Since the back numbers of *The Nigerian Field* constitute a major asset of The Nigerian Field Society, Council appointed a sub-committee to take stock. The Editorial Board also received an offer of a permanent home for the Journals at the Dominican Institute, Samonda, Ibadan. I am pleased to report that the back numbers of the Journal have now been installed in chronological order in their new home, thanks to the combined efforts of

the members of the sub-committee, students of the Department of Library Studies of the University of Ibadan and the Secretary of our Society.

At its meeting held on Dec. 6th 2003, Council revised the price of back numbers of the Journal as follows:
