## Editorial

THE present part of the Journal is issued in accordance with a resolution passed by the Council in 1892. It was represented that the interests of Archæology in general, and of the Chester Society in particular, would be better promoted if the Journal were issued at more frequent and regular intervals, and the resolution was passed that the Journal should be published (as in the early days of the Society), in parts, three or more of which might be bound into a volume.

It is hoped that an improvement will be made on the method of issue in the Old Series, and that it may be possible to print two parts in the year, which would thus contain the papers read up to the date of publication. Covers in the same style as those of previous volumes will be supplied to those who wish to keep their copies of the Journal in uniform dress.

It is also proposed to illustrate the papers more fully, and to present the Members from time to time with drawings of the many valuable and interesting objects of antiquity deposited in the Museum. Even the most imperfect drawing conveys a much better idea than pages of description. To do this effectively involves expense, and the small subscription of half-a-guinea appears quite inadequate for the carrying out of these plans. The Editor would venture to invite the Members to contribute to an "Illustration Fund," such as is formed in other Societies. Of this, due acknowledgment would be made in the pages of the Journal, which, by such help, might take its proper place among the archæological publications of the day.

The Editor would also ask that notices should be sent to him of any matters bearing on archæological subjects which might prove of interest to the Members.
