ARCHAEOLOGIA AELIANA.

I.—EARLY NEWCASTLE TYPOGRAPHY. 1639-1800.

By RICHARD WELFORD, M.A., a vice-president of the society.

[Read on the 31st October, 1906.]

A short paper on 'Early Printing in Newcastle,' read here forty years ago by Mr. John Hodgson Hinde, appears on pages 225-30 of the sixth volume, 2nd series of the Archaeologia Aeliana. Mr. Hinde limited his observations upon that occasion to the flying visit of the first printer who came hither and to a few of the books printed by his successor. Since then our knowledge of both men has greatly increased, and it has become possible, not only to show who they were and what they did, but to set forth, with more or less biographical detail, the lives and labours of those who came after them.

The first printing press set up in Newcastle owed its introduction, as we all know,¹ to the political exigencies of the monarchy on the eve of the great civil war. Charles I. coming to Newcastle to pacify, or fight, his turbulent subjects across the Border, needed a printer to put into type his orders and proclamations, but no person following that calling could be found between Ouse and Forth.

His majesty arrived at York, March 30, 1639, and holding his Court there, settled the details of the campaign. It was during the consideration of these details that the difficulty about printing arose—a difficulty that could only be solved by recourse to the royal printing house in London. A few days before the court resumed its northward march, namely, on April 20, the earl of

Arundel and Surrey, lord general of the army of the North, wrote to Sir Francis Windebank, Secretary of State, the following letter: $-^2$

Charles left York on April 29, and, after entertainment at Raby castle, arrived in due course at Durham. There he stayed with the bishop, Thomas Morton, who, on Sunday, May 5, preached before him a sermon on the divine right of kings to govern and the solemn duty of subjects to obey.

Meanwhile, travelling with that 'more then ordinary dilligence,' which the condition of the Great North Road permitted, the waggon, bearing its burden of type and press, jolted into York. Finding, however, that King and Court had gone northward, the waggoner resumed his journey, pressing on towards the Tyne. The king arrived in Newcastle on May 8; Barker's press arrived about the same time—perhaps a day or two earlier.

ROBERT BARKER, 1639.

While bishop Morton was delivering his high prerogative discourse at Durham, a proclamation to the Scottish Covenanters, printed probably in London or at York, was being read in St. Nicholas's church, Newcastle. Copies of it were at once sent across the Border, but more were required and the printing press came in time to supply the need. On May 9, the day after the king's entry, Edward Norgate, Windsor herald, writing from Newcastle to his cousin Robert Reade, a nephew of secretary Windebank, announced the printer's arrival:—

We have brought hither a printer with all his trinkets ready to make new [copies of the proclamation] as occasion may require.

Three days later—the presence of a printer among the attendants of the king being apparently a novelty—Norgate wrote:—

We have a printer here, and this day I made ready for the king's hand a proclamation for the importation of butter; it is now printing, so are 400 of the former proclamation of pardon to the Scots.

This proclamation respecting butter, which removed a previous restraint on the exportation of that useful article, is the first known specimen of typography bearing a Newcastle imprint. It is a broadside, in which the letterpress occupies a space $9\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep by 8 inches wide. One of the original copies has been preserved at the Public Record office, and a reproduction of it, reduced to the size of our pages, appropriately forms a frontispiece to this paper. It reads as follows:—

By the King.

Charles by the grace of God, King of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c.

To all Our loving subjects whom it shall or may concern, greeting. Whereas by Our Letters Patents, and former Proclamation for the good of Our subjects, and for the advancement of Trade, a Restraint was granted concerning the Exportation of Butter out of England and Wales: Now understanding by the Generall and Officers of Our Army, that it much

concerneth Our service, that good quantities of Butter should be brought in for the Victualling of Our said Army. We have therefore by advice of Our Councell, thought fit, and do hereby for the present (till Our further pleasure be signified) suspend the execution of the said Grant and Proclamation, and accordingly declare them hereby to be suspended. And We also give hereby free liberty to all Our loving subjects, as well in these Northern, as in the Western parts, and in Wales, to bring to any of Our Northern Ports what quantity of Butter they can furnish to Our said Army and Garrisons, at Marketable rates. And this Our Royall pleasure We require and command all Maiors, Justices of Peace, Bayliffs, and other our Officers and Ministers, to cause to be made known and published, so as generall notice may be taken of the same.

Given at Our Court at Newcastle the ninth day of May, in the fifteenth yeer of Our Reign.

As soon as the royal printing press had struck off the proclamation about butter and the address to the Scots, it was employed upon a larger undertaking. The king, highly pleased with bishop Morton's discourse, ordered it to be put into type for general distribution. The royal order was, naturally, at once obeyed, and thus was issued the first book or booklet printed in Newcastle. The title page is seen in the accompanying illustration.

On May 14,³ another broadside, in black letter, measuring 15 inches by $11\frac{1}{2}$ inches, with a margin right and left of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches, was issued, of which the following is a copy:—

soone as the present disorders, and tumultuous proceedings of some there, are quieted; and will leave Us a faire way of comming like a gratious King to declare our good meaning to them. But finding some cause of Impediment, and that this Nation doth apprehend (that contrarie to their professions) there is an intention to invade this Our Kingdome of England. We doe therefore to cleare all doubts, that may breed scruples in the mind of Our good Subjects of either Kingdome, reiterate this Our just and reall protestation: That if all civill and temporall obedience be effectually and timely given and shewn unto us. We doe not intend to invade them with any hostility. One other book was produced by Barker's press in Newcastle a set of regulations for the conduct and control of the army, entitled *Lawes and Ordinances of Warre*. These regulations were publicly proclaimed, as Norgate informed his friend and relative Reade, 'in a miserable cold morning, with hail and snow,' on May 16. The title page, herein copied, shows more of the resources of Barker's temporary establishment in Newcastle. It is, however, a shorter production than that of Morton's sermon, comprising only 27 pages of type and a blank beyond the title, while Morton's contains 42 pages and title.

The king stayed a fortnight in Newcastle altogether and then (May 22) set out for the Border. There, after some parleying, he patched up the quarrel and sent his troops home rejoicing. Accompanying them, in all probability, went the printer and all his 'trinkets' with him.

STEPHEN BULKLEY, 1646-1662.

In the spring of 1642, king Charles, deserting his Parliament, returned to York and set up his Court there. He brought with him the royal press, and remained in the North till August. On September 1, having raised his standard at Nottingham, he directed Barker's press to follow him.

A couple of months earlier, about the end of June or beginning of July, a printer, named Stephen Bulkley, arrived in York and commenced business on his own account. Precisely why and whence he came thither has not been clearly understood until quite recently. Thanks, however, to the painstaking research of Mr. H. R. Plomer and Mr. R. A. Peddie, we now know something of his parentage, training and experience and the reasons which induced him to start a printing establishment in the archiepiscopal city of the North.

Son of a bookseller and stationer in the archiepiscopal city of the South (Joseph Buckley, or Bulkley, of Canterbury), with a brother named Thomas serving his time to Robert Barker, Stephen was bound apprentice in February, 1630-1631, for eight years, to Adam Islip, printer (in 1636), of Johnson's edition of *Gerarde's Herbal*. His indentures duly expired in February, 1638-1639, when he took up his freedom of the Stationers' Company, and, after a brief partnership with a printer named Beale, began on his own account, in St. Martin's parish, Aldersgate, London. It was a time of scurrilous pamphleteering, and the young printer, being an ardent royalist, was very soon in trouble with the Parliament. On June 15, 1642, summoned to answer for printing a particularly unpleasant attack upon the Commons, he fled to the Court for protection, and thus it was that he appeared with his paraphernalia in the city of York.⁴

The work which Barker's press had been doing for the Court party fell to Bulkley when Barker had departed. In Davies's *History of the York Press*, the title pages of several publications bearing his imprint and issued between July, 1642, and May, 1646, are enumerated.⁵ There was good reason for the disappearance of his name at the later date. York was closely invested by the Parliamentary army, and, shortly after the battle of Marston Moor, was captured. The royalist typographer found his occupation gone.

What Stephen Bulkley was doing during the strain and . struggle of the next two years is not apparent. But, in November, 1646, under circumstances described by Mr. Hodgson Hinde, and with more detail by Mr. C. S. Terry,⁶ he came to Newcastle to work in the interest and under the immediate supervision of the king. His coming was strongly opposed by the booksellers and stationers of the town as being likely to injure their business. But the king protected him till the townspeople became reconciled to the intrusion, and here, and in Gateshead, he remained for about fifteen years. To him, therefore, attaches the distinction of being the first printer who settled down and regularly pursued his calling upon the banks of the Tyne.

At the date of Mr. Hodgson Hinde's paper, the number of publications known to have issued from Bulkley's Tyneside press was about a dozen. Subsequent investigation extends the number to over a score.

The first of them was a hoaxing pamphlet professing to be written in the interests of the royalists by an eminent Protestant divine at Geneva, entitled—

An Answer Sent to the Ecclesiasticall Assembly at London. By the Reverend Noble and Learned Man, John Deodate, the Famous Professour

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of Divinity, and most vigilant Pastour of Genevah. Translated out of the Latine into English. Genevah. Printed for the good of Great Brittaine. 1646. Sm. 4to, iv+16 pp.

No printer's name appeared on the title page, but the *Moderate Intelligencer*, a London news-sheet, announced at the end of November, on the authority of information from Newcastle, that his majesty's printer there was printing 'the answer, or letter, sent to the Assembly by Mons. Diodate'; while another news-sheet, the *Mercurius Diutinus* (No. 4, Dec. 16-23, 1646, p. 26) stigmatising the pamphlet as 'a peece of Prelatical forgery, a very fiction drawn up by some of their Creatures here in England,' declared that it was never printed at Geneva, for the good of Great Britain, but by 'the new Printer that went from Yorke to the Court at Newcastle.'

Before the end of the year three other publications had been sent out from Bulkley's Tyneside press, namely-

Shortly afterwards, the tract attributed to John Diodate was re-issued with the same title as before, but after the words 'Pastor of Genevah' came the royal arms and the imprint, 'Newcastle: Printed by Stephen Bulkley, 1647.' This was a small quarto of ii + 12 pp. During the same year another pamphlet appeared with the title of—

The King's Possessions: Written by His Majesties own Hand; annexed by way of Notes to a Letter sent to the Ecclesiasticall Assembly at London: In answer to a Letter sent from them. Newcastle: Printed by Stephen Bulkley, Printer to the King's Majesty, 1647. Sm. 4to, 12 pp.

To this brochure is attached a 'Copy of a Certificate from one of the Scribes of the Assembly to a Minister in London,' declaring that the writer, having perused the tract of the previous year and examined the records, finds that 'there was never any such letter sent from Dr. Diodate in the name of the Church of Geneva to the Assembly' and denouncing it as 'an abominable forgery.'

There is reason to suppose that this publication, although bearing Bulkley's imprint, is spurious.

From the press of this first established printer in Newcastle, came, as was fitting, the first history of the town, Gray's *Chorographia*. The title page shows inferior workmanship to that of Barker's press, as may be seen overleaf.

The book is a small quarto of viii + 34 pages, and copies of it are to be found in the Newcastle libraries and in the hands of local collectors.

The Chorographia was accompanied by another Newcastle production—a theological treatise from the pen of the Puritan vicar of the town, Dr. Robert Jenison, being 'Sermon notes presented on the ordination of Mr. William Henderson, April 13, 1649, and on that of Mr. John Brabant, June 9, 1649.' It was entitled—

The Faithfull Depositary of Sovnd Doctrine and Antient Trvths. Maintained against all Oppositions of Science falsely so-called, and against the prophane and Vaine Bablings of unsound Teachers: or a Treatise on the 1 Tim., 6, 20. By R. J., Dr. D. It would appear from the imprints that sometime during 1652 Bulkley removed his press to Gateshead and remained there for about eight years. The following emanated from his Gateshead workshop, which seems to have been located in Hillgate, adjoining the river:—

Vota non Bella. New-castle's Heartie Gratulation to her Sacred Soveraign King Charles The Seconde on his now Glorious Restauration To His birthright Power. By Ralph Astell, M.A. Gateshead, Printed by Stephen Bulkley 1660. Sm. 4to, 16 pp.

It is difficult to understand the imprints of these last two booklets, Newcastle in 1659, and Gateshead again in 1660. But it would seem that at the Restoration Bulkley crossed the water to Newcastle once more. Two books printed by him, one in 1660 and the other in 1661, certainly bear a Newcastle imprint,⁸ and there we must leave the matter.

(4) The Counterfeit Jew. [A tract relating to the subject of the "converted" and "false" Jew, previously quoted.] No title page, but dated at the end 23rd June, 1653. Sm. 4to, 8 pp.

(5) A Conference between Two Soldiers Meeting on the Roade, the one being of the Army in England, The other of the Army in Scotland; As the one was coming from London, the other from Edinburgh. The first Part. Printed at Newcastle in the year 1659. Sm. 4to, 22 pp. The titles of these two books are as follows:—

The Loyall Subject, Treating of Magistracy, Ministery, Religion, &c., chiefly set forth (in these Perilous times) to inform all those weake, unstable Spirits, and devided members of this distracted Church and State of their duty and due obedience, to God and their King. And by motives and reasons (arising from the Word of God, and learned Authors) draw them from their erronious Opinions to a holy Conformity in Christian Government. Composed in the Yeare 1658. Per R. Thomson, *Pacis & Veritatis Amatorem*. Newcastle, Printed by Stephen Bulkley, 1660. Sm. 4to, xii+120 pp.

The Bishop's Appeale, By Ri: Hooke: or, an Addresse to the Brethren of the Presbyteriall Judgement in twenty Considerations, wherein among other things is manifested That the Reformed Churches, both Lutheran and Calvinist; yea, Calvin, Beza and the Church of Scotland it self, have given their Suffrages for Episcopacy. Newcastle, Printed by Stephen Bulkley, 1661. Sm. 4to, xvi+68 pp.

Shortly after the publication of a second edition of *The* Loyall Subject, in 1662, Stephen Bulkley removed himself and his printing establishment from the banks of the Tyne and again set up his press in the place of his early labours—the now loyal and quiet city of York.⁹ There he continued his work till his death in February, 1679-1680.

JOSEPH SAYWELL, 1710.

For nearly half a century after Bulkley's departure, Newcastle and Gateshead had no resident printer. Books were published by local divines, pamphlets were issued by local authors, but the printing of them was done elsewhere. Charles II. passed away, James II. and William and Mary followed him; still, so far as is known, no typographer practised his handicraft upon Tyneside. It is not until the middle of the reign of queen Anne, namely, in the year 1710, that we meet with the name of another Newcastle printer.

There was at that time a notable bookshop upon Tyne Bridge, owned by an equally notable bookseller—Joseph Button. Button

was a friend and correspondent of Daniel Defoe, who, according to tradition, lived for a time in Gateshead and may have written, as tradition further declares, one of his books there. Bookseller Button started a local news-sheet, the first of its kind to appear on the Tyne, and its printer was one Joseph Saywell of Gateshead. Saywell's existence and that of the news-sheet are both disclosed in a volume preserved in the Advocates' library in Edinburgh. Bound up therein, with other documents, is a letter from Button to Defoe and a copy (No. 65) of 'The Newcastle Gazette, or the Northern Courant: Being an Impartial Account of Remarkable Transactions, Foreign or Domestic, from Saturday, December 23, to Monday, December 25, 1710. Gateside: Printed by J. Saywell for J. Button on the Bridge.' Unfortunately, the binder's knife has sliced away nine or ten words from Button's letter (though mutilation does not materially obscure the sense), which reads as follows:---

Yours of the 23 Ins^t. I received but had sent you before 400 Pa... prophesies. I knew there were severall errata's in't but did n[ot] think it worth while to amend, however when I've sold these ... I've already done, and do more shall both correct and print ... addenda's . if you don't sell those sent pray return 'em ... In the Gazette of Thursday xd^r 21 there is something of Sir J (?) Cunningham I suppose that is it you wou'd ha' printed there is ... in that you sent last and you say it is in that paper.

As to the man and boy I can't tell what to say matter if you can get a boy: p'haps now this Saywell is bad and low in pockett and in debt wou'd be willing for the money to Instruct him But then who must he be bound to, it must be to yourselfe f[or] I can neither make him free of London nor Edinburgh—and another ... these fellows have so disgusted and tired my wife that I don't know how I shall please her in bringing any more, I'm for haveing these two fellows out of the house as soon as possible, and in order to it have desired ... to look out Lodgings etc.

When you do Bickerstaff, I wou'd not ha' you fright all people as you say you will, p'haps the government may call us in question for intimidating her majesties good subjects.

Who wou'd ha' thought but the Provost who I heard you say was y[our] very good friend, wou'd ha' given you the advertisment else it shou'd ha' been sent.

Button's letter, so fortunately preserved, contains all that is known of Saywell, his coming to Tyneside, his struggles, and his away going. That he was a stranger may be inferred from the slighting reference made to him as 'this Saywell,' a man who, being 'bad and low in pockett and in debt,' might be induced to take an apprentice to please Defoe and increase the bookselling business upon Tyne Bridge. But whence and when he came to Gateshead, and whither and when he departed are alike unknown.

JOHN WHITE, 1711-1761.

Stephen Bulkley, as we have seen, returned to York and, in the early part of 1680, died there. Later in that year, John White, a practical printer from London, came down to the archiepiscopal city, married the daughter of another York printer and started a press in his own name. Being a man of courage and resource, he had the boldness, on the eve of the Revolution of 1688, to print the manifesto of William of Orange, which had been refused by all the printers in London. When the Revolution was accomplished, the grateful monarch rewarded him with the title of royal printer for the city of York and the five northern counties.¹⁰

The eldest son of this royal printer at York, John White the younger, came to Newcastle at the beginning of the eighteenth century and set up a printing press in the Close. Whether he had anything to do with the decaying business of Saywell is matter for surmise. One thing is certain, namely, that in August, 1711, a few months after Button penned his epistle to Defoe, John White, junior, issued the first number of a newspaper which had for its title two words from the heading of Saywell's sheet—Newcastle Courant.

Saywell's print died out; White's flourished and survived down to our own day, one of the oldest, if not the oldest, provincial newspaper in the kingdom. The earliest available copy of the Courant, reprinted by the then proprietors in the jubilee year of queen Victoria, 1887, is the 208th number, dated 'from Monday, November 24, to Wednesday, November 26, 1712.' Published three times a week at $1\frac{1}{2}d$. a copy, or 4s. 6d. a quarter. it had attained the age of 69 weeks when this number was issued. It consists of 12 small quarto pages, the type on each page measuring 4 inches wide by $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep. On the title page are the royal arms, with the initials of queen Anne. The inner title is flanked by a ship in full sail and a horse at full speed, representing the fastest means of locomotion by sea and land then known, and there is one illustrated initial capital, a 'T,' which forms an inset five lines deep. Naval and military news extend to the middle of the paper-and that is no great quantity, only 955 words-while the general news of the kingdom is retailed in 751 words. One paragraph of local news and three local advertisements read as follows : ---

Shields. November 24. Yesterday came in six light Ships from London, And this Day Sailed out of our Harbour about ten laden Ships for London and Dunkirk.

A Copy-hold Estate (part thereof lying upon Loblay-Hill, the other part near Dunstan, with a Steath belonging thereto, all in the Parish of Whickham in the County Palatine of Durham) giving 54l. per Annum, and well

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Tenanted, is intended to be Sold, either altogether, or in parcels; any Person or Persons desirous to purchase the same, may repair to Mr. Edward Steward of North Shields, or to Samuel Hodgson of Newcastle Merchant, who will Treat with them about the same.

A Large House near *Gateshead* Church, with extraordinary Conveniences and pleasantly Situate, in which Madam *Maddison* lately dwelt; is to be Lett either altogether, or divided into Tenements: Any Person or Persons desirous to take all or any part thereof, may repair to Mrs. *Hodgson*, at her House near the *Close-Gate*.

These are to give Notice, that *High-Flatworth*, (alias *Smith's* Farm) The Water side Farm, (alias *Lawson's* Farm) and *Low-Flatworth*, all Tithefree, with Lime-Kilns and other advantages, are to be Let against *Lady-Day* next: Enquire of *Robert Allgood*, Esq.; at *Low-Flatworth*, near *Howden* Pans.

The remainder $(2\frac{1}{2}$ pages) consists of proposals by Dr. Jurin, master of the Royal Free Grammar school, 'For carrying on by Subscription a compleat Course of Mechanicks, by which Gentlemen, unacquainted with any Part of the Mathematicks in the Space of twelve or eighteen Months, by meeting three Times a Week for an Hour at a time, may be enabled to compute the Effect of any Machine whatsoever, or to solve any other Problem of the like Nature.'

Only a year or so did John White remain at his starting place overlooking the ebb and flow of the river. Two sermons from his press, one preached September 10, and the other on All Saints day (November 1), 1711, bear the imprint of his 'House in the Close'; but a discourse delivered September 9, 1712, is issued from his 'House on the Side'—an indication that increasing business had compelled him to obtain what is usually termed 'more commodious premises.' There, developing a special line in broadsides and booklets, he announced that chapmen could be 'furnished with sermons, histories and ballads, &c,' and thither went peripatetic vendors of cheap literature for those treasures of song, story and legend which formed the mental equipment of innumerable sons and daughters of toil throughout the northern counties.¹¹



The first notable volume that came from White's press, and apparently the first Newcastle printed book in which an octavo size superseded the usual pot quartos or square twelves, was a volume of iv + 56 pages about charities in Tynedale, written in 1713 (though issued anonymously) by George Ritschell, curate of Hexham. Bold and plain without ornament is a proper description of the typography in this book, as it is of most of White's early work. Later on considerable embellishment was introduced, so much, indeed, that in 1725, when Bourne's *Antiquities of the Common People* (xx + 232 pages) left_the printing house in the Side, every chapter of that excellent book had its decorated headpiece, initial letter and tailpiece.

In 1726, White issued another noteworthy volume—A Most Pleasant Description of Benwell Village, in which 1,333 six-line verses of doggerel are spread over 583 pages 12mo. To that extraordinary effusion another local bard replied with A Sunday Evening's Conversation at Benwell. By way of contrast to the insignificant height of the thick volume which provoked it, the reply was published in folio. So far as can be ascertained, it was the first book of folio size printed in Newcastle.

While White was busy with these productions, his chapbooks and his newspaper, there came to him an Edinburgh goldsmith named William Ged, who had invented a process by which impressions from type could be transferred to metal plates—a process known ever since as stereotyping. Ged had tried printers in Edinburgh, but they would have none of him or his process. He had been to Cambridge and obtained a licence to print Bibles and prayer books, but being unable to restrain the licence of his workmen he had returned baffled, but not beaten, to his home in Edinburgh. There he managed to get an edition of Sallust (C. Crispi Sallustii Belli Catilinarii et Jugurthini Historiæ) set up surreptitiously and to cast the plates page by page himself. Beyond that stage, however, he was unable to go, for no pressman could be found to work for him. It was under these depressing circumstances that he appealed to John White and fortunately




found a friend. White's men worked off Sallust from the stereos in 1739, and three years afterwards another book, Scougal's *Life of God in the Soul of Man*, came from the same workshop, bearing on its title page the announcement—' Printed and sold by John White, from plates made by William Ged, goldsmith in Edinburgh.'

From the press of the first resident printer upon Tyneside, as we have already noted, came the first history of Newcastle. From the press of the resident printer second came the second history of the town-a volume written by Henry Bourne, curate of All Saints, and bearing the date 1736. Bourne's history is John White's masterpiece. Τt shows the variety of founts at his command, his skill in tabulation and adjustment, his resources in the

way of embellishment. On page 1 (repeated on pages 52 and 109), a headpiece, reproduced herewith, depicts Newcastle as the artist saw it, or thought he saw it, looking across from Gateshead. On page 31 is an example of tabular matter, on page 61 a marginal note in Hebrew, on page 102 model subscription lists, between pages 187 and 245 an ingenious way of working notes and references into the text, and at the end the gorgeous tailpiece displayed below.

When Mr. White had been fifty years in business as a printer and had gained a reputation throughout the kingdom for sound high-class work, he celebrated his jubilee by taking a partner. Six years later, at the age of fourscore, he died—the oldest master printer in England.



G. READ, 1713-1714.

Concerning a printer bearing this name, who published a sermon preached by Joseph Bailey¹² in Newcastle on Coronation day, 1714, nothing is known. The sermon bears the imprint 'Gateshead: Printed by G. Read, and sold by J. Button, Bookseller on the Bridge.' Mr. Thomas Bell of Newcastle, the farfamed collector of local literature in the last century, whose notes on books and bookmen lighten the labours of his successors,¹³ was unable to trace G. Read. He, however, expressed an opinion that another theological pamphlet, entitled, A Form of Holy Scriptural Divinity: In many things New and Reformed from old Unscriptural Divinity, by 'T. H., M. A., Co. Gl., Newcastle: Printed in the year 1713,' had evidently been issued from the same press.

T. GOOLDING, 1715.

Similar mystery surrounds the business of T. Goolding, whose name appears on but one local booklet (a copy of which is preserved in the Newcastle Public library), with the following title page:—

ROBERT AKENHEAD, 1722-1751?

Mackenzie, in his history of Newcastle, p. 727, states that 'proposals for printing the *Newcastle Mercury* were dated July 10, 1722, and the first number appeared on the following Saturday. It was published by Mr. Akenhead, bookseller on the Bridge, and at the printing office at the Bird-in-the-Bush, in the Close.' No other reference to this newspaper occurs in local history, and even industrious Timperley, who made heroic efforts to include in his encyclopædia 'all the newspapers, periodicals and almanacks published in this country ' down to 1839, names it not. Robert Akenhead was a well known bookseller on Tyne Bridge, having for his sign the Bible and Crown, and there were booksellers of that name in the town long afterwards, but

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no book or paper bearing the name of Akenhead as printer or publisher appears till about 1751. Mackenzie omits to state who owned 'the printing office at the Bird-in-the-Bush in the Close.'

LEONARD UMFREVILLE, 1733-1737. THOMAS UMFREVILLE, 1737-1743.

Leonard Umfreville (who claimed descent from the historical family of that name) was, according to Thomas Bell, the second son of Thomas Umfreville of Newcastle, a captain in the army, by Mary, daughter and heir of Leonard Thornton of Riplington, parish of Whalton, Northumberland. In 1734 he started a newspaper in Newcastle with the title of *The North Country Journal or Impartial Intelligencer*, a small folio sheet of four pages published on Saturdays at twopence.

Sykes (Local Records, Nov. 8, 1735) informs us that 'this paper, in small folio, was printed and published in Newcastle by Leonard Umfreville at the head of the Side. The earliest of this journal that I have seen is No. 67, dated as above. Previous to this time it had been printed and published by Leonard Umfreville and Isaac Lane, whose dissolution of partnership is announced in this paper. It was afterwards printed and published by Leonard Umfreville and Company.' Leonard died March 9, 1736-1737, after which the publishers were Thomas Umfreville and Company. It would appear that the efforts of this firm in journalism were not successful, for they came to an end in 1739.

Outside of the newspaper, the publications of the Umfreville press are not important. The largest book issued by the firm is a 12mo of x + 140 pages on Freemasonry. Thomas Umfreville, brother of Leonard, gave up the business in or about 1743, when he received the appointment of parish clerk of St. John's, Newcastle,—an office which he filled till his death in June, 1783. One of his sons, William Umfreville, died November 17, 1789, in the poor house of St. Nicholas's parish, of which he was the keeper.

ISAAC LANE, 1734-1735.

After dissolving partnership with Leonard Umfreville, Isaac Lane set up a press of his own. His imprint appears upon La Belle Assemblee, or the Tinmouth Bathers, an undated poem inscribed to the ladies of Newcastle, by G. K. 'Printed by Isaac Lane and Company at the Head of the Side, where Printing Work is Neatly perform'd.' It also adorns the title pages of Prideaux Errington's New Copies in Verse, 1734, and a funeral sermon preached March 2, 1734-1735, upon the occasion of the death of Lady Jane Clavering. Shortly after this last-named date he removed his press to Durham, and there he is found, apparently flourishing, twenty years later.

ISAAC THOMPSON, 1739-1776.

There is a marked peculiarity about the imprints of books issued by Isaac Thompson, who for nearly forty years carried on an extensive business in Newcastle as printer, publisher, newspaper proprietor and magazine editor. In some of them he appears as 'Isaac Thompson and Company,' in others as 'Isaac Thompson Esq. and Company,' and in several as 'Isaac Thompson Esq.' It would have been a peculiarity in any printer to dub himself 'esq.' on his own publications; but it was a marked peculiarity in Isaac Thompson because he was a 'convinced' member of the Society of Friends.

The beginnings of this Quaker esquire had no connexion with printing or literature. According to Thomas Bell, he came to Newcastle from Lancashire at a comparatively early age and

followed the calling of land agent and surveyor. In these allied pursuits he won confidence and obtained a good position. The duke of Northumberland employed him, and other north country landowners followed the duke's example. He went into local society and became the fast friend of an eminent local physician, Dr. Adam Askew, and of his still more eminent son, Dr. Anthony Askew, the bibliophile. He studied science and philosophy, gave his leisure hours to literary pursuits, and in 1731 ventured into authorship by issuing from the press of John White A Collection of Poems Occasionally Writ. In no long time afterwards he added to his profession of land agent and surveyor the business of printing and the practice of journalism.

The failure of Umfreville's newspaper had no doubt stimulated Isaac Thompson to this enterprise. Some of his county friends helped him with capital and they found a printer in the person of William Cuthbert. On April 7, 1739, appeared the first number of *The Newcastle Journal*, printed by 'Isaac Thompson and William Cuthbert at their office on the Head of the Side.'

Then something happened. Cuthbert started in business for himself and in 1744 went into competition with a newspaper of his own—*The Newcastle Gazette*. The *Journal* changed its imprint to that of I. Thompson and Co., but was printed by John Gooding, who had a press in Burnt House Entry, Side. The personality of Thompson's firm in the after years changed more than once. His last partnership, consisting of himself, Peregrine Tyzack, Robert Thorp and Thomas Aubone, was dissolved December 1, 1764, and thenceforward he stood alone as I. Thompson, or I. Thompson, esq.

When the *Journal* had become fairly established among the tradesmen and farmers of Tyneside, Thompson sought new fields to conquer. In his issue of December 20, 1746, he advertised proposals for printing monthly, price 6*d*., a periodical to be called

The Newcastle General Magazine.¹⁴ The bait with which he angled for subscribers was expedition. Newcastle was a long way from the metropolis, methods of conveyance were slow and in bad weather uncertain, Tynesiders were out of touch with the periodical literature of the day, the 'felt want' was an up-to-date local magazine. Thus the prospectus ran:—

The Distance of Newcastle from London rendering it impracticable for any of the Magazines or other Monthly Performances to arrive here at soonest before the 13th and frequently the 20th Days of the succeeding Month for which they are published, and the carriers from the Northern Counties and North Britain not coming to this Town till the week after their Arrival here, it frequently happens that great numbers of Country Réaders never see any of these Pamphlets till near a Month after their Publication, by which Delay some Parts of their Contents are quite stale and the rest less acceptable. This Magazine is therefore designed to remove the said Inconveniences as much as possible; for it will be circulated in the North a Week or Ten Days sooner than any other Pamphlet of the kind. . . . Subscribers are desired to send their Orders speedily, that it may be determined what Number to print.

Subscribers sent their orders, the magazine duly appeared, and in his preface the editor struck a high and jubilant note:—

Too long have these northern climes been deprived of a repository of learning; too long have these geniuses that now begin to shine been concealed in darkness for want of a proper channel to convey their productions into light.

Here then, repository and channel were provided, darkness was swept away and genius was enabled to shine. The first twelve numbers were in small quarto with the name of John Gooding as printer, but on the title page of the volume were the words ' Printed for I. Thompson and Co. by John Gooding.' All subsequent issues, till the publication ceased at the end of 1760, were in octavo.

¹⁴ On the cover of this magazine in September, 1751, appeared the following advertisement:—'Sold for Ready Money, By Isaac Thompson, without Pilgrim St. Gate, Newcastle, Stout Old Jamaica Rum, of a Fine Flavour and neat as imported.' In January, 1757, Thompson, in conjunction with Robert (philosopher) Harrison, began a course of lectures twice a week on Natural and Experimental Philosophy. The following year he wrote and published a paper on the cultivation of the auricula. He also wrote a description of the orrery used in his lectures.

The first work issued by him, as a publisher, was the largest that had emanated from a Newcastle printing office: It is a huge folio of 786 pages entitled A Journal of the Life of Thomas Story, a brother Quaker. Among other books that he published were Poetical Essays, the earliest literary effusion of John Brand, future historian of Newcastle, and a wonderful treatise by R. Wetherald, philomath (lover of learning). Mr. Wetherald describes the atmosphere as 'a perfect chaos of different effluvia, consisting of almost all kinds of corpuscles confusedly jumbled together,' while thunder is attributed to 'a heterogenous commixture of the effluvia or exhalation of sulphureous, nitrous and inflammable bodies in the air, which ferment and kindle into flames and make horrible explosions like gunpowder, which we call thunder and lightning.' Meanwhile the Newcastle Journal was running its course, but the cessation of the General Magazine had left a void in local literature. Thompson sought to fill that vacancy by commencing, in 1769, a weekly publication, consisting of such essays, letters and other contributions to the Journal as were considered too literary for a newspaper. It was entitled The Literary Register, or Weekly Miscellany, and ran to five volumes, ending in 1773. Three years later, on January 6, 1776, aged 72, this spirited and accomplished publisher died and was buried in the graveyard behind the meeting house of the Society of Friends in Pilgrim street.¹⁵

WILLIAM CUTHBERT.

WILLIAM CUTHBERT, 1744-1759.

We have seen that William Cuthbert ceased to be the printer of Isaac Thompson's *Newcastle Journal* soon after it started, and that in 1744 he commenced a newspaper of his own which he named *The Newcastle Gazette*. Cuthbert's venture was a folio of four pages, resembling the *Courant* and the *Journal* as to size, but set up in somewhat larger type and issued on Wednes-

Society of Friends, Samuel Maude, afterwards of Sunniside, near Sunderland (ancestor of the Maudes of Sunniside, Newcastle, Selaby, Harrogate, etc.), by whom he had three sons-Jonathan, John and Samuel-and one daughter, Hannah, who died unmarried early in life. He was a stout man and tall in proportion being upwards of six feet in height, and of very austere manners, as was also his wife, yet they lived together for many years with great affection. Mrs. Thompson survived her husband about ten years and regularly during that period visited his grave and had it kept in order. She had also an excellent portrait of her husband which she would not allow to be put out of sight, but had a packing case provided for the purpose of carrying it with her whenever she left home. Jonathan, the eldest son, followed his father's early avocation of land agent and surveyor and married a Miss Hannah Miller. He wrote an essay on Divided Commons in 1778; another on the Commutation Act in 1786; and a pamphlet on the Canal Controversy which raged in 1795. John, the second son, was for a long time in the printing business with his father, but afterwards succeeded to the land agency of the Blakes of Twizell, Hodgsons of Elswick, Askews of Pallinsburn, and other early patrons of his father. He was a man of recluse and eccentric habits, was much attached to his employers, but a misanthrope to all the world beside, and towards the close of his life refused to see any of his maternal relatives, save a distant cousin. He bequeathed the bulk of his property, reckoned to be worth upwards of 70,000*l*. to the dowager Mrs. Hodgson of Elswick for life, and on her decease to be equally divided between sir Francis Blake, bart., of Twizell, John Hodgson of Elswick and Mr. Askew of Pallinsburn, naming R. C. Askew as his executor. Though he had forsaken the Society of Friends, as well as their garb, he was singular in his dress. Both in summer and winter he wore breeches of a light drab colour with white stockings, shoes with large buckles, walking with a stiff awkward gait, and was nicknamed 'white legs.' He died unmarried. Samuel, the youngest son, commenced business in Newcastle as a grocer and general merchant, but was unsuccessful. He married but died without issue.

days instead of Saturdays. It was 'printed and sold by W. Cuthbert, in Cutter's Entry, in the Close, where books, warrants, shopkeepers' bills, advertisements and all manner of printing work is neatly performed at reasonable prices.' The *Gazette* lasted nine years and was replaced in 1755 by another Wednesday paper, *The Newcastle Intelligencer*, which 'Wm. Cuthbert and Co.' issued from Custom House Entry. In the meantime he had printed a few books and pamphlets, among them Isaac Thompson's account of the orrery—an indication that although these two men owned and published rival newspapers, they were friendly still. The latest issue of *The Newcastle Intelligencer* that has been preserved bears date 1759; beyond that date nothing is known of William Cuthbert, the printer.

THOMAS MIDDLETON, 1740-1741.

Two books, printed in Newcastle in 1740 and 1741, bear the name of Thomas Middleton. One has the curious title of *The Looking Glass Turn'd Mental Mirror*, and the other, a volume of poems by the Rev. Wm. Bewick of Hexham, contains seven title pages, and has for its imprint:—' Newcastle-upon-Tyne: Printed for the Author, by Tho. Middleton at the Printing-Office in St. Nicholas' Church-Yard, 1741.' A year later this book ran into a second edition with 108 pages added, but there is only one title page to that issue and the imprint reads, ' Newcastle: Printed for the Author and to be sold by James Fleming, Bookseller on Tyne Bridge, 1742.' Whether that change indicates the failure, death or disappearance of Thomas Middleton, or merely a dispute with the poet, cannot now be ascertained. But the name is not found attached to any later Newcastle book.

JOHN GOODING, 1743-1751.

On a previous page has been noted the connexion between Isaac Thompson and a printer named John Gooding, who, after

William Cuthbert's withdrawal, became the printer of the Newcastle Journal and the General Magazine: His printing office, as already stated, was up Burnt House Entry, Side, and he had a shop at the entrance, facing the main thoroughfare.

To his establishment resorted the newly-formed denomination called Methodists, and there, in the beginning of 1743, was printed John Wesley's first rules for the government of the congregations which he was establishing in various parts of the kingdom. These regulations form a penny pamphlet, entitled, *The Nature, Design, and General Rules of the United Societies in London, Bristol, King's Wood, and Newcastle-upon-Tyne.* Other productions of the Wesleys were issued by Gooding during that same year; several more were printed by him in the years that followed.

The printing of sermons seems to have formed the greater part of Gooding's work. Only two sizeable books are noted as issuing from his press. These were Blennerhasset's *History of England* in six volumes octavo, and a work in two volumes by the Rev. John Wallis, the first historian of Northumberland. This latter is entitled *The Occasional Miscellany in Prose and Verse*. It consists of 'A Variety of Letters, Written originally to a Young Gentleman who Design'd to go into Holy Orders' and 'a Specimen of Sacred Poetry and Sermons.' It is well printed, but the resources of the establishment in the shape of 'furniture' must have been limited, for two ornamental headings are made to do duty alternately at the top of twenty-two chapters or divisions, while a couple of finials perform the same service at their endings.

After the year 1751 Gooding's name disappears from among the imprints of local books, and his further career is not traceable.

THOMAS SLACK, 1763-1784.

We have now arrived at the middle of the eighteenth century, and have ascertained that in forty years from the advent of

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John White, the first settled typographer on the Tyne, half-adozen printers had commenced business in Newcastle, and that when the year 1750 came to an end only four of them, White, Thompson, Cuthbert and Gooding, were engaged in the active pursuit of their calling. We have learned, further, that five newspapers and one magazine had catered to the growing demand for information about current events, and that when the New Year, 1751, dawned upon Tyneside, only three of them, the *Courant*, the *Journal* and the *Gazette*, kept company with the magazine.

In the printing office of Isaac Thompson was a young man named Thomas Slack. For a number of years he had managed Thompson's business, and had issued books and pamphlets in his own name as publisher, which the firm had printed.

One of his early ventures while in Thompson's employment was an annual which, in succeeding generations, became the north country man's vade mecum and indispensable pocket companion— The Newcastle Memorandum Book. The first number came out of Thompson's workshop in 1755—' Printed by I. Thompson and Co. for Thomas Slack '—and its days ended with the 139th issue, published by Andrew Reid and Co. for the year 1893.

On May 22, 1756, the *Journal* announced that 'This Day was Published, price bound 1s., The Young Clergyman's Companion for Visiting the Sick, etc. Printed by I. Thompson and Company for Thomas Slack, and sold by the Booksellers in Newcastle, Durham, etc. Of whom may be had price 1s. 6d. Lucius and Celadon, or a Dialogue on the Existence and Immortality of the Soul. Newcastle-upon-Tyne: Printed for Thomas Slack.' This was followed on September 18 by an advertisement of a book from the pen of Mrs. Slack, who was an accomplished woman, compiler of educational works under the pen name of 'A. Fisher' which had a long and prosperous career: —'Just published in 12mo. bound in Calf, or Red Basil, The Pleasing

Instructor or Entertaining Moralist, etc. To which are prefixed (by way of Introduction) New Thoughts on Education. Newcastle-upon-Tyne: Printed for Thos. Slack, to be had of all the Distributors¹⁶ of this Paper, and sold by the Booksellers in Town,' etc.

A few months before the dissolution of partnership in Thompson's firm which, as previously noted, occurred in 1764, Slack had started a printing office of his own, for under date 1763 he published a volume of metrical psalms, collected from Tate and Brady's version by the Rev. Wm. Totton, curate of Hexham, with tunes prepared by William Thompson, a teacher of music in Newcastle. A pretty little book it is with its copperplate music of two parts--treble and bass. 'Printed by T. Slack for W. Thompson, and sold by J. Featherston, Bookseller in Hexham' is on the front page, and at the end come advertisements of two of Mrs. Slack's books-The New English Tutor or Modern Preceptor, to which was annexed an abstract of English grammar 'on a practical new plan,' also the third edition of The Pleasing Instructor or Entertaining Moralist; to which was prefixed 'Thoughts on Education and the Manner of conveying Instruction properly.'

A year later there was established in Newcastle a newspaper which was destined to run side by side with the oldest local journal down to our own day. The founder and printer was Thomas Slack, the paper was *The Newcastle Chronicle*.

In sending out the first number of the *Chronicle*, Slack hinted at some dispute or misunderstanding that had arisen between himself and the proprietors of the *Journal*, for he wrote:—

¹⁶ Newspapers in these early days were delivered to local subscribers by hand. The practice had not entirely died out even in the middle of the nineteenth century. So late as 1854, Thomas Grearson, landlord of the Beehive public house, hard by the old printing office of the *Newcastle Chronicle*, in which he had formerly been employed, delivered that paper to subscribers at South Shields and Jarrow every Friday morning.

We do not mean to insinuate any better abilities towards conducting a paper than our neighbours, or that the public should receive our attempts to serve them as a favour. When we candidly confess that we were in the course of trade unwillingly necessitated to it, and tho' the term *necessitated* may seem to want explanation to the public in general, yet it must be very plainly understood and assented to by our senior news-writers here, who consequently must least of all disapprove our measures.

A touch of sardonic humour follows :----

In this paper will be exhibited news, foreign and domestic, the prices of grain, stocks, etc., and to render it a magazine of entertainment as well as a paper of intelligence, there will frequently be inserted characters of, and extracts from, new books, with other select and original literary articles in prose and verse. As for the *select*, we have no great doubts about having fund enough to collect from; but for *originals*, should our literary correspondents which we have engaged and rely on for that purpose, fail us, we are alas! unwarily bound by virtue of our proposals (like other ingenious publishers) to write to ourselves.

A copy of the first issue shows that three-fourths of the paper is filled with advertisements, among which, besides the announcements of Mr. Slack's publication—The New English Tutor—are Dr. Chas. Hutton's Schoolmaster's Guide, and a tract with a curious title, namely, Die and be Damned, or an Antidote against every species of Methodism and Enthusiasm.

While Mrs. Slack wrote books under the signature of 'A. Fisher,' her husband performed a similar service in the name of 'S. Thomas.' She catered for schools, he for the counting house; she produced grammars, tutors, preceptors and a memorandum book for ladies,¹⁷ he compiled negotiators, calculators, sure

¹⁷ After Mrs. Slack's death, this publication was continued by her daughters and published by their brother-in-law, Solomon Hodgson, till 1805, when the failure of a London firm (Robinson and Co.), who had acquired an interest in the publication, caused it to be discontinued. Mr. Preston, editor of the *Chronicle*, told Thos. Bell that 1,000 copies of the work were printed for several years. The letterpress part—poetry, enigmas, charades, various tables, etc.—was struck off in Newcastle; the calendar, or ruled part, and the engravings, were done by Messrs. Robinson in London, save a few patterns for ladies' dresses, which were engraved by Beilby and Bewick. guides and a memorandum book for everybody. Thus working together as authors and publishers, and probably co-operating in newspaper work, they built up a large and successful business.

Mrs. Slack died April 25, 1778, aged 58; her husband followed her January 13, 1784, aged 65. Having no son to succeed them, their business came into the hands of Solomon Hodgson, who, February 15, 1785, married their daughter Sarah. A tombstone in St. John's churchyard, Newcastle, preserves the record of them and their family.¹⁸

ROBERT MARCHBANK, 1761.

Little is known of a printer bearing this name who had a press in Custom House Entry, Newcastle. Among the Roxburghe ballads at the British Museum are two imprinted—' Newcastle: Printed and sold by Robert Marchbank in the Custom House Entry.' Brand, *Hist. Newcastle*, vol. 1. p. 98, notes a book by John King, usher in the Grammar school, entitled *Sententiæ ex diversis Auctoribus excerptæ*, etc., and states that it was imprinted by 'R. Marchbank' in Newcastle. No further reference to Marchbank and his press has been found.

THOMAS SAINT, 1769-1788.

Shortly before Thomas Slack started the *Newcastle Chronicle*, the venerable printer John White took into partnership Thomas Saint, descendant of a family of merchants and yeomen at Morpeth: born there, son of Mr. Joseph Saint of that town, July 3,

Their shop was a club as well as a shop, where by the law of affinities, the litterateurs, artists, actors and politicians of the district congregated. Tradition assures us that their colloquies on topics of current interest exerted an elevating influence on local aspirations and habits.' 1738. Mr. White's partner had duly served his time with Bryson and Charnley, to whom he was apprenticed on New Year's day, 1754, paying a premium of £50. The old imprint of John White was changed in 1761 to that of 'J. White and Co.' and in 1763 to that of 'J. White and Thomas Saint.' In this latter form it remained until the death of Mr. White; thenceforward Thomas Saint carried on the establishment in his own name.

It was Saint's good fortune to be associated, in the earlier stages of their career, with two men who rose to eminence in their respective callings--Charles (afterwards Dr.) Hutton the mathematician and Thomas Bewick the engraver. Within a year of their partnership White and Saint printed Hutton's first attempt at authorship, The Schoolmaster's Guide, and soon afterwards, when Saint stood alone in the business, he issued in monthly numbers to over 1,000 subscribers Hutton's treatise on mensuration, for which Bewick cut his first wood block, a sketch of the tower of St. Nicholas's church. Saint had noted the budding genius of young Thomas Bewick, and gave to his apprentice-master and future partner, Ralph Beilby, numerous orders for cuts to illustrate children's books and the usual stock of the flying stationer, in the production of which both White and Saint had a wide reputation. Nearly all the books which Bewick illustrated in his early career as a wood engraver were printed by Saint—notably the three sets of *Fables*, the *Lottery* Book, Child's Tutor, and Youth's Entertaining Story Teller. From the same prolific press came Hutchinson's History of Northumberland, the Rev. James Murray's History of the Churches, and many other valuable works, including a curious specimen of printing in script, being fifty-two 'manuscript' sermons by the Rev. D. Pape of Morpeth.

Thomas Saint died July 31, 1788, and was buried among his ancestors at Morpeth,¹⁹ leaving the *Courant* and the printing

business to John Hall, who had been his apprentice, and Joseph Elliott.²⁰ It is somewhat singular that no local annalist records the decease of this eminent journalist and publisher, and nowhere in local history is to be found an account of his origin, his family connections, his life and labours upon Tyneside.

THOMAS ANGUS, 1774-1787. MARGARET ANGUS, 1787-1812.

At a time when Thomas Slack in Middle street, Thomas Saint in Pilgrim street, and Isaac Thompson in the Side, with their respective newspapers at their back, were in the full tide of business, a typographer named Thomas Angus began to exercise his craft at Trinity corner, St. Nicholas's churchyard. His firm makes its first appearance on the imprint of The Freemason's Companion, published in 1774. By the following year he had entered into partnership with Thomas Robson, and then began a series of change ringing imprints that are somewhat confusing. Hilton's Poetical Works, dated 1775, are issued by 'Angus and Robson'; a sermon on Freemasonry by the Rev. Robt. Green, bearing the same date, purports to be printed by 'Robson, Angus and Co.,' while Whitehead and Jameson's Armsof the Incorporated Companies are published in 1776 by 'Angus Robson and Co.' Thenceforward, however, the names appear at the head of separate establishments. That the separation was effected in 1776 is evident from the fact that T. Robson began in that year to publish a serial-The Newcastle Weekly Magazine -and that on November 23 in the same year he issued the first number of the Rev. James Murray's lectures on Genesis, a work that was completed in twenty weekly parts at threepence.

²⁰ 'All persons who stood indebted to the late Mr. Thomas Saint, Printer, of this town, at the time of his decease, are requested to pay the same to Messrs. To the press of Thomas Angus, Newcastle is indebted for its first local directory—Whitehead's Newcastle Directory for 1778.²¹ William Whitehead was a musical instrument dealer in the High Bridge who had a taste for the compilation of local annals, and only the year before had employed Angus to print for him a small octavo book of 144 pages, entitled, Whitehead's Historian's Pocket Companion or Memory's Assistant.

From the same press issued two or three of the books written by the Rev. James Murray, a polemical Presbyterian divine whose career in Newcastle redeems local literature during the latter half of the eighteenth century from imputations of tameness, sameness and mediocrity. The Angus typography is, indeed, fairly prominent throughout that period. For, after the death of the founder of the firm (February 15, 1788) at the early age of 43, the business was continued by his widow, Margaret Angus, and when the nineteenth century came in, by M. Angus and Son.²² Four interesting productions of the Angus press may be noted:—

1. 'The Protestant Packet, or British Monitor,' edited by a society of Protestants of which the Rev. James Murray was chief, and published in 27 numbers, dated 1780 and 1781.

2. 'Caps well Fit, by Titus in Sandgate and Titus Everywhere,' a

On July 4, 1825, a sale is announced, by Mr. Thomas Young, upon the premises of George Angus, in the Side, of a large assortment of type, cases, racks, stones, printing presses, etc., belonging to the said George Angus; also of a valuable collection of books, etc., on the premises, 13, Carliol street, lately occupied by the said George Angus. curious satirical work in rhyme, from the pen of William Hilton, the socalled Gateshead poet, issued in 1785.

3. 'The Newcastle and Gateshead Directory for 1795' (compiled by Hilton) printed by Margaret Angus, the widow.

4. 'The Oeconomist,' a small 12mo. monthly of 24 pages, started in January, 1798, and conducted by Thomas Bigge of Benton, James Losh, Recorder of Newcastle, and others, to provide the common people with cheap and instructive reading. Its price was 'only three halfpence, or one guinea for 250,' but in February, 1799, the subscription was raised to twopence and in December of that year it ceased to exist.

THOMAS ROBSON. T. ROBSON AND CO. } 1776-1787.

After separating from Thomas Angus, Thomas Robson,²³ setting up his press, first in the middle of the Side and afterwards at the corner of Groat market and Pudding chare, began the publication of the Newcastle Weekly Magazine, a serial in which the cause of the American revolt was explained and sustained. The death of Isaac Thompson having placed the Newcastle Journal in the market, Robson acquired the property and, at the beginning of the year 1777, changed the day of publication from Saturday to Wednesday. It was so published from the first week in January to the first week in August in that year, when the Saturday issue was resumed.

In the meantime Robson issued a prospectus of a monthly periodical at sixpence to be named the *Evangelical Magazine* or *Christian Library*. This publication was to contain (1) an ecclesiastical history, (2) a connected view of the doctrines and duties of Christianity, (3) biographies of famous persons, and (4) detached essays on religious subjects, sacred poetry, etc. Each of these subjects was to form a volume, or volumes,

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capable of being bound with separate titles or with 'Evangelical Magazine' at the back, as the purchaser pleased. In this enterprise Robson announced that he was assisted by 'a Society of Ministers and others,' who would act as editors. The first number came out on Saturday, August 3, 1777, and in the next issue of the *Journal* it was stated that 'the first impression of *The Evangelical Magazine* published last Saturday is almost sold off.' The second number appeared on September 6, and the *Journal* was able to boast that 'the demand has far exceeded the most sanguine expectations of the editors, insomuch that the second edition of the first number was nearly disposed of in the course of a few days.' In the book list attached to the present paper (see note on p. 91), the fate of this undertaking may be seen.

Some of the Rev. James Murray's books were printed and published by Robson's firm, chief among them being An Impartial History of the Present War with America which, in 1778, was announced to be completed in twenty-four sixpenny numbers, making two volumes octavo, with 'a most superb and elegant set of engravings (for framing and glazing), to decorate the cabinet of the curious.'

After the year 1780, Robson's name, either as T. Robson or T. Robson and Co., is not found upon the title pages of Newcastle printed books, though the Directory for 1787 includes him as a printer at the head of Pudding chare. The date of the stoppage of the Newcastle Journal is not clearly shown in local chronicles, but a MS. note by the late James Clephan in a copy of Sykes's 'Records' states that on August 9, 1788, 'The Newcastle Journal announced its discontinuance,' and as according to Mackenzie, (History of Newcastle, p. 727), Robson's firm printed it till 1788, there seems to be substantial agreement that it ended at that date. Yet Mackenzie adds that at the time of its cessation it was printed by George Temple and Co., a statement which creates a chronological difficulty.

GEORGE TEMPLE AND CO., JOHN HARRISON.

GEORGE TEMPLE AND CO., 1782-1786.

The Newcastle Directory for 1782 contains the name of 'George Temple, Burnt House Entry, Side, Printer and Dealer in Patent Medicines.' The Berwick Museum, a monthly magazine published in the Border town at that period, announces the death, on May 26, 1786, 'after a few days' illness,' of 'Mr. Temple, printer, Newcastle,' and in the Bodleian Library, Oxford, is a small brochure of twenty-four octavo pages containing a Treaty of Navigation, etc., between England and France, with an imprint —'Newcastle: Printed by the successors of G. Temple and Co., 1786.' From the Directory for 1787 the name of Temple disappears. It is difficult, therefore, to understand Mackenzie's statement that G. Temple and Co. printed the Newcastle Journal at the time of its decease in August, 1788.

JOHN HARRISON, 1780-1782.

John, son of John Harrison of Parkhead, Cumberland, was, if not the first, one of the earliest, apprentices of William Charnley when in partnership with Martin Bryson. He was bound for seven years from July 10, 1751, and is probably the man who, being in business as a printer and bookseller at Carlisle, began in 1779 to issue in weekly numbers a folio edition of a celebrated, but in a complete form expensive, edition of the Scriptures known far and wide as Ostervald's Bible. He obtained subscribers all over the northern counties, and finding that Carlisle was too far west for economical distribution he removed to Newcastle. A threepenny periodical which he published under the title of the *Carlisle Magazine* remained, it is to be presumed, behind him, or perhaps quietly ceased to exist.

In Newcastle, from premises which he found available down Vine entry, in the Flesh market, he sent out in due course

further copies.²⁴ But before the work was finished an accession of fortune enabled him to migrate to London, where he hoped to find wider scope for typographical enterprise.²⁵ There the issue of the great Bible, begun at Carlisle and continued at Newcastle, was resumed and completed; there also he published an edition of Rapin's history of England, and there we must leave him.

THOMAS LAWSON, 1782-1784.

The business connection which Harrison abandoned was taken up by Thomas Lawson, a printer from Thomas Slack's establishment. Having acquired Harrison's surplus stock of numbers, he began the publication of another edition of Ostervald, which was quite as successful as the first. A passion for buying, by weekly instalments, family Bibles as large, or larger than, pulpit Bibles, had set in and Lawson and his distributors were reaping the harvest.

William Whitehead, musical instrument dealer, already noted, issued four directories of Newcastle, and changed his printer every time. With his first he went to the Angus press, with his second to Thomas Lawson, with his third to Angus again, and with his fourth to David Akenhead. Whitehead's Directory is, apparently, the only book, besides Ostervald's Bible, upon which Lawson set his mark. It covered the years 1782, 1783 and 1784, but before it had run its course the printer was dead and his affairs in the hands of his widow.

LANCELOT DINSDALE, 1784-1786.

Thus bereaved, Mrs. Lawson employed another printer from Thomas Slack's establishment, named Lancelot Dinsdale, to manage the business. Him, shortly afterwards, she married. More suitable premises were found in an adjoining court— Cannon entry, Flesh market, and thither the printing office was transferred. Lawson's edition of Ostervald being completed, Dinsdale started a fresh one which promised to be equally successful with the others. But again misfortune interrupted publication. Dinsdale failed and his business was purchased by Matthew Brown. Thus it happens that one of the Newcastle editions of Ostervald's Bible is found bearing the imprint of L. Dinsdale on the title page of the Old Testament, and that of M. Brown on the New.

Dinsdale printed a book relating to the Trinity House written by George Marshall, the sailor poet. He also began the publication in numbers of the works of Josephus, which at the same time were being issued by the Angus firm. Hence arose much squabbling and ill-feeling, which ended, as such affairs often do, in an agreement under which Josephus was sent forth in the names of both firms jointly.

SOLOMON HODGSON, 1785-1800.

Harking back to the death of Thomas Slack, we take up the tale of his successor. Slack died in January, 1784, leaving one married and two unmarried daughters. One of the latter, Sarah

board one of the sailers that traded between Tyne and Thames. The vessel was detained by contrary winds at Shields and his subscribers were becoming clamorous. He therefore got his press set up in the castle precincts, used a table monument in the Priory graveyard as an 'imposing' stone, and amid these surroundings printed off the belated part before the ship was able to resume her voyage.

Slack, was united, as already stated, to Solomon Hodgson. It is suggested that Hodgson, a native of Cumberland, had been apprenticed to Slack, but there is no evidence either one way or the other. He was 24 years old when Slack died and probably carried on the business on behalf of the family till, the period of mourning having elapsed, he was able to marry the daughter. A week after the marriage, namely, on February 21, 1785, the executors of Mr. Slack transferred to him the *Newcastle Chronicle*, with the great printing, bookselling and stationery business, and the agency for the sale of patent medicines attached thereto.

Assisted by his wife, as we have seen, Mr. Slack had been his own editor, publisher, reporter and advertising agent. Assisted in like manner by his wife, who inherited much of her father's tact and her mother's ability, Hodgson followed his father-in-law's example in conducting the *Chronicle*. Blessed with a retentive memory, he was able, like Dr. Johnson and 'Memory' Woodfall, to report speeches without notes. It is recorded of him that in June, 1792, returning from an open-air meeting at Morpeth, with an address by Charles (afterwards earl) Grey in his head, he was able to reproduce a column and a half report of it for his paper. By his energy and fearless expression of opinion he raised the *Chronicle* to the position of the leading organ of Whig politics in the North of England.

One of his first undertakings in book publishing was Hutchinson's *History of Durham*. Two of the thick quartos which compose this monumental work, were issued by him; over the third there were disputes, ending in litigation, into which we need not enter.

After the death of Thomas Saint, Solomon Hodgson became the friend and literary adviser of Thomas Bewick. He assisted the great engraver to compile his *General History of Quadrupeds* and printed it; printed also the first volume of the *Birds*, and

himself compiled a collection of essays, narratives, etc., entitled The Hive of Ancient and Modern Literature, to which Bewick contributed three or four woodcuts which, in subsequent editions, were increased to fourteen.

Under Hodgson's editorship the Newcastle Memorandum Book maintained its popularity. It was issued in full limp calf with a pocket at each end and about two feet of red tape attached to the flap to keep the contents intact—said contents including 6 pages of a 'Guide to the Turf' and 23 pages recording the result of all races ran in England, Scotland and Wales during the preceding year.

Among other works issued from the Hodgson press were the famous reports of John Bailey and George Culley on the agriculture of Northumberland, Bailey's treatise on the plough and Turner's discourses. It was not, however, so much in the publishing line as in journalism that Solomon Hodgson's abilities shone. He gave up to John Bell, in 1794, his bookselling and stationery shop, and thenceforward devoted all his energies to his newspaper. Unfortunately the 'thenceforward' was brief. On April 4, 1800, aged only 39 years, he passed away. His widow succeeded him and, with the assistance of William Preston,²⁶ carried on the *Chronicle*, bought back the business sold to John Bell, and infused new life into the whole concern. She was followed by her sons Thomas and James, the former known to some of us as a painstaking antiquary, and the latter

²⁶ William Preston came to Newcastle in 1784, to be editor, compositor and man of all work on the *Newcastle Chronicle* (succeeding old Robert Moor, for many years manager of Slack's printing office) at a salary of £50 a year, 'enough' said he, 'to afford me a jill, a joke and a jacket.' This salary was afterwards increased to £60 and then to £70. As Mrs. Hodgson refused to give more, and the sum he received was less than the wages of some of the workmen in the office (Simpson the pressman had 30s. a week), he resigned and commenced business in partnership with William Heaton, in May, 1808. known to everybody as alderman Hodgson, twice mayor of Newcastle, and for many years chairman of the Corporation Finance Committee.

In St. John's churchyard, Newcastle, is a tombstone upon which may be read :—

Sacred to the memory of Solomon Hodgson. In times of unexampled difficulty the honest and independent conducter of the Newcastle Chronicle. As he could not stoop to court the smile of any man, so neither did he fear any man's frown; but through the medium of an uncorrupted press delighted in disseminating the principles of rational liberty and eternal truth. Nor was he less estimable in private life. In his affections ever awake to the best sympathies of our nature, the manly vigour of his understanding found its equal only in the kindness of his heart. He died April 4, 1800, æt. 30. Hoc perpetuæ charitatis monumentum qua erga præstantissimum conjugem tenetur mærens posuit Sara Hodgson.

MATTHEW BROWN, 1786-1803.

Matthew Brown began his typographical career at North Shields, but in April, 1784, he came to Newcastle and, entering into partnership with one William Thompson, started a printing establishment on the Quay, near the Custom House. From thence the firm issued proposals for publishing in numbers at sixpence each, with superior illustrations, a quarto edition of a *History of England* by James Robertson. This was successful and then the firm began (February, 1785) to tempt local readers with a monthly serial—*The Newcastle Magazine or Monthly Journal*. That undertaking was not a prosperous one. The magazine lasted till February, 1786 only, and the firm itself was broken up in June of that year.

Matthew Brown continued the business on the Quay till September following, when he purchased the stock, etc., of Leonard Dinsdale, and removed to Dinsdale's place in Cannon entry, Flesh market. Here he set up an outward sign, that of 'The Bible,' stimulated thereto, no doubt, by the success of Ostervald's edition of the Scriptures which, as already related, Dinsdale had begun to issue. Stimulated again, and to still further

enterprise, by the cessation of the Newcastle Journal, he commenced the publication on October 18, 1788, of another newspaper—The Newcastle Advertiser, or General Weekly Post. It was issued from his shop 'at the Bible in the Flesh Market' every Saturday, and had a fair run of success—attaining, when three months old, the respectable circulation of 1,000 copies. After his death, in 1803, various changes of proprietorship occurred and eventually the paper was removed to Durham and became The Durham County Advertiser.

Matthew Brown devoted his printing establishment to a development of the system, then coming into vogue, by which standard works were brought within reach of the masses in twopenny, fourpenny or sixpenny numbers. Ostervald's Bible had an immense sale. It is certainly a monumental work. Α copy of it in full calf from the library of the Rev. John Brand, the Newcastle historian, with illustrations by Beilby and Bewick, stands 16 inches high, is 10 inches wide, 3 inches thick, and weighs 15 pounds! Other publications \mathbf{of} his. in like serial form, were a Life of Christ and Gessner's Death of Abel in parts at twopence-halfpenny; Bunyan's Holy War at threepence; the Book of Common Prayer and Hervey's complete works at fourpence; and Captain Cook's Voyages at sixpenceall of them embellished with portraits and pictures.

When he had been fifteen years in business and was in the full swing of prosperity, Matthew Brown suffered heavily from a fire, which destroyed his residence and the more valuable part of his stock; suffered so heavily indeed that the shock eventually killed him. He died after a lingering illness, April 4, 1803.²⁷

²⁷ In the Notes at Capheaton, Thomas Bell states that the widow and executrix, Elizabeth Brown, continued the newspaper and letterpress printing till September 12, 1803, and then sold the whole to John Thompson and Charles Hutchinson. They published the Advertiser jointly until June, 1804, when Hutchinson died at Hexham. The paper was continued by Thompson till October 3, 1811, when it was purchased by Edward Humble

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WILLIAM THOMPSON, 1790- (?)

At the dissolution of his partnership with Matthew Brown, William Thompson removed to North Shields, where, for about four years, he carried on a printing, bookselling and stationery business. In April, 1790, he returned to Newcastle and set up his presses on the Quayside. Emulating his former partner's example, he adopted the plan of issuing books in numbers. In that manner he sent out a quarto edition of a Life of Christ and an octavo edition of the Life of John Howard, LL.D. and Upon the title page of Howard's Life his initials F.R.S.'W. T.' appear, cut by Bewick, with embellishments of flowers, palms, etc. It would seem, from the absence of evidence on title pages and the testimony of the local directories, that his second career in Newcastle was somewhat brief, perhaps briefer than his first. His name appears in the Directory for 1790, but never again.

HALL AND ELLIOTT, 1788-1795.

John Hall, succeeding Thomas Saint in 1788, entered into partnership with Joseph Elliott, and, under the style and firm of 'Hall and Elliott,' published the *Courant*, printed pamphlets and

and Son, who added a second title—*The Freeman's Weekly Post.* The price paid for it was said to be 900 guineas. Sanderson Ilderton, a county magistrate, was supposed to be interested in the purchase, for he applied at Quarter Sessions for a share of the county advertisements and was refused, an incident which led to a war of pens between the *Advertiser* and the *Courant.* Humble and Son pushed the sale of the paper by the device of a newsman clothed in the uniform of a mail-guard blowing a horn in local market places. That, however, did not answer. It was then proposed to issue it on Thursdays, but the change involved the county circulation in difficulties. Finally, it was taken to Durham and published as a county paper by Francis Humble and Co., the Co. being Sir Cuthbert Sharp, George Andrews, bookseller, Phineas Fewster, J. White, Benj. Howard, John Burrell, Alex. Logan, Thomas Rutherford and Ralph Hutchinson. In 1823, this partnership was dissolved and Francis Humble carried on the business alone,

tracts, and vended patent medicines. Comparatively few books passed through their hands as printers, and not many of them were of interest or importance. They published a couple of local song books—a *Bishopric Garland* of 20 pages 16mo, and a *Northumberland Garland* of 72 pages, same size; also one of the pamphlets of Graham the 'Earth Quack' who, vaunting the remedial effect of bathing in garden soil, admitted the public to see him and a young woman, styled the Goddess of Health, immersed naked in the ground to their chins. This charlatan, visiting Newcastle in July, 1791, exhibited himself with one goddess in a field near Hanover square, and with a couple of Hall and Elliott's publications were chiefly sermons, essays, and discourses of a religious character.

John Hall died in June, 1795, and it is probable that Elliot departed, in one of the two usual meanings of that word, a little earlier. For an advertisement in the *Newcastle Chronicle* of June 20, 1795, invites claimants upon the estate of John Hall, 'sole proprietor of the business lately carried on under the firm of Hall and Elliot,' to send particulars to William and Elizabeth Hall, his executors. The *Courant* and the printing business belonging to it were sold to Edward Walker.

THE AKENHEADS.

In the last decade of the eighteenth century, David Akenhead, descendant of booksellers and stationers of that name formerly upon Tyne Bridge, added to his other occupations that of letterpress printer.

He first appears as a bookseller in 1772; his adventure into typography dates from 1790, when he brought out Whitehead's fourth directory of Newcastle and a poll book of that year's borough election. Then, having taken his sons into partnership, he issued a reprint of Ralph Gardiner's *England's Grievance*

Discovered in Relation to the Coal Trade, and printed that invaluable vade mecum of the mariner and the merchant-Hilton's Shipowner's Manual. The firm of David Akenhead and Sons soon formed a wide, and no doubt profitable, connection among commercial houses in the town and neighbourhood. For they sold 'sea charts, pilots, Neptunes and waggoners for all parts of the known world by the best authors; quadrants, compasses, telescopes for day or night; epitomes of navigation, seamen's assistants, log books, journal books, manifests, seamen's articles and affidavits, bills of lading, maps, prints and every other article of stationary (sic); a great variety of books in different branches of literature and genuine patent medicines of all kinds.' When the eighteenth century went out they were among the foremost tradesmen in their line, and the name of Akenhead remained over the shop on the Sandhill until the nineteenth century was half a century old.²⁸

JOSEPH WHITFIELD, 1780-1800.

Marshall Vesey, stationer, etc., at Darlington (one of the Veseys of Coniscliffe, married to a daughter of Patrick Sanderson, the famous Durham bookseller), finding his business on the banks of the Skerne unprofitable, came to Newcastle in June, 1777, and uniting his fortunes with those of Joseph Whitfield, assistant to Joseph Atkinson, Groat market, opened a shop at the north end of Tyne Bridge, under the name and style of Vesey and Whitfield. The partnership seems to have been dissolved about 1780.

In January, 1788, Whitfield announced that owing to the demolition of his Tyne Bridge shop, he was removing to the east side of the Sandhill till it could be rebuilt. Two years later, in December, 1790, he advertised *The Ladies Complete*

Pocket Book or Memorandum Repository (continued from 1789) for 1791, to be printed 'for' him by Hall and Elliott, and cautioned the public to 'be careful to ask for the Ladies Complete Pocket Book, printed for J. Whitfield, as there is an attempt to imitate it by another publication which is much inferior, as well in matter as in elegance.'

His name appears also on two or three reports and surveys in connection with a local movement to make canals from Tyneside instead of railroads, but upon only two of them (1795 and 1797) as printer. In 1798, however, he figures as both printer and seller of three sermons by the Rev. John Clark of St. John's chapel, Weardale, and in 1799, upon *The Vocal Miscellany*, a 36-page booklet of songs, the same imprint occurs. It would seem, therefore, that in 1797 he set up a printing press on his own account. In any case his career was but short. On January 26, 1800, he died in the fifty-third year of his age.²⁹

Having brought Newcastle typography down to the eve of the nineteenth century, it is unnecessary to describe firms which began business at the very close of the period and belong to the succeeding generation. Such were Edward Walker of the *Courant*, John Mitchell of the *Tyne Mercury* and Vint and Anderson, publishers of the *Impartial History of Newcastle*.

It will be sufficient to note, in conclusion, that when the

²⁹ Mr. Bell describes Whitfield as a violent politician who distinguished himself, in 1793, by running counter to popular sentiment. Great controversy had been created by certain bills brought before Parliament by lord Grenville, which were stigmatised as 'Gagging Bills,' and petitions had been sent from Newcastle as elsewhere, against them. Whitfield prepared a counter petition, but obtained the signatures of only three persons, including his own. This exposed him to much ridicule and encouraged Charlton Nesbit to pin him to the wall in three amusing cartoons. Whitfield, his wife, and her parents, Thomas and Catherine Lumley, were buried in Corbridge churchyard, where a tombstone perpetuates their memory.

eighteenth century went out a complete revolution in typographical enterprise was being effected. The issue of Ostervald's Bible, in cheap numbers, had set a tide flowing which eventually covered the whole country. In June, 1809, Kenneth Anderson, successor of Vint and Anderson, announced that he was then distributing the following works in numbers at sixpence each:

A little later a London firm, with an agency in Gateshead, flooded the district with these 'numbers' as they were called. Their list contained 6 works in folio, 18 in quarto, 44 in octavo and 12 in pocket sizes—80 altogether. Among the folios were Matthew Henry's Commentary, 168 numbers at 6d., a History of England, 144 nos., and Fox's Martyrs, 100 nos. at 8d.; among the quartos were the Oxford Encyclopædia, 300 nos. at 8d., Universal Geography, 168 nos., and Brown's Self Interpreting Bible, 100 nos., at 6d.; while the octavos included the Newgate Calendar, 90 nos., Clarissa Harlowe, 58 nos., Hervey's Dialogues, 40 nos., Sir Chas. Grandison, 40 nos., and Sturm's Reflections, 34 nos. at 6d.

BOOKS PRINTED BETWEEN 1639 AND 1800.

BOOKS PRINTED IN NEWCASTLE, 1639-1800.30

A few years ago, Mr. Robert Alexander Peddie of St. Bride's Foundation, London, interesting himself in local bibliography, began the laborious task of compiling a list of books printed in Northumberland and Durham, together with an index to pictorial illustrations of Newcastle appearing in books, magazines and illustrated papers, down to the end of the nineteenth century. The fruit of his labours he generously presented to this Society.

The entries which follow are, for the most part, derived from Mr. Peddie's list, but amplified by further investigations, extension of titles, collation of pages,³¹ and the addition of initials indicating local libraries in which the majority of the books enumerated are preserved. The labour which these researches involved has been lightened by the hearty co-operation of Mr. Basil Anderton, B.A., chief librarian, and Mr. R. T. Richardson of the reference department, Public Library, Newcastle, and Mr. Henry Richardson of the Newcastle Literary and Philosophical Society, supplemented by the kindness of Mr. Matthew Mackey, the most ardent and successful collector of local literature in the North of England, Dr. Clark Burman of Alnwick, another industrious gatherer of local books, and Mr. John Gibson of the Castle.

Arranged in chronological order under the year date of issue, each publication in the list appears with the following particulars attached: —(1) The name of the author; (2) the title, which, unless especially curious and interesting, appears in condensed form; (3) the size and number of pages; (4) the name of the printer, and (5) within brackets, the initials of the libraries or private collections in which the book or booklet may be found.
