Samian ware from Hartshill

The material ranges from the Flavian-Trajanic period to the late second century. Most of it is from Lezoux, though there are a few pieces from Les Martres-de-Veyre and La Graufesenque.

Worthy of separate note are:

- i) Form 18, stamped S[VL]PICIV by Sulpicius of La Graufesenque, where the die (11a) is known to have been used. A stamp from a smaller version of this date, made by <u>surmoulage</u>, occurs at the main site at Corbridge and one of his other stamps appears at Wilderspool. His decorated ware is Flavian-Trajanic. c.AD 80-110.
- ii) Form 37, from Les Martres-de-Veyre. The panels include: 1) A lion, etc., to left (not in D. or O.). 2) A saltire, incorporating the motif Rogers U118 and an acanthus (Rogers K10). Cf. S & S 1958, pls.49, 586 and 43, 493 for the use of these motifs in saltires. The basal wreath consists of trilobed motifs (not closely identifiable). The beaded rosette in Rogers C280 and the larger rosette is Rogers C80. The bowl is from a mould by one of the potters who supplied Donnaucus, Rogers's X-13. c.AD 110-125.
- iii) Form 37, Central Gaulish. The surviving panels contain: 1) Bacchus (D.534a) and a pillar (similar to Rogers P2). 2) A caryatid (D.655). The fabric suggests origin at Les Martres-de-Veyre, but the bowl cannot be assigned to a particular potter. Trajanic.

Three Central Gaulish vessels, probably all Antonine. They include form 30, in the style of, and probably with a stamp of, Mercator iv. The fragmentary stamp label matches in depth, and the shape of the end of the frame, stamps from one of his dies (3a, used at Lezoux), though no letters survive. He used the ovolo (Rogers B258) and medallions (Rogers (E10?) the latter on a stamped form 30 from Corbridge. The figure-type, probably the scarf-dancer D.216, overlaps the top of one of the medallions. The stamp, when complete, gave MER/\TOR.M retrograde (S & S 1958, pl.145, 9). It occurs on decorated bowls from Chesters and South Shields. c.AD 160-190.

This assemblage, recovered in the period 1960-62 by excavation and casual finds, suggests continuous use of samian on the site from the late first or early second century to, at least, the 160s.

The earliest, South Gaulish, material comes from La Graufesenque and there are a few Trajanic pieces from Les Martres-de-Veyre, but the bulk of the samian consists of Hadrianic and Antonine Lezoux ware.

Owing to the eroded state of the pottery, very few plain forms can be distinguished, but those which have been identified, together with the decorated bowl of Mercator, suggest that samian was still reaching the site in the 160s, and perhaps later.

The amount of samian is very small for the area in which it was found (2 acres, approximately), compared with the kiln site at Manduessedum, where considerable quantities were recovered in an area of 11.21 acres.

Many of the sherds in this assemblage are not closely dateable because of their eroded condition, but it is clear from the better-preserved pieces that samian was in continuous use on the site from the pre-Flavian period to the third century.

There is sufficient Claudio-Neronian and Neronian material to suggest that the use of samian was well established by the mid-50s. The South Gaulish ware is nearly all from La Graufesenque, but there are one or two vessels which appear to be Montans fabric. These will be among the earliest samian on the site. First-century Montans ware is uncommon in Britain, apart from London and the fort at Mancetter, where there are several vessels, perhaps from a single consignment. Those from the kiln site may well be from the same source.

The supply of samian to the site was most abundant in the Antonine period when samian was, in general, most prolific in Britain, but other-wise the level of supply was fairly constant in the first and earlier second centuries, apart from a drop in the Trajanic period. This is quite common in Britain, at a time when the main supplier of samian was Les Martres-de-Veyre, which does not seem to have matched the vast quantities of samian produced at La Graufesenque. Here, however, the proportion of Flavian-Trajanic ware from South Gaul also seems rather low.

The second-century material from the Hadrianic period onwards is mostly from Lezoux, but there are two vessels from Montans, which will fall within the range c.AD 110-145, and a few from the later group of potters at Les Martres.

Most of the East Gaulish ware comes from Rheinzabern, with a few pieces from Trier and one possibly from La Madeleine. This last, and one of the Rheinzabern vessels are certainly second-century, but some of the material,

particularly from Trier, is almost certainly third century.

The most striking, though not surprising, feature of this assemblage is the almost total lack of gritted samian mortaria. Among a large quantity of late second-century ware, only one form 45 has been noted, and there is a sherd of form 43 or 45. The earlier, ungritted forms, Ritterling 12 and Curle 11, are rather more numerous. There are five first-century examples and three second-century, one from Lezoux and two from Les Martres-de-Veyre. Whether this is related to the function and development of the site is impossible to assess, since it is by no means certain that these ungritted forms, despite their spouts, were used in the same way as coarseware mortaria.
