1636 THOMAS LIDDELL—mayor, as 1609—V, 15.

1636 HENRY LAWSON—sheriff.

Silver a chevron between three martlets sable.

Youngest son of Robert Lawson of Longhirst; apprenticed to Francis Anderson, boothman, 4 April, 1602; date of admission not entered; married Catherine daughter of William Warmouth 23 Sept. 1622; died 1645; buried in St. Nicholas.

1637 JOHN MARLEY—mayor, as 1634.

Silver a chevron engrailed sable between three martlets sable—VIII, 1.

1637 PETER MADDISON—sheriff.

Silver two battle axes saltireways sable—VIII, 2.

Younger son of Henry Maddison (mayor 1623) and brother of Lionel Maddison (mayor 1632); merchant and hostman; married Elizabeth Marley; buried 6 Aug. 1643 in St. Nicholas.

Azure on a bend silver three roundels gules—VIII, 4. 

Party bendways sinister ermine and ermines a lion rampant gold-VIII, 9.

Merchant and boothman; councillor 1642; alderman 1649; buried in All Hallows 1670.

THOMAS BONNER—mayor.

Gules a lion passant between two helms silver one in chief and one in base—VIII, 10.

On 22 Aug. 1649 he, being then mayor, was by favour admitted and sworn a member of the Merchants' company and admitted a free brother of the "new hans." Admitted hostman 4 Jan. 1649; styled mayor and a "free burgess"; alderman 1645; again mayor in 1651 and 1659.

RALPH JENNISON—sheriff—VIII, 22.

Son of William Jennison of Newcastle and his wife Alice Matfen; born Sept. 1613; purchased Elswick 1640; J.P. and D.L. for the town and county; mayor 1668; married firstly Barbara Bowes, secondly Jane Carr; knighted at Whitehall 18 May 1677; bought Walworth estate; died April 1701; buried St. Nicholas.

WILLIAM DAWSON----mayor.

Arms as VIII, 11.

Alderman 1645, committee for militia 1648, on various town committees and on council until 1652, when he was dead and Pete Sanderson elected in his place. 1649 SAMUEL RAWLINGS-sheriff.

Arms as 1646-VIII, 8.

Merchant and draper; admitted hostman 4 Jan. 1605; councillor 1647-55; alderman 1652.

1650 GEORGE DAWSON--mayor.

Arms as VIII, 11.

Merchant and hostman; admitted to latter 8 Oct. 1646; councillor 1645; alderman 1652-55; mayor 1657; collector of customs for the port of Newcastle 1644; buried in St. Nicholas.

1650 JOHN LODGE-sheriff.

Azure a lion rampant silver between three maltese crosses fitchy gold on a border silver eight fleurs de lis sable-VIII, 12.

Son of Christopher Lodge of Haughton "insyde" county Durham, yeoman; apprenticed to Henry Bowes 1 Aug. 1623; no admission date; councillor 1647-51.

1651 THOMAS BONNER—mayor, as 1648—VIII, 10.

1651 PETER SANDERSON-sheriff.

Paly argent and azure on a bend sable a sword silver with gold hilt-VIII, 13.

Son of Samuel Sanderson of Hedley Hope and Brancepeth and his wife Barbara Liddell of Ravensworth. Apprenticed to John Blakiston, merchant and mercer, 1639; admitted 1648; boothman 1649; married firstly Mary daughter of rev. Dr. Jennison, secondly Rachel widow of ---- Mallard of Gateshead; councillor 1650-51; alderman 1652; died c. 1683.

1652 HENRY DAWSON—mayor, as 1646—VIII, 11.

Died during his year of office and George Dawson elected in his place; as 1650-VIII, 11.

1652 JOHN BUTLER—sheriff.

Azure three covered cups gold-VIII, 14.

Merchant and mercer; date of admission not known; son of Gregory Butler of Bishop Auckland. Councillor 1645; captain of the Train bands of the town 1655; married firstly Anne Nicholson, secondly Isabel Milburn; aged 46 in 1666; died Jan. 1695; buried in St. Nicholas beside his two wives.

WILLIAM JOHNSON-mayor.

Party sable and azure on a chevron silver, between three blazing towers gold and in base two spears saltireways gold, five cocks sable combed and wattled gules-VIII, 15. Son of Henry Johnson, he was of Kibblesworth, Durham; apprenticed to Robert Ellison 1626; admitted to company 1636; married Margaret Sherwood; councillor 1652; alderman 1655; died 1678; buried in St. Nicholas.

1653

ROBERT JOHNSON-sheriff.

Arms VIII, 15.

Probably brother of the mayor, as he has the same arms; councillor 1653; captain of the Train bands of the town 1655; alderman 1655.

1654 WILLIAM JOHNSON—mayor, as 1653—VIII, 15.

1654 JOHN RUMNEY—sheriff.

Silver on a chevron party azure and gules three roses gold-VIII, 16.

Son of John Rumney of Penrith; apprenticed to William Boone, boothman, 1631; admitted 1641; hostman 1684; councillor 1648; alderman 1654; died 5 Feb. 1694; left legacies to poor in the parishes of the town and to Jesus hospital; buried in St. Nicholas.

1655

ROBERT SHAFTO-mayor.

Arms as 1607-V, 2.

Probably son of Robert, sheriff in 1607; admitted merchant 5 Oct. 1655; councillor 1639; alderman in place of Wm. Warmouth Aug. 1642; hostman; governor 1655 to 1659; died Nov. 1670.

1655

HENRY THOMPSON-sheriff.

Party silver and sable a fess embattled between three martlets all counter-coloured-VIII, 17.

Merchant and boothman; councillor 1652; alderman and sheriff 1655.

1656 HENRY RAWLING—mayor, as 1646—VIII, 8.

GEORGE BLACKISTON—sheriff.

1656

Arms as 1645-X, 21.

Merchant and boothman; councillor 1644; alderman 1655.

1657 GEORGE DAWSON—mayor, as 1650—VIII, 11.

1657 GEORGE THORESBY—sheriff.

Silver on a chevron sable three lions rampant silver— VIII, 18.

1658 MARK MILBANK—mayor, as 1638—VIII, 3.

1658 JOHN WATSON—sheriff.

Silver on a chief sable three martlets gold—VIII, 19. A councillor from 1650 onwards. There was a John Watson, "merchant of Newcastle," who entered his pedigree and arms at the heralds' visitation of 1666, but the arms differ entirely from the above.

1659 THOMAS BONNER—mayor, as 1648—VIII, 10.

1659 JAMES B[R]IGGS—sheriff.

Ermine on a fess sable between three birds sable (mart-lets?) three rings silver—VIII, 20.

The shield is that of Bigge, differenced; it is given in error as the sheriff's name was *Briggs*.

James Briggs was the son of James Briggs of Grig hall, Westmorland, yeoman; apprenticed to Edward Man, boothman, 10 Aug. 1633; admitted 25 Sept. 1645; styled merchant and boothman 1647; councillor 1653; one of the captains of companies for safety of the town 1655; died c. 1670.

1660 JOHN EMMERSON—mayor, as 1639—VIII, 4.

1660 WILLIAM BLACKETT—sheriff.

Silver on a chevron sable between three pierced molets sable, three escallops silver—VIII, 21.

Son of William Blackett of Jarrow, yeoman; apprenticed to William Sherwood, boothman, June 1636; admitted 1645; admitted hostman 15 Nov. 1652; governor of that company 1667-68; admitted to Eastland company 15 Nov. 1652; married firstly Elizabeth Kirkley and secondly Margaret widow of John Rogers; councillor 1648; alderman 1660; mayor 1666; created baronet 1673; M.P. 1673-80; died 16 May 1680; buried in St. Nicholas.

1661

SIR JOHN MARLEY, KT.—mayor, as 1634—VIII, 1.

THOMAS JENNISON-sheriff-VIII, 22.

Son of Dr. Robert Jennison (hostman); admitted to that company and made governor in 1675 during his mayoralty; admitted to Merchants' company 28 Oct. 1657; died Dec. 1676; buried in St. Nicholas.

HENRY BRABANT-sheriff.

Gules a fess counter-embattled silver between three demi-lions passant silver-VIII, 23.

The shield should be sable and the charges gold and the demi-lions should be leopards' faces.

Son of John Brabant of Pedgebank, Durham, and his wife Jane Johnston of Piercebridge. Apprenticed 2 Feb. 1637 to Alex. Davison, boothman; admitted 19 Feb. 1647: admitted hostman 26 Feb. 1674 when an alderman; he was disfranchised by the town council 20 April 1649 for rebelling against the Parliament; restored to his former freedoms in 1660 and knighted about the same time; mayor 1667; governor of Hostmen's company 1686; died c. 1687.

SIR JAMES CLAVERING-mayor.

Arms as VI. 13.

Son of John Clavering of Axwell, mayor 1629. Baptized 5 Feb. 1619; married Jane Maddison of Saltwellside 23 April 1640; baronet 5 June 1661; admitted by patrimony to the Merchants' company 10 Oct. 1651; governor of Hostmen's company 1664; buried at Whickham 24 March 1702.

ROBERT SHAFTO-sheriff.

Probably son of Robert, mayor in 1655-V. 2.

SIR FRANCIS LIDDELL—mayor, as 1640—V, 15.

FRANCIS LIDDELL-sheriff.

Arms as V, 15.

Eldest son of Sir Francis, the mayor; married Frances daughter of Nicholas Forster of Bamburgh. She died May 1675. Her husband was then of Ogle castle; he died Oct. 1702; buried at Stamfordham.

HENRY MADDISON—mayor, as 1642—VIII, 2.

1665 WILLIAM CARR--sheriff.

Silver on a bend sable between three Cornish choughs three leopards' heads gold—IX, 18.

Second son of William Carr, merchant, and his wife Jane Cocke. Mayor 1670 and 1689; governor of Hostmen's company in latter year.

1666 SIR WILLIAM BLACKETT—mayor, as 1660—VIII, 21.

1666 TIMOTHY DAVISON—sheriff.

Gold a fess wavy between six cinquefoils gules—VIII, 27. Second son of Thomas Davison (mayor 1669); married Elizabeth daughter of Sir Wm. Blackett; alderman. Mayor 1673; admitted merchant by patrimony 13 Jan. 1663; to Eastland company 11 April 1663; governor of the company 1677; purchased Beamish 1682; died 20 Dec. 1696; buried in St. Nicholas. Memorial escucheon for him is in the Merchants' hall.

1667 SIR HENRY BRABANT—mayor, as 1662—VIII, 23.

1667 RALPH GREY—sheriff.

Barry silver and azure on a bend gules a bezant-VIII, 24.

Son of Ralph Grey (sheriff 1628); married Margaret daughter of Roger Bateman; age 39 in 1666; admitted merchant and boothman by patrimony 15 Oct. 1656; to Eastland company 8 March 1661; died c. 1677.

1668 SIR RALPH JENNISON—mayor, as 1648—VIII, 22.

1668 ROBERT JENNISON—sheriff.

Azure a bend gold between two swans silver—VIII, 22. Eldest son of Dr. Robert Jennison, vicar of Newcastle, and cousin of the mayor; admitted merchant by patrimony 18 July 1653; married Muriel Watson of Gateshead; died c. 1670.

1669 THOMAS DAVISON—mayor.

Arms as 1666–VIII, 27.

Merchant and alderman; father of Timothy (sheriff 1666); governor of Merchants' company 1670-75; memorial escucheon for him in the Merchants' hall; died Dec. 1676; buried in St. Nicholas.

1669 JOHN ROGERS—sheriff.

Silver a fleur de lis sable and a chief gules—VIII, 25. Second son of George Rogers of Beaby, Leicestershire; married Margaret daughter of Henry Cock, merchant of Newcastle; he was himself a merchant and died c. 1671.

- 1670 WILLIAM CARR—mayor, as 1665—IX, 18.
- 1670 RICHARD WRIGHT—sheriff.

(Sable) a chevron between three bulls' heads cabossed (silver)—VIII, 26.

Son of Thomas Wright of Ipswich, master mariner; apprenticed to Ralph Grey, boothman, 1 June 1647; admitted 22 July 1657; admitted to Eastland company 12 Oct. 1670; died 5 May 1671 during his shrievalty and Robert Roddam took his place. Buried in St. Nicholas.

- 1671 MATTHEW JEFFRYSON—sheriff.

Azure a fret gold, on a chief silver three leopards' faces gules-VIII, 28.

Son of Richard Jeffryson (Jefferson) of Elton, Durham, gent.; apprenticed to Richard Thursby, boothman, 1 April 1645; admitted 5 Oct. 1655 and to Eastland company 25 Jan. 1652; mayor 1678; died 1 March 1687; buried in St. Nicholas.

ROBERT MALABAR—sheriff.

Gold a chevron gules between three nettle leaves vert—IX, 1.

Son of Mark Malabar of Newcastle, tailor; apprenticed to Thomas Todd, boothman, 6 Aug. 1650; admitted 5 July 1661; to Eastland company 18 July 1664; died c. 1677.

Silver a crow sable—IX, 2.

Alderman and draper of Newcastle; mayor 1679; died 26 Nov. 1693; buried in All Saints.

1674 HENRY JENNISON—sheriff. Arms VIII, 22.

> Younger son of Sir Ralph Jennison (mayor 1668); born 1640; admitted merchant by patrimony 14 Aug. 1668; to Eastland company 3 Oct. 1668; married Mary Watson 1672; buried in St. Nicholas 19 Aug. 1703.

1675 SIR FRANCIS ANDERSON—mayor, as 1641—IV, 11.

1675 WILLIAM CHRISTIAN—sheriff.

(Azure) a chevron between three covered cups (gold)—IX, 3.

Admitted to Hostmen's company 26 Feb. 1674—his freedom only "to extend to his own person."

576 SIR RALPH CARR, KT.—mayor.

Arms IX, 18.

Son of Wm. Carr and Jane Cocke and elder brother of William, sheriff in 1665. Born 14 July 1634; admitted to Merchants' company by patrimony 13 Jan. 1663; to Hostmen's company 6 March 1661; governor of the latter 1677-83 and 1705-07; married firstly Jane daughter of Sir Francis Anderson and secondly Isabella Darcy; purchased estate of Cocken 1665; knighted at Whitehall 26 June 1676; mayor again 1693 and 1705; M.P. 1679; died March 1709; buried at Houghton le Spring.

MICHAEL BLACKETT--sheriff.

Arms as 1660-VIII, 21.

Younger son of ald. Wm. Blackett (sheriff 1660); admitted to Merchants' company by patrimony 22 Jan. 1672 and to Eastland company on the same day; admitted to Hostmen's company also by patrimony 17 Oct. 1678; died 1682 aged about 32.

1677 ROBERT RODDAM—mayor.

Silver on a bend sable three crosses patonce—IX, 4. Son of Cuthbert Roddam of Allendale, yeoman; apprenticed to Thos. Davison, boothman, 2 June 1639; admitted 22 Aug. 1649; to Eastland company 15 May 1646; alderman; married Jane —; died July 1682; buried in St. Nicholas.

Son of Robert Fenwick of Brenkley, gent.; apprenticed to Ralph Heron, boothman, 20 May 1648; admitted 4 June 1658, and to Eastland company 27 May 1661; governor 1696; churchwarden All Saints 1666; married firstly Margaret Young, secondly Elizabeth Bonner and thirdly Mary Squire; hostman 17 Dec. 1689; governor 1689; alderman; mayor 1682 and 1697; died 1707; buried in All Saints.

GEORGE MORTON—mayor, as 1673—IX, 2.

1679

Azure three closed helmets, to dexter, gold-IX, 8.

Son of Thomas Aubone of Newcastle, master mariner; apprenticed to George Dobson, mercer, 25 April 1655; admitted 16 Aug. 1665 and to Eastland company 7 April 1665; alderman; mayor 1684; governor of Hostmen's company 1685 and 1695-1700; died 20 Sept. 1700; buried All Saints. Frances his daughter and coheiress married Edward Surtees of Hedley Woodhead.

1680

SIR NATHANIEL JOHNSON-mayor.

Arms as 1653-IX, 9.

Eldest son of William Johnson (mayor 1653); aged 21 1666; admitted merchant by patrimony 20 Dec. 1669, and to Eastland company 12 April 1678; commissioner of hearth money; M.P. 1679 and 1685; knighted at Whitehall by Charles II 28 Dec. 1680; governor of Leeward Islands 1685 and governor of Carolina 1703.

JOSEPH BONNER-sheriff. 1680

Arms as 1648-VIII, 10.

Son of Thomas Bonner (mayor 1648, etc.); apprenticed to Wm. Dent, boothman, 1 July 1662; admitted 24 July 1672, and to Eastland company 17 Feb. 1670; died 30 Jan. 1695.

1681 TIMOTHY ROBSON—mayor, as 1677—IX, 5.

1681 JOHN SOUIRE-sheriff.

Sable three swans' necks and heads couped silver-IX, 10.

Son of Sampson Squire, gent., of Thruntoft, Yorks; apprenticed to Thomas Sherwood, boothman, 1 March 1658; admitted 27 Jan. 1669, and to Eastland company 8 Feb. 1669; admitted hostman 11 March 1684; alderman; mayor 1687; he was killed during his year of office by a fall from his horse and was buried in St. Nicholas 6 May 1688. His widow Mary married Nicholas Fenwick (sheriff 1678, mayor 1682) in St. Nicholas 7 Nov. 1689.

1682 NICHOLAS FENWICK—mayor, as 1678—IX, 7.

1682 NICHOLAS RIDLEY-sheriff.

Gules on a chevron, between three hawks silver, three roundels sable-IX, 11.

Son of John Ridley of Willimoteswick, gent.; apprenticed to Robert Fenwick, mercer, 8 Aug. 1661; admitted 2 Nov. 1671, and to Eastland company 17 Feb. 1670. The heralds' visitation of 1666 says John Ridley his father was then of Hard Riding, a J.P. for the county and had been a major in the king's army. Nicholas was aged 19 in 1666; married Martha March; admitted hostman 3 Dec. 1700; governor of Merchants' 1704; mayor 1706; styled of Heaton and Newcastle; died 22 Jan. 1710; buried in St. Nicholas.

1683 WILLIAM BLACKETT—mayor.

Arms as 1660-VIII, 21.
