- 3. "9C", "16C", "17C", etc., mean "9th century", "16th century", "17th century", etc.
- 4. Many headings (mostly objects and materials, e.g. Pottery, Leather, etc.) are subdivided into the following chronological periods:

- 5. Entries under the subdivision "1: Prehistoric" may be followed by one of the codes "Bz", "Ir", "Me" or "Ne" (see above). Sometimes these are combined (e.g. "(Bz/Ir)"). If no code is shown, then it is not certain which precise period an entry refers to. Note also that some Iron Age references will overlap with Roman period (Native).
- 6. The abbreviations for excavation reports (XR1, XR2, etc.) may be combined. Examples: XR1Bz/4 means that the site has Bronze Age and Medieval phases. XR2Rm/4/5 means that the site has Roman (military/civil), Medieval and Post-medieval phases.
- 7. The abbreviations "Ir", "Nt" and "RB" all mean that the site, context or object referred to is "British native" (as opposed to Roman military or civil). "Ir" refers to the pre-Roman period only; "RB" refers to the Roman period only. "Nt" means either (a) that the site, context or object referred to is not clearly dateable, and could belong to either the Roman or pre-Roman period; or (b) that (in the cases of sites and contexts) it was occupied continuously from the pre-Roman period into the Roman period.
- 8. Under the headings for most materials (e.g. iron, lead, etc.) there is a subheading for Roman period finds. Most of the entries under this subheading are for finds from Roman (i.e. not native) sites or contexts. Those which from native sites or contexts are marked (RB) or (Nt) (see note 7, above). NB: Pottery has its own, more detailed scheme for Roman finds.
- 9. The "German Limes", abbreviated here to GL, is the name used in this index for the frontier of the Roman Empire in South West Germany. For identification purposes, this index follows the German practice of dividing the Limes into 15 numbered sections ("Strecken"). Individual forts are identified like this:

Neckarburken RF (section 10, GL)

Small forts ("Kleinkastelle") are called "fortlets" in this index, like this:

Haselburg RF (fortlet, section 7, GL)

Individual watch towers ("Wachtposten") are identified by their German reference numbers (and names, if known), like this:

Wp 10/22 (Am Vogelherdschlag)

10. The Index also includes entries for items in the SANT's Newsbulletins, numbers 21 (December, 1996) and 22 (Summer, 1997). These have the prefixes N21: and N22: (e.g. N22: 3).
