# Office-Holders and Political Society in the Liberty of Durham, 1241–1345 (Part 2)\*

# M. L. Holford

### SUMMARY

The principal aim of this article is to offer a list of the major officeholders in the liberty of Durham for the periods 1241–83 and 1311–45. Provisional though such a list must be, its production requires little justification. Few adequate lists of the liberty's officers have been printed since the eighteenth century, and full lists for the period treated here have never been published. The absence of reliable information on the liberty's officeholders has been a significant obstacle to all historians of the medieval north-east, and also for historians interested in medieval English local administration more broadly. Because of its length, the article appears in two parts. Part 1 appeared in Archaeologia Aeliana, 5th series, vol. 36 (2007), 93–110. This offered an introduction to the list, which described the distinctive structure of the liberty's administration, and outlined the relationship between that administration and local political society. Part 2 comprises the list itself.

#### I: SCOPE AND LIMITATIONS

No list of the liberty of Durham's officers can hope to be fully comprehensive. Even by the later fourteenth century, formal records of appointments were by no means routinely preserved. Throughout the later middle ages, many office-holders are only known through their appearances in charter witness-lists, or the chance survival of other records of their activities; and relatively unlikely sources can contribute extremely valuable information.<sup>1</sup> In such circumstances no account can be definitive; 'one can only aim to improve on existing lists and provide a good basis for lists not produced before'.<sup>2</sup> There can be no doubt that additions will emerge as records at Durham and elsewhere are more intensively explored and catalogued.<sup>3</sup>

#### THE LIBERTY OF DURHAM 1241-1345

The following list, furthermore, does not aim to be fully comprehensive. It deals only with the officers who were most important in the political life of the liberty, and excludes certain 'lesser' officials. These 'lesser' positions, it must be admitted, are not easily defined. There is no ready distinction between 'public' and 'private' administration in the liberty: as we have seen in part 1, the most important officer, the steward of the liberty, supervised both the bishop's 'personal' estates, and the liberty as a whole. Nevertheless, there were many officers whose functions were very largely concerned with the bishop's private estates: bailiffs, parkers, and the like. There were also officers whose roles, while essentially public in nature, were of relatively minor importance, such as the gaoler of Durham castle.

These men were not without their significance in the liberty, not least because their positions provided bishops with an ample store of patronage for their servants and retainers.<sup>4</sup> Minor offices can also be important in attempting to understand any *cursus honorum* that may have operated in the liberty. There are signs, for example, that the keeper of the gaol in Durham castle could progress to more important posts. William Hornby, keeper of the gaol in 1314, occurs as coroner in 1333–4,<sup>5</sup> Richard Whiteparish, gaoler in 1329–30, was later chief forester in 1341–3.<sup>6</sup> Again, the bishop's senior estate officials might also hold lesser public office, and there could be overlap between bailiffs of boroughs and officers of the liberty. Silvester Darlington, sheriff and coroner around 1242, was also bailiff of Darlington.<sup>7</sup> Bernard Thrislington, one of the liberty's foresters, was also bailiff of Darlington in 1327 or 1328,<sup>8</sup> and John Thropton, coroner of Darlington ward in the 1330s and 1340s, also seems to have acted as a bailiff for bishop Bury.<sup>9</sup>

Space, however, does not permit a fuller listing of these 'lesser' officers.<sup>10</sup> Nor does it permit inclusion of the bailiffs of the bishop's boroughs of Durham, Stockton, Darlington, and Gateshead, who deserve fuller study in a different context. And finally, the officers appointed by the Crown during vacancies of the see have also been omitted from the following list. For all these reasons, the information presented here is only a starting-point for research into the liberty's political society. And this is all the more true because the list deals only with secular appointments, and gives no account of the bishop of Durham's ecclesiastical officers. The omission is justifiable, not least because much information on clerical careers is available elsewhere;<sup>11</sup> but the reader should bear in mind that a good number of 'secular' officers were clergymen who also had a role in the administration of the diocese or archdeaconry of Durham.

## **II: FORMAT AND PRESENTATION**

Offices are listed in the following order: steward; chancellor; constable of Durham or treasurer/receiver; sheriff; justices; commissioners; coroner; foresters; constable or sheriff of Norham; receiver of Norham; justices in Norham. As explained in part 1, the offices of constable and treasurer were probably associated in the thirteenth century, and in the fourteenth century the offices of chancellor, constable, and receiver became combined. Also by the fourteenth century, the sheriffs of Durham and Norham were acting as, and sometimes described as, escheators. 'Norham' here denotes the 'county' of Norham (also called 'Norhamshire' in part 1). Norhamshire was also used by contemporaries, but less frequently, to denote one of the districts (the other was Islandshire) within the county of Norham.

I have aimed to provide full, but not exhaustive evidence for individuals' tenure of office. In the case of officers who only occur in a few dated charters, some undated appearances have

also been noted. Inevitably, periods of office are often approximate, not least because some are based on charters which can only be loosely dated. In several cases, it is probable that tenure of office extended beyond the dates given here. Thomas Surtees, for example, almost certainly continued as steward of the liberty until the end of Richard Bury's episcopate, even though he does not seem to be documented in that office during 1345. Such deductions and speculations, however, must be left to the reader.

References to the liberty's justices have been given in particular detail; and in addition to listing the justices, I have provided the dates of judicial sessions. These have been given in their original as well as modernized form, since there is a possibility that they denote legal return days rather than calendar dates. A broader aim in listing these justices and sessions has been to illustrate the nature and extent of legal activity in the liberty. It is hoped that such a record can make some contribution to the debate about the effectiveness, or otherwise, of Durham's judicial systems.

Personal names have been standardized where possible. Surnames derived from placenames (where these can be identified with reasonable certainty) are given in the Ordnance Survey spellings. The exception is Kelloe, since by convention the bishop of Durham who took his name from that place is known as Richard Kellawe. Other surnames are given in a common modern spelling (Chancellor, Surtees) or in the most common medieval form (Gategang, Menevill). With some regret, no attempt has been made to distinguish knights. The sources used are not consistent in recording the status of officers, and there are too many cases where dominus could be the honorific of a clergyman rather than a knight. There is some consistency, however, in the use of magister, and 'masters' have been distinguished.
