## **EDITORIAL**

The A.B.M. took place at the Department of Botany, University of Ibadan, on June 11<sup>th</sup> 2010. Professor I.F. Adeniyi, of the Department of Zoology, Obafemi Awolowo Uuniversity, Ile-Ife, was elected President of the Nigerian Field Society. Other officers, whose terms are still running, remain the same.

The next day a symposium, on endangered species in Nigeria, took place at the Cooperative Hall, University of Ibadan. An array of experts from the life sciences presented papers on the subject, to a well-packed audience. This issue contains all the papers presented. It opens with an article on the subject, by J.G.C. Allen, reprinted from vol. 1, no. 1 (1931). Articles on endangered species include one by Prof. S. Fagade on animals, exclusive of birds and primates, then one by Dr. A.U. Ezeolor on threatened birds, one on primates by Emmanuel Obot, and two on endangered plant species by J.C. Okafor and by A.O. Isichei.

After the symposium, the participants went for lunch at the Institute of Tropical Agriculture (See photo at the back of this issue). After the lunch, John Peacock led an expedition into the I.I.T.A. forest.
