

II.—LOCAL ARMORIALS OF THE EIGHTEENTH CENTURY.

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[Read on 24th April, 1935.]

Two books of armorial drawings made in the latter half of the eighteenth century were recently bought from an Exeter bookseller by Mr. W. J. Hemp, F.S.A., who, through the good offices of our late member, Robert Carr Bosanquet, lent them to the present writer¹ to examine and, if thought desirable, to edit for the society.

They are of considerable local interest, not only because their contents illustrate by pen and ink and coloured drawings one of the dark ages of the art of heraldry, as used by important families in Northumberland and Newcastle upon Tyne at that time, but because they contain the work of the two Ralph Waters, father and son, local artists of eminence in their day, to both of whom we as antiquaries owe much.

The drawings are also excellent examples of the work of the herald-painters of the latter half of the eighteenth century, who had been allowed to usurp very largely the duties of the College of Heralds. It has been well said that the art of heraldry then was entirely "abandoned to the coach-painter and the undertaker."

Ralph Waters the elder was born at Chirton on 20th September 1720, married Anne Kirkhouse at St. John's church, Newcastle upon Tyne, 24th June 1749, lived for a while in Westgate, and died at his house in the Bigg

Market, 29th November 1798.² His eldest son, Ralph, was born in 1749 and died 26th October 1817.³

The late W. W. Tomlinson recorded in our *Proceedings*⁴ the little that is known of the family. We learn from advertisements in the *Newcastle Journal*⁵ that Ralph Waters the elder did not disdain to add to his more artistic work the prosaic calling of a house and coach painter, and that by 1752 he had opened a "drawing school"—the first school of art we hear of in the town—"where young ladies and gentlemen may be instructed in that art and also in Perspective on reasonable terms."⁶

A glimpse of him and of two of his sons is given in the *Newcastle Directory* for 1787, in which these entries appear—*Waters & Son, Painters in General, Bigg Market. Ralph Waters Junr., Teacher of Drawing, Pilgrim Street. Henry Waters, Printseller & Stationer,*⁷ *Bigg Market.*

It is by their fine drawings and paintings of local buildings and scenes that both father and son are best remembered to-day, and it may be well to mention here some of their extant paintings.

To Ralph Waters senior can be attributed—*Tynemouth Priory from the South in 1786*;⁸ *Guildhall and Sandhill, Newcastle*;⁹ *Tyne Bridge after the flood of 1771*;¹⁰ *View of Newcastle from the East*;¹¹ *View of All Hallows Church in ruins in 1786*.¹²

The best known picture by Ralph Waters the younger is that of *The Interior of St. Nicholas Church in 1783*, exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1785.¹³ Other drawings and paintings, whose whereabouts do not now appear to be known, both by the elder and younger Waters were advertised for sale, after the latter's death, in the *Newcastle Courant* for 15th February 1817.¹⁴

No examples of their work as "herald-painters" has heretofore been known, though it is quite possible that some of the few "hatchments" that have been allowed to remain in the parish churches of the north may have been painted from the drawings in these books; it is, therefore, fortunate that these two volumes should have been found.

The larger of them ($7\frac{1}{2}'' \times 4\frac{3}{4}''$) is bound in old brown polished calf, now much decayed. It is labelled ARMS on a panel of the back with the name WATERS below. Inside the cover is a book-plate of eighteenth century style, the centre bearing the crest of the family of Waters—an eagle's head rased¹⁵—with the name RA. WATERS printed below it. The book contains 111 drawings, in pen and ink or coloured in their proper heraldic tinctures, of armorial achievements—corrupted now to *hatchments*, whilst on the backs of some of the pages are drawings of architectural details and rough sketches of armorials,¹⁶ the latter obviously not done by Ralph Waters himself. After page 62 (no. 97) all the drawings deteriorate in style; they are very roughly tricked by a different hand to the earlier one. The name R. STEEL is printed in large capitals across pp. 68^b and 69, who may have been employed by Waters and who may have sketched these later arms.

The drawings have usually the name and sometimes the rank and occupation of the owner written beneath them; occasionally the verbal blazon is added, and nearly

all of them are sketches from which funereal achievements have been painted for people of importance in Northumberland and Newcastle upon Tyne.

Crests are carefully drawn and mottoes are sometimes placed below the shield. It is interesting to note that some of these were specially written for the "hatchment"; for example, that for no. 5 was written by Sir Matthew White, and that for no. 93 by the "Rev. Mr. Ridley."

Sometimes interesting details are given, such as on no. 13 for Snow Clayton, who is said to be "the gentleman in drab" calming the disputing fishwives in the above mentioned picture of the Sandhill. The majority of the armorials are remarkable for the care and accuracy with which the heraldic details, such as the correct marshalling, quartering, impaling, and shields borne in pretence, are treated. This reflects the importance attached to heraldry at that formal period even by non-armigerous persons.

The smaller volume ($6\frac{3}{8}'' \times 4\frac{1}{4}''$) is bound in brown morocco of later style than the larger one. It is lettered ARMS on the back, but there is no mark of its maker upon it; the book-plate of a later owner, Rev. W. H. King, is inside the cover. The shields, of which there are thirty-nine, differ in shape from those in the larger volume, and have been drawn upon separate sheets which have afterwards been bound, between sheets of hand-made Dutch paper, into their present book form. The achievements differ from those in the larger volume in that they do not appear to have been drawn for "hatchments" nor, indeed, for any special purpose, but rather for the artist's pleasure in recording armorials that appealed to him. Some are said to be copied "from a chaise" or "from a coach," and one of 27th July 1785, "from the judge's coach"—a reminder of the pomp and pageantry which accompanied "my lord's size" as he drove in procession from Sheriff Hill to the old Mansion House in the Close. The last few shields in this book are carelessly drawn and

not coloured, and seem to be done by another hand than that of either of the Waters.

The editor does not doubt that both books contain the work of both the elder and the younger Ralph Waters, but he has not found it possible to identify the work of each except that the earlier dated ones are probably the work of the elder.

The editor has identified each shield, so far as he could, and has added short biographical notes to each, so that the quarterings and impalements may be better understood. The volumes make an interesting and valuable addition to our knowledge of local heraldry and of the importance attached to it by our forerunners here in Northumberland in the later eighteenth century.

The shields that follow from volume I of the manuscript book have been numbered consecutively by the editor. Those from volume II are also numbered consecutively with the addition of the small letter *a* to the arabic numeral.

1. SWINBURNE—Per fess gu. and ar. three cinquefoils counter-coloured—Swinburne. Crest, a demi-swine ramp. ar. armed or out of a coronet gu.

On a loose leaf pasted on to first page of the book. There is no name or date, but see nos. 88 and 89 *post*.

- 1* BAKER—Ar. a tower bet. three keys upright sa.—Baker. The shield is borne upon a cross or bordered az. which itself is placed upon the breast of a double-headed eagle displayed sa. The whole hangs from a loop forming the upper part of an ornamental figure which encircles the whole achievement. Upon the upper part is the motto SALUS ET GLORIA.

This also is on the same leaf as no. 1, pasted on the first page of the book. It is a Baker shield, of the Sussex family, but the editor is unable to identify the person commemorated.

- 1^b HARRISON—Az. three demi-lions ramp. or—Harrison; an esc. *in pret.* barry sa. and gu. on a chev. bet. three lions ramp. ar. three annulets gu.—Sowerby. Crest, a demi-lion ramp. holding a wreath gu. in its paws.
Mrs. Elizabeth Harrison, Pilgrim Street, Newcastle upon Tyne, Jan. 21, 1782.

The arms are charged upon a lozenge with ornamented edges. Tricked in pen and ink. John Harrison of Fatfield, Durham, merchant of Newcastle, m. Earsdon, 19 Sept. 1755, Elizabeth Sowerby, d. of alderman Ralph Sowerby—"a most agreeable young lady with a very considerable fortune"—she d. at Killingworth 9 April 1803. Their d. and h., Ann, m. Admiral Roddam of Roddam. (JCH, III, 346, *Newcastle Courant*, 20 Sept. 1755.)

2. COLLINGWOOD—Ar. a chev. bet. three stags' heads rased sa. Crest, a stag pass. in front of a holly bush—Collingwood.

Henry Collingwood Esqr. 1783. Painted on an achievement. John Collingwood Esqr. of Cornhill, brother and heir to the above.

Tricked in pen and ink. He was s. of Henry Collingwood, Westerheugh near Brinkburn, by his wife, Elizabeth Forster, the heiress of Cornhill on Tweed. Percival Clennell devised Lilburn to him. He was sheriff of Northumberland in 1766, buried 2 June 1783. John Collingwood, his brother, draper and silk-mercier, of Fleet Street and West Lilburn, succeeded him and died 13 Aug. 1787. (JCH, II, 316.)

3. COLLINGWOOD—Ar. a chev. bet. three stags' heads rased sa.—Collingwood, *in pret.* quarterly I and IV gu. on a bend ar. three cinquefoils sa.—Roddam, II ar. on a chief sa. three lions' heads rased ar.—Richardson, III sa. a chev. bet. three escallops ar.—Milbourne. Crest, a stag's head rased sa. Motto, FERAR·UNUS·ET·IDEM.

Edward Collingwood Esqr., Chirton, 1783. Painted on an Atch. Edwd. Collingwood Esqr. his son.

The shield is tricked in pen and ink, and beneath is another small shield quarterly. I Collingwood as above, II Roddam as above, III Richardson as above, IV Milbourne as above. Ralph Milbourne of Chirton m. Winifred, d. of Thomas Richardson of Clements' Inn. Their d., Winifred, m., in 1698, John Roddam of Roddam and Little Houghton. Their d., Mary Roddam, m. Edward Collingwood of Byker and Dissington, by which marriage Chirton and the bulk of the Milbourne property came to the Collingwoods. Edward Collingwood was for many years recorder of Newcastle upon Tyne and mayor of the town in 1740. He d. 18 May, buried 23 May 1783, aged 81. (NCH, VIII, p. 324; pedigree NCH, XIII, p. 175.)

4. ERRINGTON—Ar. two bars and in chief three escallops az.—Errington, *imp.* sa. three molets and a border

ar.—Stoddart. Crest, a unicorn's head rased ar. horned and maned or.

Jno. Errington Esqr., Chesters, impaled with Stoddart as on coach, 1783—William Errington Esqr. his son and heir.

Tricked in pen and ink. John Errington of Chesters was the second s. of William Errington of Walwick Grange, bap. 29 July 1733, m. at Chollerton, 26 June 1764, Mary, d. of Rev. Charles Stoddart, vicar of Chollerton. He built the mansion of Chesters, was b. Warden 18 May 1783. (HN, II, iii, p. 415.)

5. BELL—Sa. a fess erm. bet. three bells ar. a label of three pts. ar.—Bell. Crest, a hawk prop. belled or. Motto, DEUS·HAEC·OTIA·FECIT. *Sir Matt. White Ridley, Bart., wrote this motto for the achievements. Matthew Bell, Jnr., Esqr., Newcastle.*

Tricked in pen and ink. On the dexter side of this shield is tricked a smaller one. Bell as above *imp.* gu. on a chev. sa. bet. three sheaves or, three escallops ar.—Eden. *M. Bell Esqr., Jnr. and 1st wife Eden.*

On the sinister side a small shield is also tricked. Bell as above *imp.* 1. gu. two chev. ar. over all on a pale ar. a heart gu.—? 2. ar. a . . . ? gu. bet. three molets az.—? *2nd wife alive Grand.* The impalement is not recorded elsewhere.

He was the eldest s. of Matthew Bell of Newcastle who purchased Woolsington, b. 30 April 1746, admitted to Merchants' Company by patrimony 19 Dec. 1766, d. Clavering Place, Newcastle, 28 Dec. 1782. His first wife was Dulcibelle, d. of Sir William Eden of Windlestone, whom he m. 23 July 1767. His second wife was Elizabeth Grand of Beverley who survived him. (NCH, XIII, 208.)

6. BATES—Sa. a fess engr. or bet. three dexter hands bendways ar. Crest, a naked boy holding a branch prop. Motto, ET·MANV·ET·CORDE—Bates. *The above arms painted on a very old portrait of one of the family.*

Tricked in pen and ink. On the sinister side of the above shield is a smaller one tricked in pen and ink—Bates as above *imp.* ar. a fess bet. three moles sa.—Mitford. *1st wife Mitford.*

On the dexter side is another shield also tricked in pen and ink. Bates as above *imp.* gu. a chev. ar. bet. three eagles' heads rased or—Ellison. *2nd surviving wife Ellison. August 22, 1783.*

For Ralph Bates of Halliwell, b. 14 May 1730, sheriff of Northumberland 1762, d. 2 Aug. 1783. His first wife was Jane, d. of James Mitford of Newcastle; she d. 6 May 1760. His second wife was Anne, d. of Henry Ellison of Park House, Gateshead, who d. 1 Oct. 1837, aged 94. (NCH, IX, p. 88.)

7. SIMPSON—Quarterly I and IV gu. a fess bet. two lions pass. or—Simpson, II and III ar. three oak trees prop. fruited or—Anderson, *imp.* az. a lion ramp. and in chief three escallops ar.—Clutterbuck. Crest, a demi-lion ramp. ar. (Plate I.)

John Simpson Esqr. of Bradley. October 1783. Painted on an Atchievement for Mrs. Simpson.

Tricked in pen and ink. He was s. of John Simpson of Newcastle, of Bradley in right of his w. Jane, d. and h. of Henry Anderson of Bradley. His w., for whom this was painted, was Anne, d. of Richard Clutterbuck of Warkworth; she d. 4 Aug. 1783.

8. BAKER—Ar. on a saltire engr. sa. five escallops ar. on a chief sa. a lion pass. ar. Crest, a lion ramp. ar.—Baker.

Jno. Baker Esqr., Alderman, Feb. 20, 1784.

Tricked in pen and ink. On the sinister side of above is a smaller shield also tricked in pen and ink. Baker as above with *in pret.* gu. on a mount vert a swan ar. collared or—Dale. *Dale 1st wife.*

On the dexter side is a similar shield of Baker with, *in pret.* gu. a chev. bet. three sheaves or—Reed. *2nd wife Reed.*

He was a younger s. of Francis Baker of Tanfield, the younger b. of George Baker of Crook Hall, alderman of Newcastle, sheriff of the town in 1760, and mayor in 1768 and again in 1776. He was buried in All Hallows, Newcastle,

10 Feb. 1784. The writer has not been able to trace the families of his two wives whose arms are borne in pret. (SD, II, 358; BN, II, 538, 541, 547.)

9. ATKINSON—Ar. a double-headed eagle disp. sa. on a chief or a rose vert bet. two martlets gu.—Atkinson, *imp.* barry or and az. a bend sa.—Muncaster. Crest, a cock prop.

Charles Atkinson Esqr., Mayor, 1784.

Tricked in pen and ink. His parentage is unknown, an alderman of Newcastle and mayor in 1776. His w. was Frances, d. of James Muncaster of Newcastle. He was accidentally killed at Dunfermline in Feb. 1797, bur. in St. Nicholas. (*Men of Mark*, I, 132.)

10. MOSLEY—Quarterly I and IV sa. a chev. bet. three mill-picks ar.—Mosley, II and III gu. a bend vair bet. two sheaves or—Richard, *imp.* ar. a fess az. fretty or bet. in chief a lion pass. gu. and in base three crosses crosslet fitchy gu.—Cambleshon. Crest, an eagle displayed erm. a crescent for diff. Motto, MOS·LEGEM·REGIS.

Edward Mosley Esqr., Alderman of this town Newcastle upon Tyne. Febr. 28th, 1784.

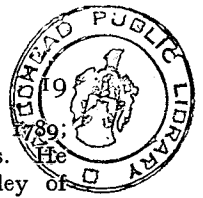
Tricked in pen and ink. He was the s. of Rowland Mosley, apothecary of York, by his w. Jane, d. of Charles Richard. Freeman of the Hostmen's Co. 1747; alderman and sheriff of Newcastle 1758, mayor 1767; 1774, 1781; d. 12 Feb. 1798. His first w. was Hannah Camblethorn or Cambleshon, d. of a York merchant; she d. 5 Jan. 1784. He m. secondly Elizabeth, d. of William Lake, 28 Nov. 1786.

11. MOISES—Gu. a fess ermin. bet. three bulls' heads ar. horned or. Crest, bulrushes prop. Motto NISI·VIRTUS·VILIOR·ALGA. (Plate I.)

The Revd. Mr. Moizes of Newcastle upon Tyne, Master of the head school. Feby. 3rd 1785.

The rev. Hugh Moises, M.A., fellow of Peterhouse, b. at Wimeswold, Leicestershire, assistant master of Chesterfield Grammar School, master of the Royal Grammar School,

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Newcastle upon Tyne 1749-1787; rector of Greystoke d. at Newcastle 5 July 1806 and bur. in St. Nicholas. was thrice m. (1) Margaret, sis. of Matthew Ridley of Heaton, (2) Isabel d. of rev. John Ellison, (3) Ann wid. of William Boag—"a young widow of £10,000 fortune."

12. INGHAM—Vert on a fess ar. three escallops party or and gu.—Ingham, *in pret.* az. a chev. engr. or bet. three roundels ar. each charged with a slipt trefoil—Walker. Crest, a lion pass. or.

Wm. Ingham Esqr., Surgeon, Newcastle upon Tyne, Feb. 26th 1785.

His life is in *Men of Mark*, II, 593 ff. The shield in pret. is diff. by change of colour from one granted to Anthony Walker of Yorks., gent., 11 March 1554. He lived in the Bigg Market in 1787, d. 26 Nov. 1817.

13. CLAYTON—Ar. a cross engr. sa. bet. three roundels sa. Crest, an arm in armour grasping a sword—Clayton.

Snow Clayton Esqr., Clothier, Sandhill, Newcastle upon Tyne, Febr. 8th 1785.

He was a younger s. of Nathaniel Clayton, alderman, sheriff and mayor of Newcastle, by his w. Anne, d. of Cuthbert Snow of Newcastle. He died unmarried 28 Dec. 1789. In the Newcastle *Directory* of 1778, Clayton and Hornby, woollen-drapers, carried on business on the north side of the Sandhill. He is said to be "the gentleman in drab interposing between the squabbling fisherwomen" in the painting of the Sandhill given to the society by Robert Ingham in Nov. 1857. (AA² III, xii.)

14. SMITH—Ar. on a bend az. bet. two unicorns' heads rased az., three lozenges erm.—Smith; *in pret.* . . . a chev. bet. three eagles' heads rased. . . . Crest, a unicorn's head rased.

— *Smith Esqr., Westgate Street, Newcastle upon Tyne.*

The writer is unable to trace this man, and the lack of colour on the shield in *pret.* makes it impossible to identify it. The shield for Smith is that given for Smith of Durham at the visit. of 1615.

15. SMART—Ar. on a chev. bet. three pheons sa. a fleur de lis ar.—Smart, *imp.* gu. a demi-lion ramp. ar. and a border sa. bezanty—Lynn. Crests, (1) a demi-eagle wings displayed bearing in his beak a burdock—Smart; (2) a cinquefoil vert—Lynn.

Jⁿ Smart Esqr. of Trewit, County of Northumberland.

He was the eldest s. of William Smart of Belford, Trehwitt and Netherton, Northumberland, by his w. Sarah Ayrd. He was a justice and D.L. for the county, he m., in 1785, Dorothy, third d. and coh. of Robert Lynn of Mainsforth, Durham, and was a well-known antiquary.

The impaled arms were granted to Major G. F. Johnson (afterwards Lynn) of Norton, 23 April 1796. (*Genealogist*, I, 116.)

16. HEDLEY—Gu. a chev. bet. three falcons ar., talons and bells or—Hedley; *in pret.* gu. on a bend ar. three molets az.—Shafto. Crest, a martlet or, wings endorsed.

Jⁿ Hedley Esqr. Alderman of Newcastle upon Tyne.

He was the third s. of William Hedley of Newcastle, master mariner, by his w. Elizabeth Johnson. He was sheriff of the town in 1766 and mayor in the years 1777 and 1788. He m. 1755 Deborah, d. of Thomas Shafto of Dunston. He d. Jan. 1798. (BN; JCH, iv, 303.)

17. SMITH—Ar. on a bend az. bet. two unicorns' heads az. three lozenges erm.—Smith. Crest, a right arm in armour grasping a sword. On the dexter side is a smaller shield Smith as above *imp.* gu. on a chev. ar. bet. three stringed bugle horns or, three molets az.—Hunter; on the sinister is a similar small shield Smith as above, *in pret.* ar. three martlets gu. on a chief gu. three martlets ar.—Fenwick.

Capt. Ralph Smith of the Riding near Hexham, 1st wife Hunter of the County of Durham, 2nd wife—Fenwick of Newcastle. Painted on an atchievement April 7, 1786.

The shields are in trick only. The editor has been unable to identify him further.

18. CLAYTON—Ar. a cross engr. bet. four roundels sa., a crescent gu. in dexter chief for diff.—Clayton; *in pret.* ar. a chief gu. and six martlets counter-coloured—Fenwick. Crest, upon a helmet a right arm in armour grasping a sword.

Painted on an atchievement for the Rev. Mr. Clayton, August 24, 1786, made torteaux [the roundels] on y^e atchievement by mistake.

Tricked only. For Rev. Nathaniel Clayton, B.D., s. of Nathaniel Clayton and his w. Anne Snow. He was lecturer at St. John's, Newcastle, 1731, vicar of Piddletrenthide, Dorset, 1773; vicar of Kirkwhelpington 1775; rector of Ingram 1775; master of the hospital of St. Mary, Newcastle, and incumbent of the chapel of St. Thomas on Tyne bridge 1779; m. Grace, d. of Nicholas Fenwick of London, in 1749; d. aged 78, 10 Aug. 1786. (HN, II, i, 206, and *ibid.*, II, iii, 420.)

19. SELBY—Barry of ten or and sa.—Selby; crest, a soldan's head facing bound by a wreath gu. and ar.; on the dexter side of this shield is a smaller one Selby as above *imp.* ar. three bars gemell and a chief or—Meynell; on the sinister is a like shield Selby *imp.* quarterly ar. and gu.—Tuite.

Painted on an Atchievement to the Memory of Thos. Selby Esqr. of Biddleston in the County of Northumberland, July 10th 1787. 1st Wife Mennell, 2nd Wife Tewitt, Dainish Family.

Shields are tricked only. He was the only s. of Thomas William Selby of Biddlestone by his w. Barbara, d. of Christopher

The statement that she was a Dane made above seems an error, perhaps because her third son, Charles Joseph Selby, born 1755, settled in Denmark and rose to high rank in that country. (*Her. and Gen.* III, 518, and *Burke's L.G.*)

20. MILBANK—Gu. a bend erm. on a canton in the dexter chief, or a lion's head rased gu. charged with a bend erm., in sinister chief on an esc. the red hand of Ulster—Milbank; *in pret.* quarterly I and IV ar. an esc. sa. in an orle of cinquefoils gu.—Hedworth, II and III ar. a cross patonce sa.—Ayton (?). Crest, a lion's head as on the canton.

Sr Ralph Milbank, Bart.

Painted in colours. Sir Ralph Milbank of Halnaby, Yorks, and Seaham, Durham, was the eldest s. of Sir Ralph Milbank and his second w. Anne Delaval. He m. Elizabeth, d. and coh. of John Hedworth of Chester Deanery, Durham. He d. 8 Jan. 1798 and was buried at Croft. The erm. bend upon the lion's head on the canton is not usually given. (SD, I, 274, and II, 151.)

21. BLACKETT—Ar. on a chev. bet. three pierced molets sa. three escallops ar.—Blackett, *in pret.* ar. on a bend sa. three crosses patonce or—Roddam. Crest, a falcon's head coupéd.

John Erasmus Blackett Esqr., Alderman of Newcastle/Tyne, July 26, 1787.

Shield is tricked only. He was a younger s. of John Blackett of Newby, Yorks, merchant of Newcastle, by his w. Patience Wise. He was admitted to the Merchants' Company of Newcastle 5 Dec. 1753, sheriff of Newcastle 1756, mayor several years between 1765 and 1790, d. 11 June 1814. His w. was Sarah, d. of Robert Roddam of Hethpool. (NCH, XII, 378.)

22. HUMBLE—Sa. a stag pass. ar. a chief indented or—Humble, *imp.* az. a chev. erm. bet. three arrows,

heads to base, or on a chief ar. three daws on a canton gu. a molet or—Dawson. Crest, a stag's head rased ar.

Edward Humble, Gent., Newcastle.

Painted in colours. He was s. of John Humble of Ryton on Tyne, b. 1723, d. at Newcastle 24 Sept. 1792. His w. was Sarah, d. of — Dawson, d. Feb. 1802. (JCH, C680.)

23. MUNCASTER—Barry of ten or and az. a bend sa.—Muncaster, *imp.* gu. on a mount vert a swan ar.—Dale. Crest, an anchor az. chain and cross head or. Motto, RESURGAM.

March 28, 1797, painted on an Achievement for James Moncaster Esqr. of Walls End, co. of Northumberland.

Tricked only. He was a merchant adventurer of Newcastle, admitted by patrimony 12 Dec. 1739; lay rector of Felton, lived at Wallsend Hall where he d. April 1797. He m. Elizabeth, d. of — Dale of Howden Pans, 22 Sept. 1767.

24. CLAVERING—Quarterly I and IV quarterly or and gu. a bend sa., the red hand of Ulster on an esc. at the centre point—Clavering, II and III gu. a chev. bet. three eagles' heads rased or—Ellison, *in pret.* ar. a human heart crowned or on a chief az. three molets ar.—Douglas. Crest, in a coronet or a lion's head rased az.

Painted in colours. For Sir Thomas Clavering, Bart., of Axwell Park, who d. 16 Aug. 1792. He m. at Gosforth, May 1746, Martha, d. of Joshua Douglas of Newcastle. The Ellison quarters came by the m. of his grandfather, James Clavering of Greencroft, and Jane, d. and coh. of Benjamin Ellison of Newcastle. (SD, Gates. 142.)

25. PEARETH—Quarterly I and IV gu. a chev. ar. bet. three pears or—Peareth, II and III or a chev. indented gu. bet. three eagles' heads rased sa.—Jackson; *in pret.*, az. a chev. bet. three eagles' heads ar. on a chief or a lion pass. bet. two roundels gu.—Jennens'. Crest, a pear tree fruited or.

— *Peareth Esqr. painted on an Atchievement June 17, 1775, do. for Mrs. Peareth March 14, 1801.*

For William Peareth of Usworth, clerk of the town chamber of Newcastle and alderman of the town for many years; he d. 20 May 1775 and was bur. in St. Nicholas. His w. was Anne, d. of Richard Jennens of Warwick; she d. 25 Feb. 1801. The Jackson quartering is for his mother, Elizabeth Jackson. (SD, II, 45.)

26. COLLINGWOOD—Ar. a chev. bet. three stags' heads rased gu.—Collingwood, *imp.* ar. a chev. bet. three sheaves sa.—? Blake. Crest, a stag pass. sa.

Mr. Collingwood.

The editor cannot identify this man.

27. FENWICK—Ar. a chief gu. and six martlets counter-coloured—Fenwick, *imp.* quarterly I and IV ar. a pale indented az. (or four lozenges conjoined in pale), II and III ar. a lion pass. regardant gu.—Daniel. Crest, upon a helmet a phoenix prop. Motto, TOUJOURS LOYAL.

Wm. Fenwick Esqr., Bywell, impaled with Daniel. Dec. 1802. Painted on an Atchievement.

Tricked only. For William Fenwick of Bywell, who d. 26 Nov. 1802. His w. was Frances, d. of Francis Daniel of Gloucester; she d. 29 June 1783. (NCH, VI, 99.)

28. SILVERTOP—Erm. a fess gu. bet. three grenades fired—Silvertop, *imp.* az. a lion ramp. guard. or over all a fess ar.—(?) Whittingham. Crest, a gryphon's head rased or pierced by a spear ar.

Mr. Silvertop.

Painted in colour. There should be a roundel ar. upon the fess on the Silvertop shield and the impal. should be *ar. a fess az. over all a lion ramp. gu.* The arms are for George Silvertop of Stella, who purchased the Minsteracres and d. 10 Mar. 1789. The *imp.* is for his w. Bridget, d. of Henry Whittingham, co. Lancaster. (NCH, VI, 215.)

29. ALLGOOD—Quarterly I and IV ar. a cross engr. gu. bet. four molets az. on a chief or three roses gu., II and III ar. a cross engr. gu. on a chief or three roses gu.—Allgood, *imp.* gu. a chev. bet. three sheaves or—*Reed of Chipchase. Mrs. Allgood Decr. 30, 1803.*

James Allgood of Nunwick, s. and h. of Sir Lancelot Allgood by his w. Jane, d. and h. of Robert Allgood of Nunwick, was b. 1749, m. 2 Oct. 1790 Martha, d. and h. of Christopher Reed of Chipchase.

30. WARD—Az. a cross patonce or—Ward, *in pret.* ar. on a fess az. three lozenges or—Fielding. Crest, a wolf's (?) head rased ar.

For John Ward of Whitby and of Newcastle upon Tyne, a Russian merchant, who m., at Harton, 16 Aug. 1766, Mary, d. and h. of — Fielding of Bebside; she d. 7 Dec. 1790, he d. April 1803. (NCH, IX, 297.)

31. ALLCOCK—Ar. a fess gu. bet. three cocks' heads rased gu. a border az.—Allcock, *imp.* ar. a chev. sa. bet. three bugle horns az.—Foster?

Allcock.

The shield is charged upon an oval, tricked in pen and ink. Probably for Giles Alcock of Newcastle and Cartington, collector of the duke of Richmond's coal dues at Newcastle. D. at his house in Percy Street, Feb. 1789. His w. maiden name is unknown, but she was probably a Foster; she d. at Percy Street, March 1788. (JCH, A406.)

32. GOLDING—Party per pale gu. and az. two bars or bet. in chief three bezants and in base a pheon ar.—? Golding, *imp.* per chev. embattled or and az. three spread eagles counter-coloured—? Crest, on a roundel or, a stag pass. on a mount vert. LIBERTY, VIRTUE, MY COUNTRY.

Golding Esqr., Durham.

Painted in colours. The editor cannot identify him.

33. ALLCOCK—Ar. a fess sa. bet. three cocks' heads sa. combed and wattled gu. a border az. charged with eight coronets or. Crest, a cock ar. combed and wattled gu. The arms are charged upon a lozenge within an ornamental border.

Alcock, March 28, 1807, painted upon an achievement to the memory of Miss Jane Alcock.

Tricked in pen and ink. She was the unmarried d. of Giles Alcock (no. 31), d. 1807.

34. WILKINSON—Vert a fess ermin. bet. three unicorns pass. ar. a label of three points ar.—Wilkinson, *in pret.* az. a right hand and arm verted grasping a baton ar.—Clennell. Crest, out of a mural crown gu. a demi-unicorn ramp. ermin.

William Wilkinson Esqr., Newcastle.

Painted in colours. He was the eldest s. of Anthony Wilkinson, Crossgate, Durham. His w. was Philadelphia, d. and h. of Thomas Clennell of Clennell; she brought Clennell to her husband. He was sheriff of Northumberland 1757, d. 1768. (SD, I, 81.)

35. TWEDDELL—Per fess vert and az., a fess party per fess az. and vert cotised ar. bet. in chief three molets ar. and in base a salmon prop.—Tweddle, *in pret.* az. a fess bet. three swines' heads rased ar.—*Pattison of Unthank.* Crest, a lion's head rased gu. collared or above it on a label VIVENDUM·RECTE. Motto beneath shield REQVIESCAT-IN-PACE.

Wm. Tweddell of Unthank Hall, near Haltwhistle, Northumberland. Painted on an achievement for — Tweddle Esqr. of Oakwood House, by order of his son, Edw. Tweddle Esqr., Feb. 18, 1808, near Haltwhistle, Northumberland.

Tricked in pen and ink. The shield appears to be for John Tweddell of Thorpthewles, Durham, and of Unthank and

Threapwood, Northumberland, and for his w. Isabella, d. and h. of John Pattison of Unthank. Their s. William succeeded to Unthank and d. without issue, according to the pedigrees. (SD, III, 82; HN, II, III, 343 and 370.) These shields are not recorded elsewhere.

36. ELLISON—Gu. a chev. bet. three eagles' heads rased or—Ellison, *in pret.* barry or and sa.—Selby. Crest, an eagle's head rased or.

Elison Esqr.

Painted in colours. The editor cannot trace this man nor an Ellison-Selby marriage.

37. TWEDDELL—As no. 35, *imp.* ar. three hazel branches—Heslop, *in pret.* Pattison as no. 35. Crest, a squirrel.

Weddell.

Shield roughly sketched in pencil. See under no. 35. The impalement named in sketch for Heslop is not elsewhere recorded and I am unable to find the marriage to account for it.

38. GIBSON—Sa. three storks rising prop.—Gibson, *in pret.* az. a fess or bet. three swines' heads coupéd ar.—Pattison. Crest, a demi-stork rising prop.

Fess in escutcheon of Pretence ar. not or.

William Gibson Esqr., Attorney, Town Clerk, Newcastle Tyne.

Painted in colours, the field of the shield has been altered from az. to sa. He was town clerk of Newcastle from 28 Feb. 1756 until his death in 1785. Nothing appears to be recorded as to his parentage or family history.

39. BIGGE—Quarterly I and IV erm. on a fess engr. sa. bet. three martlets sa. three annulets or—Bigge, II ar. on a bend sa. three lozenges erm.—Dent, III vert three calves' heads rased or—Hindmarch, *in pret.* az. three escallops paleways or bet. two flanches erm.—Clark. Crest, a demi-eagle ar. rising, wings az. crowned or.

Bigge Esqr., Little Benton, 1751.

Painted in colour. For William Bigge s. of Thomas Bigge by his w. Elizabeth, d. of William Hindmarch of Wallsend, and grandson of William Bigge of Newcastle and his w. Isabel, d. and coh. of Thomas Dent of Newcastle. His w. was Mary, d. and coh. of Charles Clarke of Ovingham. He d. 30 June 1758.

40. A shield similar to no. 39 tricked roughly in pen and ink, quarterly I Bigge, II Dent, III vert three calves' heads ar.—Hindmarsh, IV Clark as *in pret.* on no. 39. *1st Bigge, 2 Dent, 3 Hindmarsh, 4 Mr. Bigges' maternal Coat (Clark).* N.B. *The above arms thus painted when Thomas Charles Bigge Esqr. stood High Sheriff for Northumberland.*

He was the eldest s. and h. of William Bigge (no. 39). Sheriff of Northumberland 1771.

41. GREY—Gu. a lion ramp. and a border engr. ar.—Grey, *imp.* az. on a bend ar. three fleurs de lis az.—?

The arms are sketched in pencil and placed upon a lozenge. The editor cannot identify the lady nor the arms on the impaled shield.

42. GREY—Quarterly I and IV gu. a lion ramp. and a border engr. ar.—Grey, II and III barry ar. and az. on a bend gu. a bezant—Grey of Harton, a cinquefoil sa. at the fess point; the red hand of Ulster on an esc. in dexter chief. Crest, a double scaling ladder or, hooked az. (Plate II.)

Sir Henry Grey, 1751.

Sir Henry Grey, bart., of Howick, Northumberland, succeeded his father 1750, d. 3 April 1808. (NCH, II, 352.)

43. HEWER—Sa. a double-headed eagle displayed and a border engr. ar.—Hoare, *imp.* gu. a chev. bet. three owls ar.—Hewet? Crest, an eagle's head rased ar. *Hewer in Yorkshire, 1751.*

Drawn in colour. The editor cannot trace this family, but the shield on the dexter is that of Hoare of Norfolk not Hewar; the latter family bore a different shield. The shield on the sinister is that of Hewet or Fleming; this family also the editor cannot trace.

44. CAMPART—Az. a lion ramp. or holding a beast's paw (?) rased in his right paw—Campart. Crest, a bull's head cabossed ar.

Arms and Crest of the late Sir Wm. Loraine, Bart's. 2nd wife. Dec. 25th 1809. Kirkharle.

Tricked in pen and ink. She was Frances, d. of Francis Campart of Kensington Gore, d. 21 Oct. 1811, buried in Kirkharle church. Sir William Loraine d. 19 Dec. 1809 and was also buried at Kirkharle. There does not appear to be another record of this shield. (HN, II, i, 248.)

45. BAKER—Ar. a tower between three keys az.—Baker, *imp.* ar. on a bend sa. cotised sa. three roses ar.—? Ames. Crest, out of a tower sa. an arm and hand in armour sa.

Baker—London.

Drawn in colour. This shield granted Thomas Baker, Battle, Sussex, by William Camden Clarendieux, King of Arms, in May 1615.

46. DAVISON—Quarterly I and IV or, a fess wavy bet. six cinquefoils gu.—Davison, II and III az. six annulets or—Musgrave, *imp.* sa. a double-headed eagle displayed and a border engr. ar.—Hoar. Crest, a demi-dove with wings raised holding an ear of corn in its beak.

Davison.

Drawn in colour. For Thomas Davison of Blakiston, Durham; the *impal.* is for his w. Martha, d. of William Hoar of Limehouse, Middlesex. The Musgrave quartering came by the m. of his grandfather (d. 1690) with Mary, d. and h. of Sir Richard Musgrave of Eden Hall and Hartley, Westmorland. (SD, III, 166; *Records Ser.* XII, 60.)

47. Ar. a crescent gu. bet. three roundels sa. Crest, a crescent gu.

Drawn in colour. The editor cannot identify.

48. LORRAINE—Quarterly sa. and ar. a cross counter-coloured, the red hand of Ulster on an esc. in dexter chief—Lorraine. Crest, on a full faced helm the trunk of a tree with branches. Motto, LAURO·SCUTAQUE·RESURGO.

On the dexter side is a smaller shield bearing Lorraine as above, *imp.* ar. a cross engr. gu. on a chief or three roses gu.—Allgood.

On the sinister side is a like shield Lorraine as above, and *in pret.* az. a lion ramp. or holding paw (?) erased sa. in his right paw—Campart.

Painted on an atchievement for Sir Wm. Loraine, Bart., Dec. 28, 1809. He died Dec. 23.

Tricked in pen and ink. For Sir William Loraine of Kirkharle. The *impal.* on the dexter is for his first w. Hannah, d. of Sir Lancelot Allgood of Nunwick, that in *pret.* on sinister is for his second w. Frances Campart (see no. 44.)

49. LORRAINE—Quarterly sa. and ar. a cross counter-coloured, the red hand of Ulster on an esc. in dexter chief—Lorraine, *imp.* sa. a fess bet. three lambs ar.—Lambton. Crest, on a tree prop. with two branches an esc. of the arms of Lorraine.

Drawn in colour. For Sir Charles Loraine (d. 1755) and his first w. Margaret, d. of Ralph Lambton of Lambton, who d. 1746. (HN, II, i, 247.)

50. SHAFTO—Gu. on a bend ar. three molets az. a cinquefoil or in sinister chief—Shafto, *imp.* gu. on a bend ar. cotised ar. three escallops gu.—? Crest, a man in armour holding a sword in his right hand all prop. D . . . QUI·CONTENTUS.

Drawn in colour. The editor cannot identify this shield. It is not recorded elsewhere.

52. ORD—Sa. three salmon paleways ar.—Ord, *imp.* gu. a fess bet. three martlets ar.—Dillingham. Crest, a stag's head rased.

Ord of —.

Drawn in colours. For William Ord of Fenham and Newminster and his w. Anne, d. of William Dillingham of London. He was sheriff of Northumberland in 1777, d. 6 July 1789. (HN, III, ii, 107.)

53. REA—Az. a roundel bet. three crescents ar.—Rea, *imp.* ar. on a fess gu. three crosses crosslet fitchy ar.—Cuthbert. Crest, an eagle's (?) head rased.

Joseph Reah Esqr.

No particulars have been found of this man.

54. CLAVERING—Quarterly or and gu. a bend sa.—Clavering, *in pret.* ar. a fess of five fusils gu. in chief three martlets sa.—Bosvill. Crest, out of a coronet, a demi-lion ramp. az. armed gu. (Plate II.)

Drawn in colour. The editor cannot identify this shield.

Washington, III ar. a lion ramp. bet. three fleurs de lis sa.—Archbold, *in pret.* ar. on a fess sa. bet. three annulets sa. three molets ar.—Fogge. Crest, out of a coronet or five ostrich feathers, three ar. and two az.—Legge.

—*Leeg* (? Legge).

Drawn in colour. Quarters I and IV and crest are the arms of the earls of Dartmouth (Legge). The editor cannot trace the man for whom the shield is intended.

Mrs. Sunderland, Newcastle.

For Langdale Sunderland of Bradley, customer of Newcastle upon Tyne, who m. Elizabeth, d. of Henry Forster, Uckerby, Yorks, widow of Thomas Burdon. He was bur. 30 Aug. 1792 at Gosforth. (Dugdale's *Yorks. Visit.*, ed. Clay, I, 99.) See also *post* no. 15^a.

61. CHARLTON—Quarterly I and IV or, a lion ramp. gu.—Charlton, II and III lozengy ar. and sa.—Croft, *imp.* per fess gu. and ar. three cinquefoils counter-coloured—Swinburne. Crest, a demi-lion ramp. gu.

Edward Charlton Esqr., Hesleyside.

Drawn in colour. The eldest s. of William Charlton by his w. Mary, d. and coh. of Roger Croft of East Appleton. He m. in 1746 Teresa, d. of Sir John Swinburne of Capheaton, d. 1767.

62. WHITE—Quarterly I and IV ar. three cocks' heads sa. combed and wattled gu.—White, II and III az. a bend bet. two towers or, on a chief or two lozenges az.—Johnson. Crest, a cock ar. combed and wattled gu.

White Esqr. . . .

Drawn in colour. The red hand of Ulster roughly tricked in at the centre point. Matthew White (III) was created a baronet whilst sheriff of Northumberland in 1756. Quarters

II and III are intended for Johnson of Newcastle and Beaside whose heiress Matthew White (II) m., but that shield is incomplete, it should have three pheons on the bend and a lion pass. bet. the lozenges on the chief. The colours also are wrongly given.

Tricked in pen and ink. S. of Matthew Ridley of Heaton and succ. to the baronetcy on the death of his uncle Sir Matthew White of Blagdon. He was b. 1745, m., in 1777, Sarah, d. and h. of Benjamin Colborne of Bath. M.P. for Newcastle, d. 9 April 1813.

64. GODFREY—Sa. a chev. bet. three pelicans' heads rased, in their piety, or—Godfrey. Crest, a pelican's head as in the arms, above it a laurel wreath prop. Motto, POST·SPINAS·PALMA.

Drawn in colours. The arms and crest are those of Godfrey of Kent. There does not appear to have been any north country connection with the family.

65. SHAFTO—Gu. on a bend ar. three molets az.—Shafto, *in pret.* sa. a cross potent or—Allan. Crest, a salamander az. in flames.

Mr. Shafto, Benwell.

Painted in colour. For Robert Shafto, Benwell Tower and Wratting Park, Cambridge, sheriff of Northumberland in 1754, d. 11 June 1780. The esc. is for his w. Camilla, d. and coh. of Thomas Allan of the Flatts, Chester-le-Street. (NCH, XIII, 224.)

66. RUTTER—Gu. three sheaves or, on a chief az. a lion pass. or—Rutter, *in pret.* az. on a bend ar. three unicorns' heads az.—? Smith. Crest, a demi-lion ramp. or.

Mrs. Rutter, Pilgrim Street.

68. WILLIAMSON—Or, a chev. engr. sa. bet. three slipt trefoils sa., the red hand of Ulster in dexter chief—Williamson, *in pret.* ar. fretty gu.—Huddleston. Crest, out of a coronet or, a griffin's head and wings sa. (?)

Sr. Hedworth Williamson, Warmouth.

Drawn in colour. Sir Hedworth Williamson, Monkwearmouth and Whitburn, and his w. Elizabeth, d. of William Huddleston of Millum, Cumberland. He was sheriff of Durham 1747, d. 13 Jan. 1789.

Drawn in colours. Anthony Askew, Kendal, M.D., m. Anne, d. of Adam Storrs, Storrs Hall (Ped. NCH, xi, 438), whose arms are quarters I and IV. His s. Adam m. Anne, d. and coh. of Richard Crackenthorpe, Newbiggin, Westmorland, hence the grand quarters II and III. The esc. in pret. is for Adam Askew, but it is an odd reversal of the usual heraldic custom to place the husband's arms in pret. instead of the wife's, but see no. 70 *post*. The crest, also, is that of either Storrs or Crackenthorpe, not Askew. The motto beneath the shield is that of Askew.

Drawn in colour. Probably for Ralph Sowerby, sheriff of Newcastle 1740, mayor 1743, 1750 and again in 1758. The editor cannot trace the arms, for his wife, on the impalement. It is probably a Dixon shield.

He was of Belsay castle; M.P. Northumberland 1722-57, m. Anne, d. and coh. of William Ettrick of Silksworth, d. 28 Sept. 1757. His father was Sir John Middleton of Belsay whose w. was Frances, d. and h. of John Lambert of Calton, Yorks.

73. ALLGOOD—Ar. a cross eng. gu. bet. four molets az. on a chief or, three roses gu.—Allgood, *in pret.* the same shield. Crest, two arms in armour embowed holding up a heart enflamed gu.

In colour. For Sir Lancelot Allgood of Brandon and Nunwick who m. his cousin Jane, d. and h. of Robert Allgood of Nunwick and Simondburn. M.P. and sheriff of Northumberland, knighted in 1760. These arms were, therefore, drawn before that date. Confirmation of arms with grant of crest made to Lancelot Allgood in 1750. (Harl. Soc., vol. LXVII, 5.)

Supporters, two lions ramp. az. Crest, the head of Moses irradiated. Motto, TANT·QUE·JE·PUIS.
St Rich: Hylton.

In colour. For Sir Richard Hilton of Hayton castle, Cumberland, eldest s. of Sir Richard Musgrave by his w. Anne Hilton. He adopted the name of Hilton by the will of his uncle, John Hilton. His w. was Eleanor, d. of John Hedworth of Chester Deanery. The editor cannot identify quarters II and III of the impal. nor can he account for the canton of the arms of Scotland on quarter I of the Hilton shield.

76. Metcalfe. Crest, a man's bust prop. crowned or, with cap gu.

Mrs. Boucher.

In colours. Mrs. Bourchier was Mildred, d. and coh. of Richard Roundell of Hutton Wansley, Yorks.; she m. John Bourchier of Beningborough, Yorks., sheriff of Yorks., in 1759. He d. at Bath, 14 May 1759; she d. at York 12 Dec. 1796. (*Dugdale's Visit. Yorks.*, ed. Clay, I, 308, and II, 481.)

77. EDEN—Quarterly I and IV gu. on a chev. ar. bet. three sheaves or, three escallops sa.—Eden, II and

III sa. a fess bet. three lambs pass. ar.—Lambton, *imp.* or, a fess wavy bet. six cinquefoils gu.—Davison. Crest, an arm in armour prop. grasping a sheaf or. SI·SIT·PRUDENTIA. (Plate I.)

Sir Rot. Eden.

For Sir Robert Eden, Bart., West Auckland, and his w. Mary, d. of William Davison of Beamish, whom he m. in 1739. The Lambton quarters came by the m. of his grandfather, Sir Robert Eden, first baronet, and Margaret, d. and h. of John Lambton of Durham. He d. 25 June 1755.

In colour. The editor cannot identify this man.

82. FENWICK—Quarterly I and IV ar. a chief gu. and six martlets counter-coloured—Fenwick, II and III Fenwick as I and IV, *imp.* gu. on a chief ar. two molets sa.—Bacon. Crest, a phoenix rising from flames. TOUS-JOURS LOYAL.

Fenwick Esqr., Bawell.

In colour. William Fenwick of Bywell, whose w. was Margaret, d. of William Bacon of Staward; she d. 1769. He was the eldest s. of John Fenwick of Stanton and Brinkburn by his w. Margaret, d. and coh. of William Fenwick of Bywell; hence the quartered arms of Fenwick. He was sheriff of Northumberland, 1752; d. 1782. (NCH, VI, 99.)

83. DUNBAR—Gu. a lion ramp. or, over all on a bend az. three woolpacks or, on a border ar. eight cinquefoils az.—Dunbar. Crest, a demi-lion ramp. rased ar. crowned or.

Mr. Dunbar.

The arms of Dunbar of Machremore, Scotland. The editor has failed to identify this man.

84. LAWSON—Ar. a chev. bet. three martlets sa.—Lawson, *in pret.* quarterly I and IV gu. on a bend erm. three cinquefoils sa.—Roddam, II ar. on a chief sa. three lions' heads rased ar.—Richardson, III sa. a chev. bet. three escallops ar.—Milburn. Crest, two embowed arms in armour holding up the sun in his splendour. RISE AND SHINE.

Hilton Lawson Esqr. of Chirton.

Of Cramlington and Chirton, sheriff of Northumberland 1767, d. December of that year. His w. was Winifred, d. and h. of John Roddam of Chirton. (NCH, XIII, 388.)

85. COOKSON—Per pale ar. and az. two legs in armour counter-coloured—Cookson, *imp.* az. three steel caps turned up erm.—Lutwidge. Crest, a demi-lion ramp. or.

Cookson Esqr., Hannover Square, Newcastle Tyne, 1755; painted the same in an atchievement, y^e armed legs proper or counter-coloured Decr. 1783. [Crest] born some years after with the addition of a ragged staff gules in lion's paws.

Tricked for John Cookson, s. of Isaac Cookson, Newcastle. His w. was the eldest d. and coh. of Thomas Lutwidge of Whitehaven. In 1745 he purchased Whitehill, co. Durham.

86. FENWICK—Ar. a chief gu. and six martlets counter-coloured—Fenwick, *imp.* ar. a cross patonce sa.—Lascelles. Crest, a phoenix rising from flames.

Mr. — Fenwick, Westgate Street, Newcastle, 1755: Tricked. Possibly for John Fenwick, Framlington and Cleadon, who d. 1783; his w. was Dorothy, d. of William Lascelles, Durham. The colours of the *impal.* are different from the usual sa. and or, but they may have been changed for diff.

87. BELL—Sa. a fess erm. bet. three bells ar.—Bell, *imp.* gu. on a chev. ar. bet. three falcons ar. three roundels sa.—Ridley. Crest, a falcon ar.

Matthew Bell Esqr., Westgate Street, Newcastle, 1755.

A merchant adventurer and clothier, sheriff of Newcastle 1736, mayor 1757, d. Woolsington 2 Sept. 1786. His w. was Jane, d. of Richard Ridley, Heaton Hall; m. 19 Feb. 1745, d. June 1792.

88. SWINBURNE—Per fess gu. and ar. three cinquefoils counter-coloured. The red hand of Ulster in centre chief—Swinburne, *in pret.* quarterly I and IV ar. a lion ramp. bet. three crescents gu.—Dillon, II and

III gu. a sword paleways bet. a pair of wings ar.—? Crest, out of a coronet or, a demi-boar ramp. ar. armed and crined or. SEMEL ET SEMPER.

Nov. 10th 1786. Painted on an atchievement and Escutcheon to the memory of Sr. Edward Swinburne, Bart., of Capheaton.

Tricked. Sir Edward Swinburne was born 1733, succeeded his brother 1763 when he was a merchant at Bourdeaux, m. Christine, d. of Robert Dillon, d. at Capheaton 2 Nov. 1786. (HN, II, i, 233.)

John Swinburn Esqr., Westgate Street, 1755. In a later hand Mrs. Swinburn since married.

John Swinburne, Longwitton, Northumberland, Coxhoe, co. Durham, and Westgate, Newcastle, d.s.p., 1773. His w. was Sarah, d. and h. of Thomas Burdon, Coxhoe, who m., as her second husband, Sir James Riddell of Ardnamurchan. (SD, I, 67.)

90. STEPHENSON—Gu. on a bend or, three leopards' faces vert—Stephenson, *imp.* sa. a fess erm. bet. three bells ar.—Bell. Crest, a sheaf or.

Alderman — Stevenson, Westgate Street, 1755.

John Stephenson, alderman of Newcastle, and sheriff in 1728, d. 7 April 1761. His w. was Elizabeth, d. of Matthew Bell, merchant, Newcastle; she d. 25 Jan. 1789. (NCH, XIII, 208.)

91. LLOYD—Ar. a chev. bet. three Cornish choughs sa.—Lloyd, *imp.* barry or and gu. on a bend sa. three escallops or—Muncaster. Crest, a chough sa. with leaf in beak.

Reverend — Loyd or Floyd, Rector of Wighton on the Tyne, 1755.

John Lloyd was rector of Ryton from 1738 to 1766.

92. Quarterly I and IV or, a spread eagle sa.—? Temple, II and III ar. on two bars sa. six martlets ar.—Temple, *in pret.* az. a bend bet. in chief three stags' heads rased ar. and in base three crosses crosslet fitchy ar.—? Crest, out of a coronet or, a martlet ar.

from Berwick . . . ?

Probably for William Temple, burgess of Berwick upon Tweed, mayor 1749 and 1753, collector of customs at Berwick, d. c. 1763. His w. was Sarah, d. of Alexander Johnson of Newcastle, m. at St. Nicholas 14 Jan. 1739, d. March 1747. (JCH, MSS. VIII, 146.)

93. WATERS—Ar. a fess danced bet. three crosses crosslet gu.—Waters, *imp.* az. a chev. engr. erm. bet. three roundels ar. each charged with a slipt trefoil vert—Walker. Crest, a griffin's head.

Matthew Waters Esqr. of Wall's End in ye county of Northumberland painted on an Atchievement to his memory Decr. 1785. He bore his wife's arms in an escutcheon of Pretence till in late she had no issue to him—she was coheiress of the name of Walker. Motto wrote for Achievement by Rev. Mr. Ridley. PLACIDA·MORTE·QUIESCIT.

94. WATERS—Ar. a fess danced between three crosses crosslet gu.—Waters. Crest, an eagle's head rased ar.

Matthew, s. of Thomas Waters by his w. Isabel, d. of Matthew White, of the Red House, Wallsend, was admitted to Lincoln's Inn 31 May 1743, he m. Mary, d. of Henry Walker of Tynemouth, d. 17 Dec. 1783, bur. All Saints, Newcastle. (NCH, XIII, 467.)

95. DURHAM—Or on a cross gu. five fleurs de lis or—Durham. Crest, out of a coronet a fleur de lis or.

Mr. Durham.

Probably for Thomas Durham of Hanover Square, Newcastle, the last of the family of Wallsend. He d. 1768. (*History of Wallsend*, W. Richardson, 418.)

96. WHARTON—Sa. a maunch ar. and a canton or—Wharton, *imp.* vert a fess ermin. bet. three unicorns pass. ar.—Wilkinson. Crest, on a bull's head coupéd ar. a slipt trefoil sa.

Whaton of Durham.

For Thomas Wharton of Old Park, Durham, d. 1794, and his w. Margaret, d. of Anthony Wilkinson, Crossgate, Durham. (SD, III, 300.)

Either for Walter Hicks, hostman of Newcastle, who d. 30 Jan. 1761, or for his son, Lewis Hicks, hostman of Newcastle, who d. 10 July 1769. The father m. Elizabeth Dale, the son's w. was Anne Lake. The *impal.* cannot be identified. (JHC, MS. III, 39, and HN, II, ii, 276.)

Roughly tricked. The shield is that of Errington of Beaufront and Sandhoe, Northumberland. (NCH, IV, 188.)

Roughly tricked. For Sir Carnaby Haggerston, third baronet of Ellingham, d. 1756, and his w. Elizabeth, d. and h. of Peter Middleton, Stokheld, Yorks. (NCH, II, 263.)

105. PARR—Ar. two bars az. and a border engra. sa.—Parr, *in pret.* or a lion ramp. gu.—? Charleton. Crest, an arm in armour grasping a . . . ? VIRTUTE·DUCE.

Roughly tricked. Not identified.

106. CLENNELL—Az. a vested arm issuing from sinister grasping a baton in bend sinister or—Clennell. Helm above shield, no crest; RESURGAM.

Clennell of Clennell in y^e County of Northumberland. Painted on an Atchievement Feb. 22, 1796.

For Percival Clennell of Harbottle castle and Clennell, d. 1796. A marble tablet to his memory, with the above shield, is on the south wall of the nave in Alwinton church. (AA⁴, VIII, 59.)

He was the s. of John Simpson and his w. Anne Clutterbuck (see nos. 7 and 80 above), and m. Anne, d. of Thomas, earl of Strathmore. (SD, II, 269.) The editor cannot explain quarter III, which is the shield granted to the family of Collier in 1629; IV is also difficult to understand, it is the shield of the Simpsons of Fenton Hall, Yorks.

The editor cannot trace this impal. If I and IV are for Bedford it should be *per pale sa. and az. a bend or*; if that is intended the arms may be for Christian, d. of Hilkiah Bedford, who was the w. and widow of George Smith of Burnhall, d. 4 Nov. 1756; she d. 23 July 1781. (SD, IV, 98.) Quarters II and III of the impal. the editor cannot identify.

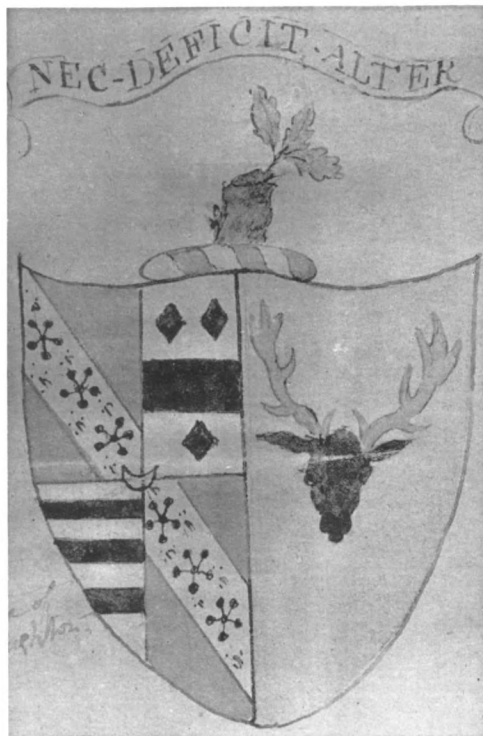

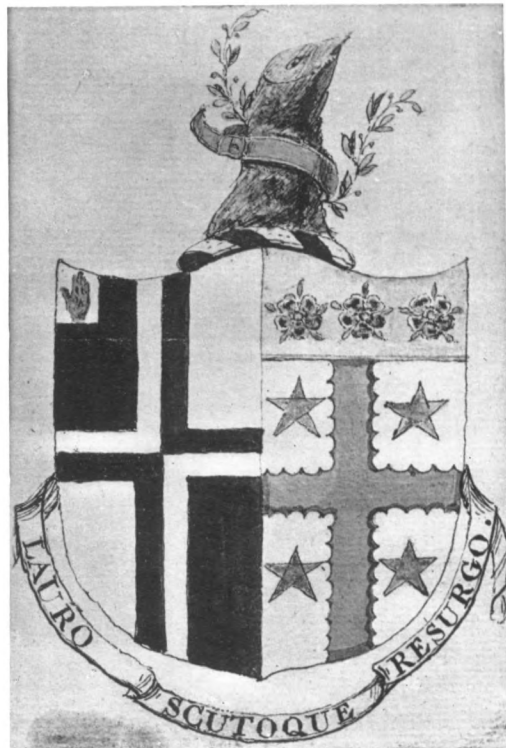
