# **RECORDS OF 'AUREI' FROM CHESTER**

In 1886, W. Thompson Watkin published his pioneering volume *Roman Cheshire*, which summed up the archaeological and literary evidence for the occupation of the county. Among the records of coin finds are descriptions of some ten gold coins and notices of others now lost. Since then further examples have come to light. The updated catalogue below lists all these pieces in chronological sequence, identified according to *The Roman Imperial Coinage*, vols. I-IX, 1923-81, abbreviated here as *RIC*.

The most striking aspect of the list is the number of early pieces and the duplication of two types, one of Nero, the other of Titus, during the reign of Vespasian. Although this does appear to be coincidental, it is possible that in the latter case, as in the bronze and silver series from Chester, they represent parts of consignments of pay sent to the legion in the area. The concentration of coins dating from the late 70s could be connected with the increase of activity in Chester when the fortress was put on a permanent basis. It is likely, however, that some pieces may have been kept as savings for a time before they were lost and this may account for the general good condition of those coins still in existence. It is to be regretted that most of the coins listed below are lost or inaccessible and that only one has been found during archaeological excavation (*cf.* catalogue no. 17).

A MS. note by Professor Robert Newstead describes the circumstances under which this hitherto unpublished coin was acquired:

'I have this 9th. day of September 1913 purchased a gold coin from Mr. H. Stuart Page of 123 Bridge St., Warrington for the sum of £5-5-0. The coin in question was found at or near the canal side (Queen St.) Chester, about two months since. It was brought to my brother Mr. Alfred Newstead, Curator of the Grosvenor Museum, by the man who found it while excavating for a drain or sewer at the place indicated above almost immediately after it was found, and offered for the sum of twenty five shillings. Subsequent enquiries failed to trace either the man or the coin, but my brother saw the coin a few days ago when it was in the possession of Mr. Page from who I purchased it. On Sept. 1st. Mr. Page (see letter attached herewith) offered the coin for the sum of five guineas. I saw the letter today (Sept. 9th 1913) and immediately wired accepting the offer. I received a wire in reply (attached herewith) stating that I could have the coin today. Immediately proceeded to Warrington and secured it for the sum stated' [A sketch and description of the coin is given here] 'I can add nothing more regarding the coin but will endeavour to interview the man who found it.

Robt. Newstead Sept. 9th 1913'

'The coin was presented to the Chester Archaeological Society shortly after I had purchased it. It is now the property of the City and is exhibited in the Grosvenor Museum. Robt. Newstead Decr. 29th 1939'

The coin does not appear to have been accessioned and has been on display in the Newstead Gallery of the Museum since October 1953. Curiously enough, it is not listed by J.T. Davies, 1922, in the first full catalogue of the Roman coin collections.

It is curious that although nos. 14 and 15 were offered for sale in 1881, Thompson Watkin does not include them among the other finds of gold coins from Chester or elsewhere in the county. This may be a genuine oversight, despite his assiduity in recording finds large and small in public and private collections and in extracting information from published and manuscript sources (*cf. Roman Cheshire*, 1974 reprint, introduction, pp.v-vi). There is also a slight suspicion that he might not have given credence to the attributed provenance. The coins are included in this catalogue for the sake of completeness.
