2. Local government divisions and names. The index uses the historical ('traditional') counties and boroughs (i.e. large towns) of Great Britain, within the boundaries they had about 1960. 'Newcastle', 'Berwick' and 'Stockton' mean 'Newcastle upon Tyne', 'Berwick-upon-Tweed' and 'Stockton-on-Tees'.

3. Many headings (mostly objects and materials, e.g. Pottery, Leather, etc.) are subdivided into the following chronological periods:

1: Prehistoric (Preh)	
2: Roman period (Rm)	
3: Anglo-Saxon period (AS)	(c. 1500-1100)
4: Medieval (Med)	(c. 1100-1500)
5: PM (PM)	(c. 1500 onwards)

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
