


# V.—SEALS OF NORTHUMBERLAND AND DURHAM.

By C. H. Hunter Blair, M.A., F.S.A.

[Read on 28th March, 1923].

This catalogue contains a descriptive and annotated list of some of the seals used, previous to *circa* A.D. 1550, by the men and women, who either held lands in, or were officially connected with, the two northern counties. It does not include those which have already been described in 'The Catalogue of Seals in the Treasury of the Dean and Chapter of Durham,' published by this Society in Volumes VII to XVII of the third series of Archaeologia Aeliana.

It has been compiled from the various collections of charters, deeds and seals, calendars and transcripts of original documents catalogues, visitations and histories named in the list of abbreviations on p. 88.1 Its object is to supplement the Durham Treasury Catalogue so that the two together shall make a fairly complete list of all the extant seals, or descriptions of seals, of these two counties.

It is the result of some years' research at various places and in many dusty receptacles of ancient deeds. It is perhaps too much to claim that it is a definitive list. The writer is aware of some tantalising gaps, which he has not yet lost hope of filling, and there are probably some which he does not know. It seems, however, on the whole, better to publish it as it now is, rather than to wait in the uncertain hope of a few stray seals being ingathered at some doubtful future date.

This list, unlike its predecessor, is mainly of armorial seals. This is perhaps what one would expect as they are chiefly those of

people of a certain importance whose charters and deeds it was considered needful for someone to preserve. It has not, therefore, the delightful variety of the 'Durham Seals'; something is lost in that we have not here any of the vagrant fancies, the strange devices and curious conceits, which are such a large element in that great collection, and throw such interesting sidelights on the minds of our medieval forefathers. On the other hand, from the viewpoint of the art of armoury and the history of its development as well as of the alterations in 'cote armoure' brought about by marriage or inheritance, or of the differences used by different branches of the same family, it is very important. Attention may well be now directed to some of these points.

The silver 'faux escochon' on a red shield, the charge known later as an orle, the arms of the Baliol lords of Barnard castle is borne undifferenced by the main line of that family until it reaches the zenith of armorial glory when it appears on the dexter side of the throne on the obverse of the great seal of John Baliol, king of Scotland. It is also, for a while, upon the great seal of that fleeting shadow of a king, his son Edward, after whom as an undifferenced shield it disappears from armorial history.<sup>2</sup>

The fine seal of Hugh Baliol (No. 40), with its strange method of indicating the orle, bears in the sinister quarter the rampant lion of the lordship of Galloway, for his mother Dervorguile—an early and interesting attempt at what was known later as marshalling.

The bold shield-shaped seal of Roger Bertram (No. 70), bears apparently the entire arms of Baliol;<sup>3</sup> the crosses-crosslet of the lords of Mitford were evidently not added till after his date; they appear first on the seal and counterseal of his son Roger (No. 71). Possibly, like his successors, he bore the orle of gold. The younger

line of Bothal (No. 74) bore the field azure with a golden orle.4 Henry Spring of Houghton (No. 722) who, according to the rolls. bore azure an orle silver depicts upon his seal three buckles in chief; these doubtless had a meaning, but now we know not what it was. The lordship of Barnard Castle passed from the Baliols to the Beauchamps, earls of Warwick, and there is a series of the seals of that princely house (Nos. 53-58). One of them, Thomas (No. 55; ob. 1369) is illustrated on Pl. 1 Nos. 1 and 2. It is one of the finest examples of fourteenth century armorial art; on the obverse the earl and his horse are magnificent in the red and gold of the Beauchamp arms whilst the reverse shews on a perfectly shaped shield, enclosed in a beautiful cusped border of interlaced tracery, the checkered blue and gold of the Newburgh earls. From the Beauchamps, Barnard Castle passed to the younger branch of the Nevilles, earls of Salisbury. We have a long series of the seals of this ancient family, lords of Raby, Brancepeth and other northern manors, and from A.D. 1397, earls of Westmoreland. This unbroken succession affords an excellent opportunity of tracing the development of their armorial seals.

The early canting device of a 'nef' or ship which appears on the non-armorial seal of Henry the last of the Norman Nevilles (No. 557) need not detain us here for though it is true that, in Grimaldi's roll of Edward III date, a certain Geoffrey de Neville<sup>5</sup> bore this device on his shield, it did not become the arms of the family but only of this individual member. His identification is difficult but I do not think he can be that Geoffrey,<sup>6</sup> the son of Robert fitz Meldred and his wife Isabel de Neville, who assumed the surname of Neville; he died A.D. 1285 and the date of the roll is well into

Edward III reign. However that may be, their armorial history begins with the saltire on the late 12th century seals<sup>7</sup> of Robert fitz Meldred (No. 513). It is borne on a pear shaped shield without any ornament or accessories; a style which continues on the seal (No. 581) of his grandson Robert (I have unfortunately not been able to find a seal of his son Geoffrey) who died A.D. 1282, and for whom this shield is first blasoned in the rolls of arms.8 The first seal of Robert's grandson and successor Ranulf<sup>9</sup> (No. 572), the first lord Neville of Raby who died A.D. 1331, has still the plain shield without any adornment. His second seal used after circa A.D. 1318 shows the beginning of decoration, on it the shield hangs from the branches of a tree and a wyvern creeps round either side of the shield; the germ from which heraldic supporters came. The seal of his son Ralph second lord Neville who died A.D. 1367 (No. 573) has a more ambitious motive, though, like the earlier seals, it remains of rather a small size. On it the shield is couched, within a panel of tracery; it hangs by its strap from his mantled helm, upon which, for the first time, is placed the Bull's head crest of the Nevilles, probably borne for a memorial of the Bulmers.<sup>10</sup> On the dexter side of the crest is a pennon of his arms, evidently so placed to fill in the vacant space occupied on the sinister side by the scarf like mantling of his helm. John, third lord Neville<sup>11</sup> increases the size of his seal and crest, and places them in a more

decorative panel, within the cuspings are large black letter capitals of uncertain interpretation.

The first seal of his son Ralph fourth lord, and first earl of Westmoreland (No. 576) completes the development of the armorial motive; on it are two greyhounds supporting the helm one on either side, thus we have the whole heraldic achievement of shield, helm, mantling, crest and supporters. When created earl, he adopted a much larger seal (No. 577) to fit the higher dignity. It is a splendid example of the heraldic art of the end of the fourteenth century with its large helm and crest and small shield. The background is beautifully diapered, the achievement is within fine tracery and the supporters stand realistically upon ground where daisies and trefoils grow. The second earl uses practically the same seal but his signet, here used as a secretum (No. 578), is curious and worthy of noting, he places his Bull's head crest within a round fence of hurdles with the motto in Black letter do not grais—the allusion, if any, is now unknown. This completes the seals I have been able to find of the direct line of the Nevilles; thus for nearly three centuries there is an unbroken sequence all bearing the plain saltire of the Englishman. Robert son of Meldred. It is always borne undifferenced and without quarterings whilst gradually the heraldic accessories of helm, mantling, crest, supporters and diapering are added as the engraver's art becomes more skilful and the desire for ornament and display increases. Upon other seals of the same family can be noted the various distinctions or differences used by younger sons and younger branches. The earliest is a label of five long pendants used by Robert Neville12 who died A.D. 1271, in his father's lifetime; the label is throughout the difference used by the eldest son before his succession, though in later times the

number of points is reduced to three.<sup>13</sup> Richard (No. 579), the eldest son of the first earl by his second wife Joan Beaufort also uses a label of three points but makes it compony, that is checkered in two colours. The earliest difference of a younger son is shown on the beautiful seal of Geoffrey Neville<sup>14</sup> the second son of Geoffrey fitz Robert fitz Meldred; he bears the undifferenced saltire, but strews the field with small crosses crosslet fitchy.

In later times cadency was indicated by placing a small charge at the crossing of the saltire; Ralph (No. 575) uses a rose, John (No. 568) a fleur de lis, Robert (248) bishop of Durham a gimmel ring, Thomas (No. 584) a cinquefoil, William (No. 585) a fleur de lis, whilst another Thomas (No. 583), not of the direct line makes his saltire ermine.

As on this series we can thus study the development of the armoury of one family, so on another series we can trace the arms connected with a barony such as that of Morpeth, the seals of whose lords, Merlay, Greystock, Fitz William, Dacre and Howard make another interesting sequence. The canting device of 'merles' perched on a conventional tree used by the first and second Roger de Merlay (No. 519) was replaced on the seal of the third Roger by three flying 'merles' paleways on his shield. This simple charge was superseded in his later life by the bars of Estoteville (or are they those of Fitz Ralph changed in colour?) surrounded by a border charged with 'merles,' represented in this catalogue by the shield, borne in her right hand, by his daughter and heiress Mary (No. 332). In her left

hand she bears the armorial shield, three cushions, of her husband William lord Greystock, in her right, lord of Morpeth and other Northumbrian manors. Her husband's secret seal (No. 330) with only one cushion is rather difficult to understand unless he uses his solitary charge to distinguish his privy seal from his seal proper. I know of no other seal of his, but I think there can be no doubt that the shield borne by his wife has had when complete three cushions upon it, the same as carried by his son John, <sup>17</sup> the last of his race, who settled his lordships of Greystock, Morpeth etc., upon Ralph Fitz William of Grimthorpe. This family later assumed the name of Greystock, but retained their own barry shield surcharged with three chaplets of red roses<sup>18</sup> (Nos. 302/4). John, lord Greystock (No. 331) married the heiress of Ferrars of Wemme and on his son's seal (No. 334) the quarterings of that lordship are displayed. Elizabeth Greystock, the last of her race. married Thomas lord Dacre; so the escallops and other quarterings of that family, added to the arms of Greystock and Fitz William, appear on the seals of the Dacre lords of Morpeth (Nos. 206/9). Another Elizabeth, coheiress of Dacre, married lord William Howard (Scott's 'Belted Will') with whom the history ends here, though unfortunately I have not been able to discover or describe his seal.

On another series can be seen mirrored the fortunes and honours of a family, for example that of Brus. The lion of Peter Brus, lord of Hart passes after the death of Peter III or is continued changed in colour by the husbands of his coheiresses. The Brus lords of Annandale and Hart signified their Scottish allegiance by adopting the saltire of St. Andrew borne on their shield with a chief. Upon the marriage of Robert (No. III) with Margery (No. IOI), suo jure, countess of Carrick, the leopard of that earldom

was charged upon the chief (Nos. 111/13). A lion again appears upon their shield on the great seal of King Robert

"Where in proud Scotland's royal shield.
The ruddy lion ramp'd in gold."

Doubtful questions as to the origin of families can sometimes be solved by their armorial seals. The early history of the Feltons is a case in point. A study of their seals will, I think, shew that they were closely connected either by blood or by marriage with the family of L'Estrange lords of Knockyn in Shropshire and that therefore they took their name from Felton (now West Felton) near that place. They also held their manor of Litcham, Norfolk, from the L'Estranges. 19 Just as the latter owed their rise to their employment in the household of Henry II so we find the brothers Robert and William Felton owing their advancement to their similar positions in the household of Edward I; they were evidently men of ability trusted by the king and continuously employed in his service<sup>20</sup> either in the field or in council. not the place to attempt any account of their many and varied employments, except perhaps to note that as early as A.D. 1279. William of Felton is an usher of the King's chamber.<sup>21</sup> By 1200 he is a King's esquire<sup>22</sup> and by the end of the century he is a knight of the King's household.23 His connection with Northumberland began with a grant he and his wife Constance had from Thomas of

Blyth (Notts.) of all his lands in Matfen, Nafferton and Lorbottle.<sup>24</sup> But space forbids that I should pursue further the fascinating story of William's life—his seals are my subject. The arms of L'Estrange were silver two lions passant gules<sup>25</sup> though in the later rolls<sup>26</sup> the colours are reversed for Sir John L'Estrange lord of Knockyn. This shield Robert Felton of Litcham differenced, as it seems, by making the lions ermine;27 the armorial seal of his son John (No. 280) bears the same arms. He also was greatly employed by the King in Northumberland and on the Scottish March. William of Felton named above, the first of Edlingham. was, judging from his armorial seal, a younger brother of the above Robert, younger because he differences his shield more. His seal (No. 281) is very imperfect but enough remains to shew clearly that it has been two lions passant debruised by a baston; this is the shield blasoned for him in the Parliamentary Roll;28 de goules a ij lions passanz de argent e un baston goboune de or e de azure. The shield borne by his contemporary Sir Hamon L'Estrange of Hunstanton, Norfolk, under whom Litcham was held, except that the latter bore the baston of gold.29 His son William, the second of Edlingham, removed the baston and in its stead added a new and interesting charge, enclosing his father's passant lions within the Scottish tressure of silver (No. 282). This was probably assumed or granted because of the great parts he and his father had played in the Scottish war.

the war brought him a greater prize than this honourable addition to his shield, for it was through it that he came to know his second wife Isabel, whose hitherto unknown family I have by chance discovered. She was the daughter and heiress of Duncan tenth earl of Fife and of his wife Mary de Monthermer granddaughter of Edward I. Isabel was therefore the great granddaughter of King Edward which accounts for the statement that William Felton was of kin to the King, on his wife's side. seems to have been a romantic marriage of affection as related in Sir Thomas Grey's 'Scalachronica.'30 'But the said earl [Duncan] had a daughter [Isabel] by his wife the King of England's daughter [should be grand-daughter] the countess of Gloucester. This daughter was in England and it was intended that she should be sold to Robert the Stewart of Scotland [i.e. her marriage should be sold] but she married for love William de Felton, a Knight of Northumberland, who was her guardian at the time and she laid claim to the earldom which had been renounced by that contract.' He died Sept., 135831 when his widow married Sir William Ramsav. who, whether or not before this date is doubtful, became earl of She had three husbands after him but her later life does not concern us here.31a

Some interesting examples of derivative shields are to be found on the various armorial seals of the Lisle family. The inescucheons on the seals of Robert and Peter del Isle (Nos. 479/480) derive in all probability from the arms of the Cramville lords of Gosforth, who, judging from a later shield, borne at the battle of Boroughbridge, used that charge as their chief ordinary.<sup>32</sup> Robert (No. 481), son of Otwell del Isle and his wife Isabel Fauconberg uses, in place of the old shield, the azure lion of his

mother's family charged upon an ermine field, its ultimate ancestor being the lion of Peter Brus. These were the arms used by his descendants until Sir Robert Lisle of Chipchase (No. 485) who put a cross in place of the lion, for what reason I cannot explain.

The seals of John Coupland<sup>33</sup> and his wife Joan point to some relationship or feudal connection with other Northumbrian families settled in Glendale and incidentally show how a man and his wife might have many seals. His first known seal is before he had become famous as the captor of David, King of Scotland at Neville's Cross (A.D. 1346) though he appears to have been of the King's household before then.<sup>34</sup> This (No. 194) bears the plain cross of his father (No. 193) differenced by placing an engrailed lozenge, charged with a lion rampant, at the intersection. In other words he places a lozenge35 of the arms of Grey of Heton upon his cross, it is a curious addition but undoubtedly points to some Grey connection. His second seal (No. 195) is of some years' later date (A.D. 1347), from it the lozenge has disappeared and a molet, or spur rowell, has taken its place, but still the Grey influence is apparent, for the full faced mantled helm bears a ram's head, the crest used at that time by the Greys of Heton. His last seal (No. 196) has the same charges but the crest faces with the helmet to the dexter. There are no known seals of his wife Joan until her widowhood. The first (No. 108) has Coupland as on her husband's later seals impaling on a bend sinister three spread eagles (? Strother). Her next seal (No. 199) is the same except that the bend is dexter, suggesting that on the first seal the bend sinister was an error of the engraver.

impalement seems to say that she was of the family of Strother but there is no other evidence in support but rather on the cotrary.<sup>36</sup> Her third seal (No. 200) used only a few years later is even a greater puzzle, on it the shield of arms bears a reversed leopard's head transfixed by a reversed fleur de lis.<sup>36a</sup> From the legend, unfortunately partly illegible, it is clearly her own seal—but que diable fait t'il dans cet galere?

The seals of the Umfravilles, lords of Prudhoe and Harbottle and earls of Angus, do not add anything to our knowledge of their armorials. Though there is a reminder of their settlement in the North on the fifteenth century seal of Robert Umfraville (No. 794); upon it his mantled helm is supported by two rampant wolves each holding a sword in his dexter paw, in allusion no doubt to the reputed grant by the Conqueror of Redesdale, to his ancestor Robert Umfraville nicknamed 'with the Beard' 'to hold by defending that part of the country from enemies and wolves with that sword which King William had by his side when he entered Northumberland.'

Some individual seals in the list are perhaps worthy of special comment; the royal leopards are treated in a drastic and rather irreverent way on the seal of Edmund, earl of Lancaster (No. 447) when he joins the three into one head and makes them into a cross, perhaps he did this in allusion to his surname of 'Crouchback.' His son Henry (No 453) differences the royal shield 'a un baston de azure' but when, after his brother's<sup>38</sup> execution at Pontefract, he succeeded to the honours of Lancaster; he changed it to the arms of that earldom—' les armes le Roy dangleterre a un label des armes le roy de France.'

Some previously unknown seals of important Northumbrian

families may also be noted here. That of Edmund Craster (No. 201) confirms the blason of his arms in Jenyn's Ordinary. The pretty seal of Robert Fenwick (No. 287) shews, like the shield on the Stamfordham effigy, 39 that the arms are blasoned with a chief and not per fess. The canting blason 'phenixes' used by Roger Dodsworth (No. 288) is I think a seventeenth century conceit, though their later crest of a phoenix was no doubt intended to be a play upon their name. 40 The two bars and a chief of Robert of Byker (No. 133) point to a connection with Adam of Jesmond and the arms of the families grouped round him. The paly shield of Sir Aymer of Athol (No. 20), who as the donor of the town moor to the town, is not sufficiently remembered amongst us, confirms the shield in the chancel window of Ponteland Church. 41 The seal of Sir William Douglas (No. 229) shews that at this date the shield with two molets on a chief, to which was added later the 'bloody' heart of Bruce, had not yet become their family shield of arms.

When tracing the developement of the armorial seals of the family of Neville, the gradual introduction of supporters was noticed; other seals here described exhibit this evolution in more detail. Small lizard-like creatures, creeping up the margins of the shield, appear about the second decade of the fourteenth century; these gradually become more defined and larger as shewn on the seal of Henry, the second lord Percy of Alnwick, <sup>42</sup> a little later actual supporters appear. They do not seem to be used for an heraldic purpose but only to fill an unsightly gap on the seal; the style is finely illustrated on the beautiful seal of Henry Percy (No. 627) whose shield rests on the backs of two pheasants, which peck with their wry necks at flowers growing above them; or

again on the seal of Michael de la Pole (No. 657), whose shield rests on the backs of two lithe, crouching lions. About the first quarter of this century shields are shewn couched, with helm and crest above them, as on the seal of Patrick earl of Dunbar (No. 239) A.D. 1334, whose helm is held up by a savage man at each side. Shortly after, the more modern style arrives; two bears hold up, one on each side, the shield of Alexander Neville (No. 551). With the coming of the fifteenth century, supporters increase in size and importance as seen, upholding the helm, on the splendid seal of Ralph, earl of Westmoreland (No. 577). Later in this century with the decadence of true armoury, they dominate the design as on the seal of John, lord Montagu (No. 569).

The decline of the art of seal engraving went on apace as the sixteenth century seals of Henry Percy (Nos. 635/636) shew; on them, beside the chess board shields of the heralds, are miserable beasts of supporters, on one seal balanced dubiously on the edge of a scroll, on the other perched on a hummock and clinging precariously with their fore legs to the riband of the Garter. One does not need other examples to shew upon what evil days the virile armorial art of the thirteenth century and the splendour of the same art in the fourteenth, had fallen. The crests and helms also upon these two seals show the same falling off from the great days illustrated by the crests on the beautiful seals of Reynold, lord Cobham (No. 172) or of John, lord Beaumont (No. 59) or again of Richard d'Arundell (No. 16) or on that of William le Scrope, earl of Wiltshire (No. 710). These all shew that in these days when the splendour and ceremonial of the tournament was at its highest, crests were considered of even more importance than the smaller armorial shield which they dominate.

The collection of seals at Durham though it contains very many seals of women of the lower ranks is somewhat deficient in the seals of great ladies; there are many such seals in this catalogue and from them it is possible to trace in more detail the changes in their motive, from the last quarter of the twelfth century onwards to the sixteenth. The earliest are of an elongated oval with the robed figure of the lady standing, full face, usually holding a flower in her right hand and with a hawk perched upon her gloved left wrist. This is the motive on the seal of Margaret, duchess of Brittany and countess of Richmond (No. 94),48 the daughter of David I of Scotland, and on that of her daughter Constance. The latest of the type I have noticed, dating about the middle of the thirteenth century, are the seals of Ramette la Tyes (No. 779) and Isabel Brus (No. 99). The seal of Margery de Vesci (No. 812) daughter of William the Lion of Scotland and wife of Eustace de Vesci is an exception to the prevailing type; she sinks her own personality by adopting the canting device of her husband, but she proclaims her sex by fitting it into a pointed oval seal. A glimmering of the dawn of armoury comes on the seal of Rohese of Dovre (No. 232) daughter of Geoffrey Lucy, who places, on each side of her standing figure, the canting device of a 'luce.'44

The earliest lady's seal in this list with armorials is, I think, the counterseal of Maud de Vipont, lady of Cuerville (No. 817). On the obverse she stands with a hawk upon her wrist, but the reverse is a shield of arms charged with the rings of Vipont. By about the first quarter of the thirteenth century flowers and birds give place to armorial shields. The first, of this novel style, I have here noted is that of Ada Baliol (No. 33) wife of John Fitz Robert of Warkworth; she is represented in the dress of her period holding, upright by their points, in her right hand her husband's shield, in her left that of her father. Another later

example is that of Margaret Brus (No. 100), coheiress of Peter Brus of Hart and wife of Robert, lord Ros of Wark.

Sometimes, probably when the father's arms are considered the more honourable, his shield takes the place of honour on the dexter, an example is the seal of Agnes de Valence (No. 796) who also, having been married twice, bears a third shield, that of her second husband, upon her breast. The lady Dervorguil of Baliol (No. 38) holds in her hands her husband's and her father's shields, but, not 'too proud to care from whence she came,' she displays at each side of her standing figure the arms of the lordships of her maternal grandfather David, earl of Huntingdon of the blood royal of Scotland. On the obverse, mindful of her wifely duty, she carries the Baliol orle in her right hand and in the legend is the lady of Baliol first and only secondly daughter of Alan of Galloway; on the reverse she redresses the balance by placing her paternal arms of the lordship of Galloway on the dexter and calls herself the lady of Galloway and secondly only of Baliol.

Mary of Greystock (No. 332) gives precedence to her paternal arms of Merlay and so has fortunately preserved for us the only representation we have of the second armorial shield of that family. Mary Heron (No. 382), of a little later date, by the shield in her left hand, gives the only clue we now have to her father's family. The colours are not to be known, but checky gold and sable a chief silver is given by Papworth<sup>45</sup> as a Muscamp shield, a daughter of which house she may well have been. Margery Brus (No. 101) suo jure countess of Carrick, possibly to emphasise that fact, uses an armorial seal of her husband's arms with the leopard of her own earldom charged upon the chief, but though defying fashion in this way she yet displays the arms upon a pointed oval seal; the artist has performed his difficult task with considerable skill. By the beginning of the fourteenth century,

when armorial decoration was approaching its zenith, ladies sometimes stand clothed in robes gorgeous with the heraldry of their own and their husbands' families, in addition to their shields of arms. The seal of Margaret Neville (No. 570) is an example of this style. By the middle of this century the decoration of ladies' seals had become very fine, one of them, perhaps the most beautiful of all, that of Mary de St. Paul, countess of Pembroke, is No. 608 in this collection. Her gracefully posed and robed figure stands in a canopied niche of the finest tracery flanked on each side by smaller panelled and diapered niches with, like the central one, canopies, crockets and finials, and a shield of arms on each side. Her small armorial counterseal is also very beautiful, it exemplifies a form of ladies' seal which after about the first quarter of the fourteenth century largely displaced the oval seal with the standing figure. Indeed from the beginning of that century these round armorial seals had been in use; the earliest here is that of Joan de Valence (No. 801) an example of the early form of impaling by dimidiation; also illustrated on the similar seal of Beatrice de Valence (No. 800) This form of marshalling was not satisfactory and the more modern style of impalement soon took its place; examples are to be found on the seals of Joan Huntercombe (No. 428) Joan ap Griffith (No. 337) and Joan Coupland (Nos. 199-200). Another form of the armorial type came into use about the middle of the century. It also was a circular seal with three or more shields placed with their points to the centre such as that used by Thomas del Redhough (No. 677) or that of Maud Tilliol (No. 770). It was a useful type when the lady had been twice married, the shields of her father and her husbands making up the composition, had she like Eufemie Neville (No. 555) or Catherine Twenge (No. 776) suffered three husbands then she had four shields at her disposal. Another very pretty form which these armorial seals take is that of Eva Clavering (No. 154) who

places in the centre of rich tracery the impaled shields of her second and third husbands (her first marriage a boy and girl affair she ignores) whilst in surrounding tracery are three lozenges each blasoned with her paternal arms of Clavering. Alice Neville (No. 553) uses a similar seal but varies the design by placing, in the middle, the shield of her second husband Ralph, lord Neville and encircling it with roundels bearing the arms of her father and of her first husband. One of the most beautiful of this type is the counterseal of Mary de St. Paul already mentioned. is needless to insist how very useful this type of seal is for the genealogy, the alliances and the histories of families. the end of the fourteenth century these beautiful seals are going out of fashion, they begin to give place to the small signets of the same motive as those used by men. Examples here are those of Elizabeth Lumley (No. 490), Christine Middleton (No. 524), Joan Neville (No. 562) and Cecily Punchardon (No. 667). Two exceptions to this change should perhaps be noted; as late as 1384, Margery Heton (No. 401) depicts her own figure with her husband's arms in front, but even she is not so reactionary as to revert to the oval shape, she uses a round seal; the artistic result is scarcely pleasing. The other exception, unique of its kind, is the splendid armorial quartered shield on the seal of Cecily Neville; it is after the style of the greater nobles of that date (A.D. 1477) and has none of the special attributes of a woman's seal, this perhaps is very fit and proper for one who was the mother of Kings.

The only other point, which this already too long introduction, should note is the legends. One of the unusual and most interesting parts of *Durham Seals* was the entertaining variety of the legends used upon so many of them. Here there is little or none of such diversity and no frivolity, they are nearly all (when available) a sober and direct statement of the owner's name and titles as indeed we expect on armorial seals. There are only very



few out of the ordinary. The legend on the magnificent seal of Thomas Beauchamp (54) states with great exactitude the regnal year of the King in which it was engraved. The secret seal of Robert Brus (No. 114) emphasises doubly its use SECRETVM: SECRETORVM. Another Robert of the same family, the competitor (No. 107), uses a legend, which his life exemplified, ESTO: FEROX: VT: LEO; a comment perhaps upon the gentler note in the 'word' of the King whom he desired to succeed, Alexander the Third, whose privy seal bore the verse,

ESTO.PRVDENS.VT.SERPENS.ET.SIMPLEX.SICVT.COLVMBA. Another Scot, Patrick of Dunbar (No. 238) has a very pretty motto round his shield, represented in a wood or forest.

PARMI.CEV.HAVT.BOIS.CONDVRAY.MA.MIE.

Even the signets do not yield much of interest; that of Ralph, second earl of Westmoreland (No. 578), 'do not grais,' surrounding a bull's head in a fence of hurdles and the 'non othere' upon the eagle signet of Joan Neville (No. 562) are the only two I have noted at all out of the commonplace.

I end with words of thanks to those by whose help I have been able to make this list as complete as it is. Dr. H. H. E. Craster I have once more to thank for the help he has given, not only by pointing out to me likely places to search but also by giving me his own notes upon many seals and documents of North country persons. To Mr. E. Hilliard, senior bursar and to the authorities of Balliol College, Oxford, I am indebted for permission, and for facilities granted me, to examine and to photograph the North-umbrian seals and charters preserved with their muniments. My thanks are also due to Mr. P. S. Allen, librarian, and to the authorities of Merton College, as well as to Mr. A. B. Poynton, bursar, and the governing body of University College, Oxford, for the same privileges. Mr. A. M. Oliver's knowledge of local charters and documents has been ungrudgingly placed at my

disposal, and he has also given me notes of many seals which I might otherwise have overlooked. I have finally to acknowledge the useful and expert assistance I have received from Mr. R. C. Fowler and other officials of the Public Record Office and for the permission I received to use freely the card catalogue, at present being made, of the seals in their archives.

The name comes from Babington, now Bavington, Northumberland. They left this place, probably, towards the end of the fourteenth century and do not appear again in Northumberland till Colonel Philip Babington purchased Harnham in A.D. 1667. Oval, a robed figure of Ada, standing holding in her right hand a shield of arms quarterly a bend and in her left a shield bearing an orle.

She was the daughter of Hugh Baliol lord of Bywell and Barnard Castle circa A.D. 1193-1228; she married John fitz Robert lord of Warkworth, she died 29 July, 1251 (N.C.H. vi, 73 and Ibid v, 25). The dexter shield is that of her husband, quarterly gold and gules a bend sable (Arch. Ael. 3rd. Ser. viii, p. 66, No. 1002). The sinister that of her father, gules an orle silver (Ibid vii, p. 284, No. 137).

34. Baliol, Alexander P.R.O., Bain II, 658, a.D. 1292/93. Round, 38 mm., equestrian, knight in mail and surcoat, helmet with fan crest and bearing a small heater shaped shield charged with an orle. The horse trappings emblasoned with the same arms.

35. BALIOL, ALEXANDER P.R.O., Bain II, 768, A.D. 1296. Green, round, 27 mm., armorial, an orle, the shield, which hangs from a bush, is placed between two wyverns.

He was of Cavers Co. Roxburgh; for full account see Comp. Peer. vol. 1, p. 386, also 'Genealogist' o.s. vi, p. 1, and Ibid N.S. IV, 141. He differenced the arms of the main branch by reversing the colours, silver an orle gules. At the battle of Falkirk he was in 'the battle' of the bishop Durham (Bek) and bore 'd'argent ou ung faus eschune de gulez.' He was also at the siege of Caerlaverock where his banner was white:—

"Al rouge escu voidie du champ."

36. Baliol, Bernard Castle Charter. Round, equestrian, very imperfect, knight in mail, sword in right hand.

She was the daughter and eventual heiress of Alan lord of Galloway by his wife Margaret, daughter and coheiress of David earl of Huntingdon. She married circa A.D. 1233, John Baliol lord of Barnard Castle and Bywell who died A.D. 1268. After his death, and carrying out his wishes, she founded and settled the statutes of Balliol College. She died A.D. 1290 and was buried at Sweetheart Abbey, beside her husband. (Clay p. 6; N.C.H. vi p. 72 et passim). For note on the various shields with their blason see note 114 Arch. Ael. 3rd Ser. xv, 154 No. 3396. It is interesting to note how, on this seal, Dervorguil on the obverse gives precedence to the Baliol arms and how she uses the reverse to stress her lordship of Galloway. The seal is illustrated N.C.H. vi pl. face p. 48 Nos. 7 and 8. Also B.M. Seal Catalogue vol. Iv pl. 10 and Oxford Hist. Socy. Proc. vol. Lxiv pl. page 363, where the document to which the seal is attached is printed p. 279.

39. Baliol, Guy D'Anisy ' Chartres Normand,' Pl. v, No. 2. Round 58 mm., equestrian, knight in mail hauberk, round topped helm, heavy sword and plain shield on left arm.

40. Balliol D6/30, circa A.D. 1269. Green, round, 36 mm., armorial, an inescucheon, in the sinister chief a shield charged with a lion rampant. (Seals Pl. 1).

#### SIGILLVM.HVGONIS.DE.BAILLOL.

Styled son and heir of John Baliol. He was the eldest son of John Baliol and his wife Dervorguil. He married Agnes daughter of William de Valence, earl of Pembroke and widow of Maurice Fitzgerald. He died without issue circa A.D. 1271. The seal is a very beautiful example of thirteenth century heraldry. The orle is indicated by the curious method of superimposing three shields of diminishing sizes one above the other. The shield in the sinister chief bears his mother's arms of Galloway and is a very unusual example of early methods of marshalling arms (references as for previous seal). The arms are blasoned for him in Glover's roll of Henry III, No. 37—'Hugh son fitz autiel one ung escucheon d'azur one ung lion rampāt d'argent Coronne d'or en la corniere.'

41. BALIOL, INGRAM B.M. Harl. Ch. 43 B9; Seal Cat. 15, 636; A.D. 1286.

Whitey brown, round, imperfect, equestrian, knight in mail hauberk, loose flowing surcoat with sword and shield of arms bearing an orle.

Legend destroyed.

He does not appear in the pedigree either in N.C.H. vi p. 73 or in that given by Hodgson II, ii p. 42. He was the son of Agnes Baliol (Agnes de Valence) and her husband, the above Hugh Baliol. In A.D. 1275 the king confirms the grant of Foxton (Foston in Leicestershire) made by Agnes de Baliol to her son Ingeram (Bain, II, 72). In Dec. 1291, he is named her son and heir (Ibid No. 553). He was dead before 20 Feb. 1298/99 (Ibid No. 1060). On 6 Mar., 1296/99 Henry Percy does homage for the lands of his cousin, Ingram Baliol, in Leicestershire (Ibid 1102).

42. Baliol, Ingram Cast, Bodleian Library, Drawer 37. Green, round, 47 mm., equestrian, knight in mail and loose surcoat, with sword, cylindrical helm, shield and horse trappings charged with an orle.

Round, 20 mm., armorial, on a bend, between a squirrel in chief and a ewer in base, a stag's head caboshed (?)

The charges are blurred and very indistinct, especially the charge on the bend. He is styled of Homildon (in Glendale, near Wooler). The squirrel is usually the chief charge in the Baxter shield. Glover blasons it vert three sitting squirrels silver. (Arch. Ael. 3rd Ser. vi, 101) and in A.D. 1388, Sir Robert Manners, on his armorial seal (see No. 501), quarters the three squirrels for Baxter. I cannot identify this man but he was doubtless a connection of the Baxters of Lanton in Glendale whose pedigree is given N.C.H. xi, p. 139.

Reverse, armorial, checky a chevron ermine, the shield hangs from a tree's branches and a leopard creeps up each side of it.

The honour and castle of Barnard Castle were granted to him by Edward I A.D. 1305. The Beauchamps held it for five generations when it passed to their successors the Neville earls of Warwick (Surtees, IV, 65). The shield on the obverse is that of Beauchamp, first blasoned in the 'Falkirk' Roll, A.D. 1298, where Sir Guy bore 'du gulez ou ung fez d'or croisele d'or.' The shield on the reverse is that of the Newburgh earls of Warwick sometimes called the old shield of Warwick and is borne for the earldom, the blason is checky gold and azure a chevron ermine. The seal is illustrated in Forster's "Some Feudal Lords and Their Seals' plate face p. 15 and p. 16.

He was son and heir of Thomas (No. 56) whom he succeeded A.D. I401, died A.D. I439. He was created K.C. A.D. I403. His splendid tomb stands in St. Mary's Church, Warwick. The inescutcheon is for his second wife Isabel, widow of Richard earl of Worcester, daughter and heiress of Thomas le Despenser earl of Gloucester. (Comp. Peer. I, p. 27; Hist. Peer. ed. Courthope p. 499). His garter plate and a seal similar to No. 56 are illustrated in 'Stall plates of Knights of Garter,' pl. xxxiv.

58a. BEAUMONT, HENRY LORD B.M. Harl. Ch. 45 I, 39; A.D. 1366, Cat. 7289.

Red, round, 35 mm., armorial, powdered with fleurs de lis, a lion rampant. The shield hangs from a mantled helm with cap of estate and crest a lion passant. All within fine tracery.

He was grandson of Henry first lord Beaumont and earl of Buchan created K.G. 1393, died A.D. 1396. Held the manors of Ditchburn, Cartington, Ryle etc. in Northumberland. (Hodgson, 111, ii, 260). His arms are blasoned azure powdered with fleurs de lis a lion gold. His garter plate and this seal are illustrated 'Stall Plates of Knights of Garter,' plate xv.

60. BEDFORD, JOHN DUKE OF P.R.O. Ex. Q.R. 51, No. 25; 4 Feb. 1427/28.

Red, round, imperfect, armorial, France and England a label of five points two of Brittany and three of France. Shield shaped à bouche hangs by rings from a mantled helm with cap of estate upon which is the crest of a crowned standing lion with label as on the shield. Dexter supporter a gryphon, sinister a yale.

This seal should, perhaps, not be included in this catalogue, but he was for long Warden of the East Marches and resided at Warkworth, it also has the local interest that it is attached to the surrender of Berwick-upon-Tweed when the town was surrendered by Henry vi to the Scots. The legend is badly blurred and very imperfect. He was the third son of Henry iv and died A.D. 1435.

61. BEDFORD, ENGUERRAUD DE COUCY, EARL OF P.R.O. Anc. Deeds A.S. 257, B.M. Seal Cat. 8998, A.D. 1369,

Red, round, 39 mm., armorial, barry of six vair and [gules]. On a full faced helm, mantled ermine, crest of a bush of feathers. The shield is placed within tracery and at each side in a quatrefoil is a lozenge charged with a fess (Hapsburg) (Seals. Pl. 1).

He was son and heir of Enguerraud de Coucy by his wife Catherine of Hapsburg. He married Isabel daughter of Edward III, and died 18 Feb., 1396/97. In 41 Ed. III he and his wife were granted the manors and lands of Joan Coupland (Hodgson III, ii, p. 377). For his honours etc. see Comp. Peer. II, p. 69. For his seal before his creation as Earl of Bedford see No. 192. It was one of this family who boasted:—

He greatly distinguished himself in the Scottish wars of Edward 1 and was present both at the battle of Falkirk and at the siege of Caerlaverock. The poem of the siege blasons his banner

... ot vermeille cum sanc,
Croisillie o un chievron blanc,
Oŭ un label de asur avoit
Por ce que ses peres vivoit.'

The back of seal has originally had a crouching animal as a holder, but at some later date an ivory handle with a rounded top has been fitted to it. The device appears to be a copy of an earlier seal. There is also preserved among the city archives the charter granted to the city by Bishop Hugh Puiset with a good impression of his seal of dignity attached. There is also a papal Bull of Alexander III (1159-1181) confirming Puiset's charter. The leaden 'bulla' is in a good state of preservation. (Both documents are reproduced in Hutchinson's History of Durham' II, p. 13.

The second and third quarters contain the arms of le Botiler blasoned gules a fess checky silver and sable between six crosses crosslet silver these arms, apparently differenced from the arms of Beauchamp of Warwick, were evidently adopted by Sir Robert Ferrars after his marriage with the Botiler heiress. This seal occupies the second place (the first is destroyed) where Lucker's ought to be. The legend is doubtful, but Dr. Craster says it 'cannot be read as Lilburn.' It certainly seems to be the shield of Lilburn, but who was David of Lucker and may he not have been of that family?
