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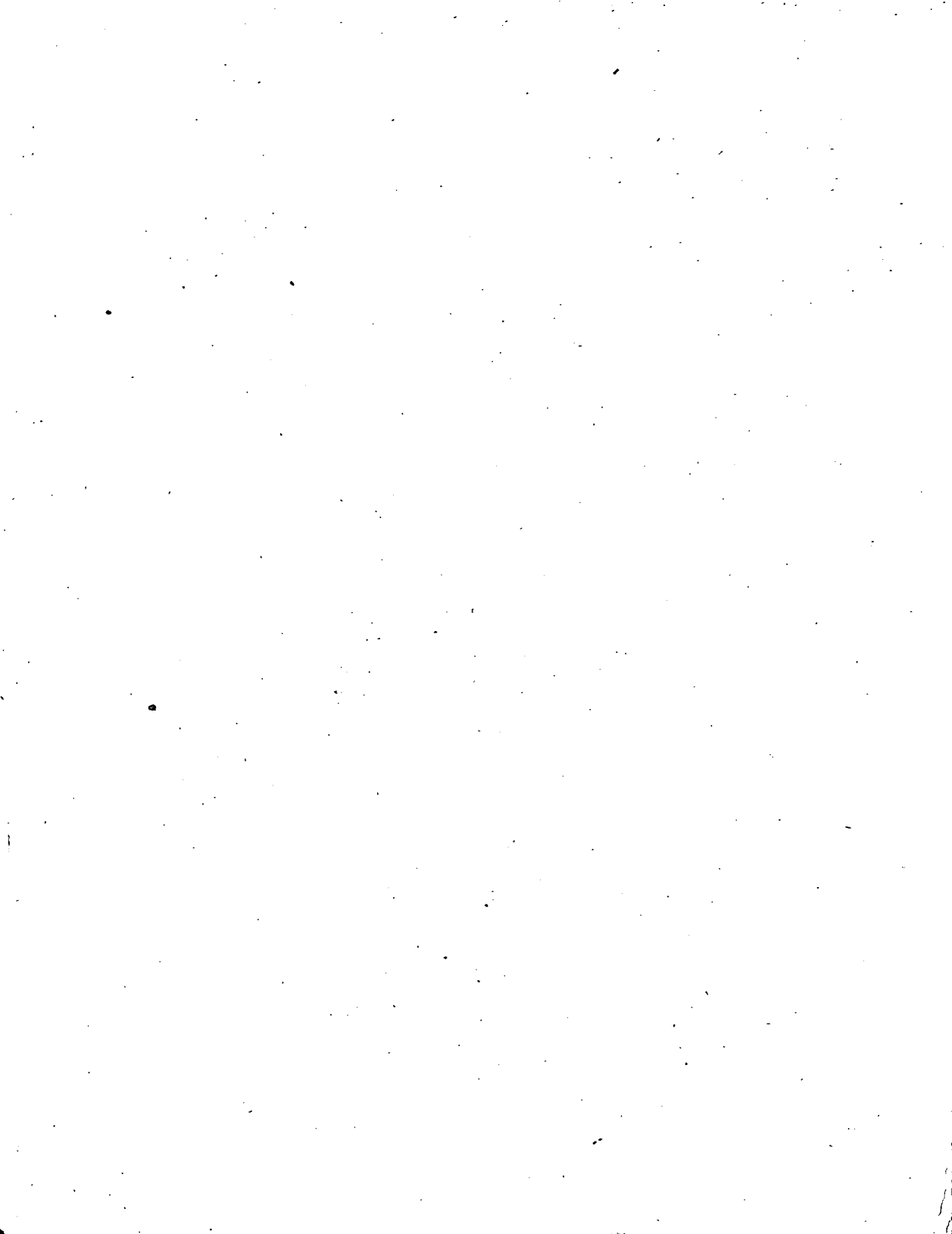

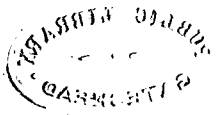

- Page 43, no. 88. The helmet was originally crested, but a fracture has given the crest the appearance of a spike. The bracer is a guard designed to protect the left wrist from the recoil of the bow-string. A bracer also found at Housesteads is now in the central case, together with specimens of Roman arrow-heads from the same station.—P.B.
- Page 49, line 4 from bottom. On the right hand end of the stone is the curved sword used by auxiliaries from the lower Danube.—P.B.

128. For 'Durham Seals 6' read '4.' Richard is styled clerk and procurator for Robert of Baldok. The village of Baldock is in Hertfordshire.

217. For 'deacon of St. Peter's' read 'dean.'
- 292 and 293. For 'Blida' read 'Blyth' (Notts.).
301. For 'of the' read 'del' see no. 2765.
324. For 'Durham Seals 7' read '8.'
335. Delete 'a spider' and read 'a goat's head with a letter on each side (?) B' A goat's head was the crest of the family.
344. For 'Braciator' read 'the Brewer.'
347. For '2-1 Elemos. 2' read '2-1 Elemos. 1.' His wife was Emma Musters see seal no. 1852.
357. For 'Wydo' read 'Guy.'
391. For 'Bremton' read 'Brempton.'
404. For 'Brokensford' read 'Drozensford.' He is styled rector of Hemingburgh, see Raine's 'History of Hemingbrough,' p. 50, and no. 814 in this catalogue.
409. On plate 8 No. 409 should read 468.
420. Note 115 for '24' read '34.'
457. Delete 'letters' after §" and read "ihr"
469. On plate 8 the first seal in second row is No. 469.
486. Delete this number and description entirely.
492. The legend should read "**en grace affie**." It is the signet of bishop Robert Neville see No. 3154. Burton was precentor of Lincoln and Archdeacon of Northumberland A.D. 1427. For account of his preferments see Visits. Linc., App. II, p. 174 and No. 3278 and note 27 in this catalogue.
512. Styled confessor of the church of Durham. In note 148 for 'baston' read 'bastons.'
515. For 'Cadamo' read 'Caen.'
525. For 'Camera' read 'Chambers.'
523. In legend for 'NEW' read 'HEW.'

527. For 'Cantuaria' read 'Canterbury.'
- 536-537. For 'Carnifex' read 'Butcher.'
- 552-558. For 'Castle Bernard' read 'Barnard Castle.'
566. For 'Cance' read 'Cavce.'
578. For 'Chemoke' read 'Chernoke.'
636. For 'Cletburn' read 'Cletlum.' He is styled Adam son of Walter of Cletlum a place in South Durham about 5 miles N.E. of Barnard Castle. See also F.P.D. 52.
644. For 'Cloncroft' read 'Cloucroft.' Cloucroft was near St. Helens Auckland, the place is now lost.
658. Note 184, for 'Pudsey's' read 'Puiset's.'
694. For 'Corbrigge' read 'Corbridge.'
700. For ('Plate VIII') read ('Durham Seals 8.')
737. For 'a landholder' read 'the terrer.' He was a monk of Durham and the terrer of the monastery (for note on this office see *Rites of Durham*, ed. Fowler, p. 281 (S.S. 107). For his account roll see *Durham Account Rolls*, II, 515 (S.S. 100). For his biography see *Scriptores Tres* (Surt. Soc. publ. for 1839), p. 113 and for note on his grave cover, *ibid.*, p. 123.
756. For 'Durham Seals 7' read 'Durham Seals 8.'
761. For 'officer' read 'official.'

774. Add (Durham Seals 10).

1934. Note 129 for '1890-91' read '1876-78.'
1935. Note 130, for '1890-91' read '1876-78.'
1938. This high sounding name should of course have been 'Taylor' and placed under T.
2017. For 'Richardus' read 'Ricardus.'
2048. Note 179 for 'Ralph' read 'Ranulf' and for 'St. Barbara' read 'Sainte-Barbe.'  
See also *Ancestor*, XII, p. 53.
2082. Note 191 delete semicolon after 'roll' in third line.
2214. For 'Sellarius' read 'Saddler.'
2272. For 'on shield' read 'a shield'; note 256 delete '(note 38.)'
2503. Note 74, delete 'he died 5 Henry III (1221)' and add 'he was appointed seneschal of Poitou, 16 Sept.; 1220 (*Cal. Pat. Rolls*, 1216-25, pp. 249, 252); he was reported to be dead 30 October, 1220 (*ibid.*, 269).'
2541. Delete 'above them two heads' and read 'above Our Lady two angels censuring.'  
The legend should read S'GIFREDI DE VEZA . . . . CAMERACÉN . . . . .
2547. Note 100, third line, for 'sister of Henry' read 'sister-in-law of Henry.'
2748. For 'Eelias' read 'Elias.'
2770. For 'BRACIATOR' read 'THE BREWER.'
2816. Delete comma after 'Edgar.'
2851. Note 103, third line, for 'Piepdie' read 'Pepdie.'
2870. For 'Lendyman' read 'Leudyman,' that is Ladyman, *levede* or *levidi* being Middle English forms of our word 'lady.'
2871. Note 118, delete all this note after 'living' and add 'A.D. 1154 *circa* A.D. 1166.'
2872. Note 119. For 'same man as No. 2871' read 'the son of Walter of Lindsay, lord of Lamberton, at the beginning of the thirteenth century.'

2873. Note 120. Delete all after 'William' and add 'son of Walter (No. 2871) living circa A.D. 1170.'
2943. Note 170a. For 'Mebsanby' read 'Melsonby.'
2982. Delete 'de.'
3022. Note 6, after 'Cyprus' add 'but it was recovered from his body and used till A.D. 1198 (Round's *Feudal England*, p. 539).
3023. Note 7, third line, delete 'and therefore before 1189.' John was not created earl of Mortain in Normandy till August, 1189; (Doyle's *Official Baronage*, II, p. 11.) He is styled in the charter *Johannes comes Moriton*. The date of the document cannot therefore be before August, 1189, though the seal itself is earlier.
3028. For plate '49' read '47' for both obverse and reverse.
3043. The obv. and rev. are illustrated on plate 72.
3047. In legend of obv. for 'gratia' read 'gra.' In legend of rev. after 'sigillum' read 'de scaccario.'
- 3048 (note 26<sup>a</sup>). This note is rather misleading; though I know of no examples earlier than Henry VI, both benches had seals *templ* Edward III and probably earlier (Rymer's *Foed.* (ed. Cayley, &c.), III, p. 868).
3059. Obv. delete ('Durham Seals 45).'
3061. Note 38, fourth line, for 'partly' read 'paty.'
3073. Throughout part V 'Scottish Royal Seals' for 'Durham Seals 48' read '46' and for '49' read '47.'
3120. Legend for 'GRAC.' read 'GRA.'
3162. Line twelve for 'pierced molets' read 'cinquefoils.'
3268. Note 17 for 'S.N.M.' read 'S.B.M.'
3332. Add ' (Durham Seals 61) ' and on plate 61 last row for no. 3220 read 3332. In the third row of the same plate for no. 3300 read 3303.
3395. Line 5; 'St. Cuthbert' should be in small capitals.
