

SUSSEX TRADESMEN'S TOKENS OF THE SEVENTEENTH CENTURY.

Descriptions of many of the Tokens issued for general use in the county of Sussex during the seventeenth century have already appeared in previous volumes of the "Sussex Archaeological Collections" (xi., xiii., xiv., xv., xvi., xvii., xviii., and xxii.). To the first of these notices the late Mr. Figg (in vol. xi.) prefixed an excellent introduction, in which, among other details, he gave a list of the names of places from which tokens were issued. All the "towns" named by him appear in the following list, with the exception of Arlington, Alborn, Penhurst, and Watlington. Of the first of these places no token is as yet known; the second is a village in Wiltshire; the third is most probably Penshurst, co. Kent; and the fourth is a parish in Oxfordshire.

The longest and best list, however, which has hitherto been published, will be found in Mr. Boyne's large and valuable work on the extensive series of tokens issued in the seventeenth century, in which ninety-three varieties are described. As the present list is more than half as long again, and will be found to vary from his in many details, it may be as well to state the authorities on which ours is founded. In addition to our own collections, and those in the British Museum, which have been carefully re-examined, we have been enabled, through the courtesy of several gentlemen, both in the county and elsewhere, to examine their collections, and we gladly return them our warmest acknowledgments for the liberality with

which they have been placed at our disposal.¹ We have also had the advantage of introducing the additions from Mr. Boyne's and Mr. Golding's MSS. The result of these inquiries will, we trust, give as nearly complete a list as can be hoped for. It is as well to add, that instances often occur (though less frequently in Sussex than in other counties) of an issuer having had a second supply of tokens, slightly varying in size, spelling, and date; hence the various descriptions by different writers.

The Sussex issuers, like those of Kent, appear to have been proud of their county, for no fewer than forty-seven have taken care to make known that they lived in Sussex. Some of them also became members of the then new sect of religionists called Quakers, and notices will be found of them in Mr. Figg's very interesting paper on "The Sufferings of the Quakers," in S. A. C., vol. xvi.

By way of conclusion, we may mention that no token has yet been found of Hastings or Winchelsea, while every other Cinque Port, and many of their members, issued one or more.

The supporters of the Dorset Arms are two leopards, popularly supposed to be cats; and hence the inn called the Dorset Arms at Lewes was, in 1670, commonly called "The Cats," and it is still better known by this latter name.

The following extract is from the register of burials:—"1662. buried Mary, wife of James Mathew, of Randildes. March 18th." Randildes is an old house of flint and brick still standing. The lion rampant is the arms of Pierpoint. We are indebted to the Rev. C. H. Borrer for the information about these two tokens.
