Summary

This desk based assessment and walkover report has been drawn up by APAC Ltd in support of a forthcoming planning application at Ludford Mill, Ludford, Shropshire. The application concerns the proposed erection of a garage and workshop structure to the rear of Ludford Mill, a grade II listed building.

Ludford Mill is a largely 17th century structure which incorporates both medieval and 18th and 19th century aspects. It is constructed on the site of two 14th century Fulling mills.

The area of proposed development is located within the curtilage of the grade II listed mill building and is within the Ludlow Conservation area.

The desk based assessment is being undertaken prior to the submission of a planning application in order to provide Shropshire County Council with further information on the likely impact of the development proposals.




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1 Introduction

- 1.1 This report has been prepared by C E Smith, APAC Ltd, and forms the results of an archaeological desk based assessment and site walkover undertaken to support submission of a planning application for the erection of a garage and workshop to the south of Ludford Mill, Ludford, Shropshire (Hereafter; the assessment area).
- 1.2 The assessment area is centred on NGR SO 351407 274173 (Fig 1). This desk based assessment has been undertaken in accordance with a Specification (APAC Doc No. 409) drawn up by C E Smith, and submitted to Shropshire County Council's Historic Environment Team (Hereafter; SCC-HET).
- 1.3 The desk based assessment was carried out in order that the impact of the proposed development can be properly assessed prior to submission of the planning application. The OASIS project number for this desk based assessment is apacltd1-325288.

2 Site Location, Description & Development Proposals

- 2.1 The assessment area is located to the rear of Ludford Mill, Ludford, on the south bank of the river Teme, Shropshire (Fig 2). The larger and immediately adjacent town of Ludlow is situated on the north bank of the river Teme.
- 2.2 The development proposals are for the erection of a three bay, two car garage and workshop to the south of the Ludford Mill building. The area is currently in use as domestic parking and garden features (Fig 3).

3 Geology and Topography

- 3.1 The underlying solid geology of the assessment area is composed of limestone in the Ludlow series from the Silurian era (British Geological Survey, 2017).
- 3.2 The subsoils covering the assessment area are described as freely draining, loamy, floodplain soils with shallow groundwater tables (Soilscapes, 2017).

4 Brief archaeological and historical background

- 4.1 Ludford is first mentioned in the Domesday book of 1086 where it is recorded as a Manor. Ludlow is notably absent from the Domesday book showing that the settlement at Ludford thus predated that at Ludlow. Ludford is an ancient nucleated settlement but proximity to Ludlow has made it effectively the town's oldest suburb. John Leland described it as 'Luddeford Suburbe' when he passed through on his way to Ludlow in 1540 (Lloyd & Klein, 1984)
- 4.2 The name Ludford is likely derived from the ford on the river Teme located at this point, likely just to the east of Ludford Mill itself. The ford is located along a fossilised routeway at the southern end of the line formed by Corve Street and Old Street. It has been suggested that two prehistoric routeways met at Corve Bridge, comprising the east-west "Clun-Clee ridgeway" and the aforementioned north-south route reflected by the line of Corve Street and Old Street (Lloyd & Klein, 1984). Watson (1988) also postulated that this north-south route may have been followed by a Roman road. Wright, in his 1852 work, alludes to the presence of a mill at Ludford being mentioned in the Domesday book, thus a Saxon origin for the site is possible.
- 4.3 There is little evidence for early occupation on the site of Ludlow. The placename and medieval documentary evidence suggests the existence of a bronze age barrow on the site of the church (Gelling, 1990), and there is an important Bronze Age cemetery at Bromfield, a few miles north of the town. A number of flint flakes and a Neolithic stone axe fragment have been recovered from the general area of the town.
- 4.4 Medieval Ludlow had over 500 burgage plots, which were clustered around the large spaces occupied by the castle and the parish church. The sequence of planning phases responsible for the medieval development of Ludlow, whilst a matter of speculation, clearly includes the burgaging of areas outside of the town walls (Such as along Old Street). In 1377 Ludlow had a tax paying population of 1172 and ranked as the 33rd largest provincial town in England.
- 4.5 In October 1459 the area immediately to the south of Ludford Mill saw the armies of the houses of York and



Lancaster fighting each other in the Battle of Ludford Bridge. The Yorkists, having occupied the town of Ludlow, dug in defensive positions on the south side of river Teme but were routed by the Lancastrian army (Hodges, 1989).

- 4.6 Ludford, despite being located essentially on the outskirts of Ludlow but separated by the natural geographic boundary formed by the river Teme, was a Parish in its own right. The Parish church, that of St Giles located to the immediate south-west of Ludford Mill, has Norman origins. It served the adjacent hospital; which was founded after 1216. Whilst the west window and chancel are 14th century in date, and the large chapel on the north side is 16th century, there are numerous features dating from an 1866 rebuild (Salter, 1988).
- 4.7 For centuries the Teme and the Corve provided the water power to turn the waterwheels for Ludlow's fulling and corn mills. The present weirs are probably those noted by Stukeley in the 1720s and may be on sites dating back to medieval times. The Mills were a constant source of dispute and anyone from the town caught using those on the Herefordshire bank could be fined (Morris & Hoverd, 1993).
- 4.8 Ludford Mill (and associated mill weir) is a grade II listed building (LB No. 1202857) located on the south bank of the river Teme within the Civil Parish of Ludford. Ownership of the mill can be traced back through deeds to c.1715 though milling on the site clearly predates this early 18th century date. Whilst the weir, extending in an arc across the Teme, is likely to be of medieval origin the current Ludford Mill structure is largely 17th to 19th century in date. A mill is documented in Ludford in the 14th century with two fulling mills, operating in 1349 and 1350, noted as being given to the Palmer's Guild after the Black Death (Lloyd, 1999). Documentary sources show that the current mill on the site was constructed as a paper mill before; like most Shropshire paper mill sites being converted for another use.
- 4.9 With the exception of Ludford, no significant buildings related to paper milling survive as extant structures in Shropshire. Paper was made from rags pulped by water-powered machinery. A 'vatman' would dip into the pulp a wire sieve called a mould, shake off surplus liquid, and turn out what remained onto a felt. Felts and papers were stacked by a 'coucher' and put beneath a screw press. The resulting sheets were then dried. Pure water was essential, and an advertisement for the Ludford Mill in 1816 drew attention both to the constant supply of water for power afforded by the river Teme, and to the never failing spring which provided water for processes (Trinder, 1996).
- 4.10 A series of dendrochronology dates from within the mill, taken in 2016 by Tree-Ring services (ESA8587), show that within the largely 17th to 19th century structure extant on the site today, several earlier timbers with a date range spanning AD1367 to AD1530. These earlier timbers would indicate a potentially medieval origin to the structure itself. After 1868 Ludford Mill was used in the production of corn which would have necessitated structural change to the site
- 4.11 Watching briefs have been undertaken at the mill site during recent developments. A watching brief by Shropshire Council's Archaeology Service (Hannaford, 2012 ESA6729) was undertaken during the excavation of a trench for a new foundation. Shallow deposits containing 19th century material were evident located directly above the natural bedrock.
- 4.12 In 2016 a further watching brief (ESA7901) was undertaken by Cursus Archaeology in relation to the installation of a hydro-energy scheme. The watching brief recorded features which were dated to pre-AD1541 by dendrochronology. These appeared to relate to a previous phase of mill construction, probably when it functioned as a paper mill, possibly representing the structure for a water wheel or a sluice gate. Alternatively it may relate to a separate structure, possibly a medieval mill on the site that may not have been incorporated into the present mill's construction in the early 18th century (Children, 2016).

5 Scope, Aims and Objectives

5.1 The scope and objectives of the desk based assessment included all aspects of the proposed development, including its setting, and followed the guidelines as set out in the Chartered Institute for Archaeologists Standard and Guidance for a desk-based assessment (2014):

Standard

Desk-based assessment will determine, as far as is reasonably possible from existing records, the nature, extent and significance of the historic environment within a specified area. Desk-based assessment will be undertaken using appropriate methods and practices which satisfy the stated aims of the project, and which comply with the Code of conduct and other relevant regulations of



CIfA. In a development context desk-based assessment will establish the impact of the proposed development on the significance of the historic environment (or will identify the need for further evaluation to do so), and will enable reasoned proposals and decisions to be made whether to mitigate, offset or accept without further intervention that impact.

Guidance

Desk-based assessment is a programme of study of the historic environment within a specified area or site on land, the inter-tidal zone or underwater that addresses agreed research and/or conservation objectives. It consists of an analysis of existing written, graphic, photographic and electronic information in order to identify the likely heritage assets, their interests and significance and the character of the study area, including appropriate consideration of the settings of heritage assets and, in England, the nature, extent and quality of the known or potential archaeological, historic, architectural and artistic interest. Significance is to be judged in a local, regional, national or international context as appropriate.

Purpose and context

The purpose of a desk-based assessment is to gain an understanding of the historic environment resource in order to formulate as required

- 1. an assessment of the potential for heritage assets to survive within the area of study
- 2. an assessment of the significance of the known or predicted heritage assets considering their archaeological, historic, architectural and artistic interests
- 3. strategies for further evaluation whether or not intrusive, where the nature, extent or significance of the resource is not sufficiently well defined
- 4. an assessment of the impact of proposed development or other land use changes on the significance of the heritage assets and their settings
- 5. strategies to conserve the significance of heritage assets, and their settings
- 6. design strategies to ensure new development makes a positive contribution to the character and local distinctiveness of the historic environment and local place-shaping
- 7. proposals for further archaeological investigation within a programme of research, whether undertaken in response to a threat or not.
- 5.2 After consultation with SCC-HET, the extent of the search area included within the desk based assessment is a 200m radius from the site of the proposed structure.

6 Methodology

Desk Based Assessment

6.1 The following repositories were consulted for information pertaining to the assessment area as part of the desk based assessment:

Shropshire Archives, Shrewsbury

Online mapping sources

Cambridge University Collection of Aerial Photographs (CUCAP)

Regional Historic Environment Record, Shrewsbury

Heritage Gateway sources

Relevant published and unpublished sources including books, journal articles and grey literature

6.2 The impact of the development proposal on the setting of statutorily protected cultural heritage monuments, landscapes, and areas is assessed through a basic visual impact study incorporating all monuments/landscapes/areas within 200m of the assessment area boundary. Where statutorily protected cultural heritage assets were shown to have a clear line of sight to the assessment area, and thus the potential for a resulting impact on setting, guidelines from the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges (2009, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage) have been used to assess the likely impact with further reference to the setting guidance provided by Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning, Note 3 – The Setting of Heritage Assets (Historic England, 2017).

Site Walkover

6.3 The site visit was carried out on Monday 13th August 2018. The aims of the visit were to:



- Assess any historic and/or archaeological sites identified during assessment of the documentary and cartographic sources
- Assess the condition of archaeological sites within the proposed development area and the potential impact of development on them
- Assess the potential of the development area to yield new and unrecorded archaeological sites.
- 6.4 High resolution (12+ megapixel) digital photographs were taken where appropriate, and a finds sampling strategy was formulated in case surface finds were encountered during the site visit. Photos were taken and stored in RAW format.
- 6.5 Following the Institute for Archaeologist's *Standards and Guidance for Desk-Based Assessments* (2014), the main objective of the site visit was to gain information about the archaeological resource within the proposed development area in order to make an assessment of its significance in the local, regional and national context. The determination of significance will enable the following to be formulated:
 - A strategy to ensure the recording, preservation or management of the resource during the proposed development
 - A strategy to mitigate against a threat to the archaeological resource should it be considered of sufficient value
 - A proposal for further archaeological investigation within a programme of research associated with the proposed development

Criteria for Assessing Impacts

6.6 The impact was assessed in terms of both the potential physical effect that the development might have on the archaeological resource and the effect on the setting of statutorily protected archaeological sites, including visibility to and from the site. The assessment was carried out following guidelines set out in *Design Manual for Roads and Bridges* (DMRB 2009, Volume 11, Section 3, part 2 HA 20807). The significance level attributed to each impact has been assessed based on the magnitude of change due to the development proposals, and the sensitivity of the affected receptor/receiving environment to change, as well as a number of other factors.

6.7 The magnitude of impacts through development upon heritage features can range from major to neutral. To establish the magnitude of impact table 3 (below) is used.

6.8 The significance of an impact is devised by cross referencing the importance of the receptor with the magnitude of impact, see table 4 (below). This follows the principles set out in the Design Manual for Roads & Bridges, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage (2009).

7 Issues and Constraints

- 7.1 Within the 200m search radius there are a number of statutory designations related to cultural heritage which may affect the proposed development. These include:
 - Scheduled Ancient Monuments (SAMs)
 - Listed Buildings (LBs)
 - Ludlow Conservation Area
- 7.2 In England the statutory consent of Historic England is required before any works are carried out which would have the effect of demolishing, destroying, damaging, removing, repairing, altering, adding to, flooding or covering up a Scheduled Ancient Monument (SAM). In addition, impacts of development works upon the setting of a SAM form an important consideration in the granting or refusal of planning consent to conduct development works.
- 7.3 There are no SAM sites within the area of proposed development. There is one SAM site (Ludford Bridge) within the 200m search radius and one immediately outside of this area (Ludlow Town Walls)
- 7.4 Other known sites of archaeological or historic significance are listed on county-based Historic Environment Records, following the 1990 Town and Country Planning Act. There are 31 sites listed on the HER for the study area (200m radius) not including those listed elsewhere. Those listed elsewhere includes LBs and SAMs and takes the total to 56 sites within a 200m radius. A total of 13 archaeological events are recorded within the HER as being within the 200m search area.
- 7.5 Two sites recorded in the HER are shown as being located within or immediately adjacent to the assessment area itself, PRNs 10942 & 06182, both of which relate to the Ludford Mill and horseshoe weir structures.
- 7.6 Three archaeological events are recorded in the HER as having taken place within or immediately adjacent to the assessment area. These relate to the watching briefs and dendrochronology surveys mentioned in paras 4.10 to 4.12.
- 7.7 Under the Planning Act 1990 (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) and the Historic Buildings and Ancient Monuments Act of 1953, listed buildings are categorised as Grades I, II* and II in decreasing order of special architectural and historic importance. These buildings are of acknowledged importance to the nation's built heritage. Section 66 of the Planning Act 1990 (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) requires planning decision makers to have special regard to the desirability of preserving listed buildings and their settings.
- 7.8 There are 25 Listed Buildings within the 200m assessment area, including the aforementioned Ludford bridge (also a SAM) and the Ludford Mill itself. Of these 25, a total of 20 are grade II listed, 4 are grade II* and 1 is grade I listed. The assessment area itself falls within the curtilage of Ludford Mill, a grade II listed building.
- 7.9 Conservation Areas may be designated under the Planning Act 1990 (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas). Section 72 of the 1990 Act requires decision-makers on applications for planning consents to pay special attention to the desirability of preserving or enhancing the character or appearance of the area. As a matter of policy, planning decision-makers must take into account the potential effects of development on the setting of Conservation Areas.
- 7.10 The area of proposed development lies within the southern part of the Ludlow conservation area.
- 7.11 The setting of statutorily protected cultural heritage assets is dealt with by Historic England's (2017) 'The Setting of Heritage Assets' and includes guidance on how assessment of impact on setting should be considered. It states that:

'Setting is the surroundings in which an asset is experienced, and may therefore be more extensive than its curtilage. All heritage assets have a setting, irrespective of the form in which they survive and whether they are designated or not... Heritage assets that comprise only buried remains may not be readily appreciated by a casual observer. They nonetheless retain a presence in the landscape and, like other heritage assets, may have a setting'

7.12 Archaeological remains are viewed as a finite and non-renewable resource which in many cases are highly fragile and vulnerable to damage and destruction. National Planning Policy Framework (2018), Chapter 16, para 184: Conserving and Enhancing the Historic Environment states that:

'Heritage assets range from sites and buildings of local historic value to those of the highest significance, such as World Heritage Sites which are internationally recognised to be of Outstanding Universal Value61. These assets are an irreplaceable resource, and should be conserved in a manner appropriate to their significance, so that they can be enjoyed for their contribution to the quality of life of existing and future generations'

8 Desk Based Assessment Results

HER Core Data

- 8.1 A total of 56 sites are recorded within the regional HER as being located within the 200m search area (Fig 4, Appendix 1) around the site, two of which are shown as being located immediately adjacent to the area of proposed development. As previously mentioned, these two sites (PRNs 10942 & 06182) both relate to the Ludford Mill and the Horseshoe weir structure. As both are also listed buildings they are assessed in section 10 below.
- 8.2 Full details of all HER sites located within the 200m search radius are shown in Appendix 1.

HER Core Data Summary

8.3 Of the 56 sites listed by the HER as being located within the 200m search area, a total of 25 relate to listed buildings and SAM sites. Of the remaining 31 sites none will be impacted (either physically or by an alteration to their setting) by the development proposals.

HER Event Data

- 8.4 The regional HER shows a total of 13 events having taken place within the 250m search area (Fig 5, Appendix 2). Those events shown as having taken place immediately adjacent to the area of proposed development include the watching briefs and dendrochronology dating undertaken on the Ludford Mill site.
- 8.5 Full details of all HER events located within the 200m search radius are shown in Appendix 2.

HER Event Data Summary

8.6 Although several archaeological events have taken place within the 200m search area, as well as those listed above having taken place adjacent to the area of proposed development, no events have taken place within the site. Whilst several studies of the area that have been undertaken are of use as background information, none have focused solely on the area of proposed development.

SAM Data

- 8.9 Only one SAM site, Ludford Bridge, is located within 200m of the assessment area with a second SAM site, Ludlow Medieval Town Walls, located immediately beyond the search area (Fig 6). The course of the Town Walls scheduled ancient monument is included within the assessment owing to the statutorily protected status of SAM sites and to ensure that no impact is likely immediately beyond the arbitrary 200m search radius.
- 8.10 Ludford Bridge Bridge over River Teme. C15, restored 1886. Dressed stone with rubble superstructure and ashlar coping. Three arches with broad ribs; deep cut-waters with chamfered bands, and large refuges over; stone band to east side. C20 alterations to north end (Historic England, 2018).



8.11 Ludlow Town Walls - The medieval town wall, ditch and gates of Ludlow, which were built between 1233 and c1304, thus postdating the laying out of the planned medieval town itself. The remains are fragmentary, but the course of the defences remains visible. Murage grants for the upkeep of walls were documented in 1294 and 1309. The town ditch was in existence in 1691 when there was still a drawbridge over it at Broad Gate. However, there was a cottage in the ditch. The town defences follow the same alignments as property boundaries and clearly post-date the layout of the properties. The town defences were owned by the Corporation from 1461 and by the 16th century the ditch was leased for limepits, gardens and small houses. Construction of the town defences began in 1233 and continued until 1304. The wall was fronted by a ditch, now largely infilled. The ditch is now marked by curving property boundaries. The height and thickness of Ludlow's town walls was not comparable to other fortified towns such as Shrewsbury. They appear to have acted more as features controlling access into the town than real defensive structures. The construction is usually of rubble sandstone rather than ashlar as is generally seen elsewhere. A recording exercise on the rear boundary wall of the old Museum Stores in Old Street established that the lower part of the wall could be part of the medieval town wall, though it could also be a post medieval rebuild on the same line (Shropshire HER). The first murage grant was received in 1233. The fourteenth-century building accounts suggest that although murage was being levied, it was not spent on the walls (Turner, 1970).

SAM Data Summary

8.12 Two SAM sites are included within this desk based assessment though neither are located within, or close to, the area of proposed development. Notably, neither SAM has a line of sight to the area of proposed development or is visible from it. Full information on the two SAM sites is contained within Appendix 1.

LB Data

- 8.13 A total of 25 listed buildings are located within the 200m search area. The majority of these, including the Ludford Mill itself, are grade II listed. The distribution of the listed buildings is shown on fig 7.
- 8.14 Full information on all of the listed buildings located within the 200m search area is shown in Appendix 1.
- 8.15 Ten of the listed buildings which form their own discrete group are street frontage properties on Lower Broad Street. A further group can be defined as those five listed buildings along the course of the Teme. This includes the Ludford Bridge, Ludford Mill itself and the Horseshoe Weir immediately adjacent. The remaining listed buildings are distributed to the south west of the assessment area throughout the village of Ludford.
- 8.16 The two listed buildings located adjacent to the area of proposed development are:

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Listing No. 1202857 (EH Legacy ID - 389681) – Ludford Mill Listing No. 1241119 (EH Legacy ID - 440047) – Horseshoe Weir
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LB Data Summary

8.17 Of the two listed buildings located closest to the site, one is the Ludford Mill itself; the area of proposed development being situated within its curtilage. The assessment area will be at least partly visible from the Horseshoe Weir though this is partly tree screened.

Conservation Area

8.18 Although located well to the south of Ludlow itself, The area of proposed development is located within the southern section of the Ludlow conservation area.

Historic Map Regression

- 8.19 **1832** King William IV Map of Borough of Ludlow (Fig 8) The map clearly shows the area of proposed development to the south of the Ludford Mill structure. No features occupy the area of proposed development. The slope from surrounding higher ground down to the mill site is shown by hachured area. The footprint of the mill structure is shown as 'L' shaped but also with a further projection southwards over what is now the mills private driveway.
- 8.21 **1835 Plan of Ludlow, Shropshire** (Fig 9) The map shows the area of proposed development in clearer detail than the earlier 1832 map. As the assessment area forms the very southern area covered by the 1835 Plan of Ludlow, only the mill structure itself is depicted with the rest of the area being shown as blank. Notably the mill is

shown as 'L' shaped with no southern projection similar to that depicted on the earlier map.

- 8.22 **1847** Ludford Parish Tithe Map (Fig 10) The 1847 Ludford Parish Tithe map shows the assessment area in clear detail. No features are shown within the area of proposed development.
- 8.24 **1885 1:500 Ludlow Town Plan (Partial)** (Fig 11) Although only partial owing to half of the assessment area falling outside of the area mapped by the Ludlow Town Plan, the 1885 map shows the site in the clearest detail so far. The mill is shown as clearly 'L' shaped in plan though unfortunately the area of proposed development is not depicted.
- 8.26 **1887** 1st Ed 6 Inch OS (Fig 12) Owing to the comparatively small scale at which the 6 inch OS maps were drawn up, whilst the site is depicted it is not as clear as previously shown. The mill is marked and is shown as a corn mill by this time. No features are marked within the area of proposed development.
- 8.27 **1903** 2nd Ed 6 Inch OS (Fig 13) The 1903 map shows largely the same detail and at the same scale as the earlier 6 inch OS map. Again, no features are marked within the area of proposed development.
- 8.28 **1928** 3rd Ed 6 Inch OS (Fig 14) The 1928 map also shows the same detail as the two earlier 6 inch OS maps. The mill is now marked as disused. No features are again shown as being located within the footprint of the proposed development.
- 8.29 **1945** 4th New Popular Ed OS (Fig 15) The 1945 New Popular Edition is a comparatively small scale map though again no features are depicted as being within the area of proposed development at this time.

Historic Map Regression Summary

8.30 The eight historic maps consulted as part of the desk based assessment, covering the 113 years between 1832 and 1945, show considerably little change within the assessment area and more specifically the area of proposed development. Certainly no structures or other features have been depicted in the area on any of the historic maps consulted.

Aerial Photographs

8.33 A search of the aerial photographs held by the Cambridge University Collection of Aerial Photographs

(CUCAP) has shown none are available which are relevant to the site. Given the extensive cartographic sources for the period it is not felt that further aerial photograph repositories are likely to hold relevant information.

9 Site Walkover Results

- 9.1 The site walkover was undertaken in dry and bright conditions (Plates 1-10). Access to the site was gained through a gate at the top of the private driveway adjacent to the Bell House.
- 9.2 The area of proposed development was found to be in use as a car parking area to the rear of the mill site. A tarmac surface forms the upper horizon with several services evident within the area, including large new installations by Severn-Trent.
- 9.3 The footprint of the proposed new development will be set back into the high sloping ground to the south of the mill. This area is currently retained by rubble-stone filled metal gabions.
- 9.4 An all-round vista from the site shows that it is not overlooked from any viewpoint. Some properties on Temeside have a partially tree screened view into the area albeit from across the river.

Site Walkover Summary

- 9.5 The site walkover has served to indicate the extent to which the area is hidden from general view. Similarly it has shown that the development footprint appears to be located in an area which has been truncated by services in the recent past.
- 9.6 Assessment of the degree of survival of any immediate sub-surface deposits was impeded by the tarmac surface. Given the prevalence of very shallow bedrock on the site; as observed during previous archaeological

mitigation, it is likely that similarly shallow deposits exist in this area.

10 Impact Assessment

Assessment of Physical Impacts – SAM Sites

10.1 As there are no SAM sites within the area of proposed development there will be NO direct physical impacts.

<u>Assessment of Impact on Setting – SAM Sites</u>

- 10.2 The assessment of the impact on setting of the two SAM sites followed Historic England's (2017) Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 Setting of Heritage Assets.
- 10.3 SAMs SA73 and SA147 relate to Ludford Bridge and Ludlow Town Walls respectively.
- 10.4 The only tangible relationship between the Ludford Bridge (SA73) and Ludford Mill is that they are located comparatively close together and both include the Teme in their architecture/design. Whilst Ludford Mill is partly visible from the bridge, the area of proposed development lies to the rear of the Mill and is entirely obscured from view.
- 10.5 No relationship is evident between the Ludford Mill and the Ludlow Town Walls (SA147) and no line of sight exists from one to the other.
- 10.6 Neither of the SAM sites included within the assessment, SA73 and SA147, have any line of sight to or from the area of proposed development. Thus there will be no impact on the setting of any SAM site as a result of the proposed development. See table 5 below:

10.7 Owing to the magnitude and significance of impact being quantified as neutral using the principles outlined in the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage (2009), it is not felt that any mitigation measures, such as screening, relocation or modification to the development proposals; as suggested in Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 - Setting of Heritage Assets (Historic England 2017), are required in order to lessen the impact on the two SAMs.

<u>Assessment of Physical Impacts – LB Sites</u>

- 10.8 As the area of proposed development lies within the curtilage of the grade II listed building, Ludford Mill (Listing No. 1202857), there is the potential for a physical impact. However, the footprint of the new structure is distinctly separate from that of Ludford Mill itself so there will be no change to, or impact on, structural fabric.
- 10.9 The area of proposed development is currently in use as residential car parking for the mill and is made up of a tarmac surface adjacent to rubble-stone filled metal gabions. The area below ground has previously been disturbed by drains/services to the mill (evident within tarmac surface) as well as by the installation of Severn-Trent services associated with the recent hydro-power infrastructure.
- 10.10 Assessment of the physical impact of the development proposals will depend on the manner and depth of foundations to be used as well as the amount of surviving deposits still *in situ* within the developments footprint. In previous areas subject to watching brief at Ludford Mill, the natural bedrock is located at very shallow depths, this is also likely to be the case in the area of proposed development. However, should any geotechnical investigation be undertaken as part of the development proposals, the depth of undisturbed material present should be taken into account when consideration is given to any further archaeological mitigation.
- 10.11 No other listed building will be affected by any form of physical impact as a result of the development proposals.



Assessment of Impact on Setting – LB Sites

10.12 The assessment of the impact on setting of the LB sites followed Historic England's (2017) Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 - Setting of Heritage Assets.

10.13 Following the site walkover, Table 6 (below) was drawn up detailing all of the 24 listed buildings within the 200m search area and showing their view to and from the area of proposed development. Owing to the very low height of the proposed development no ZTV map was deemed necessary.

10.14 Table 6 shows that, of the 25 listed buildings located within the 200m search area, only two (LBs 1202857 & 1241119) are visible both to and from the area of proposed development. Following the principles outlined in the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage (2009), the resulting magnitude and significance of impact on the other 23 listed buildings would thus be <u>Neutral</u> and <u>Neutral</u>.

10.15 Although Ludford Mill and the adjacent Horseshoe Weir are intricately linked, it is not felt that the development proposals will detract from or negatively impact our understanding of the setting of these two structures. As their setting is linked by the course of the Teme, it is not felt that a partially screened and discrete structure set back from the mill will have a negative impact.

10.16 It is also worth noting that, to a certain extent, a precedent for modern development in the mill area has already been set with the installation of the comparatively unsympathetic hydro energy infrastructure.

10.17 Table 7, below, shows the assessment of the development proposals likely impact on the setting of Ludford Mill and the Horseshoe Weir according to the principles outlined in the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage (2009).

- 10.18 Owing to the magnitude and significance of impact being quantified as minor using the principles outlined in the Design Manual for Roads & Bridges, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage (2009), it is not felt that any mitigation measures, such as screening, relocation or modification to the development proposals, as suggested in Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 Setting of Heritage Assets (Historic England, 2017), are required in order to lessen any potential impact.
- 10.19 Whilst the option of tree screening along the edge of Teme exists, thus separating the proposed new development from the view of the mill and the weir, it is felt that this would have a negative impact on both the appearance of the conservation area and the setting of both listed buildings.
- 10.20 Having assessed the impact of the proposed development on the settings of LBs 1202857 and 1241119, with reference to Historic Environment Good Practice Advice in Planning Note 3 Setting of Heritage Assets (Historic England, 2017), the impact of the proposed development on the setting of the mill is deemed likely to be borderline between moderate and minor and minor as regards the weir. The impact on their value as a group setting is not likely to be effected owing to limited visibility of the area of proposed development from the Horseshoe Weir.

Assessment of Impact on Ludlow Conservation Area

- 10.21 The area of proposed development is located within the Ludlow conservation area and thus any development will have a visible impact, albeit limited. However, the area of proposed development has been shown by the site walkover to have extremely limited visibility from anywhere outside of the bounds of the Ludford Mill property. The site is not overlooked from anywhere and the design proposals put forward by the architect show a comparatively low profile design (Fig 3). As the proposed development will be largely obscured from view it is felt that it will have a negligible if any impact on the appearance of the Ludlow conservation area.
- 10.22 Again however, it can be demonstrated how several late 20th century to more modern structures within the immediate vicinity of the site already detract from the appearance of the Ludlow conservation area as opposed to the proposed development which will be largely obscured from view (Plates 11-14).

11 Discussions & Conclusions

- 11.1 The desk based assessment has shown that, whilst the assessment area of Ludford Mill has a rich archaeological and historic past dating back potentially into the Saxon period, little material of any date is likely to have survived within the footprint of the proposed development.
- 11.2 This is owing to the area having been disturbed by the installation of services, some very recent, and the sloping ground to the south having been retained by stone filled gabions.
- 11.3 Further, it is likely that the bedrock in the area of proposed development is very shallow. As mentioned previously, should any geotechnical investigation be carried out this data (depth of soil cover) should be made available when any further archaeological mitigation is considered.
- 11.4 The map regression analysis has shown that, for at least the last 113 years, the area of proposed development has remained undeveloped.
- 11.5 No SAM sites will receive any impact, either physically or to their setting, as a result of the development proposals.
- 11.6 Of the 25 listed buildings within the 200m search radius, only two have a partial or full view of the development. These are the Horseshoe Weir (partial) and the Ludford Mill itself (full). Neither will receive a physical impact as a result of the development, although the proposal does lie within curtilage of the Ludford Mill. As outlined above, physical impacts here will not be to the structural fabric of the mill.
- 11.7 The significance of impact on the setting of the mill and the Horseshoe Weir, after following the principles outlined in the Design Manual for Roads and Bridges, Volume II, Section 3, Part 2, Cultural Heritage (2009) are deemed likely to be Minor (See table 7). The effect on the value of their group setting is unlikely to be affected.



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


Fig 1: Map showing general location of assessment area




Fig 6: GIS plan showing location of SAM sites (blue) within 200m radius of assessment area (red)




Fig 10: Transcribed 1847 Ludford Parish Tithe map showing assessment area (red)







Fig 11: Partial 1885 1:500 Ludlow Town Plan showing western side of assessment area (red)






Fig 12: 1887 1st Edition 6 Inch OS map showing assessment area (red)






Fig 13: 1903 2nd Edition 6 Inch OS map showing assessment area (red)




Fig 14: 1928 3rd Edition 6 Inch OS map showing assessment area (red)




Fig 15: 1945 New Popular Edition 6 Inch OS map showing assessment area (red)



By end of C13 much property in and around Ludlow and in Rock, Corfham, Overton and Ludford-manor of the latter held after c 1330. estates much the same as earlier, including over 40 burgages in Ludlow itself. ->

-> Buildings: Chapel extant by 1241, bells mentioned in 1311. Graveyard mentioned 1418. St John's House beside Ludford bridge incorporates part of C13 building forming the SW part of the hospital complex-SA 11280. A sketch of c 1577 shows the chapel [<3>]. Other buildings may have survived in range of tenements extending N up Lower Broad St, rebuilt c 1770 <2>

The Hospital of St John lay within an enclosure, limits of which are defined by documentary research; current plots of 29 to 33 Lower Broad Street (inclusive) occupy medieval enclosure. The Hospital of St John the Baptist was founded in the early 13th century by Peter Undergood. The Hospital owned a number of burgages in Broad Street by the 15th century. The hospital became a private house of the Fox family in the mid 16th century <5>

The patronage of the Hospital was held by the Lacys and subsequently the Mortimers. By the early 15th century, the Hospital became a college of priests who served in the chantries of the Mortimer chapels in Ludlow Castle. A fire destroyed stores and cups in 1515. In 1547 the Hospital's estates were granted to the Earl of Warwick <6>

Full dedication in 1233 was to the Holy Trinity, the Blessed Mary and St John the Baptist, although usually only referred to by last name. It owned land in Ludford and Ludlow, and estates in Herefordshire and Shropshire. The Hospital had a church by 1241. It was closed in 1538. The priors are documented <7>

Stone from the Hospital was used to repair the wall of Ludlow churchyard in 1636 <8>

The Hospital of the Holy Trinity, the Virgin Mary and St John the Baptist is located to the south of the urban centre of Ludlow, next to a main thoroughfare, Lower Broad Street, and adjacent to the River Teme. Two hundred metres to the south is the site of the Hospital of St Giles. The Hospital was defined for the Central Marches Historic Towns Survey [<9><10>] using modern property boundaries and document based studies. The hospital was established in the early 13th century, but little is known of its internal life. Its original function was to provide relief for the poor and infirm, and its location suggests that it also served as a rest house for travellers. By the early 15th century the hospital seems to have developed into a small college of priests whose principal functions were to serve chantries and obits in the hospital church and in the chapels at Ludlow Castle. Regular life had ceased by 1546, but the chapel was still in use in 1564 and probably 1577. By the end of the 16th century the hospital had largely been demolished. ->

-> All that remains visible of the hospital buildings is an arched wall, considered to be part of the chapel or of a gateway, which has been incorporated into a later building. The western part of the hospital site, along Lower Broad Street, is occupied by houses, mostly built in the late 18th century. All these houses are Listed Buildings, Grade II and Grade II*. At the back of these properties there are mainly light industrial units with a large yard covering much of the eastern half of the site. There is a petrol station to the south. Field inspection confirmed the scoring of the MPP desk based assessment [<4>], in which the site was the highest ranked of the eleven medieval hospitals in Shropshire <11>

The hospital of St Giles was defined provisionally for the Central Marches Historic Towns Survey. The hospital was established in the early 13th century as a leper hospital, but little is known of its internal life. By 1547 the hospital had become an almshouse, and at that time belonged to the Hospital of Holy Trinity, the Virgin Mary and St John the Baptist. Almshouses dating to the 17th century and a large building, known as Ludford House, of 16th and 17th century date and incorporating medieval masonry (Listed Buildings Grade II and II* respectively) appear to occupy much of the site of the hospital. The MPP field inspection confirmed the scoring given in the MPP desk-based assessment, ie overall a low to medium score, but ranked third of the 11 medieval hospitals in Shropshire <9>

The history of the leper hospital is briefly outlined in an assessment of Ludford House which developed on the site [see PRN 10936 and PRN 06313]. The origins of the hospital are unclear, but there is evidence that it was established originally as a leper hospital; it seems to have been in operation by 1267 and was still identified as a leper hospital in 1330 [<1>]. By about 1360 the whole of the manor of Ludford, with much of the land and the mill, had passed into the hands of St John's Hospital, probably including St. Giles. The emphasis at St Giles appears to have shifted in the 14th century from caring for the deceased, to housing the old and infirm in an almshouse (see PRN 10938). ->

-> The almshouse (PRN 10396) and hospital were sold to William Foxe and his eldest son Edmund Foxe following the suppression of Religious Houses in 1536. It has been maintained locally that Ludford House incorporates some medieval material from the hospital but this is difficult to substantiate. <10>

Description

Roman road from Ashton (Hereford and Worcs) to Marshbrook, Shropshire. It appears to be a continuation of Margary's Route 613 (Ariconium to Ashton). Its N end merges with SA 108-Watling St West. Houghton excavated it at SO 446 860 (undated) and in January 1959 at SO444 892 (Marsh Wood, South of Little Stretton). <1><2>

Between SO51507160 and SO51407400 the Roman road may have followed the course of the old Ludlow- Hereford road, which prior to 1832 ran to the east of the present road and adjacent to the river Teme. Its line can still be traced through field boundaries. <3>

The problem with the line of this road in the Wooferton area, SO57SW and SO56NW was considered in the first phase of the evaluation undertaken in late 1993 of the preferred route of the A49 Wooferton By Pass. The suggestion in the SMR record that the pre C19 Ludlow to Leominster/Hereford road represented the line of the Roman Road was considered unlikely, in view of the sinuous course of the post medieval road through relatively easy country. Also picked up from the SMR was an annotation on an engineering plan for the Ludlow Bypass (c 1978). This consisted of a straight linear feature on the supposed line of the Roman Road, which has been labelled Apparent break of slope. This was recorded at the cropmark site of PRN 3431. However, this feature was not apparent on the ground during the 1993 evaluation. The 1993 field walking did, however, find earthwork features at the field centred at SO518 693. Most of these appeared to be the remains of a medieval field system (PRN 4649), but cutting across the eastern corner of the field was a low bank c 100m in length aligned NNW/SSE. This corresponded in position and alignment to the proposed line of PRN 2613, and may represent a short stretch of surviving agger. Alternatively it could be a headland or former hedgebank of a field system. It should also be noted that amongst the cropmarks making up the cropmark PRN 3431 was a straight linear cropmark ditch c 170m long on a NNW/SSE alignment, which would correspond in alignment and approximate position to the proposed line of PRN 2613. It may represent a side ditch of the road. A light scatter of Romano-British and medieval pottery were recorded in this area. though the small quantity was considered more indicative of arable cultivation than settlement. In the evaluation report it was recommended that a watching brief be maintained for the site during the construction of the road. <4>

An archaeological watching brief was carried out in July 2007, during the installation of a new Water Rising Main between Ludlow Sewage works and Orleton/Wooferton Sewage Works. No archaeological features or deposits were recorded at a depth of 0.20m. Evidence for the course of a culverted stream was found, which flowed through the area from north to south. <5>

In 1993 a geophysical gradiometer survey was undertaken on an area proposed for a new bypass route near Woofferton [part of ESA 2632 <4>]. The magnetic results were quiet apart from areas of obvious modern disturbance and a few ephemeral anomalies of uncertain archaeological potential. The survey failed to identify any anomalies associated with the postulated Roman road. <6>

In 1994 an archaeological evaluation, comprising the excavation of two trail trenches (A & B), was carried out in advance of the construction of the Woofferton by pass, [See ESA 2632 <4> & ESA 5069<6>]. Trench A revealed three very shallow linear features, no more than 0.2m deep and aligned north-northwest/south-southeast. 18th-19th century pottery sherds were recovered from the western most linear feature, and all produced very small and much abraded sherds of Romano-British coarseware pottery. The easternmost linear feature corresponded to the long straight linear feature identified on the aerial photography, however no sign of a road, Roman or otherwise, or a roadside drainage ditch were revealed. The trial trenching demonstrated that whilst some of the cropmarks did represent buried archaeological features, these were shallow and were severely truncated. Their remaining fills produce little diagnostic material and such as there was suggested a relatively recent origin. <7>

Evaluated for MPP in 1990-1, Medium score as one of 11 Roman Roads. <8>

A watching brief was undertaken on development at Back Lane, Onibury, in January 2014 in proximity to the putative line of

this Roman road from Ashton (Herefordshire) to Marshbrook (PRN 02613). No significant archaeological features or deposits were recorded during the watching brief. The proposed line of the route here (along Back Lane, running from Onibury to Bromfield) is considered an unlikely alignment, given its sinuous nature. <10>

A desk-based assessment was carried out in 2011 on the proposed site of Ludlow Touring Park, centred on SJ 5128 7213; the putative line of the Roman road from Ashton to Marshbrook was recorded as crossing the east of this site. Research indicated that this route was later used as a medieval road from Ludford south to Ashford. Historic mapping (pre -1815) shows a road running through the application site parallel to, and in close proximity to, the River Teme. Its route is shown as an 'old road' on the tithe map of 1840, replaced in the 1830s by a turnpike, which later became the B4361. ->

-> The assessment recommended that limited investigative work was undertaken along the route of this road. <11>

A programme of archaeological investigation was carried out in 2011 of the Ludlow Touring Park site, further to the deskbased assessment (see <11>). The investigations included a series of trial trenches across the line of the road. Consistent characteristics were recorded across the trenches: the presence of a c.0.1m thick stony deposit loosely set in a silty matrix, laid on a foundation of compacted sandy-clay (where excavated), with ditches to either side of which the western one was larger than the eastern one. The road's dimensions ranged from 2.3 – 5.8m in width, but four of the six sections were between 5.2 and 5.8m wide; plough damage or other disturbance might account for the reduced width in Trenches 3 and 5. The stony deposit was interpreted as road core make-up. The road is depicted on two 19th century maps, indicating an end date for the use of the road in the 1830s, with the construction of the turnpike (now the B4361). The tentative identification of late 17th or early 18th century coins, as well as some 18th century ceramics, found along the road during this investigation would be consistent with its use prior to construction of the turnpike. There is no evidence for a Roman origin, as suggested by Margary for example, based on the surviving physical remains excavated during this investigation, and the stratigraphic relationship of the road constructed over the in-filled water channel in Trench 3 shows that it post-dates the use of this feature. <12>

An assessment of the current evidence for the line of this road was undertaken in 2011, drawing upon the 'work of previous historians, by personal observation and by the identification of Roman-related place names along its length'. <13>

A watching brief was undertaken on the route of the installation of an electric cable as it crossed the postulated line of the Roman Road at SO 4599 8214. No archaeological features or finds were recorded. <14>

A watching brief was carried out in 2012 on the insertion of a new foundation beam in the cellar floor of the mill building. No archaeological features or finds predating the 19th century were recorded. The existing flagstone floor appeared to have been laid probably in the late 19th or even early 20th century, with its bedding laying directly on the natural bedrock. <16>

A watching brief, programme of building recording and dendrochronological survey was carried out in 2015 at Ludford Mill, in connection with the installation of a hydroelectric turbine within the existing mill leat. ->

-> The programme of building recording concentrated on the mill building and the associated weir. After a fire parts of the mill building and the weir itself had been completely reconstructed in 2002 using partly original materials, but with the addition of large amounts of modern concrete and stone. The watching brief recorded features which were dated to pre-1541 AD by dendrochronology. These appeared to relate to a previous phase of mill construction, probably when it functioned as a paper mill, possibly representing the structure for a water wheel or a sluice gate. Alternatively it may relate to a separate structure, possibly a medieval mill on the site that may not have been incorporated into the present mill's construction in the early 18th century (PRN 06182). <17>

Dendrochronological analysis was carried out on 3 timber samples recovered from a watching brief at Ludford Mill [see <17>]. The three sections were

Dendrochronological analysis was carried out on 3 timber samples recovered from a watching brief at Ludford Mill [see <4>]. The three sections were

measured to contain series of 101, 105 and 72 years. A mean series of 164-years was established and dated to span AD 1367 to AD 1530. In the absence of bark a felling-date range was been calculated. The outermost ring of the series is though likely to end at the heartwood/sapwood boundary and therefore it is likely that the tree was felled between AD 1541 and 1571. All three sections are likely to have derived from a single tree which would have been at least 196 years old when felled. In July 2013, a watching brief was carried out by the Archaeology Service, Shropshire Council on the excavation of a foundation trench for a retaining wall, and a small pit for a gas connection at the Horse and Jockey Public House, 113 Old Street, Ludlow. No significant archaeological features or deposits were recorded during the watching brief. <7>

A programme of archaeological evaluation, followed by a watching brief, was undertaken to the rear of Pellow House, Old Street in September to October 2014. This recorded two to three phases of medieval activity, including pits, postholes and the rear boundaries of back plots, associated with pottery dating from the 13th-16th centuries (see PRN 31099). A simple interpretation of the evidence would be that during the period 1200 - 1400 a reasonably substantial earth-fast timber-framed building was erected within the land behind the properties fronting on to Holdgate Fee (Old Street). It is probably unlikely that one of the frontage properties extended so far back, although not impossible considering some of the long, narrow, historic buildings still surviving in Ludlow which show such extensive footprints. Alternatively the building could have been a service unit, a warehouse, stabling, workshop, or similar function. The small pits could derive from domestic waste management activities, a function commonly attributed to pits found to the rear of burgage plots. The pottery found within the in-fill of the features could represent residual material that became incorporated during backfilling, or contemporary material which was thrown away and contributed to the fill of the cut features. <8><9>

Further to the programme of evaluation (<8><9>), an area of 11m x 11m was excavated to the rear of Pellow House in 2015. This identified a number of features consistent with land use to the rear of a burgage plot within a medieval urban context. A possible fenceline, a number of postholes and refuse pits were identified. No further evidence was identified for a timber structure in this area, as had been suggested by the evaluation. 122 sherds of medieval pottery were recovered and subject to specialist analysis. This included a waster, indicating pottery production in the vicinity. Finds of animal bone and a single stone loom weight indicate small scale industrial activity occurring to the rear of the plot, together with waste disposal from the 13th century onwards. <10>

PORTCULLIS LANE: The original line of Portcullis Lane appears to have been as a classic back lane to the burgages on the east side of Corve Street, though it had kinked round an encroachment by the early 19th century. The centre line of the lane formed the parish boundary between the new C11/12 parish of Ludlow and the earlier parish of Stanton Lacy <4>

CORVE STREET: Upper Corve Street, which was originally cigar-shaped, may have functioned as an additional market street, before or in addition to the medieval market place. The first documentary reference comes in 1186. <5>

CORVE STREET: A watching brief was undertaken on the excavation of 3 small trenches in Corve Street, Ludlow, as part of a sewage feasibility study. The town of Ludlow was laid out, probably during the 12th century, in the shadow of the castle (which was then a major fortress on the frontier with Wales). It was a planned town and was probably set out in several phases, the earliest areas perhaps being Old Street and Corve Street. A charter was granted in the 13th century, and an annual fair was being held by 1241. Ludlow was a wool town in the high medieval period, but the trade in cloth gradually became more important. The town gained a new patron in the person of Richard Plantagenet, Duke of York, in the mid 15th century: he granted a new charter in 1449. The town suffered after Richard's defeat at Ludford Bridge in 1459 (during the Wars of the Roses), when it was sacked by the army of Henry VI. However, when Edward IV (Richard's son) took the throne, he granted Ludlow corporate borough status as a reward for its loyalty to York. The seating of the Council of the March of Wales at Ludlow from 1473 onwards benefitted the town economically, especially after it became a body of regional government for Shropshire, Herefordshire and Wales ->

-> The town was garrisoned by the Crown in 1642, on the outbreak of Civil War, because of its strategic location. It was threatened, besieged and taken in 1645-1646, during which period considerable destruction took place in the suburbs mostly perpetrated by the Royalist garrison seeking to clear the way for artillery fire and remove cover. After this the town was slow to rebuild. <3>

Beresford describes Ludlow as a new town founded within the hinterland of the De Lacy castle between 1086 and 1094 (<5>). However, the earliest surviving documentary references to burgages occurs in the late 12th century records and the precise date of the establishment of the town as a borough is unknown (<6>). The town of Ludlow was granted a licence to build urban defences in 1233 and subsequent murage grants were made regularly between 1260 and 1458. <4>

Dendrochronological analysis was carried out on 3 timber samples recovered from a watching brief at Ludford Mill [ESA 7901]. The three sections were

measured to contain series of 101, 105 and 72 years. A mean series of 164-years was established and dated to span AD 1367 to AD 1530. In the absence of bark a felling-date range was been calculated. The outermost ring of the series is though likely to end at the heartwood/sapwood boundary and therefore it is likely that the tree was felled between AD 1541 and 1571. All three sections are likely to have derived from a single tree which would have been at least 196 years old when felled. Strong cross-matches with reference chronologies in the local area suggest that the timber dated came from a local source. <1>
