## III.-NEWCASTLE HOUSEHOLDERS IN 1665.

Assessment of Hearth or Chimney Tax.
By Richard Welford, M.A., a vice-president of the society. [Read on the 30th of November, 1910.]
At an early period in English history, the domestic fireplace, seat anid centre of family life, was considered, by both Crown and Church, to be a convenient object of taxation. So far back as the Conquest, according to Domesday Book, chimneys paid fumage or smoke money to the ling, and this tribute, in the reign of Edward miI, had extended into fuage, or focage (hearth silver), being a shilling for every fire. ${ }^{1}$ In like mannex, as we read in the Account Rolls of Durham Abbey, smoke pennies, or reek pennies, formed part of the abbey revenues in the 13th and 14th centuries, being possibly, even then, only a survival of the old Peter pence levied upon every house that had a chimney. ${ }^{2}$

The last imposition of a hearth tax in England was made to assist in providing for the expenses of the monarchy after the Restoration. Charles in became king on the 29th of May, 1660, and on the 1st of March, 1661-2, his majesty made a long speech to the Commons concerning his revenue. He complained of delay in settling it, reminded them of 'the miserable effects' which had attended 'the wants and necessities of the Crown' and conjured them, by all the professions of affection which they had made, to betake themselves to 'some speedy resolutions, and settle such a real and substantial revenue upon me, as may hold some proportion with the necessary expences I am at for the peace and benefit and honour of the kingdom.'

Thus appealed to, the Commons, on the same day, resolved that the matter of the king's majesty's revenue should be first taken into consideration, and that no other business should be allowed to intervene. Immediately afterwards they ordered that a bill be brought in for laying an imposition of $2 s$. each upon chimney hearths, and it was brought in at once and read a first time. By the 12th of March it had passed through all its stages, was then sent 'up to the Lords, approved by them and in due course received the royal assent. ${ }^{3}$

The tax was charged half-yearly upon every dwelling, at $2 s$. for each fire-hearth and stove, and was payable by the occupier upon a return to be made by him to the constable, tithing man, or other such officer, within whose district the dwelling was situated. Power was given to this officer to enter houses and verify the returns, and these returns, duly completed, were to be sent to the county justices at quarter sessions, enrolled by the clerk of the peace, and a duplicate thereof forwarded to the Court of Exchequer. In towns like Newcastle, which are counties of themselves, the sheriff was to receive the returns from the local officers and collect the tax. Exemptions were made in favour of those whose poverty already excused them from payment of poor and church rates, or who could prove that the annual value of their houses did not exceed 20 s ., and that neither they, nor any other person using the same, occupied land of 20 s . value, or possessed property to the value of $10 l$. Inmates of hospitals and almshouses whose endowment and revenue did not exceed 10l. per annum, were in like manner exempt, as were also private ovens, kilns, blowing houses and furnaces. ${ }^{4}$

After a year's trial, this tax, disliked and resented all over the country, had not yielded the expected amount of revenue, and on the 6 th of April, 1663, a committee of the Commons was

[^0]instructed 'to peruse the Act, and consider of the defects therein and how they may be supplied.' While the committee considered, the House ordered all members to inspect the chimney rolls in their respective counties, and report upon what each county might probably produce upon 'true returns' being made, the 'present yearly value' of the tax being reputed to be 170,6037. 12s. These instructions were obeyed, and a bill founded upon the committee's report duly tabled. It was defeated on the second reading, but on the 22 nd of July, another. bill was brought in, passed through all its stages, and received the royal assent within a week from its introduction. ${ }^{5}$

Still the collection was unsatisfactory, and upon suspicion that local officers permitted evasions and winked at inaccuracies, another Act, 'for the better ordering and collecting hearth money' was passed in $1664 .{ }^{6}$ By this Act the collecting was taken away from the local authorities and handed over to officers of the Crown. Thenceforward the screw was applied with unrelenting vigour and the tax became detestable.

Macaulay gives a graphic description of the methods adopterl in extorting this impost and the popular indignation which resulted therefrom:-.-7

The tax on chimneys was peculiarly odious, for it could be levied only by means of domiciliary visits, and of such visits the English have always been impatient. to a degree which the people of other countries can but faintly

conceive. The poorer householders were frequently unable to pay their hearth money to the day. When this happened, their furniture was distrained without mercy, for the tax was farmed, and a farmer of taxes is, of all creditors, proverbially the most rapacious. The collectors were loudly accused of performing their unpopular duty with harshness and insolence. It was said that as soon as they appeared at the threshold of a cottage, the children began to wail, and the old women ran to hide their earthenware. The collectors were empowered to examine the interior of every house in the realm, to disturb families at meals, to force the doors of bedrooms, and if the sum demanded were not punctually paid, to sell the trencher on which the barley loaf was divided among the poor children and the pillow from under the head of the lying-in woman.
'The good old dames, whenever they the chimney man espied, Unto their nooks they haste away, their pots and pipkins hide; There is not one old dame in ten, and search the nation through, But, if you talk of chimney men, will spare a curse or two.'
Efforts were not wanting in Parliament to obtain the withdrawal of this hateful tax. In the autumn of 1666 the Commons made a vigorous attempt to buy it up and substitute some other means of raising revenue. Pepys takes note of the proceedings in his diary, under date October 16 in that year:-

This day the great debate was in Parliament, the manner of raising the $1,800,000 l$. they voted the king on Friday; and at last, after many proposals, que moved that the chimney-money might be taken from the king, and an equal revenue of something else might be found for the king; and people be enjoyned to buy off this tax of chimney-money for ever at eight years' purchase, which will raise present money, as they think $1,600,000 l$., and the State be eased of an ill burthen and the king be supplied of something as good or better for his use.

The Tournals of the House of Commons confirm Pepys' note. A bill was brought in to effect the purchase, but, unfortunately, it did not materialize into an Act. Eventually supply was provided with the hearth tax retained. ${ }^{8}$

Pepys refers to the proceedings again on the 3rd of April, 1667. He was with the duke of York (afterwards James ir), Sir George Carteret, treasurer of the navy, and Sir Wm. Coventry,

a commissioner of the Treasury, when Sir George Carteret complained that he had no funds to raise money on. Thereupon-

Sir Wm. Coventry burst out and said he did supplicate his royal highness [the duke] and would do the same to the king, that he would remember who they were that did persuade the king from parting with the chimney-money to the Parliament, and taking that in lieu which they would certainly have given, and which would have raised infallibly ready-money; meaning the bankers and the farmers of the chimney-money, saying plainly that whoever did advise the king to that, did as much as in them lay cut the king's throat, and did wholly betray him. To which the duke of York did assent, and remembered that the king did say again and again at the time, that he was assured, and did fully believe the money would be raised presently upon a land-tax.

Outcry, remonstrance and agitation notwithstanding, the chimney money continued to be levied for over twenty years longer. It outlived Charles iI and the short and troublous reign of James ir, but perished with the advent of William and Mary. Macaulay states that when the prince of Orange came over to England, along the whole line of march from Torbay to London he was importuned by the common people to relieve them from the intolerable burden of this hateful tax. The prince lost no time in acceding to their request. He and his consort accepted the Crown on the 13th of February, 1688-9. On the 1st of March following he sent a message to the Commons in which 'having been informed that the revenue of the hearth money is very grievous to the people,' he expressed his willingness to agree 'either to a regulation of it, or to the taking of it wholly away.' The Commons chose the latter alternative, and on the 24th of April it was abolished. ${ }^{9}$

The incidence of the tax in the northern counties meets with scant notice in local history. The citizens of Newcastle, no doubt, grumbled and protested, and once at least the poorer sort, as will be seen presently, broke into open riot. It is probable, too, that at parliamentary elections this impost became a burn-

[^2]ing question. But, although there were half a dozen such elections in the town between the Restoration and the Revolution, no political conflagration arising out of this special grievance has been noted.

- Some of the hearth tax returns; ordered by the Act to be sent to the Exchequer, are preserved among the subsidy rolls in the national archives at the Public Record Office. One of them ${ }^{10}$ shows the assessment of the tax upon householders in Newcastle for the half-year ending Michaelmas, 1665, when Henry Maddison, second of his name in the civic chair, was appointed to the mayoralty. The official return for that halfyear was enrolled at quarter sessions held in Newcastle Guildhall on the 16th of January, 1666-7, during the mayoralty of Alderman William (afterwards the first Sir William) Blackett, and a duplicate thereof was duly sent to the Exchequer. Of that duplicate a transcript has been made for the purposes of this paper. It is contained in 22 membranes and is signed by William Blackett, mayor, Robert Shafto, Mark Milbank, John Emerson and Henry Brabant.

It will be seen from the figures above quoted that a considerable interval-a year and three months-passed between the dates of assessment and enrolment. No other reason appearing, it may be conjectured that the delay arose from the difficulty in collecting the tax. Not only was the impost unpopular but trade was bad, the demand for labour scarce, poverty everywhere and increasing. The year 1665 was the year of the great plague, which, although not so severe as in London and the south, did not altogether spare the north of England. Furthermore, we were at war with the Netherlands, France and Denmark. In the summer of 1666 things became worse. The colliers, keelmen and other dependents upon the staple industry of the Tyne were starving and desperate, and a few weeks after Alderman Blackett's election to the mayoralty, matters reached

[^3]a climax. At the end of November, when the collectors of the hearth money went into Sandgate, they were saluted with curses, threats and stones, and were twice driven out of the thoroughfare. On the morning of the 7th of December, the mayor himself went down to assist the collectors, but Sandgate set them all at defiance. In the afternoon his worship returned, accompanied by the Recorder and aldermen, and tried conciliation. He talked in a friendly way to the multitude, explaining that the tax was small, and promising that it should be taken from those only who were able to pay it. To which the residents replied that they had not bread to eat, that hundreds of them had lived for weeks upon oatmeal and cudbush boiled in water, and, therefore, had no money for taxes. The parley ended in an order from the mayor to take the tax from those only who were willing to pay, and so the tumult was appeased. ${ }^{11}$

In the transcript which follows we have the names of all the householders in Newcastle at the date of the assessment, distinguishing those who were liable to payment of hearth money from those who were not liable. The document is valuable because it enables an estimate to be made of the population of Newcastle at a time when no other data are available, and supplies what is practically a directory of the town a hundred and twenty-three years earlier than the first published directory.

The areas of collection were the twenty-four military divisions or wards, named after the gates and towers of the town wall. By the aid of an ancient document quoted in Brand's history of Newcastle, ${ }^{12}$ we can trace the boundaries of twenty-three of these divisions, and describe them, with a plausible degree of accuracy, in terms of modern street nomenclature.

In these twenty-four wards were 2,510 householders. Of that number 1,472 were liable to pay the tax and 1,038 were not

[^4]liable. Presuming that each household contained an average offive persons, the population of the town was 12,550 . Possibly the average is low, when we remember that nearly every tradesman had one or more apprentices living and lodging with his family. But, in the absence of more precise enumeration, we may fairly assume that the population of Newcastle in 1655 was not less than 12,500 and may have been a couple of hundred more.

Most of the householders who are returned as not liable had but one hearth or chimney each. Indeed only nineteen of them exceed that number, eighteen with two hearths each and one with three hearths. The fortunate householder who escaped taxation, although his house was warmed by three fires, was a minister named Thomas Thompson. ${ }^{13}$ There may have been something special in his case, for other ministers duly appear as liable, e.g., Vicar Naylor, Rev. John Clark of St. Andrew's, Rev. Wm. Cock, or Cox, of All Saints, and William Durant the Nonconformist. The Rev. John Shaw, of St. John's, is absent, but he was then rector of Whalton also, and did not reside in Newcastle till a year or two later.

The largest houses, judging by the number of hearths taxed, were situated in the Close, Sandhill, Westgate and Pilgrim Street. The occupiers of these mansions were Sir John Marley and Thomas Errington, with 17 chimneys each; Jane Shafto, 16 ; Sir James Clavering, 15; Francis Anderson (Anderson Place), Mark Milbank and Robert Shafto, 14 each; Thomas Bewick, Edward Blackett and Ralph Carr, 13 each; Richard Forster, Thomas Harrison, George Peascod and Thomas Peirson, 12 each; John Blakiston, John Clarke, Thomas Davison, Dr. Claudius Fenwick, John Garstall, William Johnson and Peter Sanderson, 11 each; George Beadnell, Robert Gardner, James Jenkinson, Thomas Ledgard, Christopher Nicholson, Andrew Rutherford, Joanna Sherwood, James Turner, and Lancelot

Westgarth, 10 each. ${ }^{14}$ Some of these names identify leading citizens who play responsible parts in local history. Other residents, equally prominent, lived in smaller houses, e.g., Henry Brabant, John Butler, William Durant, Robert Ellison and Ralph Grey, 9 hearths each; William Blackett (the mayor who signed the return), Robert Johnson and Robert Tempest, 8 each; Cuthbert Dikes, William London, John Rogers and George Thursby, 7 each; Bertram Anderson, Ambrose Barnes, Nicholas Fenwick, William Hutchinson, John Simpson and Thomas Wrangham, 6 each; Thomas Aubone, John Emerson, Alexander Hall, Robert Jenison, George Lewen, Henry Rawling and Matthew Ridley, 5 each. ${ }^{15}$

The following receipt for hearth tax, paid in Newcastle in 1682, thirty-seven years after the date of the levy herein contrained, has been kindly supplied from his local collections by our colleague, Mr. Matthew Mackey:
