes three pots, C1737, C1823 and C1826. They share a rosette stamp and each has one or two of three different cross stamps. Two pots, C1823 and C1826, are the same size and shape and have the same pattern. They were buried next to each other. The third pot, C1737, which was found 2 m away from the others, is smaller and is decorated with horizontal stamp rows and vertical bosses, in place of the defined chevron found on the other two. All three pots were buried towards the north-eastern corner of the cremation cemetery. C1823 contained bronze sheet, glass beads, crystal and part of a florid cruciform brooch.

## Group 21 (Fig. 77)

Four pots, C1862, C1863, C1941 and C2127, all share one 'S' stamp arranged in similar untidy horizontal rows; on three pots the stamp is in an unusual sideways position. One pot has shallow bosses. There were no grave-goods. All the pots were buried close together in the north-eastern edge of the cemetery, one cutting inhumation 26 , another cutting the corner of the square enclosure (Context 581). The greatest distance between any two pots was 3 m .

## Group 22 (Fig. 76)

Two pots, C1913 and C2114, share an 'S' stamp, although four further stamps occur only on C1913, which is much the larger of the two. Both are decorated with horizontal stamp rows and chevrons, while there are also stamps in the panels of the larger pot. They were buried more than 12 m apart, although both in the north-eastern quarter, C2114 cutting inhumation 36 . Neither contained grave-goods.

## Group 23 (Fig. 77)

A pair of pots, C1733 and C1839, have three stamps in common; a fourth occurs on C1839 only. Both have a pair of horizontal lines around the middle, below a zone occupied by stamps; on C1733 these are in curved vertical rows, on C1839 in horizontal rows. Neither had any grave-goods. They were buried 5 m apart in the north-eastern part of the cemetery.

## Group 24 (Fig. 78)

Two pots, C1930 and C2254, share a concentric circle stamp and each has a separate second stamp. Both have stamp rows around the neck although C2254 is too fragmentary to reconstruct the rest of its decoration. There were no grave-goods. C2254 is reconstructed from the disturbed area, but was probably buried within 5 m of C1930 in the northern half of the cemetery.

## Group 25 (Fig. 78)

Three pots, C1870, C1872 and C1877A, share a concentric circle stamp very like that linking group 24, but more worn. Three other stamps occur on one pot only. Except that all threehave horizontal stamp rows around the neck, the decoration of these pots is not very similar except that none is bossed. There were no associated gravegoods. C1870 and C1872 were buried within 1 m of each other, but C1877A was 14 m away from the other two, though still in the north-eastern corner.

## Group 26 (Fig. 79)

A pair of pots, C2083 and C2085, share a semi-circular stamp and both are decorated with horizontal stamp rows above chevrons. Neither had grave-goods. They were buried 6 m apart, to the immediate north of ditch 146 .

## Group 27 (Fig. 79)

This consists of three pots, C1628 (from an earlier season), C1889 and C2115. The latter two share three stamps and also carry three variations on a similar theme, but C1628 is linked only by a distinctive barred triangle stamp which it shares with C1889. C1628 is too fragmentary for its decoration to be reconstructible, but the other two have the same pattern, differing only in the order of the stamps. None had any grave-goods. C1889 and C2115 were buried less than 8 m apart, while C1628 was 19 m from C1889.

## Group 23 (Fig. 80)

Two pots, C1982 and C2145, share a large rosette stamp. They have similar decoration, vertical stamp rows in chevrons, although in shape and size they are not close. Glass beads and a spindle-whorl were found in C1982. They were buried close together, less than 3 m apart, near the south-eastern edge.

Group 29 (Fig. 80)
Two pots, C1924 and C1936, share a grid stamp while a second grid occurs only on C1936. C1924 is fragmentary, but so far as can be seen, its pattern is the same as that of C1936. Bronze sheet was found in C1924. The two cremations were buried only 3 m apart, towards the northern edge.

## Group 30 (Fig. 79)

Two pots, C1973 and C2053, share a rosette stamp. One pot is decorated with a chevron below a stamp row, the other with a defined chevron above a stamp row. C1973 contained a set of miniatures, a hone and a comb, but C2053 had no grave-goods. They were buried 5 m apart, on the southern edge and just south of ditch 146 .

## Group 31 (Fig. 81, Plates II and IV)

There are five pots in this group, C1806, C1981, C2010, C2059, C2080. (Four more, not discussed here, were excavated in 1979). All of the five pots published here share a cross-in-circle stamp and two also share circle and semi-circle stamps. C2059 is the only unbossed pot: it has linear ' T ' motifs within swags and single stamps between the swags. The other four share variations on a more elaborate scheme. C2010 and C2080 both carry vertical bosses alternating with small round bosses on the shoulder, while C2080 shares with C1806 a slashed cordon around the neck and massed stamps in panels. The ' T '-shaped arrangement of bosses on C1806 in turn is reflected by the linear ' T ' motifs found on both C1981 and C2059.

Tweezers and a comb were buried with C1806, and glass beads were found in C2080. Four of the pots were buried within 5 m of each other on the eastern edge of the cemetery, in or to the south of ditch 146. A fifth lay more than 17 m west of this group. The 1979 pots lay some way to the south, in the south-eastern part of the cemetery (Hills 1980, fig. 2).


Group 32 (Fig.82)
Two pots C1746 and C1963, share cross-in-circle stamps and each has separate 'S' stamps. C1746 has stamp rows above empty chevrons, while C1963 has pendant triangle stamp panels. Neither had any grave-goods. They were buried just over 2 m apart in the northern half of the cemetery.

Group 33 (Fig.83)
Two pots, C1886 and C2135, share a rosette stamp. They are of similar shape but different sizes. Both are decorated with stamps between chevrons, the upper panels of which are occupied by lines, a distinctive feature seen only on these two pots. One pot, C1886, contained fragments of a crystal bead, the other some bronze sheet. They were buried 12.5 m apart in the northern half of the cemetery.

Group 34 (Fig. 82)
Two pots, C1828 and C2019, share circle and cross stamps, and each has one separate third stamp. One pot is decorated with horizontal stamp rows, the other has pendant triangle stamp panels and horizontal stamp rows. Glass and ivory were found in C1828. They were buried 18 m apart in the north-eastern sector of the cemetery.

## Group 35 (Fig.83)

Three pots, C1808, C1841A and C2250, share a large cross-in-circle stamp; C1808 also carries a grid stamp. Two of the pots are fragmentary, so their decoration is not completely reconstructible but, at the least, all three have in common chevrons defined by dots. This feature may relate the group to Group 36 , which also has a stamp very similar to that linking Group 35, and also perhaps to C1172, C1292 and C1361 (Hills 1977, fig. 73). Only one of the three, C1808, had any grave-goods; these were iron shears and a knife blade. They were all buried within 10 m of each other in the northern half of the cemetery.

## Group 36 (Fig. 84)

Two pots, C1892A and C1915, share a cross-in-circle stamp very similar to that of Group 35. One is decorated with horizontal stamp rows, the other also has chevrons with dots within them. The tweezers, knife and bronze fragments found in C1892 may not have been associated with this pot (1892A) but with the other fragmentary pot also given this number (1892B). Glass was found in C1915. The pots were buried only 3 m apart in the north-eastern sector.

## Group 37 (Fig. 85)

Four pots, C1745A, C1897, C1938B and C2274, share a cross stamp, and on C1745A only there is a semi-circular stamp. The fragmentary state of three of the pots makes identification of their decorative scheme uncertain, but two pots have horizontal stamp rows while two have stamps in chevron panels. One is bossed. None had any definitely associated grave-goods. Three of the pots were buried close together, within 1 m of each other, but C1745A was 11 m from the others, although still in the northern part.

## Group 38 (Fig. 84)

Two pots, C1885 and C1905, share rosette and 'S' stamps. Both are decorated with horizontal stamp rows, the lowest row being interrupted by vertical-scored bosses. The only difference between the two is that C 1885 is smaller, and has only two stamp rows instead of three. Neither had any grave-goods. They were buried 4.5 m apart in the north-eastern part of the cemetery.

## Group 39 (Fig. 86)

Three pots, C1857B, C2253A and C2253B, share an untidy rosette stamp; there is also an 'S' stamp on C2253A only. What is left of these three fragmentary pots does not

appear to show very similar patterns, except that none is bossed. None had any associated grave-goods. C1857 was buried about 3 m away from the disturbed area within which C2253 was found.

## Group 40 (Fig. 84)

Two pots, C2248 and C2249, share a semi-circular stamp. The fragments surviving suggest they had identical patterns. They were found in the disturbed area, so have neither associated grave-goods nor a precise location.

## Group 41 (Fig. 87, Plate IV)

Three pots, C1757, C1762 and C1766, are linked by a wedge-shaped stamp which is similar, but not identical, to those found on three further pots, C2219, C1841C and C 2255 , the other details of which are also like the actual stamp-linked group. Other than C1841C all six pots have stamp rows around the neck above swags on the middle (C1841C is too fragmentary for more than the neck to be reconstructed). The stamps on the neck are wedges except on C1757; on three of the pots these are on raised cordons. Within and/or between the swags are vertical stamp rows, lines and grooves. The most elaborate is C1757, one of the directly stamp-linked group, which has rosette motifs. The basic design of the other two linked pots is closer to C2219, which has a different wedge stamp. All three stamp-linked pots and C2219 contained grave-goods, but only glass occurred more than once. Otherwise the range included playing-pieces, bronze fragments, ivory, shears, tweezers and possibly one brooch. The three stamp-linked pots were buried within 11 m of each other, but C2219 was 20 m from the nearest of these. The six pots discussed were buried in the eastern half of the cemetery.

## Group 42 (Figs.88-9, Plates I and III)

Five pots, C1778, C1784, C1954, C1991 and C1992, share one stamp, a barred oval. This is a difficult stamp to identify, since differential wear and pressure are even more likely than with other stamps to obscure precise detail, but the stamps on two other pots, C1764 and C2060 although similar to those of the group are clearly different. All the stamp-linked group are decorated with horizontal lines above swags, and all except the smallest, C1992, are bossed. The bosses range from simple round bosses between the swags on C1991 to the alternating round and vertical bosses on C1784, and C1954 to the round, vertical and curved ones on C1778. All except C1991 have horizontal stamp rows around the neck. Three have flat lids decorated with stamps and grooves.

They contained a range of grave-goods: shears, knife, glass and comb in C1778, a large glass bead in C1784, crystal in C1991 and a knife in C1992. They were buried within 12 m of each other on the eastern edge of the cemetery: two within ditch $\underline{146}$ and three to the south of it.

In connection with this group should be considered firstly the two pots with similar stamps, C1764 and C2060, also buried in ditch 146 . These are decorated with horizontal stamp rows above vertical grooves and bosses, not swags. When first found, from surface appearance and finish, they were associated with Group 41 , which may still be a better context for them. Secondly, there are a number of pots which have flat, flanged lids, often slashed around the angle as are those from C1778 and C1784. These are the following: C1772, C1967, C2007, C2016, C2035, C2056, C2090, C2099, C2203, C1753B. (Figs.89-92). These are stamp-linked neither to each other nor to Group 42 and are not all, in fact, even stamped, but they do often have variations on a horizontal/swag decorative theme. They were also all buried along the eastern edge of the cemetery, four of them in ditch 146 .

Group 43 (Fig. 86)
This includes two pots, C1940A, and C2181, and one lid, C1857D which might originally have belonged to C1940A and have become displaced. There is one cross stamp common to the group and an 'S' and a circle which each occur once. No similarity between the patterns of the three can be observed, and the only associated find is glass from C2181. C1940A and C1857D were found within 2 m of each other, whereas C2181 was buried more than 32 m to the south. This group is the least convincing of those identified, since not only are the pots buried at a distance and the patterns different, but the stamp is a relatively simple one. Nevertheless, it is distinctive as a square and not a round cross which is certainly exactly the same size on all three.

In addition to the pots which can be directly linked by identical stamp impression, there are several other groups which are arguably products of the same workshops.

Two pots, C1814 and C2112 (Fig.92) are decorated with several versions of a diag-onally-crossed grid, a motif which does not appear on many other pots. None of the stamps on either pot is actually the same as that on the other, but the similarity of motif and of their elaborate bossed and stamped patterns leaves little doubt that they should in fact be considered together.

Another group of pots, without stamps, but with very similar distinctive arched groove patterns, was already identifiable amongst the pots previously published (Hills 1977, figs.44-5). To these should be added six more pots, C1801, C1803, C1827, C1836, C1987 and C2050 (Figs.43-4).

Discussion
There are now forty-two separate groups, after the amalgamation of Groups 7 and 12. Of these, nineteen consist of two pots only, and ten of only three. However, the largest, Group 7/12, now includes thirty-one pots, and several others may in fact be larger than can at present be shown since further discoveries may link groups which are now separate. The likelihood of these groups being products of individual potters is strengthened by the fact that most pots within each group correspond broadly in shape and in overall decorative schemes. Classification according to strict definition of decorative attributes would probably identify several of the smaller stamp groups as they stand, while most of the others would fall into two or three categories, largely corresponding to an increase in elaboration of design related to an increase in size. Most groups, particularly $7 / 12$, become more internally coherent with the addition of further pots, since this provides further cross-links between pots on the basis of actual stamps, stamp motifs and decorative elements.

Fabric analysis has not yet proceeded far enough to show whether fabric groups correspond to stamp groups, but at least it can be said that there is some consistency amongst the fabrics of Group 7/12 pots (Brisbane 1980).

There are no very obvious correspondences between grave-goods found in pots of the same stamp group, and in fact, amongst all stamp groups, there are perhaps fewer grave-goods than amongst the cremations as a whole. General consideration of all stamp groups together would probably be misleading however, and there are perhaps some indications of specific associations amongst separate groups, notably $7 / 12$. The lack of miniatures and the disproportionate number of combs and glass beads amongst this group need confirmation from a more detailed statistical analysis of the cemetery as a whole, and will need to be carefully considered before any conclusions as to its significance can be drawn. It may relate to the group itself, and to the status of those buried in the pots or it may be a chronological characteristic, specific to parts of the cemetery used during different phases.

The distribution of the stamp-linked pots within the cemetery remains the most strikingly consistent aspect of the study. This now appears to show a radial pattern, with the centre of the cemetery empty (Fig.3). Even the most centrally-distributed Group, 3, lies as it were on either side of a large central area which is still more clearly avoided by other groups. There are several different patterns within this: some small groups were buried very close together, within a few metres of each other; larger or more scattered groups still mostly remain within one broadly defined zone of the cemetery, north, east or west, and a few groups show a very much more dispersed pattern. Some of the last category are groups which have been identified at cemeteries other than Spong Hill and might be non-local in origin. The denser clusters may represent local potters or family groupings, whilst some of the more scattered groups might be the results of exchange or of exogamy. Study of the bones may eventually throw some light on these possibilities. Overall, the scatter of linked pots around the fringe of the cemetery suggests a temporal phasing, an overall horizontal stratigraphy with expansion outwards from the centre. The clustering of some groups suggests that within this there were areas set apart for separate communities or divisions of the whole population.

## V. GRAVE-GOODS

Nearly all the same categories of grave-goods occurred in the second series of cremations as in the first, so that grave-goods will not be listed again (Hills 1977, 2330). Further discussion of each type and the listing of total numbers, and an examination of associations and distribution, will be left until the excavation has been completed.

Types of object listed in Part I and not occurring in this volume include the following: bronze bell, bronze sword pommel and bone casket fittings, each of which has only been found once so far, and also iron arrow-heads, found previously in three graves, and iron diamond-shaped fittings, found twice. New categories of object are more numerous. In C1743 there was a silver pendant and silver rings, while in C2146 there was also a small unidentifiable silver fragment. Bronze bars occurred in C1730, C1952, C2143 and C2162. Small bronze rivets were found in C2057, an iron tool in C2013, and a possible iron handle in C2042. In C1894 there was an amber bead, and in C2067 one of jet. Small quartz pebbles, possibly substitutes for playing pieces, were put in C1980. There were bone pegs in C2100 and C2218, ahollow bone, possibly used as a needlecase, in C1976, and two pyramidal bone pendants in C2143. There are no major new categories: those listed above occurred only in one or two graves.

CATALOGUE OF CREMATIONS

## NOTE ON CATA LOGUE

Cremation numbers: Nos. 22 and 41 are cremations excavated in 1968. No. 1601 is republished from Part I because further pieces of pot have come to light, making possible a full reconstruction. Nos.1691-2240 were excavated in 1976 and 1977, and Nos.2241-85 are numbers given to reconstructed pots recovered from the urn-diggers' disturbance, excavated in 1975 and 1976. Only C2283 and C2284 from this last group have associated cremated bones and none has associated grave-goods. They are located only approximately (see p.3).

Figure references: the first figure reference following the cremation number refers to the illustration of the pot. If the pot is too fragmentary to illustrate, there is no reference, and 'n.ill' appears after the pot description. If several pots are included under one number ( $\mathrm{A}, \mathrm{B}$ etc.) their illustrations are indicated both in sequence following the number, and at the end of each individual pot description. Further figure references are to sections, either of pots associated in the ground with other cremations or internal sections of complete pots. Figure references to grave-goods appear immediately after the listing of each item (note here the change from the practise of Part I). Grave-goods which are not illustrated are described as 'n.ill'.

Pottery descriptions: these are slightly fuller than in Part I, but are still intended only as summaries, complementary to the drawings. There is still no description of colour or fabric as this aspect of the pottery will be dealt with more satisfactorily in the context of a full specialist report on the fabrics and no useful purpose could be served by adding an approximation here.

Stamps are listed as before by the type numbers used in tabulation on Figs.126-33. There are a few minor changes and some new types: XVI, XVIII, and further subdivisions of existing types. It should be noted that there is room for doubt over the identification of stamps as belonging to 1 e rather than 1 h , since in some cases the outer circle of 1e may simply be the edge of a stamp which, if not so deeply impressed, would appear as 1 h .

Bosses can again be assumed to be hollow unless specifically described as 'applied'. The condition of the pot is described after restoration: its condition during excavation can be seen on the internal sections (Figs.186-92) if it was sufficiently well-preserved to be listed before emptying. Some pots, either from damage, poor firing or bad conditions for preservation, have collapsed into little more than lumps of damp clay. Some of these pots can, nevertheless, be regarded as belonging to 'complete' burials, since all the pot was essentially still in position with its contents. Some burials listed on Table 7 as complete do not, therefore, have complete pots. Conversely, some badly smashed and scattered pots have been fully restored and are now complete pots, although the burial was certainly not intact. The condition is described under the following headings:

Complete: intact or missing only a few chips from rim or base
Near complete: noticeable pieces missing, usually from rim Incomplete: large pieces missing although probably still sufficient for complete drawing
Fragmentary: large pieces, half or less of pot, not possible to reconstruct fully
Base, lower half or upper half only: self-explanatory
Sherds: only a few sherds survive
Holes in the side or base of a pot are recorded. These may have been deliberate holes, cut neatly or carelessly before burial in some 'ritual' connection, or alternatively, if the pots could be shown to have had some earlier domestic usage, the holes might have some functional explanation. However, it is also possible that the activity of worms, well
attested within the pots both by their actual presence and by the deposit of peagrit at the bottom of many pots, has extended to the burrowing of holes through the more friable bases.

Grave-goods: in this volume no indication has generally been given of whether an object has been burnt or not. In most cases, bone, ivory and glass have been burnt, and unburnt pieces amongst an otherwise melted or charred assemblage are probably simply pieces which lay away from the greatest heat. Illustrations of bronze objects show whether they are complete or melted. Iron objects show no sign of burning, but it is arguable that the funeral pyre would not have reached a sufficient temperature to affect them.

Descriptions are slightly fuller than in Part I and a larger proportion of melted glass beads, bronze sheet and ivory fragments has been illustrated: anything not drawn is usually identifiable only as being a fragment of some known substance. In the case of glass, it is usually possible to suggest whether it is the remains of beads or vessel, and to estimate how many beads, what colour and possibly what size. Where a figure reference is given for bronze sheet or ivory fragments, this will usually show a selection, including some of the larger pieces. The number of playing pieces drawn is indicated, and those not drawn are identical to one or other of those which are. Figure references are given beside descriptions of illustrated glass beads. 'Bronze' is used to describe all copper alloys.

Some categories of object found inside pots are not likely to have been deliberately deposited as grave-goods. These include worked flint, potsherds, tile and lumps of clay. Of these, worked flint flakes have been retained as grave-goods although their position at the top of the pot, often well above the bones, suggests they may well be residual objects from the surrounding soil (see Figs. 186-192 especially). There is no evidence for their use by the Anglo-Saxons, but, on the other hand, one cannot be certain none of them was deliberately deposited. Potsherds are found both at the top and well down inside pots and are sometimes burnt. In the latter case, they may be the remains of pots deliberately burnt on the funeral pyre and as such should be counted as grave-goods. However, some sherds may have been accidentally incorporated in the pyre. Unburnt sherds, both Roman and Anglo-Saxon, also occur and these could have arrived in the pot as residual objects in backfilled soil, and so should not be listed as grave-goods, aithough the possibility of deliberate deposition of unburnt sherds cannot be entirely discounted. In the case of one cremation, C2213, two joining pieces of pottery were found, one at the bottom, the other at the top of the pot. It was felt to be more consistent to list all potsherds separately rather than to attempt to distinguish between those which may have been grave-goods and those which were residual. Likewise, fragments of Roman, medieval and modern tile or brick are simply listed as having been found in the pot. Some of these fragments have been brought down from a higher level by worm sorting, while others were found with broken pots, buried only just below the present ploughsoil.

Illustrations: solid circles beside a pot illustration indicate the presence of glass in the burial, and solid triangles the presence of fragmentary grave-goods which have not been illustrated (this practice was followed inconsistently in Part I, but has been rigidly adhered to in this volume). All other grave-goods appear both in outline beside the pot in which they were found and again full-size in the series of illustrations which show grave-goods arranged according to type (Figs.137-180). Objects found with burials later shown to include more than one pot cannot usually be regarded as securely associated with one of these pots rather than the others. Outlines, then, are put, for convenience only, with the pot in such series given the letter ' A '.
