With the exception of the Tudor Arms, the above glass has, throughout, been inserted the wrong way round; so that to read it correctly it is necessary to do so from outside. It is of extraordinary interest, recalling as it does some of the most enthralling episodes in English History. Sir Walter Blount, the friend of John of Gaunt, son of Sir John and his second wife Eleanor Beauchamp, married Sancha de Ayala, daughter of one of the highest officials of the Court of Castille4; and was killed in 1403 at the Battle of Shrewsbury, as Shakespeare relates, in single combat with the Earl of Douglas. Their eldest son John was one of the heroes of Henry V.'s reign. Their second son Thomas married Margaret Gresley, whose son Walter was created Lord Mountjoy, having inherited the Mountjoy estates through the first wife of Sir John, his great grandfather, and he therefore quartered the arms of Mountjoy by inheritance and not by descent. This Sir Walter was created a Knight of the Garter. Sir William St. John Hope, in his Garter Plates at Windsor, thus describes his plate:—

"Plate LXXVIII. Sir Walter Blount, Lord Mountjoy, K.G. 1472–1474. Now in the twenty-third stall on the South side of the Quire. A quadrangular plate of copper, paly of silver, red and translucent green enamel. The arms are, quarterly, (1) Silver two wolves passant sable and on a border silver eight saltires gules (for Ayala); (2) Gold a tower azure (for Mountjoy); (3) Barry undy gold and sable (for Blount); (4) Vair (for Gresley). The helm is silver with a fantastic black mantle with gold lining, surmounted by 'a gold crown from which rise two ibex horns' as a crest. Across the bottom of the plate is a scroll inscribed

WALTER BLOUNT S'OR DE MONTJOYE.

The plate is probably of foreign workmanship. Through decomposition or imperfect fusion the blue enamel of the third and fourth quarters is now of a pale brown colour.

Sir Walter Blount was son and heir of Sir Thomas Blount of Elvaston co. Derby, treasurer of Normandy, and Margaret, daughter of Sir Thomas Gresley. He became treasurer of Calais in 1460, and was created a Knight of the Bath at the Coronation of K. Edw. IV., for whom he also fought at Towton. In 1465 he was created Lord Mountjoy, and made Lord High Treasurer, in which office he continued until the following year. He was created a Knight of the Garter in 1472. Lord Mountjoy died in 1474, and was buried under a sumptuous alabaster tomb in the Church of the Grey Friars in London.

Fox Davies, in his Art of Heraldry, p. 292, also notes this plate. Possibly not realising the alteration that time has effected, he records No. 4 as "Vairy argent and gules"—and, were it so, rightly attributes it to Gresley. But the glass at Northiam, which has retained its true colour, records it, as St. John Hope does, as Vair. And as such it should apparently be for Beauchamp of Hache; and it is thus attributed in Collect. Top. and Gen., VII., 221, when describing a like achievement on the Paulet Tomb in Crondall Church, Hampshire. The Achievement on this Garter Plate, incorrectly marshalled as it appears to be, is the same as that in this Northiam Glass; while No. 3 should evidently be "Barry nebuly or and sable"—for Blount. It will be found more correctly marshalled in Bentley's Excerpta Historica, p. 339.

The Glass in the first window, in both achievements, records the marriage of Sir Thomas Oxenbridge to his second wife Anne d. and coh. of William Blount, son of Walter, first Lord Mountjoy (S.A.C., VII., 27). She afterwards married Sir David Owen, whose tomb is in Easebourne Church (S.A.C., VII., 27). The two shields in the second window are probably those of Henry Stokes (the quarter should, however, be charged with a boar's head) first husband of Anne Oxenbridge, a niece of Sir Goddard Oxenbridge of Brede, whence the glass is supposed to have come (S.A.C., VIII., 218), Horsfield says that it was supposed to have been brought and deposited here from Brede Place, when the Chapel attached to that place was suffered to fall into ruin. It was placed at first in a window over the Frewen pew, and, on the erection of the Frewen mausoleun, was transferred to its present position.

But for No. III. see the Brass of Joyce, Lady Tiptoft, at Enfield, Middlesex. (See Transactions of St. Paul's Ecclesiological Soc., IV., 227.) There seems, here, to have been a desire to emphasise the Royal connection by marshalling the Arms of Holland (which they had assumed from their connection with Edmund Plantagenet of Woodstock by marriage with his daughter Joan, the Fair Maid of Kent (see Archæologia, LXVI., 459) in the 1st quarter, instead of placing them in the 3rd quarter, with Tiptoft in the 1st and 4th, and Charlton in the 2nd as we should have been inclined to expect. (See Collect.) T. & G., VIII., 185.) The same thing has occurred at Chichester where the first three Grand Quarters of the "Browne" achievement are as here (see S.A.C., XLVIII., 142). There is in the Lewes Probate Registry a Sequestration of the living of Rotherfield 'on the death of the last rector,' the date of which is 6th March, 1591–2."

The date of the inscription as recorded by Burrell is therefore incorrect.

,, 162 ,, 6. This is Bowyer, because Sir George Rivers of Chafford in Penshurst married Frances d. and coh. of William Bowyer—Hasted (folio) I., 418.

,, 178. Iron Slab, No. 3. In my Dacre MS. is a note of a coat of arms for Whitton of Lamberhurst. "Argent on a chevron sable five plates, a bordure engrailed sable; in chief a mullet for difference."
