a depth of only twenty inches. They had been severely burnt, most of the *denarii* being stuck together in one mass, and remains of burnt wood were found with them. A list of the coins prepared by Mr. H. H. E. Craster, F.S.A., is given below (pp. 250-254).

### THE COINS.


A small mass of folles found in 1912 deserves attention since this species of currency, as has been pointed out elsewhere, is rare on this site. The latest coin in it, that numbered 7 on the following list, is not earlier than A.D. 309, but the remainder can be all approximately dated A.D. 303-7. It should be observed that one of these eight coins has come from Carthage, a mint not otherwise represented in the Corbridge finds.



Tables are given below (p. 255) of (1) all silver coins found in 1912, (2) all copper and bronze coins of the Early Empire, (3) all types of antoniniani and other denominations of the second half of the third and of the fourth centuries, including new varieties of mint-marks, not previously found at Corbridge. As in previous reports, references are given to Cohen's Médailles Impériales (second edition except where otherwise stated), and to Mr. Percy Webb's monographs on the coinage of Carausius and Allectus in the Numismatic Chronicle.

Two coins call for special notice, namely, fig. 7 a Greek imperial bronze of Severus Alexander and fig. 8 an antoninianus of Carausius having a new type of reverse. The former is a coin of Caesarea in Cappadocia of A.D. 225, and recalls the find of a bronze medal of Septimius Severus from Hadrianeia in Hellespontus made on the same site in 1909. The coin of Carausius bears on its reverse the inscription invictors and for device the Sun-god hastening to the left. The type is similar to that of coins of Carausius having oriens avg on the reverse, and the legend invictors avg occurs on specimens in the Royal Mint and

in Lincoln museum, but this legend is new, as is also the combination of a star in the field and a whip in the left hand of the Sun-god. Both coins are here figured.

The writer regrets that his engagements prevent him from continuing beyond the season of 1912 the classification of coins which he has carried on since the commencement of the excavations. He gives, however, below a catalogue of an interesting little hoard of mixed silver and copper found in 1914 as a corroded mass in the eastern area of the excavations. It comprises thirty-two denarii and twelve copper coins, and is the only considerable collection of silver yet found on the site, though it may be remembered that a small find, consisting of an aureus of Domitian and seven denarii (1 Galba, 1 Vespasian, 1 Titus, 1 Domitian, 2 Trajan, 1 Hadrian) was made in 1911 and is described in the report for that year. The present hoard is made up as follows:—

The latest coin is a dupondius of the second consulship of Trajan anterior to that emperor's assumption of the title Pater Patriae, and consequently falls into the year 98. The hoard may therefore be assigned to the last two years of the first century. A noticeable feature in it is the later date of the copper coins, taken as a whole, as compared with the silver, and the fact that only four out of thirty-one denarii are subsequent to the death of Titus (A.D. 81), although the hoard belongs to the opening of

Trajan's reign. The scarcity of denarii of the sole reign of Domitian has been noted as a feature of silver hoards found in Germany, and is also characteristic of the general series of coins from Corstopitum. Generally speaking, the composition of this hoard of about A.D. 99-100 may be taken as a warning against the assumption, on numismatic grounds, of any extensive occupation of our site before the last decade of the first century. The only coins of any degree of rarity are the denarius of Vespasian with the heads of Titus and Domitian on the reverse, and the sestercius of Nerva commemorative of Augustus.

### III. GENERAL REMARKS.

It may certainly be claimed that the work of 1914 has produced definite and important evidence bearing on the history of Corstopitum. Other parts of the site have given us traces of an occupation which may roughly be placed between the years A.D. 90 and 110; but nowhere else have such traces been so numerous or so striking as those found during the past season

in the east field. If we may judge by the comparatively small depth at which the undisturbed sand or gravel was found, this area seems to have been originally the highest part of the site, and we may conclude that here was the centre of the occupation during the period mentioned, *i.e.*, from shortly after the departure of Agricola from Britain to the middle or latter part of the reign of Trajan.

The quantity of pottery of this period unearthed from a comparatively small portion of the east field tends to prove that this occupation was not brief or unimportant. Probably it followed the end of the first occupation of Newstead15 and the abandonment of the northern part of Agricola's conquests, and it seems to have come to an end with the disaster which befell the Roman arms in the north of England shortly before the accession of Hadrian. It seems likely that somewhere about A.D. 90 the limes of the Roman province was withdrawn to a line which nearly coincided with the line subsequently chosen Hadrian's Wall, and that this new limes was protected by some sort of praetentura, consisting in all probability of a number of fortified posts, of which Corstopitum was one. The remains found at the Haltwhistle-burn camp and at Nether Denton seem to be of the same period, and may indicate two other posts on the suggested line. Similar evidence, though not clearly recorded. has occurred at the Chesters (Cilurnum), and it is possible that Chesterholm (Vindolana) and Carvoran (Magna) may have originated as parts of the same scheme of defence. may perhaps be said of the stations at Old Brampton, Watchcross, and possibly Castlesteads. If similar evidence should in the future be found at one or more of the five last-mentioned places, it will become probable that the road known as the

Stanegate or Carel-gate formed the line which connected the forts of this early frontier, and in that case we might suspect the existence of an undiscovered station at or near Newbrough or Fourstones, while there is a possibility of early sites being proved between Corbridge and the sea. This theory, however, is stated as a theory only, and to some extent as a suggestion of places where excavation might usefully be carried out. Much additional evidence is wanted before the subject can be thoroughly cleared up, and such evidence cannot always be depended on to turn up by accident.

But in any case the late first-century occupation of at least some part of the site of Corstopitum has been established, and such an occupation makes the existence of a fort of that period a practical certainty. It is possible that in later times, when the Wall was in being and efficiently held, Corstopitum may have been at one or more periods an unfortified town; but in a.d. 90—110, when the place must have been a frontier post, with no such line of defence to the north of it, but only tribes who would naturally be emboldened by the recent withdrawal of the Roman power, such a state of things could not have existed. If there was a settlement, there must have been a fort, and we may claim, at least provisionally, that the ditches found in 1910, 1913, and 1914 indicate its position.

The fact that no traces of buildings, or of post-holes indicaing timber structures, have been found in this area, will, no doubt, be held to militate against the view here put forward, but as yet only the eastern fringe of the suggested fort has been examined, and perhaps the subsequent history of the area, so far as it can be traced, may have some bearing on the point. It is probable that the existence of the fort, qua fort, was ended by the disaster towards the close of Trajan's reign, and the pottery evidence of the whole site generally, in the opinion of Mr. J. P. Bushe Fox, points to that disaster having been followed by an

interval of some duration—perhaps fifteen years—during which Corstopitum was unoccupied.

Such an interval is quite in accord with the probabilities of the case. During the period occupied by the building of Hadrian's Wall, the force engaged on that work and subsidiary operations would be far too large to be provisioned from the resources of the adjacent country, which must certainly have suffered considerably at the time of the disaster. It seems probable that the whole or the greater part of the stores needed by the men engaged on the eastern half of the Wall were brought by sea, landed at Newcastle (Pons Aelii), and taken westwards by the military road which formed part of the Wall scheme, and would certainly be carried out in advance of the rest.

In that case Corstopitum would be, for the time being, needed neither as a fortified post nor as a supply base, and it may well have remained unoccupied while the building of the Wall con-But when the work was finished, and the Second, Sixth, and Twentieth Legions returned to their usual quarters at Caerleon, York, and Chester, the auxiliaries forming the permanent garrison of the Wall would probably not be too large a body to be provisioned from the produce of the country within a reasonable distance to the south of the Wall, which would by that time be resettled and reorganized. For the eastern half of the Wall the Tyne valley would be the most important producing area, and a central depôt for the assembly and distribution of such supplies would become necessary. For this no place would be so suitable as Corstopitum, situated in one of the widest and most fertile stretches of Tynedale, only two and a half miles to the south of the Wall, and about equidistant from Wallsend (Segedunum), the easternmost fort, and Carvoran (Magna), the westernmost fort of the eastern watershed.

These considerations render it probable that Corstopitum was unoccupied from, say, A.D. 115 to about the time when the Wall

was finished. At what date we should fix that event we can only guess. The late Dr. Bruce computed that with ten thousand men engaged the construction of the Wall and Vallum could not have taken less than two years, supposing the work to have been continuous—a supposition which it is impossible to make in view of the probable weather conditions in winter. If we take into account the work of repressing a recently rebellious district and of patrolling a newly demarcated frontier, the maintenance of communications, the preparation of materials, and the other works subsidiary to the actual construction of the line of defence, the estimate of ten thousand men appears too large, and the minimum of two years much too short. The period of work may quite well have been something much nearer ten years than two, and perhaps even ten years would be insufficient.

The revival of Corstopitum may accordingly have come as late as A.D. 130, and when it did come, the old site, or the principal part of it, seems to have been left alone, the centre of activity being shifted further to the west. Then, or not later than A.D. 140, the fort ditches, or at any rate those on the west side, must have been filled up, probably with the material forming the rampart, and the great road to the north was laid out along the western berm. If there were any masonry structures still remaining within the abandoned fort, they would be largely ruinous and would naturally disappear during the period of great building activity which followed the revival. The stones of the lower courses would be most in request, but any remains would afford a good supply of material for rubble concrete, such as that which formed the cores of the walls of the two granaries.

The absence of post-holes is at the best only negative evidence. We might expect to find timber buildings in connexion with such an occupation as there may have been in the time of Agricola—an occupation possibly limited to the duration of a single campaign. But here we seem to have the site of a fort
