letters. Probably there were never more than three lines, but the obvious meaning of the third line suggests that only the first half of each line has been preserved. The letters appear to have been scratched on the tile while it was still soft before baking. The letters are:

OMQ · · · | LIIND · · · | LEGE FELiciter.

Plainly, the third line is to be completed lege feliciter, 'read, to your good luck.' The other lines, which yield no clear sense, seem to be a reading lesson scratched by the teacher for the pupil The third line is then an exhortation to the learner to exert himself; possibly a modern teacher would have couched it more emphatically and less gracefully. A rather similar tile was found long ago at Silchester. It contains a number of more or less slightly differing names, Pertacus, Perfidus, Campester, Lucilianus, Campanus, and ends with a tag from the beginning of Vergil's Second Aeneid, conticuere omnes. This, as was well conjectured by Sir E. Maunde Thompson, was probably a writing lesson, for the pupil to copy.16 It is to be remembered that education was widely diffused in the Roman Empire. to it are common on archæological remains. Thus, a well-known wall-painting from Pompeii shows a school at the moment when a boy is receiving castigation in a quite modern fashion, and two of the Neumagen sepulchral reliefs show a lesson and a library respectively.

CONSPECTUS OF POTTERS' STAMPS ON PLAIN SAMIAN WARE FOUND AT CORBRIDGE, 1906-14.

Before the excavation of Corstopitum began, only one Samian potter's stamp had been recorded from the site. In the years 1906-14 the spade revealed upwards of 1300 examples. Some of these were fragments, bearing only two or three letters.

But the following list will shew that about 600 are complete or fairly complete. These figures are significant. They illustrate admirably the difference between the amount of finds likely to be made by chance on any unexcavated area and the amount to be won by methodic and systematic digging. Corbridge in this respect resembles other large archaeological sites, Silchester,

Wroxeter, Newstead. All of them declare the deceitfulness of appearances; they tell us, too, how little we can pretend to know of remains which have not been turned up by the spade.

The few Samian stamps found in the first two years of the excavation, 1906-7, were included in the reports for those years. But the number of finds rapidly increased and sinec seemed 1908 it has better to print only the important more


amples, that is, the stamps on decorated ware (a comparatively small number) and the really noteworthy among the stamps on plain ware. The rest, a vast host of names, many of which recur from year to year, are best suited to collective publication at the end of the work, when the different stamps can be compared, their varieties determined, repetition and overlappings cleared out, and a final list digested. The time for that is not yet; the excavation is not complete, nor is there a museum in which the speci-

mens can be put side by side. But it seems good at this moment to issue a condensed list of stamps on plain ware found and examined up to the end of the excavations of 1914. This list is the fruit of several men's labours, especially of Mr. G. L. Cheesman and Mr. P. Newbold; nearly all the stamps have been also examined by myself; in the preparation of the actual list great help has been given by Mr. D. Atkinson, who also for some years shared in the excavations.

The list is meant to serve provisionally, till a fuller catalogue can be compiled. Therefore its aim is limited. It gives all the names which have as yet been read with fair certainty on the plain ware of Corbridge, with the main varieties of form and punctuation. It adds the shapes of the various pieces, denoted by their numbers in the classification of these shapes which now obtains among students of Samian, and it states how many examples of each shape have been recorded; such an entry as '33 twice 'or 'two 33' means that the stamp in question occurs on two specimens of the cup known as 33. Notes are added only in special cases. On the other hand, little attempt has here been made to register smaller differences in the forms of letters, to distinguish between an ordinary and an unbarred A, an ordinary or an inverted N, and so forth. Nor have I thought it desirable to essay any precise dating. In many cases these stamps can not yet be dated; the one thing certain is that much of the German chronology set forth by Forrer, Knorr, and others, which some English archaeologists follow, is highly disputable; it is misleading to adopt or even to quote it, without more discussion than is possible in an excavation report or a provisional list. Nor, lastly, have I troubled in general to add the find spots. The objects have seldom been found in definite pits or strata or associated with other datable objects, and though it is often possible at Corbridge to argue from the occurrence of certain stamps to the occupations of certain sites (as has been noted year by year in the reports), it is

rarely possible to argue conversely: the deposits are not sufficiently 'sealed' or 'closed' for that process.

One or two remarks may be ventured on our list, by way of preface. It contains about 280 names (not counting varieties). Of these all but about a quarter—65—recur in Roman London, as Mr. Atkinson calculates on the basis of his recent enquiries, and about 110 recur among the 220 stamps found by Mr. Bushe-Fox in the two first years of his Wroxeter digging; we may



then infer that much the same kinds of Samian went to the towns of the south and the military regions of the north. Per contra, it is to be noted that the 65 Corbridge stamps which seem to be wanting in London are also (with hardly an exception) lacking at Wroxeter, so that the military districts seem to have some special features. It will be interesting to see if these likenesses and unlikenesses are maintained in future finds.

It may further be noted that very few shapes are used for the Corbridge plain ware. The vast bulk of the pieces belong to the class of straight-sided cup called 33 and to one or other of the varieties of the saucer or shallow bowl called 31; the cup called 27 is also fairly well represented. This limitation of varieties of shape is characteristic of second and third century Samian, as we may without rashness call most of our pieces. It would seem that in this period Samian was manufactured in vast quantities, and this proved inimical both to delicacy of execution and to variety and fancy in form. It is proper to add, however, that many of the pieces are so badly broken that their shapes cannot be recognized; identification is often difficult and mistakes very easy.

For convenience I add here a résumé of 26 stamps in our list, which there is substantial reason to assign to the first century—of course, to its later years, from about A.D. 80 onwards:—

To these may be added seven stamps found together in a pit of late first—or at latest, early second—century date in 1912 (report¹, p. 43), viz., Decuminus, Draucus f, of Lucan, Montani, Pacatu f, of Satarr, Tasgiliu. There are perhaps others which I have overlooked, but (I hope) not enough to alter the proportions of the amounts and the bearing of the evidence.

In the list which follows, 31, 33, and similar numbers denote the shapes of the vessels, square brackets denote lost letters, and an oblique line at the end of a stamp/ shews that a final letter or letters may have been broken off. The Pan Rock parallels are cited from my list in the *Ephemeris* (ix, 1358).
