


Figure 3: The Road from London to St Davids, Pembroke (from Ogilby's Britannia 1675)




Figure 4: Rocque's map of Berkshire (1761)




Figure 5: Davis' map of Oxfordshire (1797)


Figure 7: Tollgate at Goring, Oxfordshire (©Historic England)




Figure 10: 1st Edition OS 6" map, Berkshire XV (©The National Library of Scotland, reproduced by permission)




Figure 14: Map of extension lines into Metroland (published by the Metropolitan Railway in 1924)




Figure 17: A steam road-roller manufactured by Allen and Son, Cowley, Oxfordshire, 1899 (©Historic England)
