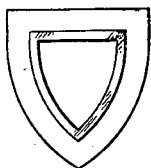


APPENDIX II.

BARONIES WHICH OWED CASTLE-GUARD OR CASTLE-GUARD RENT TO THE CASTLE OF NEWCASTLE UPON TYNE AND WHICH MAINTAINED HOUSES WITHIN IT.

BALIOI.



Gules an orle silver.

The shield borne by the first lords of the barony. So borne by John Baliol lord of Bywell and Barnard Castle; died 1268.

BOLBECK OR BYWELL, whose house was called BOLBECK HALL.



HUGH OF BOLBEC.

Vert a lion rampant silver.

Sheriff of Northumberland in 1221, 1236; died c. 1262.



MARIE DE VALENCE.

Barry silver and azure and an orle of martlets gules.

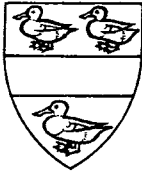
Daughter of Guy de Castillon count of St. Pol and third wife of Aymer de Valence earl of Pembroke who in 1334 held the barony in dower.



SIR RALPH NEVILLE.

Gules a saltire silver.

Lord Neville of Raby; succeeded 1331; married Alice Audley; had grant of reversion of barony after death of Marie de Valence; died 1367.



SIR WILLIAM HERLE.

Gules a fess gold between three shovellers silver.
Name from Kirkharle; serjeant at law 1308; justice of assize 1321; chief justice common pleas 1326; died 1347 seised of half barony of Bolbec, lordship of Kirkharle; etc.

BOTHAL.



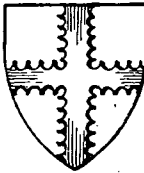
SIR ROBERT BERTRAM.

Gold an orle azure.

Born c. 1322; succeeded his father 1334; sheriff of Northumberland 1343-44; fought at Neville's Cross; granted an annuity out of Newcastle customs for taking Sir Wm. Douglas prisoner; died 1363 seised of the manor and castle of Bothal and other lands.

BOLAM.

The arms of the early lords who took their name from the barony are unknown.

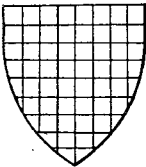


SIR ROBERT RAYMES.

Sable a cross engrailed silver.

Son and heir of Robert Raymes 1; held half the barony of Bolam and manor of Shortflat in right of his wife Agnes; he was sheriff of the county 1345-47, M.P. 1348, escheator 1347; died 1349 seised of a moiety of the barony of Bolam and the manors of

Aydon and Shortflat. This barony did not maintain a house in the castle.

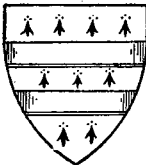


SIR THOMAS BEKERING.

Checky silver and gules.

Of Beckering, Lincolnshire; did homage for his lands there and in Northumberland 1325; held half the barony of Bolam; sheriff of Notts. and Derby 1335; died c. 1352.

DELAVAL.



SIR ROBERT DELAVAL.

Ermine two bars vert.

Born 1289; married Alice daughter of Sir William Felton; summoned to Great Council 1324; died at Seaton Delaval 1353.

DILSTON.

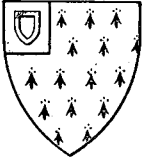


SIR WILLIAM TYNDALE.

Silver on a fess sable three sheaves gold.

GOSFORTH (north).

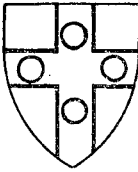


SIR THOMAS SURTEES.

Ermine on a quarter gules an orle silver.

Son of Nicholas Surtees; succeeded to Gosforth 1318;
held the manor of Felling 1333; steward to Bishop
Bury of Durham 1337; died c. 1345.

GAUGY OR ELLINGHAM.



Vert on a cross silver four roundels gules.

As the barony of Ellingham it was held by the Gren-
villes until about the end of the twelfth century and
afterwards by their descendants the Gaugys, from
whom it took its later name.



SIR ROBERT CLIFFORD.

Silver three spread eagles gules.

Descended from the marriage of the heiress of the
Gaugys with a Clifford; possessed the barony in
1304; died 1339.

HADSTONE OR HERON.



Gules three herons silver.

The Herons, lords of Hadstone, Northumberland,
originally held the barony and it was sometimes
called after them.



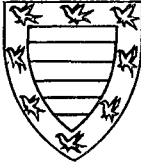
SIR JOHN DARCY, LORD DARCY.

Azure crusilly and three cinquefoils silver.

Called "le cosyn." Married Emmeline daughter and heiress of Walter Heron son and heir of Sir William Heron of Hadstone and Ford. He was son and heir of Sir Roger Darcy of Oldcotes, etc., one of the great men of his day; fought at Crecy and Calais; summoned

to parliament 1331-34; justiciar of Ireland; steward of the king's household; died 1347.

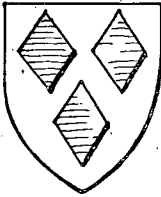
MERLAY OF MORPETH.



ROGER OF MERLAY.

Barry silver and gules, a border azure charged with martlets gold.

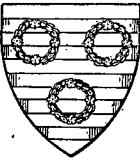
He held the barony in the time of Henry II and it was held by that family until c. 1270. Mary daughter and coheir of Roger Merlay III married William of Greystoke.



WILLIAM OF GREYSTOKE.

Gules three cushions (or lozenges) gold.

He was lord of Greystoke in Cumberland and lord of the barony of Merlay in right of his wife; he died 1289.



SIR WILLIAM FITZ RALPH, LORD GREYSTOKE.

Barry silver and azure three chaplets gules.

He held the barony in 1342. He succeeded to both baronies on the death of his father Sir Ralph fitz Robert who had adopted the surname of Greystoke in 1306. He did homage for his lands in 1342; fought in the French and Scottish wars; made castles of his

houses at Morpeth and Greystoke; died in 1359; buried in Brancepeth church.

WARK UPON TWEED, CARHAM OR ROS.



Gold three bougets sable.

This barony was granted to WALTER ESPEC by Henry I, from whom it passed by marriage to the lords ROS of HAMLAKE, who held it until 1317.



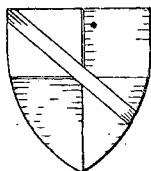
SIR WILLIAM MONTAGU.

Silver a fess of three fusils gules.

He was granted the castle and barony in 1333; created earl of Salisbury in 1337; died 30 January 1344.

WHALTON.

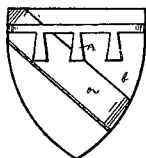
Held in 1165 by Walter son of William, with whose descendants it remained until 1205.



ROBERT SON OF ROGER.

Quarterly gold and gules a baston sable.

Lord of Warkworth. Was granted the barony in 1205; it remained in that family until 1314, when it passed by grant to the Scropes, lords of Masham.



SIR HENRY LE SCROPE.

Azure a bend gold and a label of three points silver.

He was first lord Scrope of Masham; held it in 1341. He was continually employed in the French and Scottish wars; fought at Halidon; warden of the west marches towards Scotland; died in 1391.

The following occur in the fourteenth century who held their lands by the service of paying castle-ward to the castle of Newcastle upon Tyne:

1341 JOHN OF WAUTON.



Silver a chevron sable.

The manor of Brotherwick, near Warkworth. Lords of the manor of Masham, Yorks., with branches widespread in the south and east of England. Agnes, wife of the famous Roger Thornton, was a daughter of the family. John was probably in the service of Robert fitz Roger, lord of Warkworth.

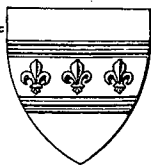
1342 ADAM OF WELLES.



Silver a double-tailed lion rampant sable.

Two parts of the manor of Bywell. He was son and heir of Robert lord Welles; fought in the French and Scottish wars; summoned to parliament 1332-43; died 27 Feb. 1345.

1349 HENRY OF NORMANVILLE.



Silver on a fess doubly cotised gules three fleurs de lis silver.

For Stamfordham, Heugh, etc. The family held land there from early in the thirteenth century to 1344. The shield is that of the lords Badlesmere, differenced by the flowers on the fess.

1359 ISABEL WIDOW OF SIR WALTER CREYK.



Azure a bend between three wyverns.

For the manor of Yetlington. She was the daughter and heiress of Sir Wm. Ridell of Tillmouth, and when she married Sir Walter Creyk she was the widow of Sir Alan Clavering. Sir Walter was sheriff of Berwick upon Tweed. She died 14 May 1360.

1361 ROBERT OF RYHILL.

Arms unknown.

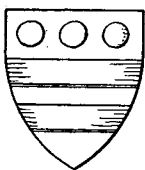
Ryal in Stamfordham. He held a moiety of the township in 1334. Paid for the manor of Hoton.

1370 JOHANNE WIFE OF SIR REES AP GRIFFITH.

Gules on a fess danced silver, between six lions rampant gold, three martlets sable.

For the manor of Benton and part of Stannington. She was daughter and heiress of Philip of Somerville; styled "the lady of Whichnor"; her husband was a Welsh knight.

1405 WILLIAM CARNABY.



Silver two bars and in chief three roundels azure.

For the manor of Halton. Son of Sir William Carnaby and his wife Isabel Fenwick; steward of Hexham; sheriff of Northumberland 1428; died 1453.
