Canoe trip at Ijebu

On Sunday the 28th of November Melissa Morse and the Nigerian Field Society presented a canoe trip in the village of Ibeju near Epe.

A group of approximately 18 adventurous souls (including four young children) were warmly welcomed in Ibeju by our guide a local school teacher named Mufu, a set of highly skilled boatmen and a band of excited village children.

After a quick demonstration in how leaves are transformed into raffia for weaving, everyone set off, each in his or her own canoe with accompanying boatman.

The waterways through the thick forests harbour the surreal feeling of calm and beauty. The sounds of birds and monkeys surround you while the clean water slowly flows on its way to the ocean.

The trained eyes of the avid bird watchers amongst us spotted the most exquisitely coloured King Fishers. It was easy to imagine that we were miles away from anywhere but the soft, distant sound of drums served to remind us that we were in actual fact surrounded by several small villages.

This was the perfect relaxing outing for a Sunday morning. Who knew that just an hour's drive from bustling Victoria Island one could find this pristine get-away?

This outing was thoroughly enjoyable and comes highly recommended to all - even the less-adventurous at heart!

Visit to Murtala Muhammad Botanical Garden

Fourteen of us joined field-trip organiser Charles Wheeler at the Nigerian Conservation Foundation (NCF), Lekki at 8:00am. After a brief introductory talk by Professor Emmanuel Obot, we drove in convoy to Murtala Muhammed Memorial Botanical Garden, Epe, arriving just after 9:00am. Only 64 kilometres and a 35-minute drive from the toll booths on Lekki Expressway on a traffic-free Sunday, and we were in the bush.





Or to be exact we were in the 60 hectares (one hectare = 2.5 acres) of savannah known as the Murtala Muhammed Botanical Garden.

Founded by Mrs Ajoke Muhammed to honour her husband (Nigeria's former Head of State, General Murtala Muhammed who was assassinated in 1976), the garden was established to conserve rare and ornamental plants and to provide an education centre, library, picnic garden and flora museum. Now without funds and rather forgotten about, the buildings are ramshackle. signage is dilapidated and the grounds are slowly returning to bush, although there were signs of upkeep as we strolled along swept and mostly weed-free paths.

We spent a couple of hours walking at leisure in the company of Professor Obot and Mkobong

Ekaete, who identified flora and fauna and answered all our questions. At the pond we saw the bog plant sagittarius, an aquatic species of utricularia which is insectivorous, a nitrogen-giving species of azolla and two species of water lily. Professor Obot pointed out the alanblackia flowering plant, which is an indigenous source of natural vegetable fat, the vanilla africana vine and source of vanilla pods, xylopia aethiopica an evergreen, aromatic tree and source of the hot peppers traditionally used in Nigerian pepper soup, pentaclethra machrophylla or African oil bean, a traditional source of protein when cooked and mashed, the aerial yam vine which produces edible fruits and bixa orellana a small tree with bright red spiny fruits that are the source of the red pigment annatto; bixa orellana is used traditionally by new mothers to decorate their bodies and to help the body recover from childbirth.

We walked through the African Palm Garden; saw a calabash tree weighed down by kilos of fruit, and spotted lizards, butterflies, dragonflies, sunbirds, babblers, bee-eaters and African pied hornbills. Our visit ended with a picnic lunch in the still-useable picnic rondavels, under the shade of a huge cassia tree. It was a privilege to spend time in this quiet wilderness with just birdsong, the sunshine and a cool breeze.
