## ARCHÆOLOGIA AELIANA

## I.-THE ARMORIALS OF THE COUNTY PALATINE OF DURHAM.

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[Read on 26th May, 1926.]
This Society published, in Volume vi of the third series of Archaologia Aeliana, an index and ordinary of the armorials of Northumberland. It has also published in Volumes viil to xviri of the same publication, under the title Durham Seals, a complete annotated and illustrated catalogue of the very large collection of seals, chiefly armorial and mostly of north country families, attached to the charters and other deeds preserved in the Treasury of the Dean and Chapter of Durham. This catalogue was followed, in Volumes xx and xxi of the same series of Archaologia Aeliana, by a catalogue supplementary to Durham Seals containing a list of all the then known seals, again chiefly armorial, belonging to Northumberland and Durham, and not represented in the Treasury at Durham. The Surtees Society have also issued, in Volumes cxxir and cxxxini of their publications, under the title Visitations of the North edited by Dr. F. W. Dendy, some early Heraldic Visitations and collections of pedigrees relating to the north of England; these have added greatly to the knowledge of the genealogy and armory of the district in the later sixteenth century. In addition to the above the Records Committee of this

Society has published in Volumes iv and v of its series, an annotated account of all the monuments of armorial interest, within the two counties, as they existed prior to about the year 1666. It seems therefore desirable that the subject should be completed by an index of the arms of the families of the county palatine of Durham before A.D. 1666. The following paper is an attempt to do this. The index begins, as is very proper, with the shield of arms of the see and of the cathedral church followed by those of the lords palatine, the princely bishops of Durham, by those of the priors and of other ecclesiastical dignitaries, so far as the writer can find them, to about the same date. These are all in chronological order. The shield of the see is azure a cross gold between four

lions rampant silver, the arms attributed in the late fourteenth century to St. Oswald, King. Robert Neville ( 1438 ) is the first of the bishops of Durham to use these arms upon his seals, ${ }^{1}$ but it seems probable that they were in use by the latter part of the preceding century. The shield as here blazoned, but with the cross couped, was in the east window of the cathedral church next to the shield of bishop Skirlaw ( I 388 ). ${ }^{2}$ It is also, though with different colours, in a window at the Deanery beside that of Hatfield. In the First Calais Roll ${ }^{3}$ it is blazoned impaled with ermine a chevron sable for Tho. Hatefield B. of Durham (Plate II), ${ }^{4}$ but it is very doubtful whether the blazons were

[^0]in the original roll, they are probably a much later addition. ${ }^{5}$ The shield of the bishopric, with charges as above, was also in stained glass in one of the windows of " the south alley of the quier ${ }^{\prime}{ }^{6}$ in Durham cathedral, beneath "the picture of St. Oswold King with his scepter '' ; it was there tinctured red with all the charges of gold as borne by the priory of Nostell also for St. Oswald. ${ }^{7}$ These arms were used on the seals of all the bishops of Durham from Neville (1438) to Bainbridge (1507); Ruthall (1509) uses the cross patonce, and Tunstall (1530) both the plain cross and the cross patonce. There is, however, no doubt, in spite of this confusion on these later seals, that the plain cross for the see or bishopric, the cross patonce for the church and monastery, was the earlier and more correct use. This leads to the consideration

of the shield of the cathedral church and monastery of Durham; it is very like that of the see, the only difference being in the shape of the cross. The shield, called that of St. Cuthbert, is azure a cross patonce gold between four lions rampant silver. This appears first in the time of bishop Hatfield rather earlier than the shield of the see. It is first used on the seal of prior Wallworth ${ }^{8}$ ( $1374-91$ ), and is continued on those of his successors until prior Burnaby ${ }^{9}$ ( $1456-64$ ) after whom there are no more armorial seals of the priors of Durham extant. The colours here blazoned are taken from those presumed

to be on the shield in the cloisters at Durham, which were begun before the death of bishop Skirlaw. ${ }^{10}$ They are confirmed by the blazon given in 1530 at the heraldic visitation by Thomas Tonge, Norroy King of Arms. ${ }^{11}$


The shield azure a chevron gold between three lions rampant silver is sometimes given by some late authorities for that of the priory. It appears also beneath the figure of St. Oswald on the seal of bishop Neville, ${ }^{12}$ but there seems no doubt that it is there used in error and in ignorance of its true origin as the shield of bishop Thomas Hatfield. ${ }^{13}$

The arms of the bishops of Durham are represented by a complete series from that of Antony Bek (1283) to that of Nathaniel, lord Crewe (1674). These, with the possible exception of those of Kellawe, are all taken from the bishops' seals, contemporary rolls of arms or other reliable sources. Before A.D. 1283 there is no evidence for the use of armorials by bishops. I have therefore thought it not desirable to enumerate the unauthenticated shields attributed by late and worthless authorities to the earlier bishops of Durham from St. Calais (1081) to de L'Isle (1274). ${ }^{14}$ Antony Bek, as implied above, was the first of the English episcopate to use armorial charges; this is probably because he was the younger son of a great baronial family, that of Bek

of Eresby ${ }^{15}$ whose shield he differences by changing their silver mill-rind cross into ermine. All his successors at Durham, except Bury and Kellawe, use shields of arms upon their seals. As the pre-reformation shields have been fully annotated in the many notes appended to the section in Durham Seals, further comment here seems superfluous. ${ }^{16}$ The post-reformation shields do not call for comment.

The armorial history of the priors of Durham is not satisfactory, probably because, with few exceptions, they did not belong to families of armorial rank; yet the lord prior was a great county magnate, a baron of the palatinate, ranking with the Nevilles, Baliols, and Percys, whilst in Durham he kept a state very little inferior to that of the lord palatine himself; one would therefore have expected to have been able to find more record of their arms than there is. A personal shield appears first on their seals as late as prior Hemingburgh ( ${ }^{1391-1416), ~}{ }^{17}$ and on those of his successors to Burnaby ( $1456-74)^{18}$ after whom the writer has been unable to identify their arms, except for prior Castell (1494-1519) who seems to have adopted the shield attributed to Our Lady as his own. ${ }^{19}$ But even for these, whilst the charges are known, we are ignorant of the proper colours except for the shield of prior Wessington, who used the bars and molets of his family. The arms of the deans, being late, are blazoned from visitations and other authorities and require no comment. Armorials are used by the archdeacons of Northumberland and Durham from the early part of the fourteenth century. They appear thus early because the office was then filled by men of families who habitually used arms. Thomas Neville, ${ }^{20}$ namely, for Durham (A.D. 1334), and Edmund

Howard ${ }^{21}$ for Northumberland (A.D. I340). Some of their successors use shields of arms, but unfortunately the seals of archdeacons now in being are few, and therefore the writer has been obliged, for the most part, to use other and less satisfactory authorities. The armorials of the gentlemen of the county in alphabetical order follow the archidiaconal list. These considered as a whole are disappointing in their interest, probably because so much of the land was held in chief of the bishop as lord palatine and the tenants "held their land for the defence of the body of St. Cuthbert and were under no obligation to go beyond the boundaries of the palatinate, the rivers Tyne and Tees." ${ }^{22}$ The need, therefore, for armorial charges had not arisen for many of them; but though this may be generally true yet there remain many whose shields are blazoned in some of the earliest thirteenth century rolls of arms. ${ }^{23}$ Of these may be specially named the early baronies of the bishopric, that is, estates held in chief of the bishop and of enough importance to be ranked as baronies. These appear to have been ten in number as enumerated in the Pipe Roll of 8 Rich. I (II97), ${ }^{24}$ but the writer has only been able to find the arms of seven, namely, Hilton of Hilton, Bulmer of Brancepeth, Conyers of Sockburn, Hansard of Evenwood, Robert de Amundeville, Robert fitz Meldred, and the barony of Siggeston; others of similar and sometimes higher standing than these, though not ranked as baronies of the palatinate, are Brus of Hart, Baliol of Barnard Castle, Neville of Raby, Surtees of Dinsdale, Ever of Witton, and Fitz Marmaduke of Horden, not to mention other names equally famous, the heads of whose baronies were outside the bounds of the

The names of other historic families and shields will be found in the index as well as the shields of the new men who came in after the dissolution of the monasteries, and who had arms, sometimes strange and wonderful, granted to them, for a consideration, by the heralds who visited the county officially in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. Derivative arms, that is a shield derived from that of a feudal superior or through a connection by blood or marriage, are not very numerous in the county. Neither the arms of the bishops nor those of the barons seem to have affected those of the lesser gentry to any extent. The saltire of the Englishman, Robert son of Meldred, adopted by his descendants of the great house of Neville, has influenced the local heraldry very little; apart from the differenced shields of the cadet branches of the family, the writer can only note as probably derived from it, the saltires of Clervaux and Tailboys, the small engrailed saltire borne in the quarter by Chancellor and the comparatively unknown shields of Heworth and Hesilton. The orle or faux escucheon of Baliol is little better represented, within the county, though it no doubt accounts for the shields of Henry le Spring, of John of Lythegraynes, of Ralph Langton and Robert of Kellawe. Even the shields of the lords palatine had very little armorial influence, that of Bek alone is represented; from it derive the like crosses of Carrowe, Fulthorpe, Laton and Kilkenny. The fess and popinjays of Fitz Marmaduke are probably the origin of the arms of Marmaduke Lumley used first in 1365 , and afterwards the shield of his descendants. The beautiful coat of Surtees probably comes from the ermine shield of Brittany, through the earls of Richmond with the Baliol orle in the quarter.

Canting arms, that is devices punning or playing upon the name of the user, are fairly numerous. There are the bows of Bowes, the bourdons (pilgrims' staves) of Burdon, the herisson (hedgehog) of Heriz used by his descendants of Claxton, the eel-spears of Elstob, the burrs of Burwell, the keelings of Killinghall, the trees
(bois) of Boys, the dolphins of Dolphanby, the cart wheels of Cartington, the merles of Marley, the strange charge of a monastery borne by Musters reminding us of his origin de Monasteriis which became in O.F. Moustier and so to the modern Musters. Nor should the stormfinches of Tempest be forgotten; it is surely in accordance with the playfulness of heraldry, that these birds-the birds of tempest--should be so blazoned and not as martlets. The luces of Lucy, the herons of Heron, and the flesh-pots of Monboucher belong to Northumberland rather than to Durham. Though one may think the heraldry of the county, upon the whole, rather dull and lacking in variety, yet within its borders are to be found some of the very finest examples of heraldic monuments. These have been made the subject, as was said before, of Volume v of our Records Committee's publications, and it is not now the writer's intention to do more than merely name them here. The splendid couched shields of the late fourteenth century, with their 'crests and mantled helms, over the east gateway of Lumley castle (Plate IV, i) are of supreme interest, whilst by way of contrast, on the east side of the west gateway are the series of shields representative of seventeenth century heraldry and of the ideas which inspired $\mathrm{it}^{25}$ (Plate IV, 2). On the west face of Hilton castle are the numerous shields representing the famous men of the county who, living in the early fifteenth century, were the friends and relations of William Hilton, the builder (Plate III). A later, more ornamental style of heraldry is seen in the shields set up by bishops Ruthall and Tunstall above the oriel window at Auckland castle (Plate V). Nor must there be forgotten the great array of fifteenth century north country shields which still adorn, though probably not in their original colours, the roof of the cloisters of the cathedral priory church at Durham.

Besides these carved shields of the castles and halls,

[^3]of which only a few are here enumerated, there are the many shields of arms and armorial coats on the brasses, monuments and effigies to be found within the churches and churchyards of the county. These date from the twelfth century onwards, and range from the magnificent tomb-throne of bishop Hatfield in the great priory church, (Plate VI) to fragments of dilapidated effigies of men and women whose name and habitation have passed from among us (Plates VII, VIII). Enough has been written : if any reader is sufficiently interested to pursue the subject in more detail he can do so in the aforesaid book of the Monuments of the County Palatine of Durham.

The writer is indebted to Mr. Robert Bertram for drawing many of the shields used to illustrate this paper, and his thanks are also due to the Newcastle upon Tyne Records Committee for permission to use some illustrations which have already appeared in its publications.

## NOTES ON THE PLATES.

Plate I (Facing p. i).
The achievements of arms on this plate are from the Armorial de Gelre, an heraldic manuscript of the fourteenth century now in the Royal library at Brussels (No. 15,652-56). It is so called because it is considered to be the work of Claes Heynen, "Gelre herault d'Armes,' to the duke of Gueldres, A.D. 1342-72; some of the arms were probably drawn, however, by his son and successor.
I. die b'e $w^{\prime}$ neuile. John lord Neville of Raby, K.G., d. 1389. Gules a saltire silver. The helm is gold, the crest coronet sable, and the bull's head crest silver, with horns and tongue gules.
2. die $g^{\prime} v^{\prime}$ waerwic. Thomas Beauchamp, earl of Warwick, K.G., d. I401. Gules a fess between six crosses crosslet gold. The helm is gold with the coronet gules, the crest, a swan's head and neck, silver with beak gules. This is the same as the achievement on his Garter plate (Stall Plates of the Knights of the Garter, by W. H. St. John Hope, Plate xiI).
3. die b'e vo graestoc. Ralph fitz William, lord Greystoke, d. 1417. Barry silver and azure three chaplets gules. The helm is gold with mantling of the arms, the coronet is gold with crest of a flame of fire. The crest on their seals was blazoned by the writer as a " bush of feathers," but it seems likely that this MS. is right, and that it should be a flame of fire. It is not a usual crest, and Gelre herald must have had opportunities of seeing it on the helm of lord Greystoke, who was great] employed in the French wars of Edward III.
4. ananderdeel. Bruce, lord of Annandale and Hart. Gold a saltire and a chief gules, crest on a silver helm mantled of the arms, a right hand and arm, blessing, the arm is vested gules with white cuffs, and around it is a garland silver and azure. The date is too late for the shield to represent a Bruce lord of

Annandale. It probably here stands for the lordship, held at this date by George, earl of Dunbar and March.
5. sur robbert colleuile. Robert Colville, lord of Oxnam' and Ochiltree. Silver a mill-rind cross sable, on a gold helm, mantled vert (?) a battlemented tower gold, from which issues a right hand and arm, vested azure, grasping a triple thonged scourge with gold handle.
6. ct' de maersbe. 'George of Dunbar, earl of March. Gules a lion rampant silver a border silver charged with eight roses gules. On a gold helm with crest coronet gules the crest of a horse's head and neck grey, bridled gules. (See Durham Seals, Nos. 2803-14.)

Plate in.

1. Tho: Karefield, B: of ourham. Thomas of Hatield, bishop of Durham, 1345-8r. Azure a cross gold between four lions rampant silver-See of Durham, impaling ermine a chevron sable (or gules)-Hatfield. The first Calais roll from which this shield is copied is a contemporary list of the leaders at the siege of Calais, $1345-48$. But, as stated in the introduction (ante, p. 2), it is very doubtful whether the blazons of the shields were in the original roll, they are probably a later addition. The shield, here illustrated, is copied from Harl. MS. 6595, and is obviously of much later date than the fourteenth century. The shield given for the bishop appears to be confused with the later shield of the Hatfields of Holderness. There can be no doubt about the arms used by the bishop, they are as blazoned on pp. 4, i2 and 13 ante.
2. die bisscop wō durem. John Fordham, bishop of Durham, 1382-88. Sable a chevron between three crosses paty (or patonce) gold. Above the helm, which is mantled purple lined ermine, is a gold and jewelled mitre, rising from a gold crest coronet, between the horns is a red globe, upon which is a dove rising, holding in its beak a scroll upon which is gloria deo. This achievement is from the Armorial de Gelre. (See Durham Seals, Nos. 3140-43.)
3. the bishopp of duresme the lord chomas Rewthebal. Thomas Ruthall, bishop of Durham, 1509-23. Azure a cross gold between four lions rampant silver-See of Durham, impaling party azure and gules a cross engrailed silver between four doves gold; on a chief quarterly gold and ermine two roses gules-Ruthall. The shield is ensigned by a gold and jewelled mitre; with labels of crimson with gold fringes; from between the horns of the mitre issues the bishop's crest of seven ostrich feathers. This shield is copied from The roll of the peers of Parliament in the sixth year of Henry VIIIth. (Thos. Willement, London, 1829.)
